### Points in Mining Law

The first requisite of a valid mining claim is the discovery of mineral "in place," and until that is done a claimant nas no security in its possession. Mineral n place means that which is found in the place where first deposited, as distinguished from "float," or such as has been de tached from its native place. The latter can be made the basis of a placer claim

The location of fissure claims, to be valid, must be upon the vein, and the side lines must be equi-distant from the centre of the vein. Consequently if at my point along the side lines the vein departs from the surface boundaries, the cation beyond such point is "defeasible

If the vein is not found along the centre of location, lengthwise, so that the istance by either side line is greater than half of the width, the excess cannot be held by the locator.

On the "dip" of the vein, i. e., its departure from the perpendicular in its downward course, the claimant may go outside of his side lines, provided he has the top or apex of the vein between his

Discovery alone gives title for the time allowed by law for the completion of loeation and record; and after location and ecord have been made the title still reates back to the time of discovery. It is advisable to have the date of discovery expressed in the location certificate, but such inceptive title may be lost by failure to make location and record in proper time and an intervening location and

The actual possession of any part of the public lands gives good title to the possessor as against a mere trespasser; that is, one who has not a better right. Abandonment is a question of intention to be proved by the re-locator.

Where land is of such a character that lacer so as to include a vein or a lode, e existence of which is known to the

A neglect to do the annual labor requird by law, leaves a claim open to re-locaion. But neglecting to do the annual or does not work a forfeiture of the laim unless after such neglect and before another has located the claim, and after re-entry of the first locator the title reates back to the first location. But if the first locator finds another in possession who is making or is about to make a location, such re-entry is not sufficient o dispossess the latter in order to rein state the former, but he must finish his annual labor for that year before the location of the other shall be complete (see Morrison's Mining rights, page 60).

There is some difference of opinoin as to when the annual labor shall be per-The law says that not less than \$100 worth of labor shall be performed or improvements made during each year, and the general interpretation has been that the annual period dates from the time of location, but it has been decided recently by the Land Department, that he assessment work is to be done during the calendar year, i. e., from January to January, so that the safe way would be to ollow that course. The work expended in making the location counts as part of the first annual labor. After entry of application for patent no labor is required, ince the patent, when issued, relates

The miner's title is not a vested right prior to the obtaining of a patent-that is, may be revoked by the government. The reason is that nothing is paid for mineral warranty deed without a saving clause gainst the United States. MINES THEREABOUT.

Together with Mr.A.W. Dunn, a News reporter started, last Monday morning, to worth their while to go and see in it a Gulch, to note the progress of development, and the prospective value of some of the mines. (There is a beer garden at the mouth of Horse Gulch).

A group of mines and prospects situated on what is known as Sockrider's Peak, (a spur of Mt. Elliott) north of Horse ed. Gulch, on the west bank of the Rio Dolores, was first visited:

LILLY.

Boaro & Geogline, owners of this property, have as development, an assessment shaft and an open cut of about 12 feet, which shows a well defined vein of mineral, assaying 22 ozs silver, which will doubtlesss increase in richness on further development.

Messrs. Dunn and Carey, owners have done considerable work for development on this property. At tunnel No. 1, about 20 feet from top of lead or ledge, they have attained a depth of 33 feet, running an incline. The work is first class in every respect, and the true fissure, 6 feet between walls, rewards the work, showing a four foot pay streak, assaying from 200 to 400 ozs silver, and from 4 to 60 ozs gold. Top rock from this ledge assays \$100 silver and \$20 gold per ton. An anal ysis gave the following. Silver, 400 ozs.

Gold. \$60. Lead, 22 per cent.,

Copper, 6 per cent.

They now have about 8 tons of free milling ore lying on the dump of the upper level. At tunnel No. 2, they have an open cut of about 25 feet with an incline fairly begun. The lead or vein matter is defined for a distance of 300 feet perpendicular from lower to upper level, as shown by survey of F. W. Gove. These gentlemen will also begin the work of a centre and third level within a short time. which work will be pushed with vigor this fall and winter.
