**Mines and Prospects.**

**A TWO DAYS TRIP AMONG THE MINES THEREABOUT.**

**Some of the Workings for the Hidden Treasures, Etc.**

Together with Mr. A. W. Dunn, a News reporter started, last Monday morning, to take in the mines in the vicinity of Horse Gulch, to note the progress of development, and the prospective value of some of the mines. (There is a beer garden at the mouth of Horse Gulch.)

A group of mines and prospects situated on what is known as Sockrider's Peak, (a spur of Mt. Elliott) north of Horse Gulch, on the west bank of the Rio Dolores, was first visited:

**LILLY.**  
 Boaro & Geogline, owners of this property, have as development, an assessment shaft and an open cut of about 12 feet, which shows a well defined vein of mineral, assaying 22 ozs silver, which will doubtless increase in richness on further development.

**SADIE.**  
 Messrs. Dunn and Carey, owners have done considerable work for development on this property. At tunnel No. 1, about 20 feet from top of lead or ledge, they have attained a depth of 33 feet, running an incline. The work is first class in every respect, and the true fissure, 6 feet between walls, rewards the work, showing a four foot pay streak, assaying from 200 to 400 ozs silver, and from 4 to 60 ozs gold. Top rock from this ledge assays \$100 silver and \$20 gold per ton. An analysis gave the following:  
 Silver, 400 ozs.  
 Gold, \$60.  
 Lead, 22 per cent.  
 Copper, 6 per cent.

They now have about 8 tons of free milling ore lying on the dump of the upper level. At tunnel No. 2, they have an open cut of about 25 feet with an incline fairly begun. The lead or vein matter is defined for a distance of 300 feet perpendicular from lower to upper level, as shown by survey of F. W. Gove. These gentlemen will also begin the work of a centre and third level within a short time, which work will be pushed with vigor this fall and winter. There is a good easy grade for a wagon road from the mouth of Horse creek to the Sadie mine, and owners of mines in this group contemplate the building of a wagon road at an early day.

**LITTLE ROCHESTER.**  
 Messrs. Doren & Sawyer, owners, have finished the assessment work on the lode, having a shaft and an open cut, both showing about four feet of mineral giving encouraging tests. The Little Rochester is a promising prospect for the amount of development.

**INSPECTOR.**  
 Dunn & Carey have in the Inspector a cross lode, running parallel with the Little Rochester, a quartz ledge, cased with soft carbonates on either side of the vein, assaying 22 ozs silver and 1/2 oz gold per ton. An open cut of 15 feet exhumes a handsome vein of mineral.

**C. H. V.**  
 A cross lead of the Sadie, a fair prospect has mineral in place, of carbonate nature, assaying well from top rock.  
**U. P. MC.**  
 This familiarly named lode, owned by Messrs. Dunn, Doren & Sawyer, situated on the west bank of the Rio Dolores, opposite the famous Black Bird, has a vein of general decomposition of *quartz sabs*, assaying 12 ozs from top rock, improving in appearance and value as depth is gained. A tunnel will be run on the lode this fall.

**ZURILDA.**  
 The Zurilda, owned by Messrs. Enderich, Patton and Holden, is advantageously situated on the bank of the Rio Dolores, near water and close to timber. A vein of soft and hard yellow and black carbonates may be seen at the breast, or traced along the side walls of the tunnel. The ore is of average grade, and according to assay tests will pay to mill.

**M. S. BUTLER.**  
 The Butler has a narrow streak of genuine lead carbonates, assaying from the lowest to the highest, all of which taken together, will mill and give to the owners a good profit. There is about five feet of vein matter between walls, carrying a two foot pay streak. The pay streak has increased from the commencement of work upon it.

**REPUBLICAN.**  
 The Republican lode shows a pretty vein of mineral, which will doubtless mill and pay. It has an incline tunnel at a depth of about 35 feet, well timbered. Having reached the depth of the bed of the Dolores river, it is now difficult to go

further without some means of pumping the water.

**MINES FURTHER UP HORSE CREEK. PUZZLE.**

With other visitors we were shown through the extensive works of the famous Puzzle mine. There are various tunnels, shafts, drifts and adits, constructed on the mine, in all of which may be seen ore running from 50 to 2000 ozs silver and considerable amounts of gold per ton. A great amount of Puzzle ore has been shipped, milled and sold, which has netted the owners several thousand dollars. The Puzzle has not been sold nor does the owner express any desire to sell. We understand the Grand View Smelting company has contracted for a large amount of the ore, and shipping has already begun. To enter into the minuteness of the matter we deem wholly unnecessary, though to those who have not seen the Puzzle, we would say it is well worth their while to go and see in it a valuable mine, (provided Mr. Bennett who is in charge, has time to show them through, at leisure he will take pleasure in doing so.) The prominent mines of Dolores Carbonate camp are frequented with visitors, though if visitors draw their visits mild, they will be courteously treated.

**RICO.**  
 The Rico is situated about three miles from the mouth of Horse gulch, on the south bank of Horse creek, Messrs. Chas. Bullock and Frank Collins, owners, has as development an open cut from which a shaft is sunk to the level of the creek bed, from whence an incline will be run. The boys have a fine body of mineral, assaying 716 ozs silver per ton.

**LEGAL TENDER.**  
 This prospect is situated near the noted Johnnie Bull bonanza. The assessment work exposes an ordinary vein of mineral. Further development will tell.

**NEW DISCOVERY.**  
 Mr. H. Heath discovered an extension of the C. B. & Q. a few days ago, an assay giving from top rock 170 ozs silver per ton. Mr. Heath and Johnnie Eggers will commence an incline shaft on the ground the coming week.

**VICTORIA.**  
 Messrs. Grigsby, Boaro and Geogline, owners have constructed an open cut and a tunnel, the cut being about 15 feet and tunnel about 25 feet. The average assay of the ore is given at 150 ozs silver per ton.

**JOHNNIE BULL.**  
 The Johnnie Bull, though discovered but a few weeks ago, has gained prominence among the most prominent mines of the camp. Messrs. W. L. Hull and Antonio Boaro, the kings of this bonanza, say that at the surface of the discovery there was little encouragement for development, but on going in but a few feet it was found that the Bull was a mine, assaying in the thousands as stated in former issues of the News. A tunnel was started from which a drift is being run on the vein. This lode is at present the centre of attraction among prospectors, is situated about four miles from the mouth of Horse creek on the north bank, from which point mountains in Utah can be seen. There are several hundred men in the vicinity of the "Baby Mine," in search of an extension or something a "wee bit" like it. Messrs. Hull and Boaro have contracted a large amount of ore to the Grand View smelter, and will begin shipping next Monday.

**BROTHER JONATHAN.**  
 The Brother Jonathan is beyond question an extension of the Johnnie Bull, as it is located on the course of the vein. Finny Jones, locator, says he would trade but will take chances on his mine being the genuine Jonathan and brother of the Bull, an open cut is made, and a tunnel begun, the vein carrying the same nature of mineral.

**CONSOLIDATED RICO MINING AND MILLING COMPANY.**  
 The company of which S. S. Mann is president, and W. H. Hintz, secretary, and S. S. Mann, F. L. McClure, J. J. West, F. W. Raymond, S. P. Brown, Wm. Hart, R. L. Morgan and F. A. Cornell, directors, have done a great deal to advance the best interests of the camp, having developed and improved their mining properties and exerted every means to get their milling apparatus in operation. In transporting the machinery to Rico, they became victims to the carelessness indulged in by shipping agents.

Their mill site is advantageously situated at the mouth of Horse Creek, on a beautiful level plateau or park with the natural advantage of a splendid water power. A mill race has been constructed carrying from Horse creek all the water needed to run both saw mill and smelter. A good force of men is now rapidly pushing for the early completion of the saw mill, located on the mill site, and will be ready to make a run in about ten days. A great deal of work has been done on the mill site, in building, ditching etc. Among the mines of the company are the Elgin Boy, Lady Elgin, Highland Mary, Dolores, Cleveland and Gerlie, good and valuable properties, most of them with the amount of work necessary to obtain patents. **COLORADO BOY.**  
 The Colorado Boy is situated on expectation mountain, owned by Messrs. Roedenhouse, Howard and Kennedy, have worked a shaft to the depth of 20 feet and a tunnel to a depth of 20 feet. The vein is of soft manganese about feet in width. Assays give from 20 to 30 ozs silver per ton. The

**SILVERHEEL.**  
 near the Colorado Boy, owned by same gentlemen, has a shaft 50 feet deep with a cross of 25 feet. A vein of mineral about 3 feet wide, assays from 40 to 60 ozs silver per ton, and promises to one of the leading mines of the camp, so the

**FLORA TEMPLE**  
 owned by the same gentlemen, has a tunnel to the depth of 40 feet. A tunnel and a half foot vein of mineral, assays from \$30 to \$40 in gold and silver. They will continue the work of development this season.

**UTAH.**  
 The Utah lode is situated on the north bank of Horse creek, Antonio Boaro, Parsell and Louis Waldon, owners, have an open cut of about 11 feet and a tunnel 15 on the lode, vein of decomposed matter, about 6 feet between walls, will continue the work of the tunnel in a short time.

**C. B. & Q.**  
 Messrs. Erhardt, Eggers and French have let a contract to work an incline shaft 30 feet. There is a good force of work under the contract. Assays from top rock gave 136 ounces silver per ton.

**ITEMS FROM VARIOUS MINES IN OTHER LOCALITIES.**  
 Lookout, situated on Expectation mountain, about two miles from town, assessment work done, surveyed and recorded. The owners will begin work on the lode in a short time, and think they will be able to ship ore at a depth of twenty feet.

**Brooks.**—Some valuable ore has been taken from the Brooks, lately. There is a well defined body of low grade mineral in this lode, with small pockets of rich mineral, which will doubtless pay for milling the whole vein matter on further development.

The Hawkeye State, owned by Fred Downs and W. A. Lyons, is situated on Elliott mountain, west side of Dolores river, two and one-half miles from Rico and has a pay streak of 18 inches of carbonates (both iron and lead). Assays 34, 52, 64, 98 and 185 ounces in silver have had from this prospect.

The Hidden Treasure No. 2, is located about three miles from Rico, being about 1,500 feet from the Pioneer saw-mill on the Dolores. It has an 18 inch vein of black sulphurets, running from 26 to 30 ounces in silver from the grass rock downwards. This promising piece of property is owned by Messrs. McGraw, Allen and Dewey.

The Carbonate mine, owned by A. Demasters & Co. shows a vein of soft and hard carbonates together with gale and gray copper, that assays as high as 186 ozs silver with 40 per cent. lead. The property with a little development, would undoubtedly rank among the best mines in the camp. The company contemplates putting on a force of men about the end of the inst.

We have just been shown a very fine specimen of ore taken from the Noonday lode, situated on Horse gulch, five miles from Rico, owned by Messrs. B. M. Juds and Ira Russell, it looks as if it would run up well in the hundreds of ounces, but they have no report from the assayer yet can not give exact figures. They are millions in it, at least we hope so for the sake of discoverers.

We are in formed that Mr. Frank Coe of the Lower Animas, boasts that he will make the editors of the Dolores News get down on their knees, if he should once chance to meet either of both of them. Mr. Coe, we will give you a pointer: First, we have no fear of rope-pulling cowards, in the day-light, and when it is dark we will keep a lookout, but will get to the front with even the really bad men, when absolutely necessary. There are two or three of your kind of people here now, and probably if you were here, it would behoove our citizens to lock up their chickens.

RECENT MINING DECISIONS.

The following is an important decision of the Secretary of the Interior, made August 9, 1880.

1. That a claimant having a mining claim which has been located and recorded according to law, has a right to have it accurately surveyed and plotted, by or under the authority of the Surveyor-General.

2. The survey, being an *ex parte* proceeding, no one except the claimant is interested and no one except the claimant can have the right to appeal from the action of the Surveyor-General, in approving or disapproving the same.

A Tomichi correspondent of the Denver *Tribune* says: "Judge H. L. Bryant is running a tunnel to cut the Little Carrie, at a depth of 200 feet, and is also sinking a shaft on the same. It is one of the largest and best mines in Colorado. The walls are in places forty feet apart with a distinct salvage. Both walls are lithologically the same—schistose rock. One can not help but take off his hat to them and say, 'Here it is!' The value in the quartz ore consists of about  $\frac{1}{2}$  silver and  $\frac{1}{4}$  gold." These tidings come from the Tomichi district to gladden the heart of W. H. Bean, of Rico, who is the owner of 7-48ths in the Little Carrie, the estimated value of which is \$150,000. Mr. Bean will leave for that reason in a short time to attend to some matters connected with it, but returns soon to his interests in Rico and vicinity.
