Palo Duro River Authority has priority

A municipal water supply reservoir for six North Plains cities -- the Palo Duro River Authority lake in Hansford county -- has a top development priority from the Texas Water Development board.

The top ranking among state water projects is reported by Johnnie Lee of Spearman, general manager of the PDRA, who talked with officials of the state board recently at an Austin meeting.

Lee will return to Austin this week to discuss the new state water bill with the commission and the effect of the bill on the Palo Duro project.

"We have the only major water project in Texas that is ready for construction," the PDRA manager declares. "All we lack is the financing."

The Palo Duro lake will store some 69,000 acre feet of water behind a dam at the junction of the Palo Duro and Horse creeks, northwest of Spearman.

It will provide a water supply for Dumas, Sunray and Cactus in

Moore county; for the City of Stinnett, and the cities of Gruver and Spearman in Hansford counties.

The state agency has indicated that it could put \$15 million in the project in storage purchases, grants and loans.

"I anticipate the new Texas Water Plan, passed by the Legislature, will help us tremendously with the financing," Lee believes. "However, we will have to wait until after the general election in November since it involves a constitutional amendment."

The water plan amendment will be on the November ballot and must be approved statewide to become effective.

"Since Perryton will not be in the Palo Duro Authority, the cost of the project has been scaled down about \$2.5 million, our engineers say," Lee continues.

Cost of the dam, water plant and piping system has been estimated at \$56 million. Lee says the project now will cost about \$53 million.

Swimming pool opens June 1

The new municipal swimming pool which is being built in the City Park is expected to be completed this week.

The pool will be filled with water on Sunday and the pool will open to the public on Saturday, June 1, 1985 at 2:00 p.m.

The pool will be open daily Monday through Saturday from 2:00 p.m. to 6: p.m. to the public.

The pool will be open on Tuesday evenings from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. for Teen age only.

The pool will be open on Thursday evenings from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. for family only.

The pool will be open to the public on Sunday afternoons from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Admission will cost \$1.00 or a season pass will cost \$35.00. Season passes are available at the City Hall.

The pool can be leased on evenings when the pool is not open for \$35.00 per hour.

All children which are less than 8 years of age must be accompanied by an adult while at the pool. There is no charge for the wading pool, however it is up to the parents to accompany the children and watch their own children while they are there. There will be no lifeguard in the wading pool area.

Concessions will be available at the pool. Roy Mayhew will manage the pool and his staff of lifeguards have been trained in lifesaving. Craig Solomon and his shop classes have built several tables and benches for the pool area.

Swimming lessons will be taught starting about the middle of June by a

qualified instructor. People wishing to take lessons should sign up at the pool office after June 1st. Lessons will be taught as the demand requires.

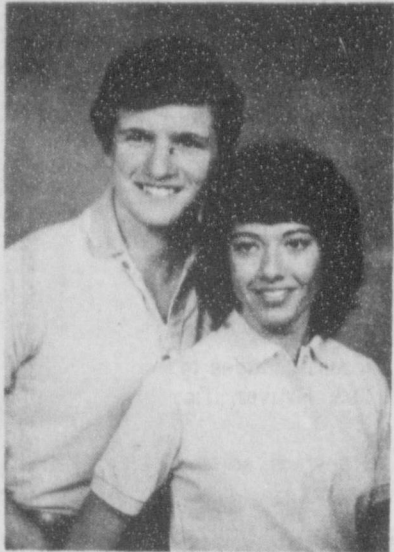

petition is held annually throughout the United States. Winning entries from participating congressional districts are displayed in the U.S. Capitol for one year.

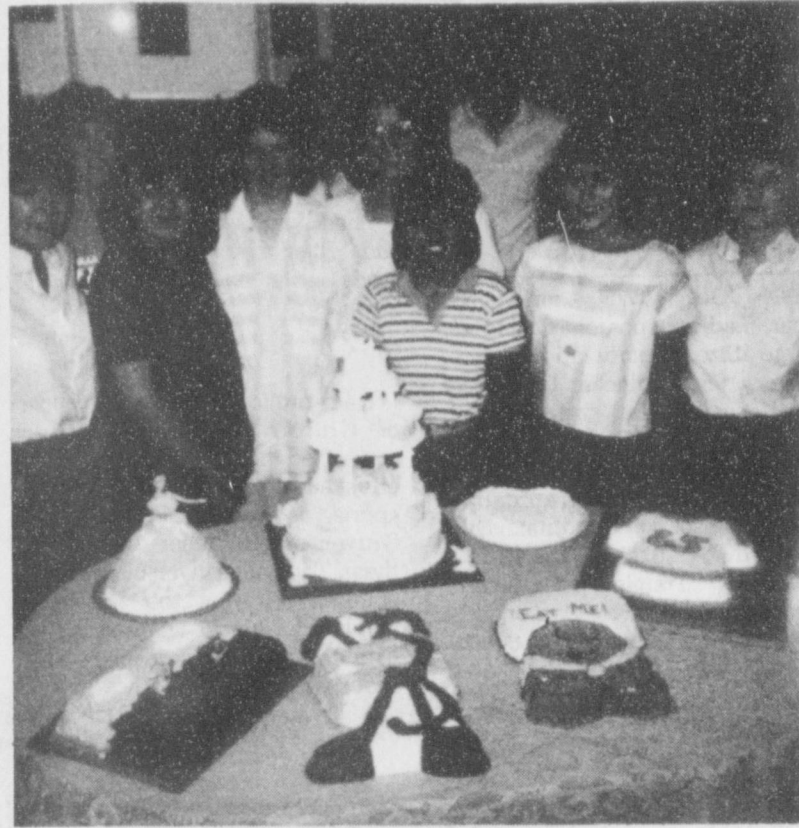

REMEMBER THESE SAFETY TIPS

- Watch for power lines when climbing in trees.
- Do not climb electrical poles, towers or structures.
- Do not trim trees near power lines.
- Do not set ladders or scaffolds near power lines.
- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

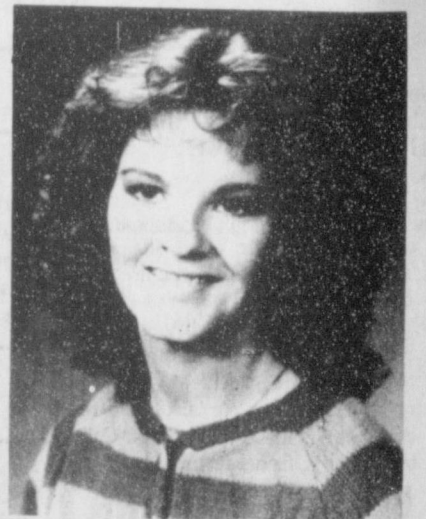

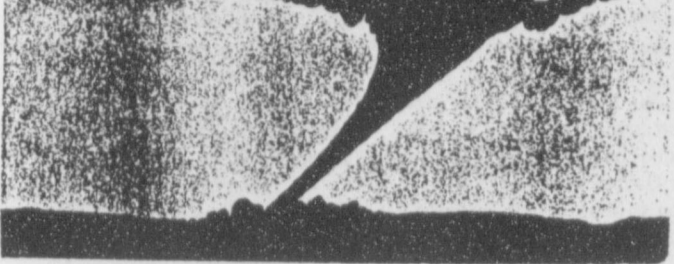

Tips for Tornado Safety



With tornado season upon us again, it is important that we refresh our memories about the types of warning the City of Gruver uses during an emergency and the correct action that should be taken when warning is given.

Every tornado is a potential killer and is capable of great destruction. Tornadoes can topple buildings, roll mobile homes, uproot trees, hurl people and animals through the air for hundreds of yards, and fill the air with lethal, windborne debris. Sticks, glass, roofing material, lawn furniture all become deadly missiles when driven by a tornado's winds. Since a large number of these tornadoes strike suddenly and with little or no warning, knowing what to do before and during a tornado could save your life.

During severe weather, the City uses two primary sources of information in determining a need to issue a warning. First, the National Weather Service in Amarillo provides the City with information on watches, warnings and tornado activity. They track storm movements by radar and often times are able to determine a storm's ability to form a tornado well before one is formed. Secondly, the City relies on police, fire, sheriff's units, and volunteer weather watchers to monitor a storm's activity in this county. These people get out in the storm and monitor its movements, and observe clouds which exhibit potential for developing a tornado. Many times these people are able to spot a tornado well before it is detected on radar. This can provide the City with a great deal of time to issue a warning and allow the public a little more time to seek a place of safety.

If a tornado is sighted which is a potential threat to this community, the City will activate the outdoor warning siren located at City Hall. When activated this siren will give a continuous blast lasting approximately three (3) minutes.

Another form of warning used by the City is the Cable TV Warning System. With this system the City can interrupt regular programming and provide necessary information over cable television. During the course of a severe thunderstorm the City will keep the public informed by means of this system and provide emergency messages in the event a warning becomes necessary.

In the event of a power failure the City will utilize warning lights and sirens on the City's emergency vehicles to provide warning to the public. During threatening weather, City emergency vehicles will use their emergency lights and sirens for warning purposes only. If, during a severe thunderstorm, you observe a police car, ambulance, or fire truck driving down your street with red lights and sirens on, **PAY ATTENTION!** This may be the only warning you receive of an approaching tornado.

Keep your FM radio tuned to KRDF-FM 98 in Spearman during severe weather. The City will provide KRDF with emergency information concerning the Gruver area during warning situations.

When the danger has passed the City will give one short blast on the outdoor siren at City Hall. This will be the signal that all is clear. The City will also utilize cable TV for this purpose. In the event of power failure, emergency vehicles will be

What can you do to protect yourself before a tornado? First of all plan in advance what action you and your family will take in the event a warning is issued and make certain that everyone in your family is familiar with this plan. Know in advance where designated shelters are in the City or make plans with neighbors to use their cellar or basement. The City of Gruver currently utilizes the basement of the City Library located at 504 King and the basement of the Golden Age Center located at 105 East Broadway for public shelter. Secondly, keep a battery operated radio, flashlight and a supply of fresh batteries in a convenient place.

WHAT TO DO DURING A TORNADO:

*Take cover immediately when a tornado warning is issued. A tornado warning means that a tornado has been detected in or near the community.

*Do not attempt to flee from the path of the tornado in a car or other vehicle. Over half of the deaths recorded in the Wichita Falls tornado in 1979 were attributed to people trying to escape in motor vehicles.

*Abandon cars or mobile homes and seek shelter elsewhere. Automobiles and mobile homes afford the least safety during a tornado. If you are in a car when a tornado approaches, get out and head for the nearest ditch or depression if there is no better shelter immediately available.

*If you are at home or at work, stay inside, away from windows and exterior walls, until the storm is over. The safest place in a home during a tornado is in the basement. If there is no basement, take shelter in a bathroom, a closet or under a heavy piece of furniture on the lowest level. Small rooms, such as closets or bathrooms, in the center of a home or building offer the greatest protection from flying objects. Such rooms are also least likely to experience roof collapse. Do not waste time opening windows or doors in an attempt to lessen the likelihood of damage from changes in atmospheric pressure. This theory is no longer considered valid. Tornadoes do their destructive work through the combined action of their strong rotary winds and the impact of windborne debris. In the most simple case, the tornado's push the windward wall of a building inward, the roof is lifted up and the other walls fall outward. You may waste valuable time opening windows and get caught by the tornado.

*If a tornado strikes during school hours, teachers should keep children away from windows and seek shelter either in a designated area or in interior hallways. Concerned parents should not attempt to go out in the storm to pick up their children at school.

There is very little one can do about the property damage caused by tornadoes, but with early warning and proper action lives can be saved!

Few things are worse than a broken air conditioner on a hot, humid day -- except the bill to get it fixed.

Preventative maintenance can help avoid a possible breakdown during the summer months and make an air conditioner run more efficiently.

Since air conditioning is one of the largest single users of home energy, proper service and maintenance can help consumers hold down electric bills.

Checking the system for warning signs is a simple matter. Put your hand in front of the air supply vents. If the air feels lukewarm, it could indicate a problem with the ductwork, compressor, evaporator or refrigerant.

You should also feel air movement from the vent. If you don't, it may indicate a fan problem, a dirty filter, dirty evaporator coils or ductwork leaks.

Then check the condenser unit outside. It's normal for the air being discharged from the unit to be hot. If it isn't, there could be a problem with the compressor.

Fixing or maintaining a central air conditioning unit is usually not a job for a do-it-yourselfer. But because a service call can be costly, homeowners should know what to expect for their money.

Maintenance service call should include the following:

Lubricate the condenser fan bearings, if not permanently sealed.

Clean the air intake side of condenser coil.

Tighten the electrical connections on the condenser, and check the operating current and supply voltage with volt amp meter.

Check the refrigerant levels and pressures.

Inspect the compressor start and run capacitors.

Clean or replace the blower filter.

Lubricate an unsealed blower fan motor and blower bearings. Check and adjust the belt tension and inspect the belt if the fan is belt-driven. Clean the blower wheel.

Clean the evaporator coil and check the fan condition on blower unit.

Clean and inspect the drain lines and pan in the blower unit.

Check for excessive attic air leakage into the return air chamber of the blower unit.

Ask the service technician to provide a checklist of the maintenance provided for your unit, to insure that you're getting the most for your service dollar.

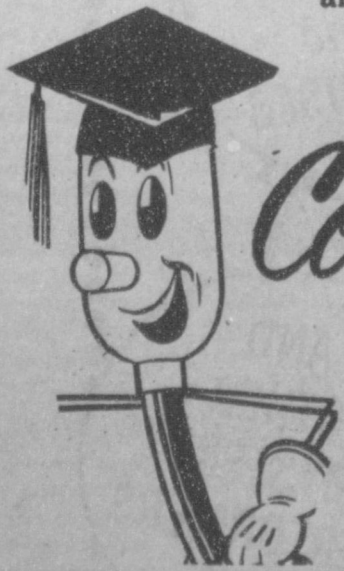

Small 'Dogs, bite hard

"We're just a bunch of small guys that want to win state." — Gruver fullback Jack Rodman. How 'bout them small 'Dogs!

The Gruver football team is nicknamed the Greyhounds. To be honest, they look more like Chihuahuas. But lately, winning playoff football games has gone to the little 'Dogs.

Saturday afternoon in Childress the Gruver football team was surrounded at midfield by its adoring fans after beating Archer City, 20-17. This second playoff win put Gruver in the Class 1A Texas schoolboy state football quarterfinals.

But nobody was talking about this being the first Greyhound football team in the playoffs since 1968, and the first in the school's history to reach the quarterfinals. Not a thing was being said about a team called Munday, ranked No. 1 in the state and Gruver's quarterfinal opponent on Saturday.

Nope. It was time for more important matters — a team picture.

Kicker Trevor Williams heard a bunch of "Atta boy" and "Way to go" comments for his game-winning field goal. Then, some guy yells, "How 'bout them 'Dogs," and a big howl went from the players. There was No. 22, Gruver's gummy star running back Rod Been a grin-nin'. Been has been playing with a bad hip the past few weeks. But Saturday he made Doug Flutie's Heisman Trophy-smile look like an everyday grin.

The front row of Gruver players were kneeling, and of course, smiling. I thought No. 40 was kneeling.

But as Gruver noseguard Chris Tomlinson thrust his helmet into the air and said, "Oooooooooooooowwwuuuuuuuuuu," I realized he was standing.

Hey, a bad view? "I've gone completely under a few guys this year," said Tomlinson, a 5-2 senior. "But then sometimes I just get sat on and look up hopin' somebody else makes the play."

Welcome to the world of a small 'Dog. Tomlinson is never going to be all-state, or all that tall. But Tomlinson, quick, spunky, and never at a loss for words, is a starter for Gruver's defense, which averages 150-pounds per player. However, he would be an all-American

at nose guard on everybody's All-Chihuahua team.

On Turkey Day Tomlinson's weight ballooned to 124 pounds. After a hard workout he may tip the scales at 117. Remember, we're talking about a lineman, a guy who makes his living buttin' heads all day. Whimps and noseguards get together about as often as mustard finds itself in a bowl of cereal.

Tomlinson, quick on his all fours like little 'Dogs have to be to survive, began playing football in the eighth grade and didn't start a game until Sept. 23, 1983. His new coach, Barry Haensch ("the reason we are in the playoffs," Tomlinson said), asked him to try the position after the Greyhounds starting noseguard quit the team the week Gruver was to play Panhandle.

"Coach Haensch got the idea from Odessa Permian," Tomlinson said. "He told me I could handle it. Because those guys from Permian aren't very big. Gol, they just get out there and play their hearts out. That first game was the scariest thing in my life. They (Panhandle 40-0) were good and boy did y hit you."

"I cared no longer, Tomlinson, an bench press more than 200 plays his heart out, even

though "its tough being double-teamed" and "I got my lunch ate on the draw against Archer City."

"I told him the position was his until someone took it away," Haensch said. "He's a senior now so that can't happen. He's just real quick."

Tomlinson is also an inviting target to opposing coaches. Who wouldn't run at a 120-pound noseguard?

"We tried to trap him and sent our wingback into the line," said Claude coach Jackie Burns. "We really respected him. And I was impressed. He's a heckuva little ball-player."

And little Chris Tomlinson, who learned his trade from the two guys — Steven Fry (180 pounds) and Jeff Bonham (141 pounds) — playing next to him, has fallen in love.

"I love it. I love being a nose-guard. It's fun. You don't get a lot of glory, but I just enjoy playing. And especially in a situation where we are right now, being able to go to the quarterfinals. Golly. Gruver! Gruver who?"

"After we had three wins to finish the season last year we were ready to go into two-a-days right after that game. Gol, we just wanted to win so bad. We just set our minds to it. We don't have any individuals, we just all pull together and scrap for all we're worth. Now it's here, and golly I just can't believe it."

How about that little Gruver nose 'Dog.

Beaver here Friday at 7:00

Coach Haensch was extremely proud of his Gruver Greyhounds at Hooker Friday night in their first scrimmage of the year. The first Greyhound unit scored a touchdown and held Hooker to 0 touchdowns, thus winning the scrimmage 1-0. The 2nd unit from Hooker then took the ball and ran 15 plays against the Gruver 2nd unit and did not score, but the Gruver 2nd unit intercepted a pass and ran in for a score to win this scrimmage 1-0. Coach Haensch was extremely proud of his defense.

But it will be a different story at Greyhound stadium Friday night when they entertain the Beaver Dusters. The Dusters are one of the finest teams in this area, usually, but little is known of their strength this year. In a special call to the Gruver States-

man Tuesday morning, Coach Haensch invites area fans to attend the scrimmage in Gruver at 7:00 p.m. Friday night against the Beaver Dusters.

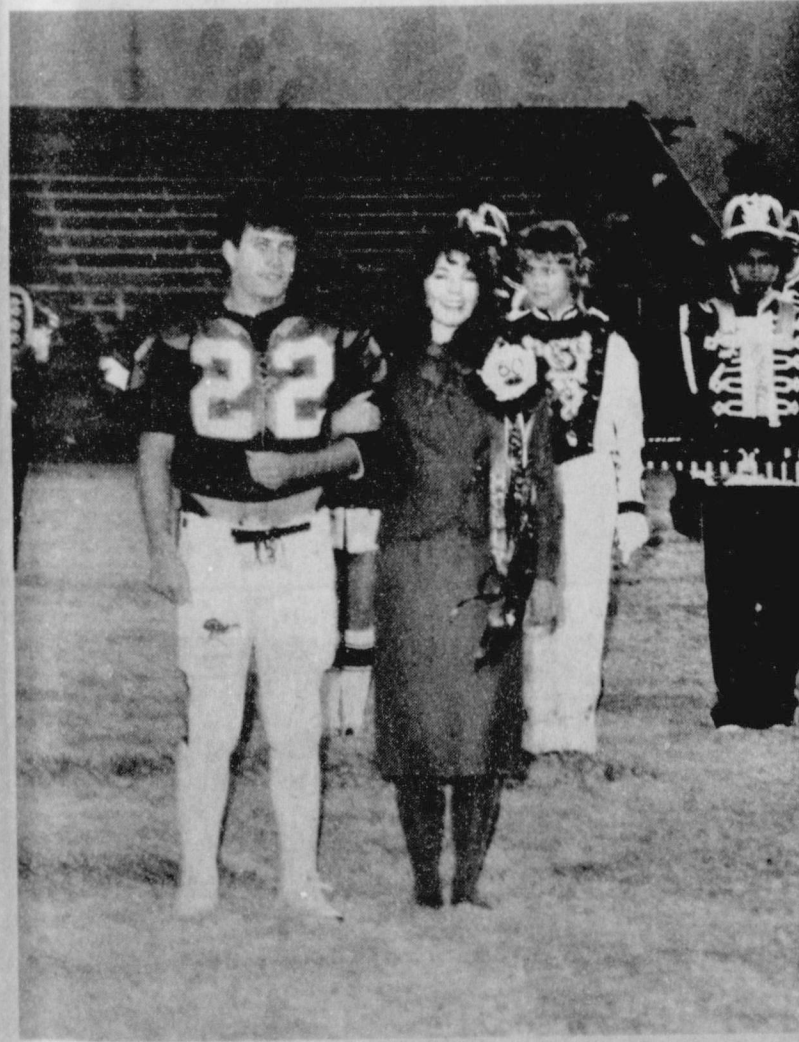

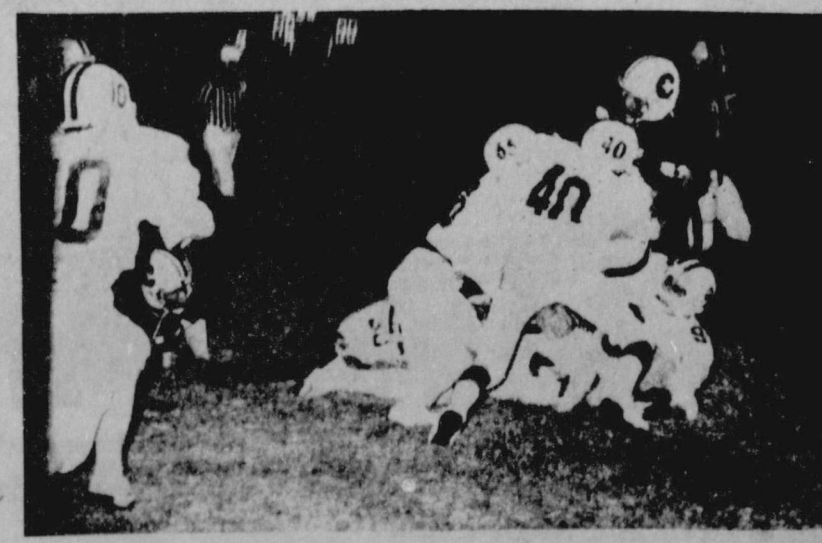

Will play in Bowl game Saturday

Would you call them the "Muddy Mutts"? The happy Hounds are just a real good football team. In any event, the Gruver Greyhounds blasted an excellent Sundown Roughneck team, 21-0 Saturday night in Hereford Stadium to win the bi-district 1-A championship.

Jack Rodman, a 159 lb. Gruver Senior running back, took the opening kickoff of Saturday's class 1-A bi-district play-off game and dashed 99 yards on muddy Hereford Stadium field for a touchdown. The PAT was good giving the Greyhounds a 7-0 lead with only a few seconds having ticked off of the game clock.

The game was played under severe weather conditions including an extremely wet field, high winds, rain, and every obstacle seemed to benefit the Greyhounds. The Greyhounds ran up a total of 21 points on the undefeated Sundown Roughnecks. This gave the Greyhounds a berth in the class 1-A area round against Archer City. Gruver Coach Barry Haenisch was almost speechless after the game. The muddy Dogs played hard and simply took control of the game for 48 minutes. The kickoff return, the first in high school by Rodman, actually was all the points that Gruver needed to win the game as they limited Sundown to only 77 yards of total offense and did not allow the Roughnecks a 20 yard penetration the entire game.

Rodman fielded the opening kickoff at the 1 yard line then cut to his right and duplicated a touchdown run that the Greyhounds had used against Booker previously. Rodman said he thought he was going to get caught at the 20, but he remembered seeing 2 blocks by Justin Finney and Ross Renner which sprung him loose. Rodman said, "All I heard at the 50 was Ross yelling to cut outside." Rodman said he listens to his blockers "Who I owe everything to." The senior made one last cut near the sideline at the 50 and went into the end zone standing.

Trevor Williams booted the PAT and Gruver (8-4) the District 1-A runner-up, scored all the

points it would need in the game with 47:45 remaining in the 48 minute game.

Rodman's kick-off return was a great inspiration to the Greyhounds but it was Gruver's ability to stop the undefeated Roughneck's rushing game and control the ball on offense which proved the biggest reason for the Greyhound's 5th shut-out this season.

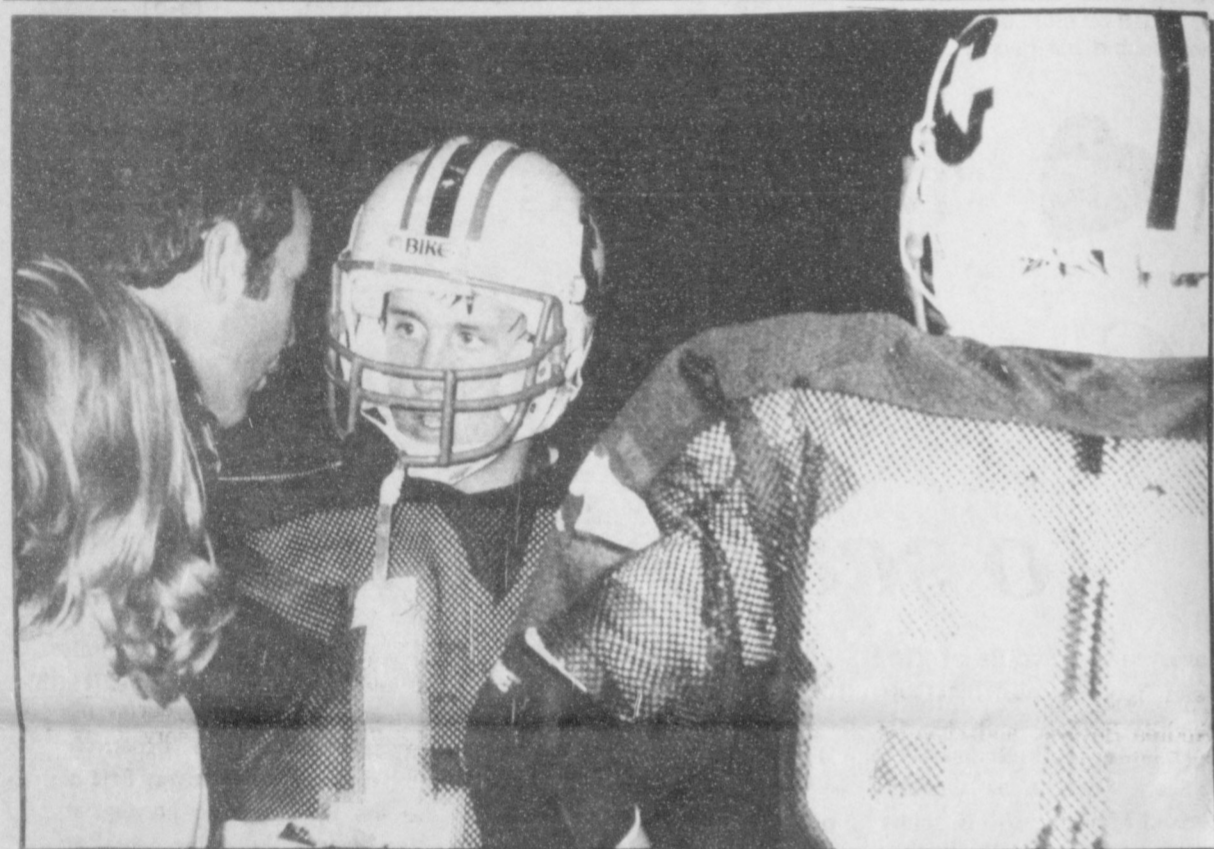
The Gruver offense was led by the rushing of Rod Been. The senior rushed for 120 yards on 18 carries, including a 51 yard effort on his first carry of the night.

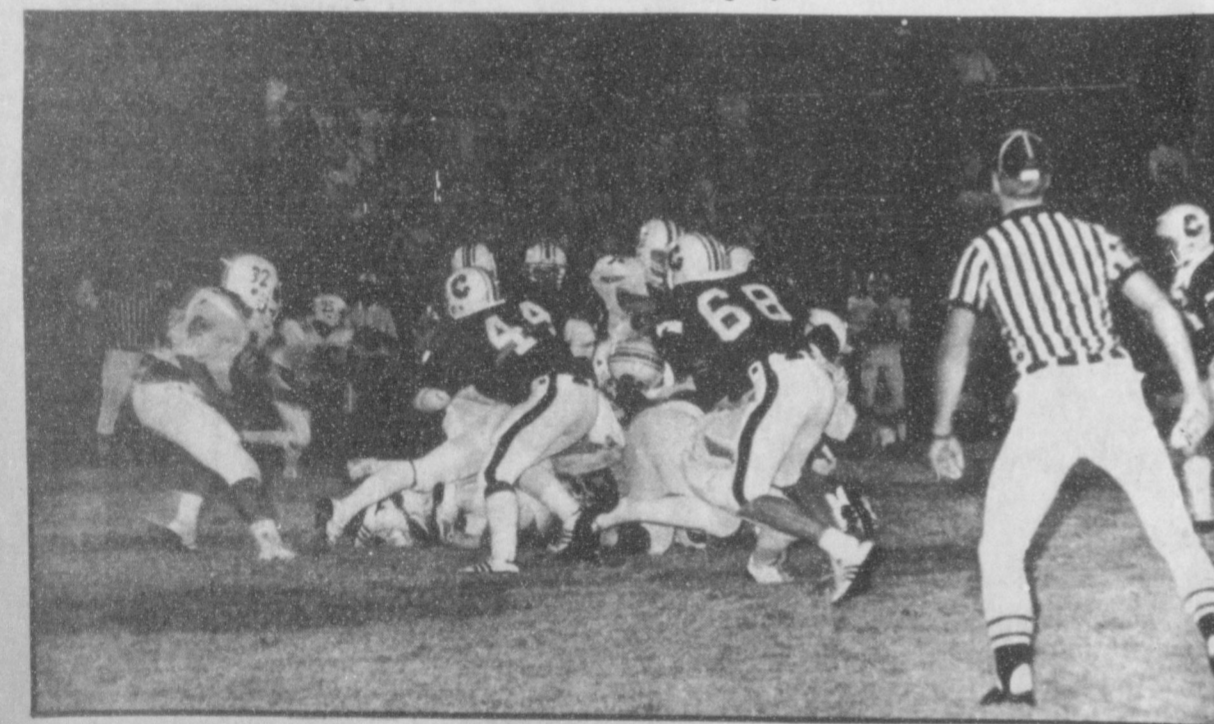
The Gruver offense committed just one turnover and nearly tripled the total yardage (192-77) of Sundown.

Gruver will meet Archer City at Childress Saturday afternoon at 2:30 p.m.



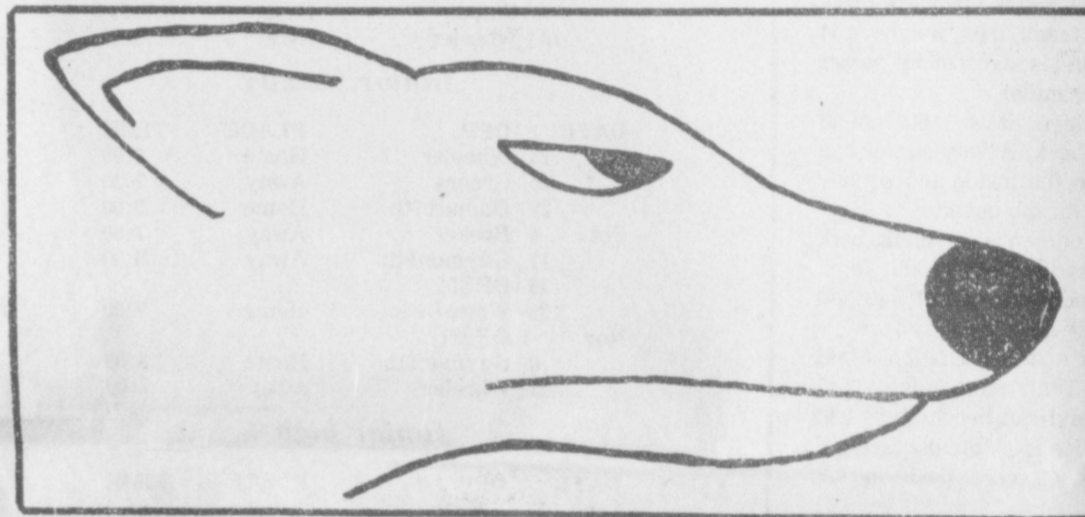
Chad Logsdon discusses the next play with the coach

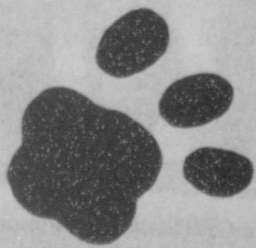
Mad Dogs bite Phillips

Surprise team of the year... Gruver Greyhounds

Sure, the Gruver Greyhound football team was picked to finish third in District 1-A by the *Globe-News* before the season started. After all, Gruver was dropping from Class 2A to Class 1A and had 14 returning starters.

But really, the Class 1A quarterfinals?

It wasn't so surprising Gruver made the Texas schoolboy football playoffs when the Greyhounds produced a 6-2 district record and earned the second playoff spot in the rugged world of 1-A football.

But under the guidance of second-year coach Barry Haenisch, the Greyhounds didn't become satisfied with just a playoff berth. And nobody would have

blamed the 1984 Greyhounds for sitting back and gloating for being the first football team in Gruver to play a high school playoff game since the U.S. had Lyndon Johnson as president.

Nope. Gruver entered the bi-district round, met unbeaten Sundown on a muddy field and came away with a 21-0 win. Jack Rodman opened the game with a 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. The next week in the regional game, trailing much of the game, Gruver scored 10 points in the last quarter and knocked Archer City out of the playoffs with a 17-14 win.

The Greyhounds' bubble burst the next week as Munday, the No. 1-ranked Class 1A team in the state, scored 28 points in the first quarter and defeated Gruver, 48-0.

"That loss really hurt us," Haenisch said. "But if it didn't then I would have thought something was wrong."

To judge the Gruver season on its final showing would be like wishing a toronado to rip through your arch rival's locker room — a real shame. For this team, not blessed with size, grabbed the hearts of the people in Gruver and grabbed more playoff wins than any team in the school's football history.

"This team was really fun to have won 13 of the last 17 games that he's coached at Gruver. We were very close and I can't remember hearing a harsh word among them all year."

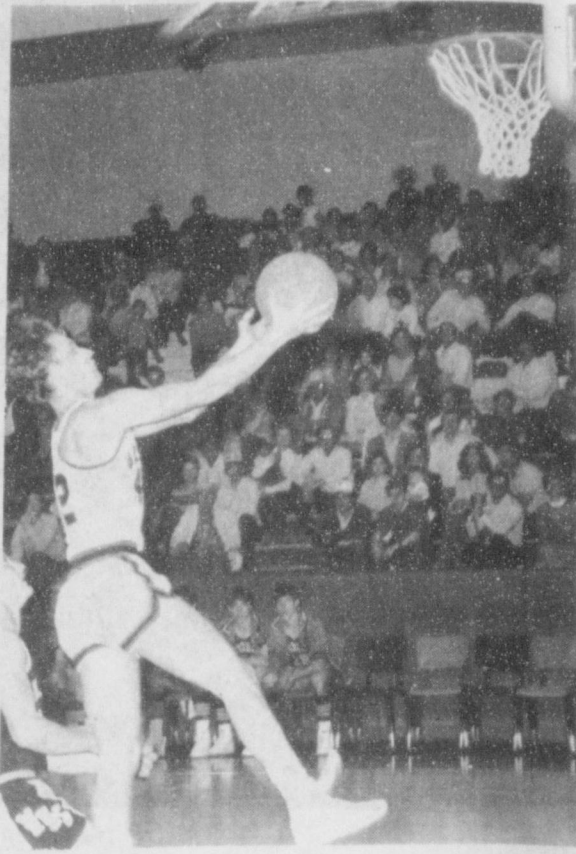
Gruver finished the season with a 9-4 record and three of the Greyhounds losses were to playoff teams. Gruver split its two non-district games to open the season and then went on a six-game winning streak in District 1-A. In those six games Gruver outscored its opponents, 243-39.

Kelon Morley led the Greyhounds with 16 points and the Hounds as we said before, were in the lead 32-30 at the end of the

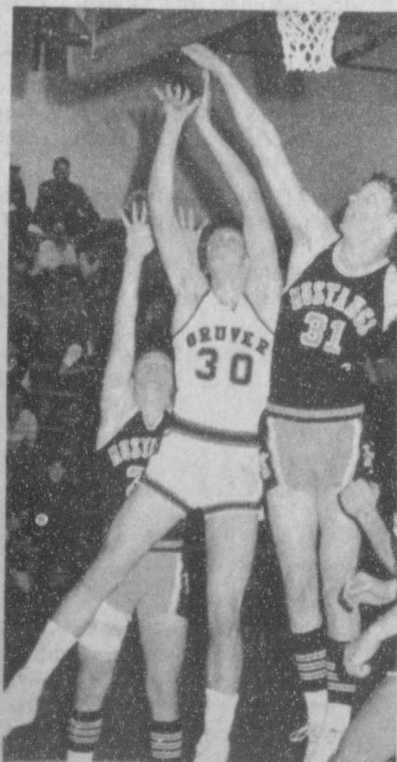

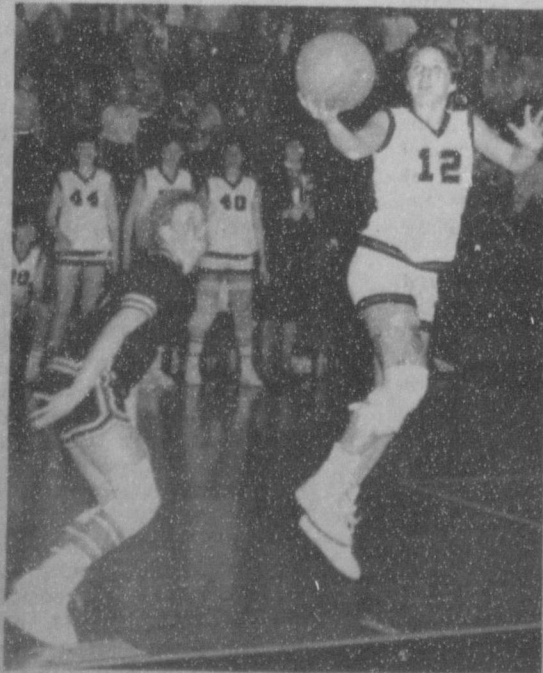

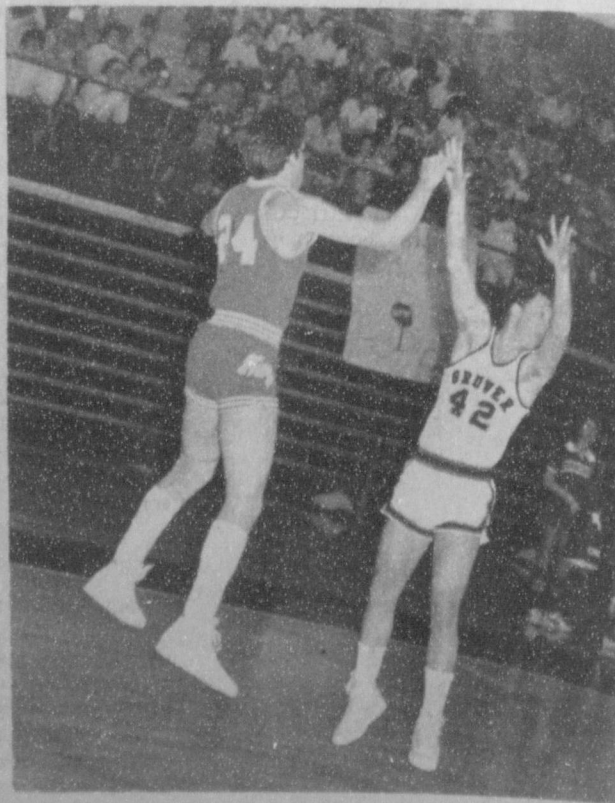

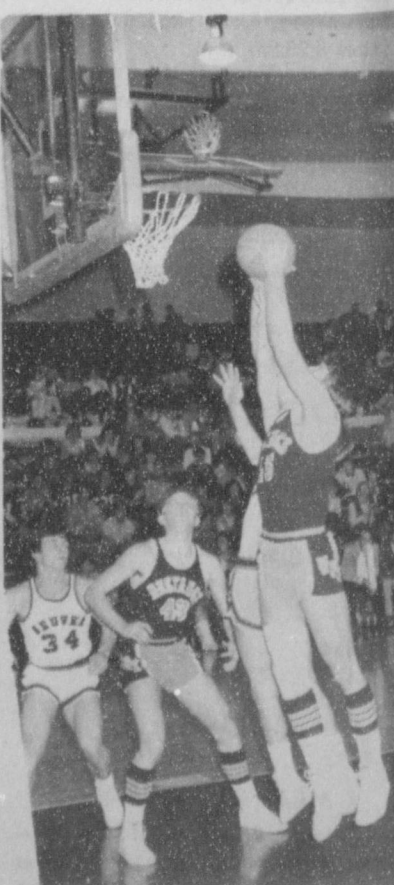

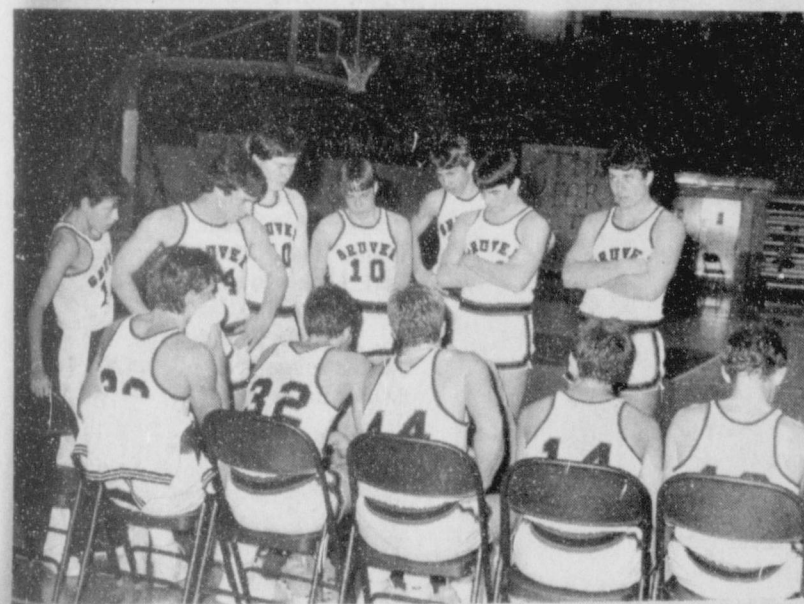

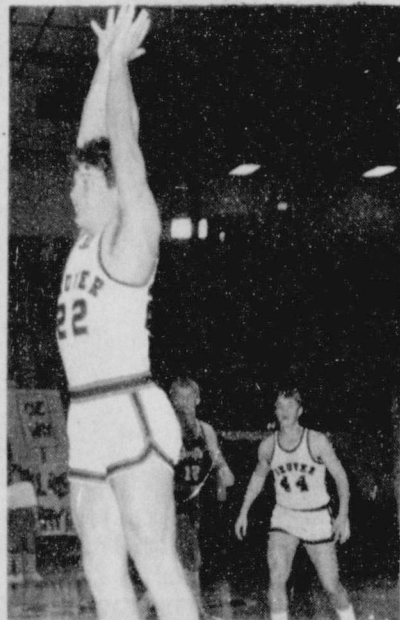

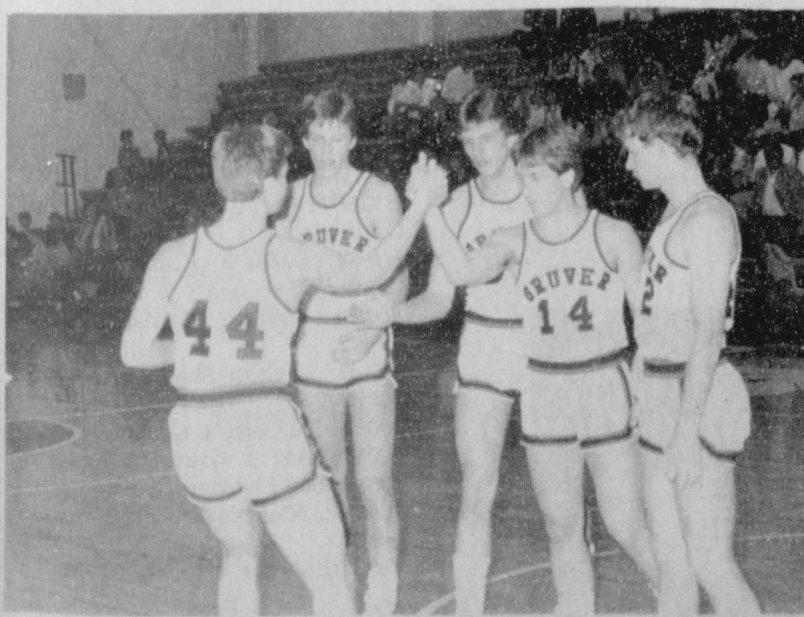

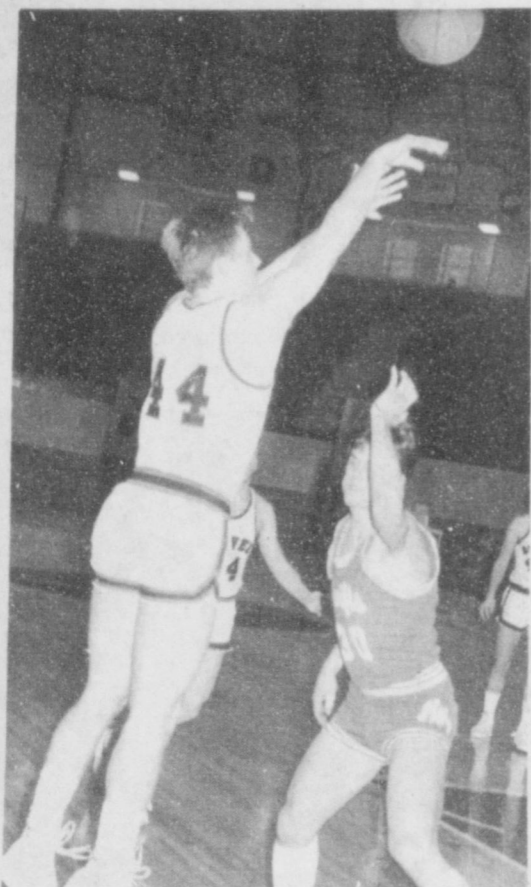

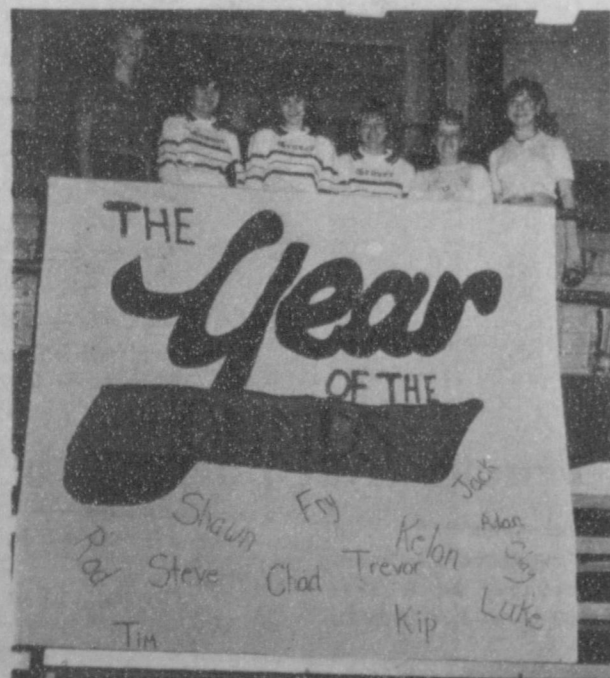

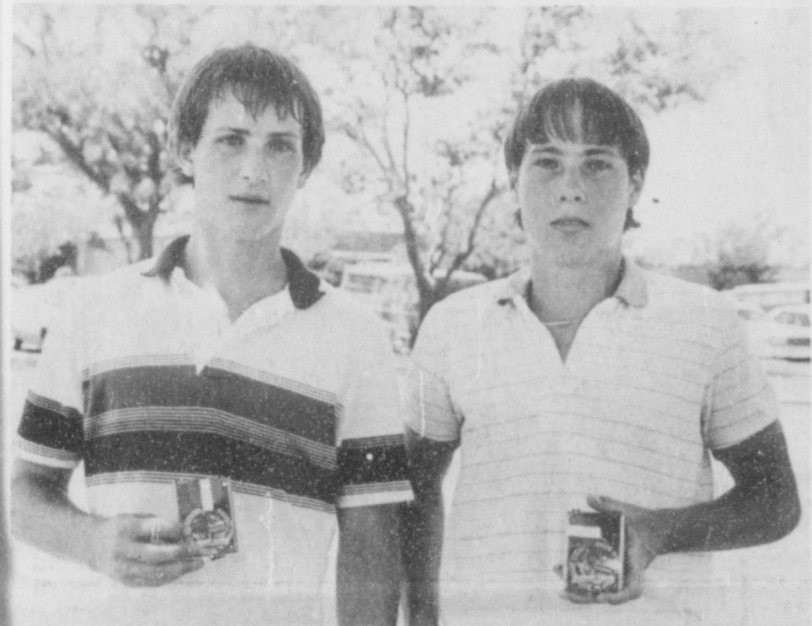

bid Wheeler won the bi-district game 60-58, and Wheeler then defeated Claude 53-47 Tuesday

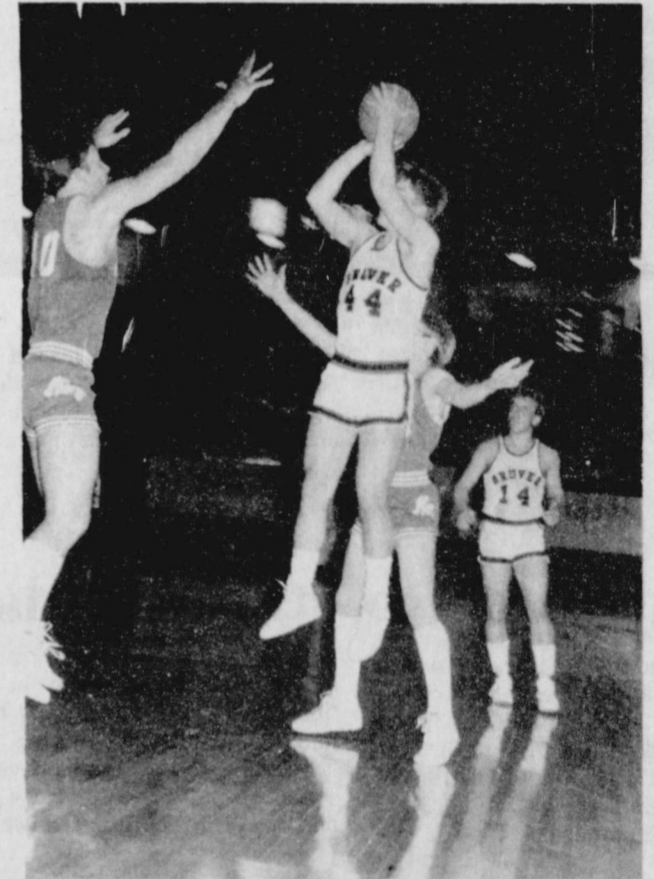
night to earn the right to play in the regional tournament at Levelland this weekend.

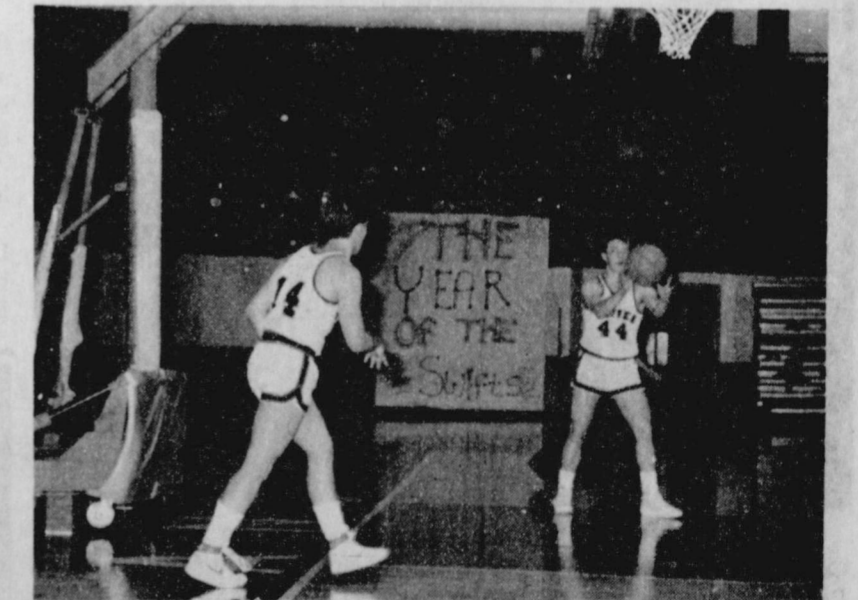

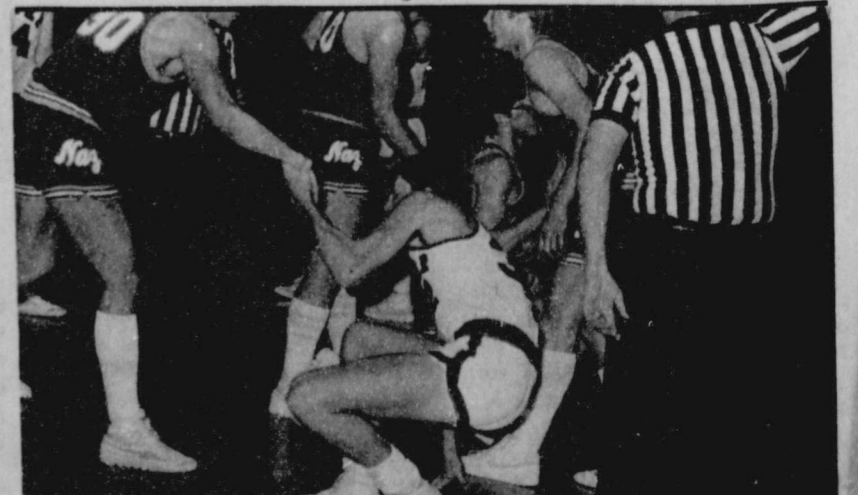
