A BRIEF HISTORY

OF THE YOUNG CARBONATE CAMP ON THE DOLORES. The carbonate camp on the Rie Dolores,

scarcely known to the people of the San Juan, where'n it is located, as we may say, has certainly shown in its rapid advancement in so short a time, that there is an element within it that points to a future for the town of Rico and the district in which it is situated, a most encouraging feeling, coupled with the development of the carbonate deposits thus far discovered and partially worked within but in a very small portion of the camp.

Since the year of 1869 the section of country now known as Pioneer Mining District, on the Dolores river, whereon Rico is located, has been known to miners and prospectors as a low grade mineral camp, but not until the present year of 1879 had carbonates been ascertained to exist. The number of persons who have come into the country for the past ten years did not exceed twenty-five or fifty a year, and as winter approached not a half dozen of the people who came in to prospect remained to pass the winter -all sought more genial climes where there was some prospect to make a living, if not much money, and as a consequence the camp on the Dolores was regularly deserted every year and each individual going out made the same report-"there is nothing to be found on the Dolores but low grade galena not worth working or having-no account."

THE DISCOVERY OF CARBONATES.

In the spring of 1879 carbonates were ascertained to exist within the mountain ranges on the Dolores river, but to what extent and grade in value of the ores those persons who had prospected the country could give no accurate information. The assays made of the mineral found showed the same to be carbonstes the ores were so low in quality that miners gave their prospect holes no attention, but went away and left them for a short time; came back; went deeper and were rejoiced.

Prospecting went on lively during the before mentioned months and in the month of July it occurred to several persons in the camp that a town must grow up in the midst of the carbonate mines as had been the case in other mineral regions; therefore parties hastened to select millsites and out of them came a town on the banks of the Dolores and a really pretty place was had; upon a most eligible platean of land located on the east bank of the river, immediately in the neighborhood of some of the richest and best mines at that time discovered and near Nigger Baby Hill, Telescope, Expectation and Dolores mountains, in all of which carbonates had been discovered in the greatest abundance.

No sooner had the citizens of Pioneer District communicated their desires or wants to the honorable court, off eighty miles from their young infant town and new born mining district, than the thought all of a sudden came to several clumps of enterprising capitalists of the town of Ouray that a wagon toll road was needed from the Rio San Miguel to the Dolores via Howard Fork and at once, as it were, in a trice, several wagon toll road companies were formed in Ouray county to the north for the benefit of Rico and the Dolores on the south; the necessary papers were duly notarialized, sent to the secretary of state at Denver and there placed on file in order to clinch and fasten the south end to the north end of Ouray county by a San Juan patent toll road. 
