Editor Dolores News: B Rico a carbonate camp? If it is, I venture the prediction that it will eclipse Leadville in the extent and value of the silver ore under her hills.

All the mines yet opened near Rico, are in the carboniferous or post carboniferous strata, as proved by the fossil remains found in one of the thicker limestone beds.

The working capital shares now offered for sale by the Rico Silver Mining Company should be quickly taken up.

The Spar mine, owned by McCaw Brothers, is being worked by three men. A tunnel has been run 170 feet, and a shaft has been sunk from the upper level, 30 feet, which shows 12 inches of solid galena and gray copper.

It is not necessary for present purposes to consider the various theories of vein formation, further than to suggest that the theory of the Leadville deposits by Dr. Emmons, U. S. geologist in charge, shows clearly the derivation of the Leadville carbonates from the adjoining porphyry and limestone.

It will be seen that 15,249 votes were cast for all points other than Denver, leaving our choice with a majority of 14,999 over all competitors combined, and 24,201 majority over the next highest candidate (Pueblo).

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—One of the most elegant entertainments of the season thus far, was given this evening at Willard's hotel by Representative Belford of Colorado, in honor of Governor John L. Routt, who is now here on a short visit.

Rico Silver Mining Company.

We take particular pleasure in calling attention to the advertisement of the Rico Silver Mining Company which appears for the first time in this issue.

This company owns some very valuable property in Horse gulch and on Elliott mountain. The Puzzler mine in Horse gulch, for which the United States patent has been secured, is sufficiently developed to show that it contains rich ore and that it can be easily and cheaply worked.

The Georgie lode is situated in Horse gulch just east of the famous Puzzle mine. The surface grounds of the two claims almost join. It is thought that the rich Puzzle vein extends lengthwise into the Georgie claim.

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MINING MENTION.

The Big Casino is one of the Fish Lake properties which attracted considerable attention last summer. It carries brittle silver and sulphures and has a pay streak of 1 foot, which assays from 50 to 1000 ounces. Owned by Dr. J. P. Landon and Louis Sherbino.

The Setting Sun is situated upon the north fork of Horse gulch and is now bonded for \$5,000. Width of the vein is 5 feet, character of the ore is quartz and manganese, which assays from 40 to 100 ounces and is similar in appearance to the Grand View ore. Owned by A. H. Steele and A. M. Rogers.

The General Sheridan is located on the northwest slope of Telescope mountain and is of the group consisting of the Gen. Logan, Gen. Sherman and Pigeon and adjoins the latter. It has the same formation as other members of the group, and has carbonate ore. Owned by Louis Habermann, B. F. Klee and R. F. Patton.

The Telegraph is a parallel claim to the Setting Sun, owned by Wm. Woodward, Geo. Sifford, A. Kille and A. H. Steele, believe they have struck the Newman contact in their 125 foot tunnel. A shaft of 60 feet has also been sunk and work will soon be resumed. Vein is 4 feet wide, which assays from 40 to 60 ounces.

The St. Louis is being worked constantly in connection with the Bancroft and is turning out some splendid lead ore, which has sprung into such demand since the Grand View smelter has been in operation. The St. Louis is now a producer, and we believe that development will soon convert it into a bonanza of large proportions for the benefit of its owners.

The Hidden Wealth is located on the west bank of the Rio Dolores, west of Rico. This lead shows copper, galena, gray copper, and brittle silver. The vein is a true fissure, five feet in width, assaying 48 ounces silver and \$12 gold. We are informed by the owners, Messrs. Julius Thompson, J. J. Letts, and J. L. Cottle. The development consists of an open cut and tunnel twenty-five feet long.

The Pole-Cat mine, which is situated on the south fork of Horse gulch, and located in June, 1880, is a fine showing; one streak, white quartz, eight inches wide, carries \$90 in gold and 11 ounces silver per ton. Another streak, of yellow color, 2 1/2 feet wide, runs well in silver and lead. An open cut and a tunnel of 20 feet develops the property. Owners are M. O. Reilly, J. J. Letts, and W. K. Patrick.

The Premier is a location of last fall and is an extension of the Belle Air. It is located on the west side and near the base of Dolores mountain. In consequence of the lateness of the season when the location was made, but little work is done—nevertheless the heavy galena vein shows up well and assays on the mineral from very near the surface give 35 ounces silver and 1/2 per cent of lead. Owned by John Clark, A. H. Steele and John Schindler. Vein, 5 feet wide.

The Eliza Jane is one of the more prominent of our mines and is located on the north side of Dolores mountain. It is a well-defined fissure vein, developed by two tunnels, one of 45 feet and another of 30 feet. Character of ore is oxide of iron, sulphures and black manganese, and assays of 13, 161.3 and 182 ounces have been had. Thos. Radigan, B. F. Klee and J. Q. Adams own it and are proud of it, in which they are perhaps justified, as the mine is no doubt good.

The Dalgarno is situated on Expectation mountain and is a parallel claim to the Hoosier Girl and Silver Heels. It has a tunnel 30 feet long, with a chamber in the breast 10x12 feet, from which a shaft has just been started. Character of ore is black manganese and quartz, assaying 32 ounces, but have not reached the rich mineral of the vein as yet. Crevice is 10 feet wide. Property owned by Sam. H. Bargarhart, Ottawa, Illinois, parties and the estate of Steve Wehlan, deceased.

The D. T. Sherman lode on the north slope of Expectation mountain in Horse gulch was located on the 6th of last May, and is developed by a 100 foot tunnel, showing a vein of 5 feet 4 inches. There is a 16 inch streak of white quartz, with oxide of copper and lead assaying from 6 to 43 ounces silver, 3.10 of an ounce gold and a large per cent of copper. Specimens of native copper may be seen at the Bank of Rico or at Seck's assay office. The locators and owners of this property are T. C. Johnson and Joe W. Lyon.

The Fortune Tunnel Site located May 5th, 1881, and situated on the west side of Dolores river, on the east slope of Expectation mountain, adjoining Eliza, cutting one vein of mineral 25 feet from starting point; the vein is 5 feet in width. Six assays made from an average of the vein give an aggregate of 28 ozs. silver and 1/2 of an oz. gold per ton. Experts who have examined this tunnel site, say that it is bound to strike some mammoth bodies of mineral. Owners are Julius Thompson, J. J. Letts and J. L. Cottle.

The Calcedonia and Dudley are cross locations, situated on the southern slope of Elliott mountain and are developed by a tunnel of 25 feet. Four veins have been proven to be on the surface ground—one of 2 feet of carbonate of copper ore, running as high as 1664 ounces, and one of the same dimensions and similar ore, running 61 ounces silver and 1/2 ounce in gold. Vein best mentioned was struck at the mouth of the tunnel, before getting under cover and the breast of the tunnel is now the wall of another vein. Owned by Moritz Rich, of Lake City, B. F. Klee, of this city, and John C. Sneathen, of Pittsburg, Pa.

The Dull of the Woods is situated on the middle fork of Horse creek, and was located June 16th of this year. It is a splendid prospect for the amount of development; it has a vein of quartz 3 1/2 feet wide, with 12 inches of galena, containing 54 ozs. silver—38 per cent lead—and a trace of gold. Yellow carbonate streak carries 1/2 ozs. silver. Upper open cut is 25 feet lower open cut 15 feet, and tunnel 4 1/2 feet, well timbered; this lead has two prominent veins within twenty feet of each other—one of galena and one of yellow carbonates—with a cross-cut tunnel. Owned by M. O. Reilly, J. D. Wakeley, J. L. Cottle and J. J. Letts.

Anxious Relatives. St. Joseph, Mo., Dec. 4, 1881. Editor News: Dear Sir: Will you please give all the information you can as to the whereabouts of William Kennedy and Samuel H. Trugg, who left their home at River-ton, Franklin county, Neb., March 8th, 1880. Will you please be so kind as to insert the attached notice in your paper and oblige the mother and sister of Wm. Kennedy. Mrs. Anna Kennedy, Agnes Kennedy, Pacific House, St. Joseph, Mo.
