### Police investigating disappearance of girls

GRUVER - Police are conducting an investigation into the disappearance of two girls who were last seen early Monday entering a car parked outside of Gruver Junior High school.

Renee Rodriguez, 14, and Janie Perez, 12, were seen getting into a yellow 1972 Pontiac Grand Prix bearing Texas license number 4UHQD.

Renee is described as 5-foot, 100 lbs., dark complected, long straight dark hair and a mole on her right cheek. She was last seen wearing brown eye glasses, a purple sweat-shirt, black pants and carrying a black tote bag.

Janie is described as 5-foot-2, 100 pounds, short black hair and brown eyes. She was last seen wearing a grey shirt, pink sweat pants and white sneakers.

### GRUVER

An investigation into the possible kidnapping of two girls early Monday was halted Tuesday when authorities determined the girls ran away from home.

According to Police Chief Stephen Gaines, Renee Rodriguez, 14, and Janie Perez, 12, voluntarily entered a car parked near Gruver Junior High School.

The pair was last seen Tuesday afternoon in Plainview, police said. Witness statements and information from other sources suggest the girls left the city on their own.

"There's no indication that force was used to take them away," Gaines said.

Authorities are attempting to reunite the girls with their families, police said.

# Bike - A - Thon



Alex Deford

Alex Deford was born Saturday, October 30, 1971. She died Saturday, January 19, 1990 of cystic fibrosis.

Alex was an incredible child who never gave up and really never quit fighting. She was a feisty, funny little girl with an enormous love of and zest for life. Alex virtually transcended her debilitating disease and was an inspiration to everyone around her. When she died, her family was devastated, but her courage, spirit and hope were captured by her writer-father, Frank Deford, in the book *Alex: The Life of a Child*.

This April, the movie version of *Alex: The Life of a Child* will air on ABC Television. Craig T. Nelson, star of *Polettergeist* and *Call to Glory* plays Frank Deford, Bonnie Bedelia portrays his wife and 8-year-old Gennie James from *Places in the Heart* is Alex.

Angie Pugh has been appointed chairperson of the annual Cystic Fibrosis "Bike For Breath" Bike-A-Thon sponsored by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

The event is scheduled to start at Spearman High School on Sunday, May 4 from 2 to 5 p.m. Proceeds will benefit the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation's programs in research, care and education. "Anyone who wants to ride bikes for health, fun and prizes can register," according to Pugh. "Participants will collect pledges for each mile they ride on a bicycle course."

Prizes in the Bike-A-Thon will be awarded to participants based on the amount of money they collect and include T-shirts, athletic bags, headset radios, AM/FM cassette recorders, and Sony Walkman's. Area grand prizes include a color television

and portable mini televisions. Cystic fibrosis is the No. 1 genetic killer of children and young adults in America. The disease produces thick mucus

that blocks the lungs and intestines, resulting in lung damage and malnutrition. One in 20 Americans is an unknowing carrier of the defective gene that causes cystic fibrosis.

This year, Cystic Fibrosis Bike-A-Thons are being held nationwide in honor of Alex Deford, who died of cystic fibrosis in 1980 at the age of eight. The story of Alex's short, courageous life will

be told on an ABC-Television movie airing on Monday, April 21st.

# ACS Fund Raising

"The breakdown of how American Cancer Society funds are spent in Texas represents one of the best returns on the dollar that we know of," said Georgia Holt and Betty Davis, Co-Chairman of the 1986 educational and fund raising Crusade in Hansford Co.

In preparing for the April Crusade Residential C-Days beginning April 14th, Holt and Davis feel that it is important for the community to realize ACS expenditures. "It is one part of the ACS we're most proud of and I think our friends and neighbors will be more willing to give to cancer control if they know how well their money is being spent," they said.

The following represents the breakdown of how each dollar raised in 1983-84 by the ACS was invested during the last fiscal year (September 1, 1984 - August 31, 1985) in Texas.

Professional Education	.11
Public Education	.28
Service/Rehabilitation	.25
Program Development	.06
Administrative	.12
Crusade	\$1.11

This 111% expenditure reflects increased research allocations to Texas by our National Society.

"The ACS is currently sponsoring research investigations in 13 major Texas hospitals, medical schools and universities totaling over \$6 million," said Holt. "Because Texas has so many research institutions, the National Society allocates additional funds here."

"Programs that help people are our priority. We keep a tight control over our administrative costs and keep them within acceptable limits as this breakdown indicates," Davis commented.

ACS programs such as patient service and rehabilitation (Reach to Recovery, volunteer transportation, etc.), public education (films, pamphlets, exhibits, the Great American Smokeout) and professional education for the medical community are mainly administered through the society's volunteer system. (Note: THE HANSFORD COUNTY VOLUNTEERS WILL BE CONDUCTING RESIDENTIAL C-DAYS APRIL 14-21) "Volunteers help maintain these impressive figures," said Holt.



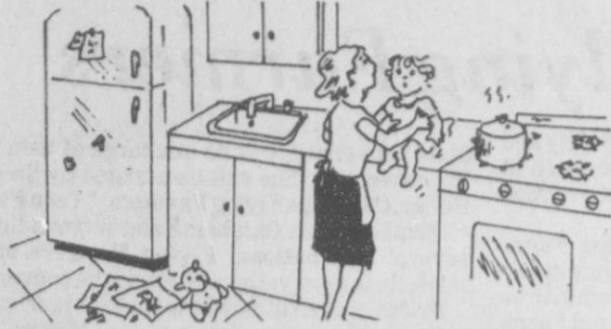

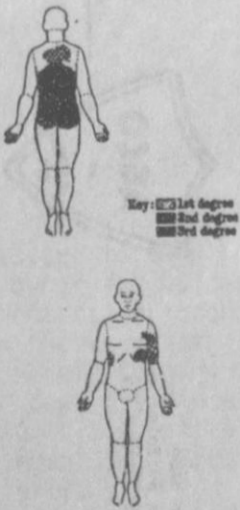
# A Question of Burning Dinner Was Late (Kathy, 18 months)

**How it Happened:**  
Friends were coming in half an hour, and Margaret was late in starting dinner. She had prepared a beef stew the night before. She took it out of the refrigerator and put it on the stove to warm. Then she started cleaning carrots at the sink. Kathy was drawing pictures on the floor. After a while she got bored. She wanted to see what her mother was doing. She got up, went over to her mother and pulled on her skirt. Margaret looked down, "Not now, Sweetie, I have to fix dinner." Kathy cried a little and reached out her arms to be picked up. "Not now, Kathy, you'll have to wait," Margaret said. "Here, play with your bear," she added, handing Kathy her teddy bear. Kathy was quiet for a few seconds, but then she started to howl. She wanted to be where Mommy was. "All Right!" Margaret said, picking Kathy up and setting her on the counter between the sink and the stove. "But sit there quietly." Margaret turned her back slightly to reach up and get salt from the cupboard.

Suddenly Kathy began to yell. The edge of her cotton dress had caught fire on the burner. Within seconds the back of her dress was engulfed in flames. Margaret pushed her down on the counter and rolled her to smother the flames. As soon as the flames were out, she removed Kathy's smoldering dress and applied cool water to her burns. Questions: How do you think Margaret was feeling just before the accident? What else could Margaret have done to keep Kathy happy? It is a common situation for parents and children to have conflicting needs at times. Do you have any advice to caregivers on how they might cope with situations like these?  
**Medical Record:**  
Deep 3rd degree burns over entire back, including buttocks; 2nd degree burns on left arm and abdomen.  
**Hospitalization:**  
39 days, during hospitalization, child was operated on three times for grafting of her back and arm. During healing, she was tormented by itching, which was relieved somewhat by medication. Her back is quite scarred, but the scars do not seem to hinder her movement.
