The Greyhounds scored in the first quarter on a 10 yard pass from Stedje to Duncan. Trevor (the toe) Williams kicked the extra point to give the Greyhounds a 7-0 first quarter lead.

In the second quarter the Lynx drove to the Gruver 3 yard line with a good chance to tie the score but ran out of time.

In the third quarter Kip Pittman scored on a 8 yard pass from Stedje. The kick failed.


Spearman roared back in the third and scored on a Bret Davis 5 yard run. The try for extra point

8.50 inches of rain West of Spearman

HANSFORD COUNTY; Wed. Sept. 12th-The Hansford Plainsman.

Spearman received one of the best rains in the history of Hansford County Wednesday of this week. A heavy shower moved through Spearman at 3 p.m. Wednesday dropping .25 moisture in the city limits. Three miles north of Spearman and on into Waka it rained nearly two inches at this time. Also, R.C. Porter, who farms 4 miles southwest of Spearman received 1.90 in this early downpour. Another shower fell in Spearman after 5 p.m. and this shower totaled .65 bringing the total rain to .90 in Spearman. From 6 p.m. on until 8 a.m. Thursday morning Spearman received 3.10 inches by our official Reporter rein gauge. Gruver received over two inches.

Mother Nature, however went on a rampage 3 miles west of Spearman as she dumped 8.50 inches of rain on the Reynolds farm. Also, between Spearman and Gruver, Omar Cotter 5 miles west of Spearman, reported 5 inches of rain. Oscar Donnell reported 6 inches of rain at old Hansford. Needless to say, Hansford County received an ample supply of rain. Discouraging to Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties, was only a .24 rainfall.

The heavy downpour created several problems in the area. The golf course road was inundated for approximately 1 mile. A highway department truck stood by to assist stranded drivers who were going to the golf course Thursday. The golf course lake ran over and baked up some 6 to 8 feet on the back side of the dam. After running on the golf course dam the water almost took out the bridge south of Carter Crawford's home.

Sheriff's officers report water across the highway in many areas. Also a near drownded skunk floated into town and was discovered in the Permian yard. He soon regained his bearings and went back west where he had come from.

Panhandle police and sheriff dispatchers report 4 inches in Spearman, 3 inches in Dalhart, 2 inches in Vega, and 1.15 inches in Miami.








Crop insurance still available

Texas farmers have until the last day of September to buy crop insurance for small grains.

'Crop insurance is basically a risk management strategy in which a farmer pays a premium to protect

against large, unpredictable yield losses," says Dr. Ashley Lovell of Stephenville, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Crop insurance can assure a farmer of a minimal cash flow in case of a major crop loss so that he will have a chance to farm the next

year," adds the economist.

Producers who insured their small grain crops last year will have their contracts renewed automatically unless they cancel the, Lovell points out. However, any changes in the level of coverage or

price election must be made by Sept. 30.

This year multiple peril crop insurance (mpci) for 1985-86 wheat, oats and barley will be available only under the Actual Production History (APH) program, Lovell explains. Under APH, yield guarantees are based on

actual production records of the insured or grower rather than on county average yields as was the case under the area coverage plan. This means that a farmer must provide evidence of previous years'

production and acreages. The preium cost per acre also may be higher than with the area coverage

Selecting crop insurance requires choosing a price election and a yield guarantee of either 50, 65 or 75 percent of past production history, explains the economist. Price elections are \$1.30, \$1.50 or

\$1.80 a bushel for barley; 80 cents. \$1 or \$1.25 a bushel for oats; and \$2, \$2.80 or \$3.30 a bushel for wheat. The combination of yield guarantee and price election de-

termines the level of insurance coverage and cost of the premium. Lovell reminds farmers that the premium cost for mpci reflects the federal subsidy of the premium. Interested producers can obtain

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 5, 1985**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund, with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proeeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood con-

trol projects. The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal of and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will not be affected by such expiration.

The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for water conservation, water development water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence con-trol, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued.'

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conservation bonds in an

amount not to exceed \$200 million, if authorized to do so by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation onds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only for four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricul-

tural water conservation bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 3

ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 54 prooses a constitutional amendment would permit the legislature to authorize a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property if such relocation or replacement is done in conjunction with or immediately following the relocation or relacement of water mains serving the property. Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and ould provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens ere affixed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or

House Joint Resolution 89 prooses a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts by determining

the services the district must provide, by setting requirements a resident must meet in order to qualify for services, and by determining any other relevant provisions necessary for providing health care to

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to

authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 27 proses a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of Chambers County to divide Chambers County into not less than two and not more than six justice precincts. Under current constitutional law, Chambers County may be divided into not less than two and not more than five justice precincts. The proposed amendment will ap-

pear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six pre-

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 prooses a constitutional amendment that would grant an additional \$500 million in bonding authority to the Veterans' Land Board for the veterans' housing assistance program. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans Housing Assistance Fund. This amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the leg-islature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legis lature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

> **PROPOSITION NO. 9** ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature either to enact a statute or to attach a rider to the General Ap-

propriations Act to require prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of any funds appropriated by the legislature to state governmental agencies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proses a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in a fund to be known as the farm and ranch finance program fund. The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest that becomes due on such bonds in each fiscal year would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from treasury revenues in the fiscal year

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that would create a board with responsibility for the reapportion-ment of judicial districts, subject to legislative approval. The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislature to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment

will be the responsibility of the Legislative Redistricting Board if the Judicial Districts Board fails to make a timely reapportionment. The amendment would provide for the creation of judicial districts smaller than a county in counties where the creation of such districts has been approved by the voters at a general election. The amendment would provide for more than one judge for a judicial district. The amendment would rename supreme judicial districts as courts of appeals districts. The amendment would provide that the jurisdiction and terms of court of district and county courts may be as provided by law. The amendment would provide for the jurisdiction of justice courts, which may have additional jurisdiction as provided by law. The amendment would provide for rules of judicial administration and civil procedure to be promulgated by the Supreme Court, and would provide that the legislature may delegate additional rule making power to the Criminal Appeals. The amendment would provide that courts and judges in existence at the time of its adoption remain in existence until other wise provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

PROPOSTION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of County Treasurer in Andrews County and transfer the powers and duties of that office to the County Auditor. The amendment would also abolish the office of County Treasurer in El Paso County if, at the statewide election at which this amendment is submitted to the voters, a majority of the voters who vote in El Paso County favor the amendment. The functions of the office of El Paso County Treasurer will be performed by a person employed or designated by the El Paso County Commissioners Court. The amendment also provides for the abolition of the office of County Surveyor in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, and Henderson lin, Dallas, El Paso, and Henderson unties upon approval of such abolition by a majority of the voters who vote on the question at an election called by the commissioners court of the county. If the office of County Surveyor is abolished in any county, the commissioners court may employ or contract with any qualified person to perform the duties of the office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to

provide for: (1) the abolition of the office

of county treasurer in Andrews County and El Paso County; (2) the abolition of the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dal-las, Denton, El Paso, Henderson, and Randall Counties."

An economy and convenience, it's hard to beat the humble sack lunch. But unless the sack lunch provides at least one-third of your daily food needs, it may not do much for you nutritionally.

A sack lunch should contain two to three ounces of meat or other protein food; a cup of milk or plain yogurt or two thin slices of cheese; one or two slices of bread or a serving of cereal and a serving of fruit or vegetables to meet this nutritional requirement.

Including vitamin C rich and deep green or yellow vegetables in lunches helps to round out these frequently neglected nutrients, although these foods can also be provided in morning or evening

Many children -- and adults -think that a sack lunch has to have sweets and fats to be satisfying, but if you pack these foods, remember that they're a concentrated source of calories that should be consumed in small amounts.

Potato chips, lots of dressing on sandwiches or salads, soft drinks and candy bars can quickly add many calories with few minerals and vitamins.

For both economy and good nutrition, the best food buy for school children is probably the Heart Association lunch served at school. But if parents carry sack lunches too, it

National Farm safety week

National Farm Safety Week (Sept. 15-21) is a good time for farmers to remind their families and workers about the dangers of carelessness around electicity, advises Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

The National Safety Council reports 82 persons died in electricity-related accidents on America's farms in 1982, the latest year for which figures are available, said Seth Thomason, SPS Manager of Agricultural & Industrial Power. There were 979 electrocution deaths in the nation that year, he said.

Deaths and serious injuries have occured when farm machinery, tools or irrigation pipe touches an overhead line, Thomason said.

"A big problem is hunters who lift irrigation pipe to chase out rabbits," he said.

Farm workers should be extremely careful when operating tractors, combines, cotton module builders and other equipment with parts that extend high enough to touch overhead lines, Thomason said.

Fallen or dangling power lines damaged by a storm or accident pose a special danger, Thomason said. "Those lines can look harmless but be deadly," he said.

SPS offices have electrical safety booklets, posters and other items available free to the public, Thomason said. Films and presentations are offered free to schools, civic clubs, employers and other groups, he said.

Many area farmers through the years have been introduced to electrical safety at SPS-sponsored 4-H and FFA camps.

SPS primarily provides electric service to a population of more than one million people in a 52,000-square-mile service area in south-eastern and eastern New Mexico, the Panhandle and South Plaines of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle, and southwestern Kansas.

54 contracts awarded

Governor Mark White today announced the awarding of 54 contracts totaling \$2,254,706 to weatherize homes of low-income people, with priority given to the elderly and the disabled.

Under program guidelines, as much as \$1,600 can be spent to weatherize a single dwelling be applying caulking, weatherstripping, and insulation and by replacing windows or doors.

In the past 11 months, 8,560 dwellings have been weatherized under this program.

The weatherization contracts, which are administered by the Texas Department of Community Affairs, use funds from the U.S. Department of Energy and U.S. Health and Human Services. The Texas Legislature also designated a portion of the accrued interest on oil overcharge funds awarded to Texas for weatherization programs.

Sale tax up

State Comprtoller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$57.3 million in local sales tax to the 1.005 cities that levy the one-percent city tax last week.

The city of Gruver received a check for \$3,132.86 for the same period, up 10.30% from the \$2,678.30 last year.

Total payments in 1985 to date to Gruver are \$30,342.98, compared to \$27,509.18 for 1984 for the same period.

The city of Spearman received a check for \$14,725.33 for taxes collected in July and reported to the Comptroller's Office by August 20. This check is up 61.68% compared to last year's \$3,949.40.


