MAIL MATTERS.

Geo. E. Blake, one among a few reliable mail contractors, in this Southwestern country, arrived in Rico yesterday. Mr. Blake is here in the interests of his business, and of the people. Had he control of the route between Ophir and San Miguel, we would doubtless have a direct and regular line of communication between Rico and Ouray.

A petition will be circulated to increase the service to a tri-weekly from Rico to Ophir, and establish a tri-weekly route, with service, from Ophir to San Miguel, thus connecting with the already established tri-weekly route from San Miguel to Ouray.

A bank has been established in the city of Mexico in order to develop the mines of the Sierra Mojada. Numbers of Californians are going to the mines.

Congressman Bingham introduced in the House Dec. 4, a joint resolution, providing for an equestrian statue for the late General Custer to cost 30,000 and to be erected on some suitable reservation in Washington.

From the number of through lines to the Pacific, which are promised from all quarters, the chances are that if any one wants to build in a year or two, he will have to make his line an elevated road. There won't be one room for it on the ground.
