

FINAL RITES HELD FOR COUNTY PIONEER, JOSIE HAYS

Funeral Services were held for Josie Hays, Sunday January 17, 1965 in the First Christian Church of Spearman at 3:00 p.m.

Mrs. Hays was a pioneer resident of Hansford County for she was born February 9, 1895 in the home of her parents on the Palo Duro Creek. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Stuart Cator. Her father came to America to join his brothers, directly from England and settled in Hansford County to make his home.

Josie Hays grew to womanhood on the Palo Duro Creek and attended schools which were quite un-modern. She began her schooling in the basement of the Henson home then continued to Pleasant Hill and completed her secondary education at Old Hansford.

Following the completion at Old Hansford in her schooling, she and her sister Vina continued their schooling at Panhandle Agricultural Institute in Goodwell, Oklahoma. Upon completion here Josie and Vina furthered their education at St. Joseph Hospital in Kansas City where Josie graduated in 1917.

Mrs. Hays enjoyed recalling the experiences which she and her brothers and sisters encountered while growing to adulthood. She often told of the experiences with the Indians at one time as well as the enjoyable times spent with the neighbor children. These pioneer experiences have remained in her mind and in the past few years she has been actively engaged in restoring the History of

Hansford County as she has been a member of the Hansford County Historical Society.

On December 10, 1919, Miss Josephine Cator, married Robert Hays who was a resident of the County. The couple was married at Old Hansford by the Judge at that time. Following their marriage they lived in the home of Bob Hays parents and Mr. Hays helped his father in their store at Old Hansford for a short time. They soon started out on their own and began by running cattle on land to the south and east of Spearman. Mrs. Hays loved ranching as well as her husband and enjoyed working with the cattle. In 1927 they bought their land some twelve miles south of Gruver and have made their home there since that time, where they have ranched and farmed, also.

A member of the First Christian Church of Spearman, almost since the church was established, Mrs. Hays has also served as an original member of the Board of Spearman Community Hospital. She was an active member of the Medlin Home Demonstration Club and will be remembered forever by her friends and neighbors as she has cared for many of them when they were ill.

Mrs. Hays died at 10:07 a.m. Friday January 22nd in the Hansford County Hospital after an extended illness. Burial was in the Hansford Cemetery. W. Graham Pugh, pastor of the First Christian Church of

Spearman officiated with the funeral and was assisted by Harold Fleming of the Morse Community Church of Morse, Texas. The choir presented three numbers, directed by Mary Brock and were, "Beautiful Garden of Prayer," "Beyond the Sunset" and "In the Garden."

Final rites were held in the First Baptist Church with the Reverend Ray pastor of the church officiating, assisted by Reverend Jeff Moore, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church. Burial was in the Westlawn Cemetery under the direction of the Ed Brown Funeral Directors.

Mrs. Ormon was a member of the First Baptist Church and of the Order of the Eastern Star, Chapter 811 of Borger. Survivors include her husband; sons, Harold and Kenneth of Borger and Rex of Clovis, New Mexico; her mother, Mrs. Fred McRee of Borger, a sister, Mrs. James Baldwin of Borger; brothers, Jim McRee of Albuquerque, Victor McRee of Lubbock and Bill McRee of Big Spring; along with seven grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

TEAMS SPLIT WITH STRATFORD

The Gruver boys won their second straight game Friday night with the Stratford Elks, 65-48; while the girls lost a thriller which called for an overtime 49-53.

Both teams showed an exceeding amount of improvement. The Stratford girls kept Anita States pined to where she hardly saw the ball though she did net 15 points for the evening. Jan Roper capitalized on long shots and connected eleven for a total of twenty-two points for the evening while Judy Bayless netted ten points.

Stratford began the game with four straight field goals to give them a lead of 8-0 as the game was just underway. The Gruver girls had trouble and were only able to net five points and the first quarter ended with Stratford leading 16-5. At the half the Stratford girls still led 28-19. As the third quarter was underway field goals by Jan Roper and Judy Bayless narrowed the margin to a five point lead for Stratford. Then Jan made two points and Judy followed with three while Anita netted a free shot and the score stood 32-31 in the Stratford favor. After a field goal by Stratford, Jan and Judy both netted a field goal apiece and Gruver led for the first time in the game 35-34. As the third quarter ended Stratford added two more to make the score stand 36-35 in the Stratford favor.

The fourth quarter proved to work as a see-saw. Stratford netted a field goal while Gruver scored only one free shot. Then Stratford made one field goal and three free shots before Gruver began scoring. Anita netted a field goal followed by a free

shot by Karen and three straight field goals by Jan to again give Gruver the lead 45-43. Stratford tied the score and two free shots by Anita coupled with a field goal by Stratford ended the four quarters in a tied position, 47-47.

The over time found Stratford with four straight points before Gruver was able to score a field goal. Then Stratford added two more free shots and the game ended in Stratford's

favor. The first quarter for the boys was close but Gruver jumped to the lead as the quarter was closing and the score stood 17-13. Gaining lead by a large margin in the second quarter the halftime score stood at 31-25 in Gruver's favor. Stratford was only able to score seven points in the third period and Gruver netted 17 to give Gruver the lead 48-32. Stratford tried to place

themselves back in the game as the fourth quarter was ending but in the fourth quarter they were only able to net 17 points while Gruver scored 17 points but the same lead was held by the Greyhounds.

Sam Tipton netted twenty-three points for high-point man of the night for the Greyhounds.

Three traffic mishaps occurred Tuesday with seven vehicles being involved.

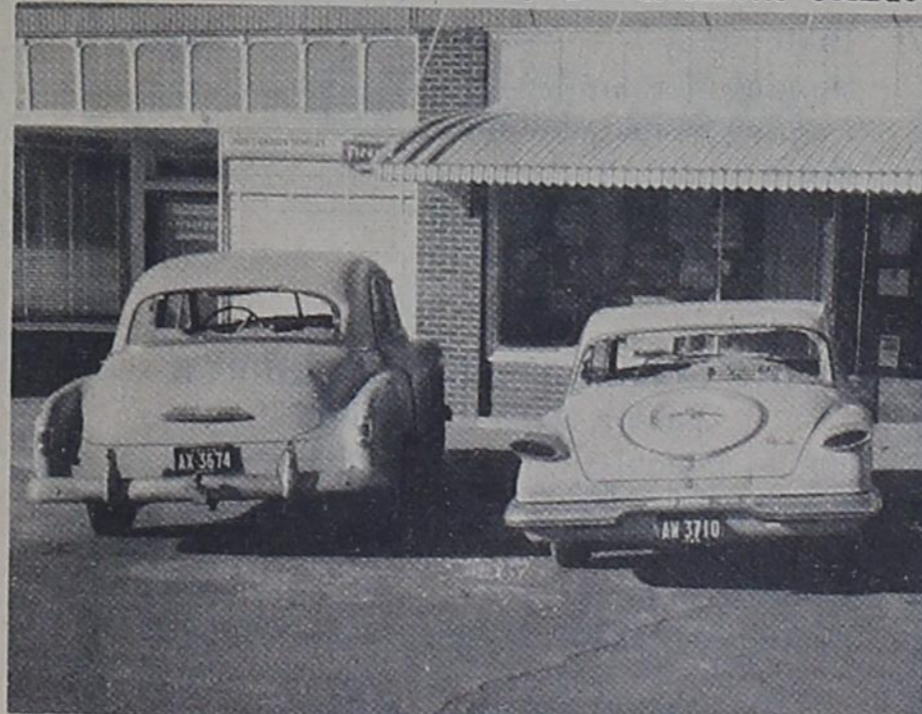
The first occurred before daylight as a truck driven by Don Robinette collided

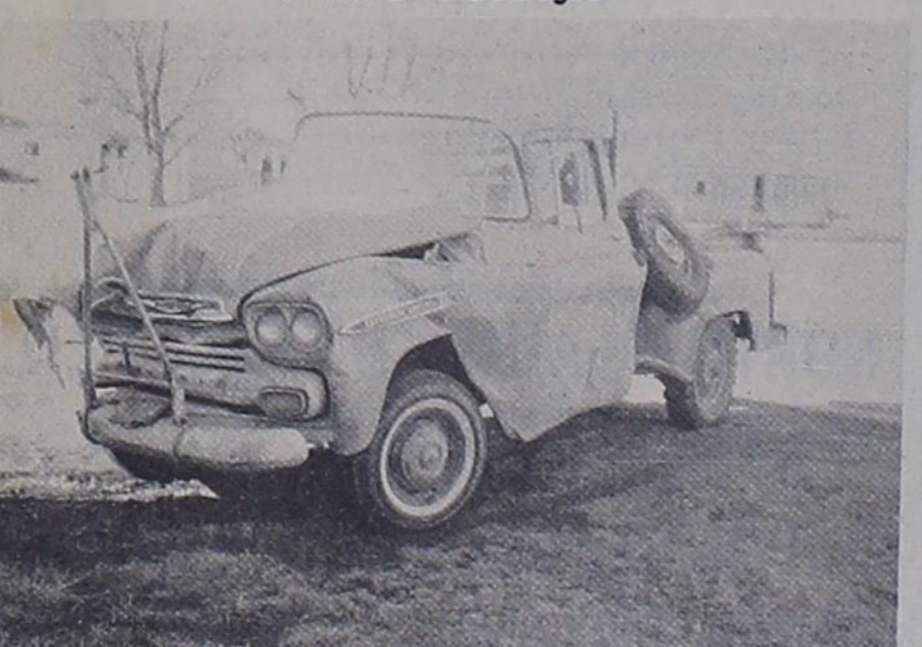
broken back glasses along with hard knocks to the back of the cars. The unguided truck received no damage.

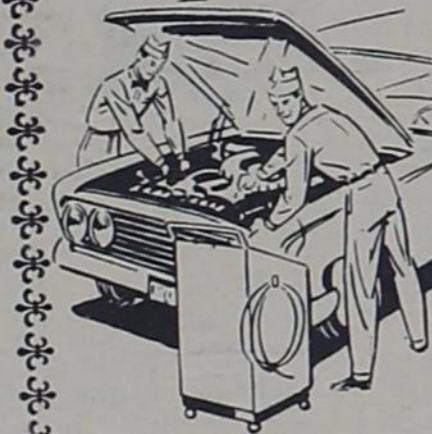

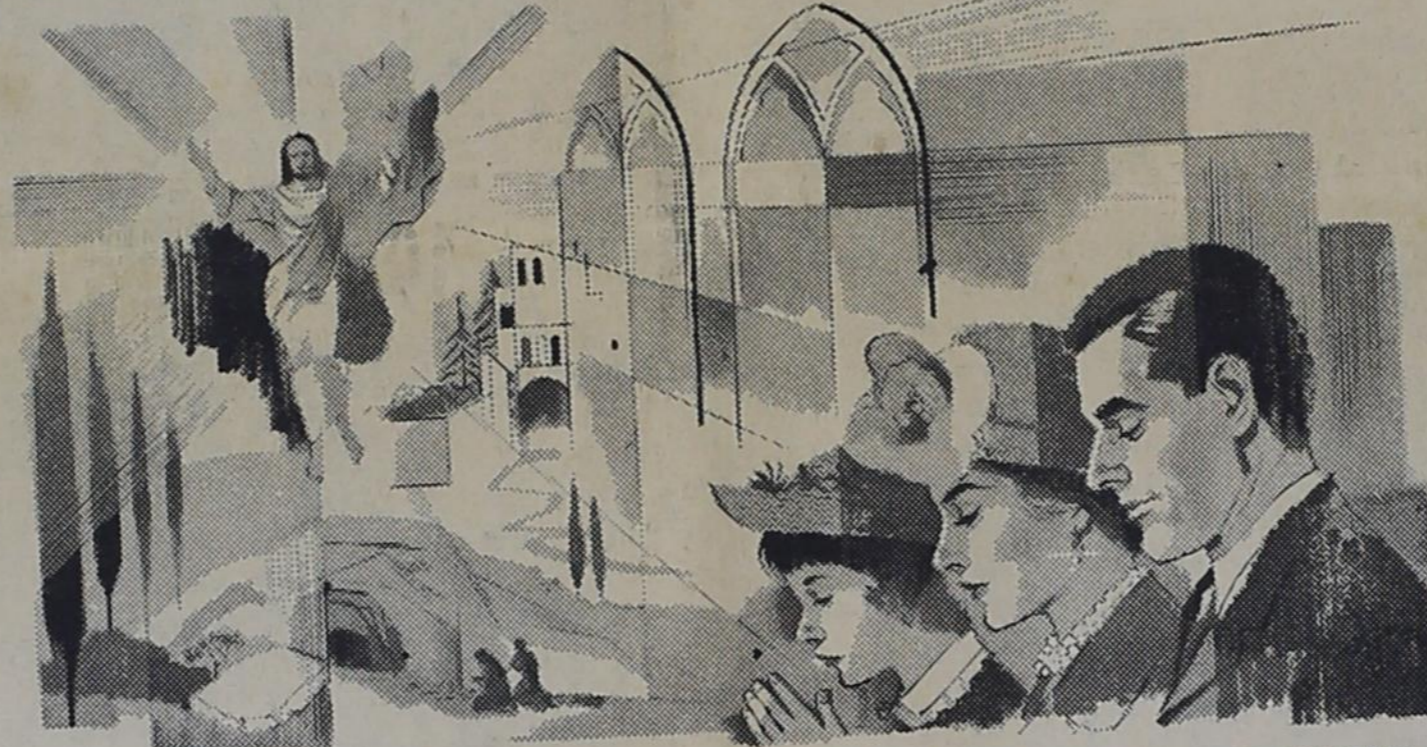

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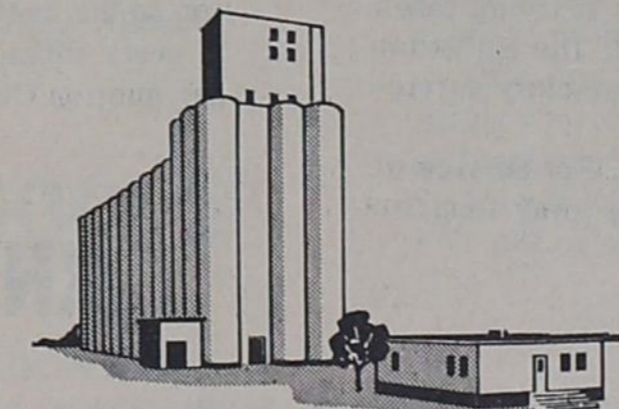

WINDBREAK TREES AVAILABLE: The deadline for ordering trees for windbreaks from the Texas Forest Service is Friday, February 12. The forms for ordering trees are available in my office.

RODENT CONTROL DEMONSTRATION: Farmers and ranchers having trouble with prairie dogs, gophers and coyotes should keep in mind the date of Wednesday, February 17, 1965. A field demonstration will be given that date, weather

permitting, on the proper way to use poison baits in controlling these pests. The place has not been set yet but you will receive more information on this later on.

RECREATION LEADERS' LABORATORY: May 3 thru 8 of 1965 will be important days--The Southwestern Recreation Leaders' Laboratory will be holding its 15th Annual Meeting. Those dates are coming to your attention now, in order that you may reserve these days on your 1965 calendar. As a leader for youth or adults, this can be the most stimulating and informative session

of the year.

Opportunities for expert training in the direction of recreational activities are rare, so the Southwestern Recreation Leaders' Laboratory was organized for this specific purpose. The flat bottom boat is nothing new. Under the name of skiff or pram it has been around for ages.

In Arkansas a good many years ago someone dubbed it the john boat and that name has stuck. No one knows exactly where the name originated. But it serves its purpose well.

In most of Texas about the only flat bottom boats are homemade affairs. Usually they are built for river use. Generally they are constructed of 1x12, caulked with a heavy application of tar on the inside and covered with green muck on the outside. They are the kind you find tied up under an overhanging willow on the river bank.

Now, however, the john boat, flat-bottom or square-end, as you might prefer to call it, is coming into its own in Texas.

You'll find most of them in East Texas. They are numerous on such lakes as Caddo, Texarkana and Lake o' the Pines.

The john boat is an easy boat to handle. It can be transported on top of the car without too much trouble.

Today john boats are being made in both aluminum and fiberglass. Weights are about the same, usually slightly more than 100 pounds. Two men can handle one on top of a car, with relative ease. Especially the 12-foot models, which are lighter.

Most practical and popular john boat is the 14-footer. However, in Arkansas they use a great many of the 16 to 20 foot length five foot fishing.

In fact, the 16-footer is almost a standard item on Arkansas streams. They have plenty of beam and ample freeboard. And they can be powered by comparatively light motors.

The john boat has ample space for carrying a duffle bag, an ice box and comfortable swivel seats for the fishermen. Three men can fish in comfort from one of these longer boats.

On East Texas lakes, however, the 12 and 14-foot boats are the most practical. In fact, they are ideal for the diversified fisherman--the man who doesn't care too much what kind of fish he catches.

One big advantage in these

car-toppers is that they can be hauled right to the bank of the lake or stream, thereby eliminating long rides across open water. If you know where there is a good tree-top expanse of water you can drive up to the shoreline, slide the boat in the water, and with a small motor be in your fishing spot in a matter of minutes.

After you reach your destination manipulation of the john boat is simple, although perfection takes considerable practice and experience.

I like to watch experts fish from these boats. They sit in the front end of the boat and with a short paddle and a stirring motion, move the boat along from tree to tree with the greatest of ease.

Most of these fishermen use a comparatively short cane pole. Rigged up with a line slightly shorter than the pole, they use two hooks. One may be baited with a minnow, another with a worm or a cricket.

They move up to a brush pile or a tree stump protruding from the water, drop the hook to the bottom and jiggle the bait a couple of times. If there is a fish around it usually hits pretty quick. If not, the fishermen quietly move on to another location.

These fishermen do not bother to string their catch. Most of them have wire baskets hanging over the sides of their boats. They drop the fish into these baskets.

In the course of a day they will get a mixed assortment of fish. Some will be bass, others large bream and crappie. Occasionally they'll pull up a good catfish or two.

This is an economical way to fish. Initial price of the boat is comparatively small. A 3-hp motor is ample and it doesn't cost too much. With a cartop boat, no trailer is involved.

Not only is transportation of the john boat simple, but so is its storage.

It can be suspended from the ceiling of your garage, completely out of the way. Then when needed, all you have to do is lower it on top of your car and tie it securely to your luggage rack.

John boats make excellent auxiliary boats. As such they certainly have earned their place in Texas.

HOMEMAKING NOTES

by Linda Webb, H.D. Agent

The County Home Demonstration Council meets Tuesday, January 26, for its first meeting of 1965. The meeting will be in the Home Demonstration Club Room at 2:00 p.m. Visitors are always welcome to visit the council meetings.

What is Home Demonstration Council? The council is made up of representatives of each Home Demonstration Club in the county, who bring their ideas for furthering and coordinating Home Demonstration work in the county.

The H. B. Council acts as a means of communication between the six Home Demonstration clubs in Hansford County; between the clubs and the agent, and between the clubs and various other groups and individuals interested in the objectives of the Extension Service. Council is an advisory committee to the clubs on matters concerning the Home Demonstration clubs.

Officers for the 1965 County Home Demonstration Council are Mrs. Claude Jackson, chairman; Mrs. L. W. Rosenbaum, secretary; and Mrs. W. B. Barnes, treasurer. Advisor for the County Council is the Home Demonstration Agent, who is responsible for technical training relating to all areas of homemaking for all interested homemakers in the county.

Of course, the invitation is always out to anyone who is interested in joining a home demonstration club to contact the agent or any member of the H. D. clubs.

We have been discussing duties and responsibilities of club officers this month. This week, I will talk to club reporters.

Reporting is work; but, it will pass if the reporter will be sure to get in the MUST - the 5 "Ws" Who, What, Where, When Why.

The local newspaper editor wants to print items about local people, what they are doing and planning to do. He depends on you for news about your club.

Every meeting of your club is material for a news story, but not everything done at the meeting is news. Pick out the things that were different about the particular meeting; Who were the speakers? What did they say? Has anything important happened since the last meeting? What important things did the club decide to do? Who were new officers elected? New members?

Don't confine your stories to meetings. If any member of your club has done something outstanding, interesting or unusual, write a story about that. Variety is the spice needed for news stories.

Here are some points to keep in mind in writing up your story: Write in the third person. Don't express personal opinion. Local names add interest, life and reality to the story. Write simply - don't ramble. Many times extra words can be left out, or one used in place of several. For example, use only the word "January" instead of "In the month of--". Another example: the following phrases mean as much, have more force when the words in the parentheses are omitted: all the (different), first (of all), in (the year) 1949, for (a period) of, (in the) meantime.

Write the story legibly or type it, using double spacing and plenty of margin room.

Give full names of people, and get to your item as soon as possible. Keep it news, don't make it history.

Good reporting takes practice, but it can get to be a habit if practiced correctly.

One last thought: The successful housewife is one who makes no mistakes she can't either pour mushroom soup on or slip-cover.

To continue my subject from last week on duties and responsibilities of Club officers, I would like to talk about secretary-treasurers.

Your job consists of the following things, and perhaps others your club expects of you.

1. Keep records of the club.
2. Keep roll and record of attendance. Announce the subject of roll call before you begin.
3. Keep and write minutes; read them at each meeting. Minutes should include the following items for most efficient use: (1) kind of meeting (2) name of the organization (3) date and place (4) who presided and who was secretary (5) whether minutes of the previous meeting were approved as corrected (6) name of person who made each motion (7) what disposition was made of the motion (8) signatures of secretary and president (after approval).
4. Write letters for

the club and compile club reports; correct procedure says that the secretary may remain seated when calling the roll, but should stand while reading the minutes.

The treasurer, of course, receives the club money and arranges for its safe keeping. He pays bills authorized by his club, and keeps a record of money that may be examined at any time. A treasurer's report should be given at each meeting, and an end-of-year report be made.

Complete records should show about each transaction; the date; to whom paid or from whom received; for what; and, how much.

Treasurer's books do not have to be kept elaborately, but the above information recorded about each bit of money taken from or put into the club treasury will eliminate many questions and mathematical headaches in the long run.

A thought: The post office effort to speed the mails certainly get results. Bills are coming faster all the time.
