MINING NEWS.

THE MOUNTAIN KING.

John Schelle has recovered from the effects of the winter snowslide and is once more digging for wealth in the vein of the Mountain King lode in Horse Gulch.

MORE LELIA DAVIS ASSAYS.

Some very flattering assays were made Thursday on Lelia Davis ore and varied from 366 to 500 ounces. The ore of this mine is said to be of the very best character for economical smelting.

DAY AND NIGHT SHIFTS.

Both day and night shifts have been put on the Grand View mine under Jno. Clarke, and the boys are plugging away with a will. Clarke always has good men under him and their work counts.

THE STRAWBERRY.

The Strawberry, a Telescope mountain location belonging to Messrs. W. H. M. Bangs and Arthur Wannemaker, will receive the first installment of development for the season during a period commencing next week.

TEMPORARILY SUSPENDED.

Work on the Hidden Wealth lode was suspended on Thursday evening, but will be resumed again in a few days. There is talk of putting in a wagon bridge across the river at this point by the owners of this and adjacent claims for the accommodation of their ores.

AN ENCOURAGING RETURN.

An assay made by Elliott Dixon, Thursday on some samples of ore from the Big Casino mine at Trout Lake, gave a return of 572 ounces in silver per ton. The Big Casino is on Sheep Mountain and is owned by Mr. Eckstein, of Buffalo, N. Y., Dr. J. P. Landon, of Rico, and M. J. Landon and I. T. Woodruff, of Illinois. It will be worked for pay this season.

TOO MUCH DAMPNES.

Henry Hensel and Jim Clarke were compelled to stop work on the Maid of Australia shaft last Tuesday morning, owing to the heavy flow of surface water. A talc deposit lies over the vein and the bottom of the shaft had penetrated this deposit. Previous to striking the talc the shaft drained itself, but the clayey substance formed an admirable receptacle for holding the liquid.

WORKERS FOR MOUNT WILSON.

On Wednesday a number of gentlemen left Rico for the well-known Blk creek mines—the Magpie and Sunlight, and most of them will work in the veins of the mines during the summer and possibly throughout the winter of 1884-5. This will in no way interfere with the stoppage ground of Hippler, Byfield and Sutherland, acquired under their lease. The party included Jas. O. Campbell, Max Hippler, Chas. J. Uban, Eugene A. Cobb, J. C. Thompson and Frank Johnston. They expect to make their principal work the extraction of ore, believing that the mine is sufficiently opened up to assure a good output during the summer.

A NEW AGREEMENT.

A new agreement between the mine-owners and the Pasadena Reduction Co. has been circulated this week and is intended to replace the donation document which was signed by all mine-owners willing to give certain amounts of ores as an inducement to the smelting people to locate their first plant here. Prof. Dixon is averse to the bonus idea and would like to dispense with it altogether. His idea, as embodied in the new agreement, accomplishes this. In substance the agreement stipulates that the smelting company enter into an agreement with mine-owners to treat certain quantities of ores for them of a value not less than \$25 per ton, sharing the cost of transportation and profits above smelting charges. This has been signed by many of those who had agreed to donate ores, and is certainly more satisfactory than the other plan to all concerned.

EXTENSIVE IMPROVEMENTS.

The addition of an amalgamation plant to the lixiviation works of the Rico Reduction Co. will be supplemented by the erection of new buildings to accommodate the plant and also to increase facilities for convenient handling of ores. A new building will cover the ground between the present ore house and the feed floor and south of the furnace room a cooling floor will be built, where the hot ore can remain in any quantity as long as desired. Heretofore, it has been necessary to handle the ore uncomfortably hot, simply because there was no place for it. From this cooling floor the ore can be taken to the leaching house or into the amalgamator as its character demands. The amalgamator will be located north of the present main building. Capt. McCaskey and Frank Her have been busy during the week changing the conveyor. Mr. Waring says that they can be ready for business within two weeks from the time the new machinery is laid down at the works.

NOT A NEW PROCESS.

THE COLORADO CANNIBAL. The Belief That Packer Will Not Live to be Tried Again.

A short time since, while visiting at Gunnison, a representative of the Denver Times called at the county jail to see Alf Packer, the man who has become almost universally known as the Colorado cannibal, from San Juan. The prisoner seemed glad to have some one call upon him, although generally averse to talking or having anything to do with the newspaper fraternity. He wears his hair long, and his whiskers also, which, contrasted with his thin cadaverous features and emaciated frame, gives him a hideous appearance. A number of photographs of him have been taken by local artists and he keeps himself well supplied with tobacco and other things by selling these pictures to those who call upon him. In conversation Packer bitterly denounced the morning press of Denver and also the Review-Press of Gunnison, saying those papers had labored with all the diligence at their command to secure his death, either by a judicial hanging or by mob violence, and concluded by saying that the time would come when he would be able to assert himself as a man and reply to their lying statements.

His case is now on the docket of the Supreme court, but it is doubtful if he will live until it is reached. During the past winter he has been failing rapidly, and is now but a skeleton of his former self.

From his story of the crime with which he is charged, he would convey the idea that his is a life of martyrdom. He says that the Indian agent at the time of the tragedy is prosecuting him in order to curry favor and cover up his own looseness while in charge of the agency. He recited the whole history of the case, and still claims that four of his companions were killed by the man whom he admits to have shot, and that when he shot the murderer of the other four he did so only in self-defense. After the night of the death of his five companions, he stayed about the camp for three days before he ate any of the flesh of his companions. The first meal, he says, made him sick, but after that his repugnance was fully overcome.

He is very sanguine of ultimately obtaining his freedom and proving unto the world his innocence of the awful crime with which he is charged. Packer's parents are both living at Indianapolis, Indiana. From photographs shown to the reporter, they are pleasant appearing people and are both quite old. Packer claims to be a relative of Mr. Asa Packer, of Pennsylvania, the richest railroad man in that state and the founder of the Philadelphia & Reading railroad.

Fire-Proof Passenger Coaches.

A railroad exchange says: The cremation of human beings in passenger and sleeping cars, in case of accident, as illustrated in the Ashtabula tragedy and others of more recent date, have been and are still the greatest horrors to be found in railway travel. The light draperies, inflammable upholsterings and heavy varnishings of sleepers and palace coaches, while pleasing to the eye, are food for the flames whenever a car is overturned and help, however quickly it comes, is too late to save from agony, if from death. It has been left for a Buffalo inventor, George Mann, to discover a remedy for this great terror of the traveler. He has adopted asbestos as an upholstering for seats, materials for curtains and lining for the entire interior of the car, this to be covered, when used for upholstering or ceilings, with a fine wire cloth upon which pleasing designs may be wrought. Asbestos is known to be non-combustible and a car so upholstered and so lined, in Mr. Mann's opinion, would be almost fire-proof. Passengers would have ample time for escape or to be rescued before a fire, originating from an overturned stove, could become dangerous in cars in which asbestos was used.

PULLMAN'S WASH BILLS.—In a recent interview, the president of the Pullman company said: "You can figure it out for yourself. Each car contains twenty-four berths and the linen must be changed daily. Every day there are nearly 30,000 sheets and 20,000 pillow slips, 10,000 hand towels and 3,000 roller towels to be washed. The average price paid for the laundrying is 14 cents per piece. Sixty-three thousand pieces a day would bring the laundry bill up to \$25,000 a month, which may be maximum—take \$10,000 a month for the minimum. In addition to the expenses of running the cars, the number of combs, brushes, whisk-brooms, feather dusters, soap, towels, tumblers, etc., stolen is enormous. One of the leading ladies of a traveling dramatic company was detected recently appropriating the soap and comb and brush in the ladies' toilet room."

SPEAKING about faro and other wicked games, a Virginian, after remarking that in the better days of the republic, when everybody played faro, a gentleman was distinguished by the comment: "He plays with red checks," from the poor white-check trash, dwelt upon the passionate love for the game which possesses men who get into its clutches. "Years ago," he said, "two of the finest lawyers of New Orleans on their way to New York, stopped at Charlottesville, Va., because they heard that there was a man there who dealt faro. They found the man and played all night. About midnight, one lawyer whispered to the other: 'He's cheating.' 'Hush!' said the other: 'I've known that for two hours; but there isn't another faro bank within fifty miles.'" Philadelphia Ledger.

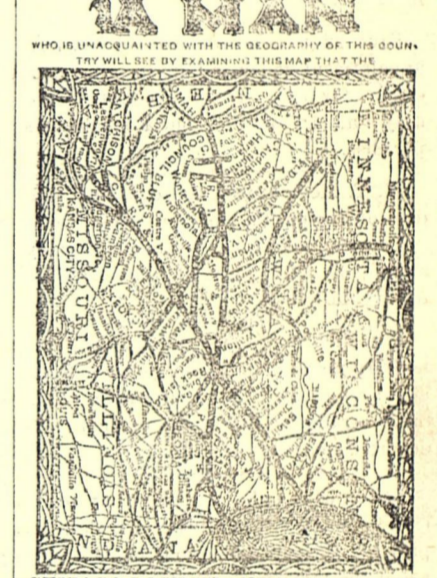

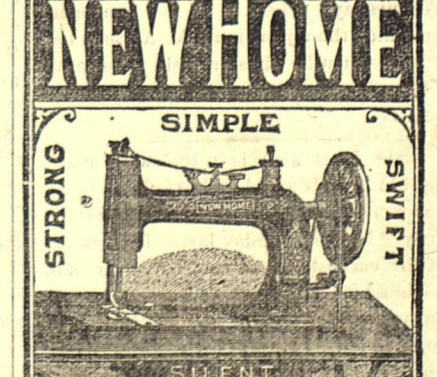
