## Highlights From The Past To The Present

The Hays Family is the lighted family as Highlights from the Past to the Present visits another of Hansford County's pioneers. This family celebrated their sixty-third birthday on April 15, as they have lived in Hansford County since April 15 of 1900.

Born on December 13 1853 Ervin C. Hays grew to manhood in Tennessee. There he married having two sons Elmer and Geroge. He and his family later moved to Tarrant County Texas where one other son Lon was born. George passed away in 1956 followed by Lon in 1962.

Miss Manerva Shaw was born January 22 of 1868 in Oklahoma, when the state was still Indian Territory. On the 6th day of December of 1885 Mr. Hays married Miss Shaw in Parker County Texas.

The couple made their home in Parker County. While living here three children were born to this union, Jess, Bob and Horace. Later the family moved to Tarrant County to make their home and here their other two sons were born, Matthew and Floyd. Matthew died when only an infant.

In 1897 Mr. Hays yearned for a new home so the family moved in a wagon driven by a team in search for new land. They stayed in Donley County a short time then moved on to Mobeetie where they remained three years. Still yearning for something he had not found, Mr. Hays came farther north. Finding what he desired in Hansford County, he prepared a dugout for his family. He then returned to Mobeetie to move his family to their new home on April 15 of 1900.

They moved in wagons, sleeping at nights in tents at the camp site. Upon arrival to their new home they were shocked to find a great sea of land and sky. There was not a sprig of grass to be seen for miles. A terrible grass fire had swept from Dumas taking sections and sections of land. It had taken all the Hays family's land. The fire had also burned part of their dugout door to their home. They felt fortunate that they had not built a half dugout for it would have been completely destroyed.

Their new home was located some six miles south of what is now Spearman. They faced a hard road ahead of themselves with their property completely destroyed by the fierce fire. Their neighbor J.C. Sander's lost all the lumber he had purchased for his home. This hazardous start did not discourage them for they lived on to be quite successful.

The summer months were hot and a tent was erected for sleeping purposes at night in the hot weather.

The boys would haul wood for the bachelor stove from the breaks of the Canadian River. For water the boys would go to Old Hansford the county seat some eleven miles away. Not long after they lived there was it, that Mr. Hays drilled his own well.

Mrs. Hays would recall the beautiful sights of deer and Antelope roaming the prairies.

Mr. Hays took up drilling as an occupation. He would be gone from home for a week at times drilling water wells for the pioneers.

Being quite successful in well drilling, Mr. Hays decided to build a store at Hansford, Texas. He and his sons hauled the lumber for the store from Channingby wagon. In 1902 the store was completed and the family moved to Hansford where they made their home in the back of the store. Groceries was the main stock of the modern store of that day.

Mrs. Hays recalls the first people she met were Mrs. James Cator, Mrs. Clayton McCrear, Mrs. Richardson and Mrs. B.P. Ward. Of course they all did not live in Hansford though.

Mr. Richardson taught school which was first held in the court house and later in a building behind the Hays store some three blocks. The Hays children and the Richardson children were the only ones to attend.

In 1902 Mr. Hays ran for County Judge against Nelson B. Crosby but failed to be elected. In 1904 he ran again and was elected judge. In that year the commissioners were J.C. Sangster, W.O. Douglas, F.C. Wilmeth and W.J. Cline while Bert O. Cator was sheriff. Mr. Hays, in 1906, was re-elected for a second term.

The town of Hansford began to grow and prosper. In 1904 the Caldwell's moved to Hansford and build a dry goods store and operated the first telephone exchange in the county.

Mrs. Hays once told of a time when Mr. Caldwell went to buy groceries at a small grocery operated in the judges office in the Court House. He saw a nice ham and decided to buy it. But he was told by Mr. Ward that the ham could not be sold for court would meet the next week and the ham would be needed for then!

Mr. Ward later moved his store from the court house to a small building where he had a general store with a post office located in the back with Mrs. Ward as post-mistress.

The Hays family saw the town of Hansford prosper, adding several new stores, offices and banks. In 1912 and 1914 the little town marked a rapid change in prosperity. Mrs. Hays recalls the town having two main street called State Street and Grand Avenue.

In 1919 a railroad was built into the town site of Spearman and the families began to move their stores and homes to Spearman. Mr. and Mrs. Hays later moved in 1925 to Spearman.

Horace married Lois Lowe in 1914 and in 1916 they moved to their farm just east of that is now Gruver where they farmed and ranched. They now make their home in Gruver.

Bob married Josie Cator in 1919 and they set up housekeeping to the south of the present town of Gruver later to move to a farm near Morse where they presently, make their home.

Jess married Mattie Eubanks in 1922 and moved to Spearman where they operated a cafe.

Floyd married Beuna Vernon and moved to Spearman where he has barbered for a profession and remains at present.

Mr. E.C. Hayes passed away in 1936. Mrs. Hayes presently lives in Amarillo in the Susie Dacus Rest Home. She is ninety-five years of age.

This is an outstanding pioneer family who moved to Hansford County to find their land destroyed by fire. They had courage and determination to strive forward, to build a business and continue to make a successful Hansford County family.

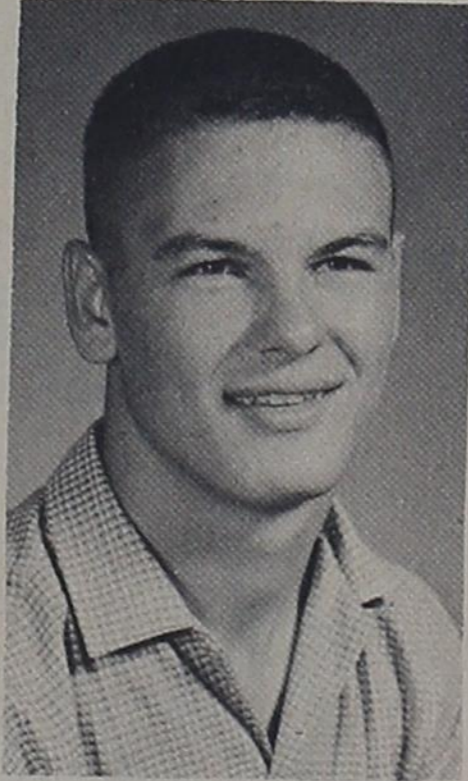

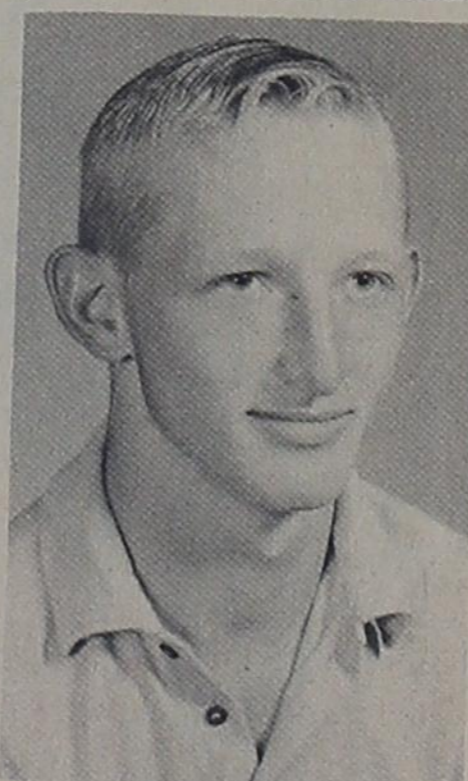
## WEATHER

**YOU'RE JUST BEING OBSTINATE**

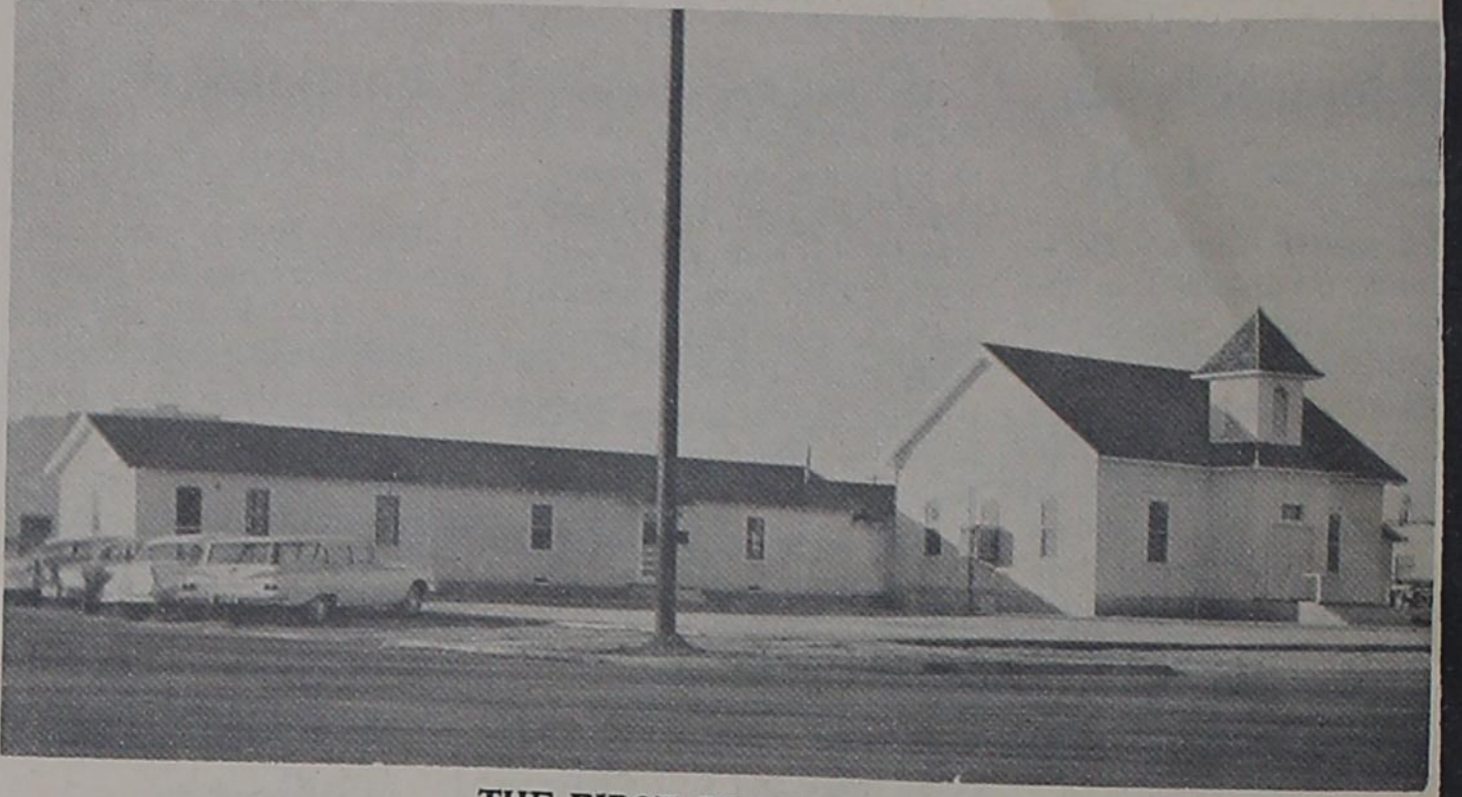
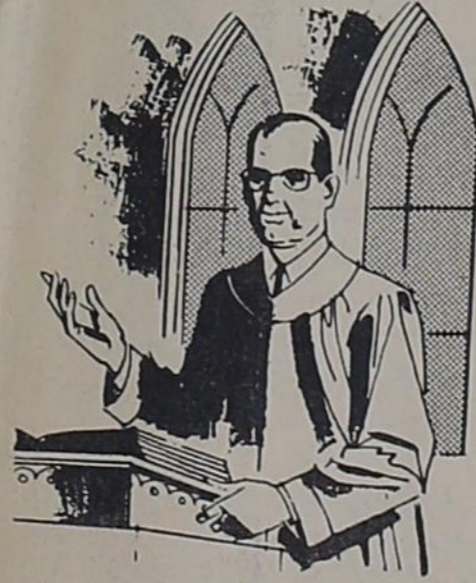
Sometimes when Christians do not participate in sectarian religious services, special religious days and alliances, the world thinks we are stuffy, obstinate, and plain obnoxious. We are sorry that they feel this way, but reserve the right to uphold what we believe. It is not obstinacy on our part when we decline an invitation to a union meeting of religious people. It is because we practice what we preach. We cannot condone the many divisions of the religious world. It is a sin to preach division. It is just a wrong to practice division, yet give lip service to union divisive meetings. Paul said "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same things, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgement" (1 Cor. 1:10). Again, "Fulfill ye my joy, that ye be like-minded, having the same love, being of one accord, of one mind" (Phil. 2:2). Hypocrisy is preaching one thing, yet practicing another. We preach against division in the religious world to accept this "Way". Accept the Bible as the only creed; the Old and New Testament as the only guide for faith and practice. When you accept this, we will meet as brethren. Until then, it is not we who cause division. It is the creeds, dogmas, disciplines, and catechisms preached and practiced that divide. This day we commune with our Lord around his table as a memorial to his coming again (1 Cor. 11:23-26; Acts 20:7). It is this day that we give of our prosperity into His treasury (1 Cor. 16:1-2). It is this day that we sing, pray, study, and fellowship together (Acts 2:42). There is no other day in which we are commanded to observe as sacred (Heb. 10:25). The world think it strange and peculiar that we shun other days as special, but where do they originate? Who do they honor? The world commercializes and uses it's appointed days for it's own selfish ends. The fiction concocted alone, more than out-weighs any usefulness that it could have in a religious sense. Falsehoods never beget truth. Rather, Paul said "Touch not; taste not; handle not; which all are to perish with the using; after the commandments and doctrines of men." (Col. 2:21-22) Again he said, "Ye observe days, and months, and times, and years. I am afraid of you, lest I have bestowed upon your labour in vain" (Gal. 4:10-11).

No we're not obstinate, but we do admit to be peculiar according to the world's estimation. Yes, "a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a Peculiar people;" (1 Peter 2:9).

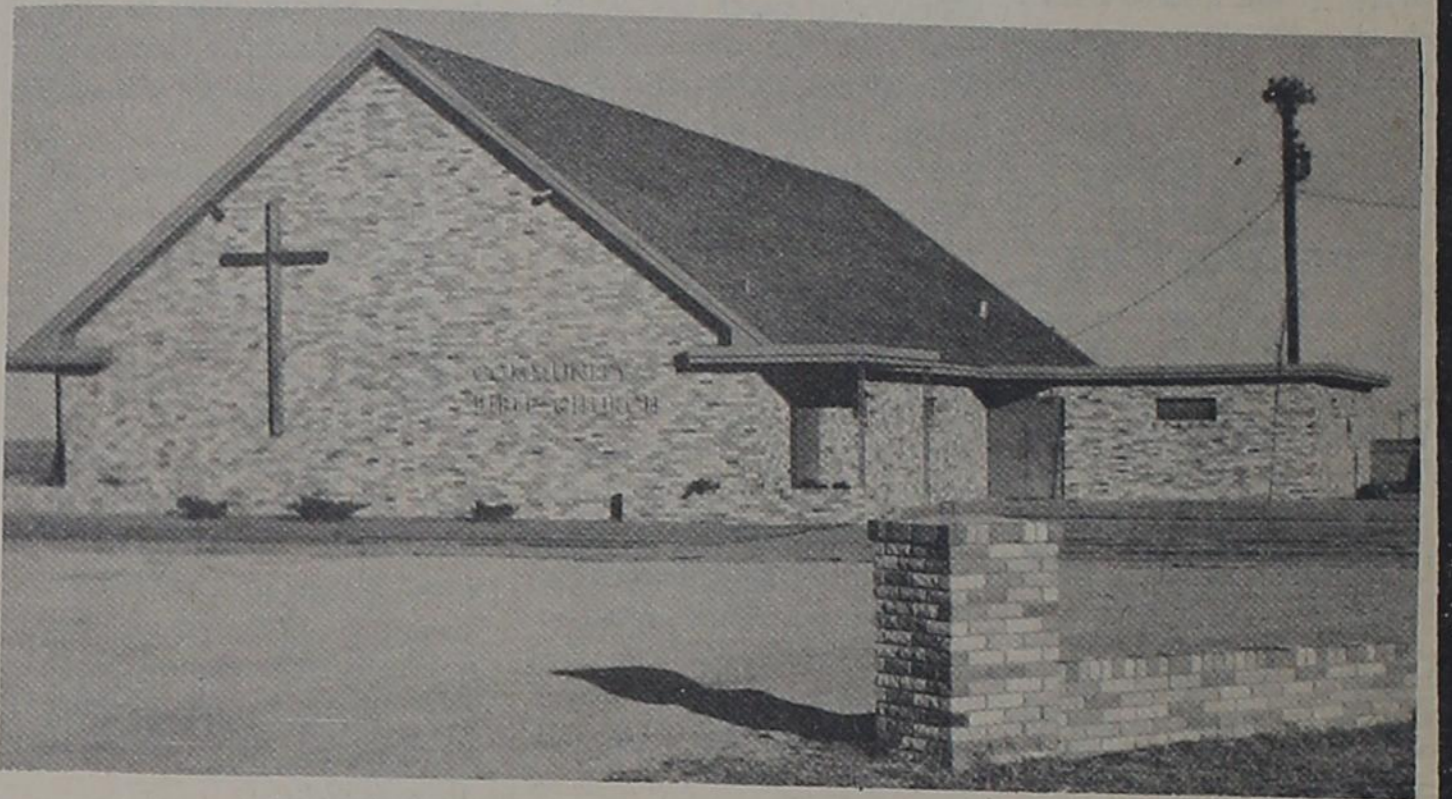

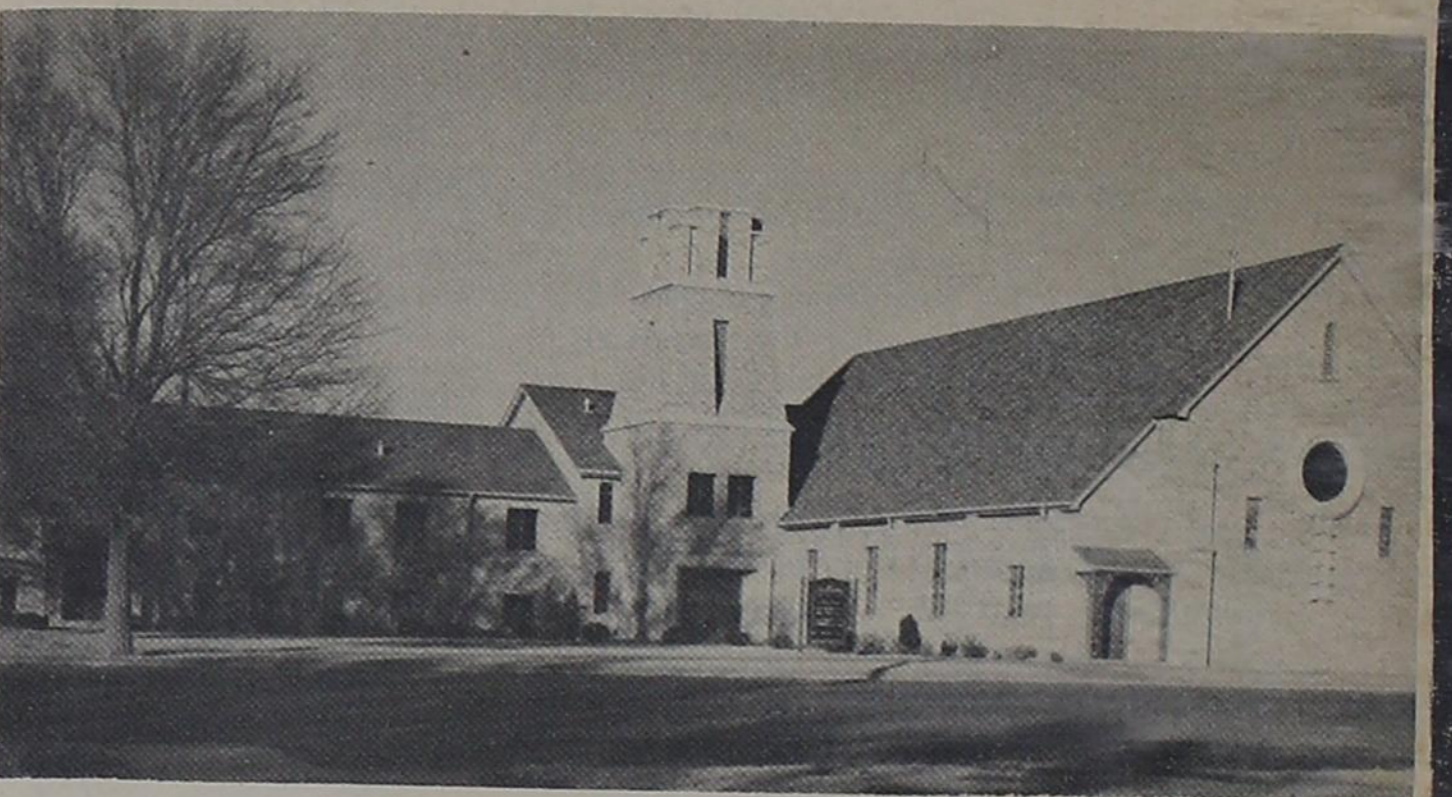

Announcement of winners in all contests will be made in the school auditorium at the conclusion of all contests.

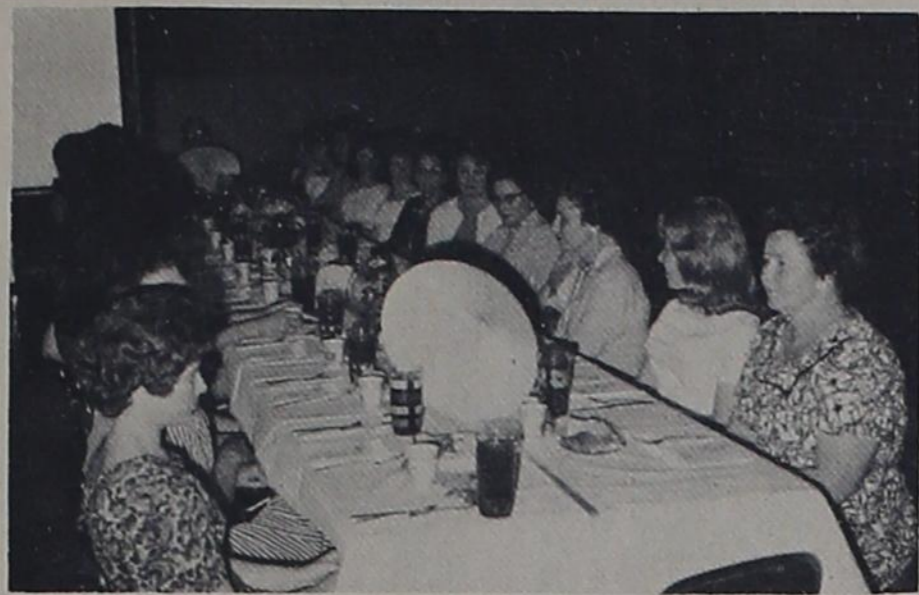

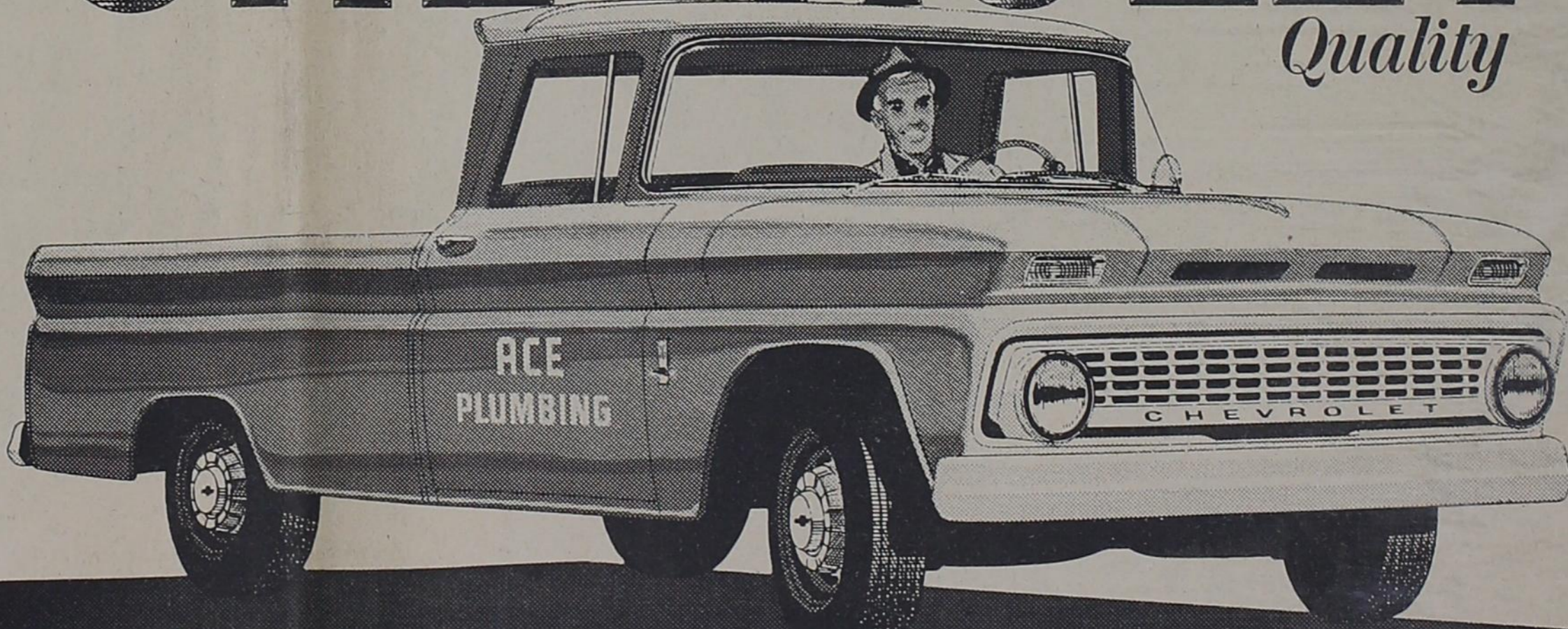
