AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDI-NANCE NO. 16., CONCERN ING LICENSES.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico, that ordinance No 16, be amended by adding thereto the following sections:

AUCTIONEERS. Sec. 24.—Any person who shall sell or attempt to sell at public auction in this town, any goods, chattels or property whatever, without first having obtained a portion of the the time. Those desiring whatever, without first having obtained a assaying done, can leave their name, with license therefor as provided by ordinance the ore marked and numbered, and it will shall forfeit and pay to the town for each offense not less than fifteen nor more than

> SEC. 25.-No license shall be granted to any person for the sale of any property at public auction until such person shall have paid to the Town Clerk the sum of fifteen dollars for each three months, or fifty dollars for the year.

> SEC. 26.—All sales made by virtue of legal progress, or by trustees, shall be ex-empt from the provisions of this ordi-

> PEDDLERS. SEC. 27 .- The clerk in his discretion may issue a peddlers license to any applicant upon payment of fifteen dollars for each three months, or fifty dollars for the year. Any such license may be revoked by order of the Trustees for any improper conduct on the part of the person so licensed; and any person so licensed who shall be guilty of any fraud, cheat or imposition while acting in such capacity shall on conviction thereof be fined not less than twenty-five nor more than fifty dollars for the use of the town.

Sec. 28.—Any person who shall pursue the occupation of a hawker or peddler within the town without first having ob tained a license therefor as provided by ordinance shall forfeit, and pay to the town for each offense not less than twentyfive dollars nor more than fifty dollars for the use of the town.

EXHIBITIONS. SEC. 29.—Any person who shall own, conduct, or manage for gain within this too the town unless the owner or keep-town, any theatre, circus, caravan, or er of any such dog, shall, as soon as said town, any theatre, circus, caravan, or other exhibition, show, or amusement, or who shall exhibit any natural or artificial annually thereafter on the first day of curiosities or panorama or device of any kind without having first obtained a for the use of said town, the sum of three license therefor as provided by ordinance shall forfeit and pay to the town for each or whelp and the sum of five dollars offense not less than twenty five dollars nor more than fifty dollars. ordinance shall specify the object and length of time for which the same are respectively granted. COMMISSION MERCHANTS.

SEC. 32.—Any person who shall carry on the business of receiving, storing and selling goods, wares and merchandise or produce of any description for another, shall be deemed a commission merchant, and any person who shall carry on the of a commission merchant within the limits of the town of Rico without first having obtained a license therefor, shall forteit and pay to the town not less than twenty-five nor more than fifty dol-

SEC. 33.-The Clerk is hereby authorized to issue a license for the purpose con templated in Sec. 32, to any applicant therefor upon the applicant paying the sum of fifteen dollars for each three months, or fifty dollars for the year.

DRAYS AND OTHER VEHICLES. SEC. 34.—It shall not be lawful for any person to do any manner of hauling with-in the town of Rico for hire or compen-

any article of property, box, package, load, or property of any description whatever, or to keep, or own within said town for public use, or for hire, any dray, cart, express or job wagon, carriage, omnibus, or any vehicle of any kind for the uses and purposes above mentioned without first having obtained a license so to do as provided by ordinance. Any person who shall violate any provision of this section shall upon conviction be fined in a sum not less than five nor more than twenty five dollars for each offense: Provided, this section shall not apply to persons popularly designated freighters pursuing regularly their business, nor to those who in good faith are in the regular daily or weekly employment of building or general contractors actually engaged in their business as such contractors:

SEC. 35 .- The Clerk is hereby authorized to issue a license to any applicant therefor for the purposes named in the foregoing section, upon payment by the applicant of ten dollars for each three months, or forty dollars for each year. SEC. 36.—Any person so licensed shall cause the number of his license to be plainly painted in a conspicous place upon such vehicle and shall keep the same plain and distinct during the time the same is used under such license.

LIVERY STABLE KEEPERS. SEC. 37.—Every person who shall keep horses and carriages for hire in the town of Rico shall be deemed a keeper of a livery stable. Any person who shall keep a livery stable without first taking out a license therefor shall forfeit and pay ten dollars for each offense.

SEC. 38.—The Clerk is hereby authorized to issue a license to any person to keep a livery stable who shall apply therefor and pay into the treasury at the rate of fifteen dollars for each three months, or fifty dollars for the year.


