



HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE PAST TO THE PRESENT

As Highlights from the Past to the Present turns back the pages of time a few years we visit this week with the J.P. Miller Family who settled on land to the north of what is now Gruver when the country was only rolling prairie and it was an unusual sight to see plowed fields with crops growing.

Mr. S.P. Miller was born November 12th 1862 in the state of Tennessee. At the age of ten he, along with his family came by boat to the Galveston port where they purchased wagons and moved their belongings to their new home. Mr. S.P. Miller's father was a minister. While still young and unmarried Mr. S.P. Miller served as a cowboy on the Rocking Chair Ranch near Mobeetie.

Mrs. Mary (Coomie) Wright was born October of 1871 near Bonham Texas. Her family were farmers in northeast Texas. On May 6th of 1888 Miss Mary Wright and S.P. Miller were married, in St. Jo, Texas in Montague County.

After their marriage the couple made their home in St. Jo where Mr. Miller was engaged in farming and ranching. Six children were born to this union who were two who died in infancy and Benton, Joe, Mary and Price. All the children were born in Montague County.

In 1902 a deed to move west to a new frontier gave way to Mr. Miller's trip to Hansford County where he bought land. Several years later the family moved to Hansford County to make their home.

The family made their move from Montague County to Wellington where they remained for a year on Mrs. Miller's father's place. The family moved by two wagons and a buggy carrying all their household goods, their farming equipment and their personal belongings. Mr. Miller drove the wagons while Mrs. Miller drove the buggy. The children recall a dirt storm which caused them to lay over in Shamrock. Another incident recalled on their trip to their new home was when Joe's wild mare broke loose starting a stampede among the horses down the Main street of Mobeetie.

It was February 3rd of 1909 when the family arrived at their new home of Hansford County. Their land was located near Bernstein and was formerly the Mosely place. There were no improvements on the land when they moved therefore the family lived in a house to the north of their land until their house was completed in 1913.

Mary went to school at Old Hansford her first year in the county but Price attended a school which was a dugout on the Bishop place. Price seems to think his first teacher was Nannie Shook. Other children attending the school included the Bishop, Forrest and Gore children. After attending this school for two years the children moved to the McBride School where the McBride, Wallin, Forrest, Howard and Brandvik children also attended. The Miller children would ride their horses to school or go by buggy.

Several years later the 2-7 school was built about a mile and a half south of the Miller home and here Price transferred and later finished his schooling in Wellington.

Benton and Joe both finished their schooling in Montague County before moving to Hansford county.

The Miller family lived as the other pioneers, not knowing what luxuries were. For their heating and their cooking the family used cow chips in their stove. The mode of light was coal-oil lamps. The family garden supplied the food throughout the year, the family recall how beautiful their gardens would be never to be watered other than the normal rains. The family also butchered their own meat. The water trough from the well served as the refrigerator, keeping cool well water flowing over the milk and other products which needed to be kept cool.

The family purchased their chickens and milk cows after they moved to the county. They have never had a telephone while making their home in the country. When they needed to talk to someone they would jump on their horse and ride to the neighbors home. What supplies the family needed they would buy at Guymon or Texhoma. Their mail came on the Star Route from Guymon Oklahoma to Hansford. The mail carriers would meet at the McComas home and exchange mail.

The family recall how traveling salesmen would come ever so often to sell pots and pans, materials for dresses and etc. Also they remember a German who sold eye glasses as he traveled over the prairie.

Outstanding in the earlier days were the herds of antelope which could be seen over the country side. As a sideline when the family first moved here they would break mules for the Hitch ranch.

Mr. Miller and his sons planted the family's first wheat crop in 1910. The land which they bought had a small part broken, they broke more land with their walking plow and mules and horses. They had to purchase some farming equipment after their move. It was not until 1924 when the family began to change from horses to tractors.

Their main crop was wheat but some row crop was

planted for feed for the cattle. The row crop was cut with a one row binder and stacked. The wheat was cut with header barges. They freighted their wheat to Texhoma to market. Also remembered were the times when freighters would stop by the Miller home to spend the night either enroute to market or to their own homes.

Mr. Miller purchased a car for the family in 1918 and in that same year Mr. and Mrs. Miller and Price returned Montague County for their first visit.

The activities of that day were few but the children recall attending the play parties and literary societies. Church was held at the Kimbell and Grand Plains Schools.

The children have married and all have made their homes in this area or call this their home. Benton married Lillie Jordan and the couple made their home on the Miller farm until 1918 when they moved to Guymon, later to Texhoma and finally back to Guymon. To this couple were born three children who were twins Joe and Jess and Lynn. Benton passed away in January of 1961 in Guymon.

Joe was united in marriage to Mamie Hughes, this couple have always made their home in the Gruver area. Fred, J.C., Maxine, Lucille, Opal and Carolyn were the children born to this union.

To the union of Mary and Oscar Howard were born six children who are Oleta, Juanita, Shirley, Tom, James and Marilou. Mrs. Howard calls her home Gruver though she has lived in several places throughout the United States.

Price married Bebe Jeffries and this couple have made their home on the Miller farm until they moved to Gruver in January of 1949.

Mr. Miller died on December 19th 1932. Mrs. Miller lived by herself until she remarried in 1944 to W.G. Hardson and they moved to Gruver. Mr. Hardson died June 13, 1953 and Mrs. Hardson died March 26, 1955.

The development of the country seems to be the biggest change to the Miller family. They remember Hansford County as a rolling prairie with very few fences and all the animals at roam. They have seen the country change from cow trails to paved roads and graded roads. They have also seen the rolling prairies turn into towns dotted throughout the area as well as the vast rich empire Hansford County is today. The Miller Family is another of the outstanding, prosperous families who have played one of the important parts of making our county what it is today.

DEAD MAN RECEIVES SIX MONTH TERM

"While he was handcuffed, they beat him over the head with a blackjack and kicked him in the ribs."

"He was a pretty good old boy--never bothered anybody. Never been in any trouble, I don't think."

"He died at 6:06 this morning. They're going to have his funeral tomorrow at 3:00 p.m."

With those remarks and many more like them, Gruver was buzzing Thursday morning.

But, as usual, there was another side to the story--in fact, two other sides. The arresting officers told a

different version and the deadman himself had different views as to what happened.

Let's look at the stories one at a time.

The rumor had it that deputy Orville Walker of Gruver called Spearman deputy, John Brown, to help arrest a drunk. In a million different versions--many of them obviously started by other winos--had Brown beating the man to death while the victim was handcuffed

It all started when a telephone call to the Gruver Hotel early Thursday morning reported that the man

arrested Wednesday night had died early Thursday morning.

Another story (told by Walker and Mrs. Reese, who runs the hotel coffee shop) went like this.

Alvin Kisselburg was drunk in the coffee shop and annoying customers. Mrs. Reese called Walker. The Gruver deputy asked the man to go with him but Kisselburg refused. When Walker tried to take the man from the hotel, the drunk resisted and pushed Walker across the hotel lobby.

Walker told the man he would call for help and be back. He did, and Brown

came to Gruver to help with the arrest. Brown found the man on the third floor. The drunk, on seeing Brown tried to run into his room and lock the door.

Brown said he got to the door before the man could get it locked and the two engaged in a pushing battle. Kisselburg, losing the match, suddenly jerked the door open and hit Brown as he fell in. According to the deputy, (He had a bruise on his shoulder as proof Brown also injured his right arm in the fall and ensuing struggle.

"I had the handcuffs in my hand, and I got up and rapped him over the head a couple of times," Brown later said. Then I jammed my knee into his stomach and held him until Walker came in and helped me with the handcuffs."

"He was still struggling and continued to do so as we took him from the hotel," both Brown and Walker said.

A talk with the wino Thursday brought out another entirely different story.

"I was just sitting there drinking coffee when that Gruver deputy (Walker) came in and jerked me off the stool. He tried to kick me in the stomach but I got out of his way."

"I started to my room and he grabbed me again in the lobby and tried to kick me again (Walker) vouched to the kicking part and was disgusted upon missing. He didn't go along with the rest of the story."

Kisselburg said he went on to the room and was asleep when Brown came in and started to beat him.

Asked if he resisted arrest the drunk said, "I had just had a couple of drinks and that they didn't have any right to arrest him. Asked if he drank often, Kisselburg looked down and said, "Yes, that's what always gets me in trouble." He admitted that it was possible that he didn't remember what happened.

Asked about his previous record the drunk said, "That's why they always pick on me, because I have a record."

And, that was the under statement of the century. He not only has a record, but a book compiled of lawmen throughout the entire southwest from Oklahoma to California--and all of them were not petty drunk charges.

Five times he has received prison sentences ranging from two to five years. Five times he has either been convicted or charged with robbery or burglary.

On numerous occasions he resisted arrest. Five times he has been charged with assault with a deadly weapon. He was discharged from service for assault with a deadly weapon--a gun.

In all the arrest total up to 48. There may be more. But, the arrest sheet won't be changed for the next six months. That's the term he received Thursday morning while his corps was being mourned in Gruver.

HOUNDS TROMP GROOM TIGERS

Gruver's Greyhounds won their home opener and second game of the season Friday night as they blanked the Groom Tigers, 26-0.

A 65 yard punt return by Jimmy Cooksey in the first quarter and a 55 yard gallop to pay dirt by Wayne Leatherman in the final quarter were the highlights of the game. Bob Gillispie also brought plenty of excitement with some fine dashes.

Cooksey's punt return gave the Greyhounds their first touchdown. Gruver struck for two more tallies in the second quarter on a nine yard romp by Gillispie, and two yard Plunge by Kelly.

Leatherman closed out the scoring in the final quarter with his 55 yard run over left tackle.

On his kickoff return,

Cooksey followed good blocking to his right and stayed near the sideline until he reached the Groom 30 then cut back across the field and raced on to score.

In addition to the long punt return, Jimmy picked up 13 other yards from the line of scrimmage.

Leatherman was the big ground gainer with 141 yards. Gillispie added 96 and Kelly, used sparingly,

chalked up 16.

The Greyhounds chalked up 14 first downs to only three for Groom. All of the Groom first downs came in the first quarter.

This Friday night the Greyhounds play host to The Spearman Lynx. Spearman has also won its first games of the season, beating Panhandle and Boys Ranch.

SPORTS REPORT

At least one Hansford County team will have a good year this football season. The winner Friday night when the Spearman Lynx come here to tangle with the Gruver Greyhounds. Both are undefeated in their first two games of the year.

Spearman will be ranked the favorite but that means little when the two Hansford County teams tangle.

Actually both teams are still to be tested since their opponents in the first two games are all seemingly weak teams.

Gruver opened with a 14-8 win over Clarendon and a 26-0 romp over Groom. Spearman beat Panhandle 30-22 in the opener and stopped Boys Ranch 28-0 last week.

After losing to Gruver Clarendon dropped a game to Class B Claude and Groom had opened with a 20-0 loss to Lefors. After the Spearman game, Panhandle fell to a good McLean team while Boys Ranch had been tramped by Sunray before coming to Spearman.

But, regardless what happens the rest of the season the team that wins here Friday night will have something to crow about the rest of the year.

Getting away from the non-conference slate, it looks like an interesting year in District 1-A. Unless some team develops in a hurry the league should be fairly close.

Sunray was the pre-season pick and opened with an easy victory over Boys Ranch. However, last Friday night the Bobcats were walloped 25-8 by Stinnett to show they can be beaten.

However, Johnny Johnson and Fred Morgan, Sunray's top backs saw little action. Sunray has a big young line that could develop. The Bobcats should still be the team to beat.

Sanford Fritch was supposed to be real tough but dropped the opener 34-0 to Stinnett and escaped with a 20-20 tie with Canadian last week. The Eagles can still be rough but aren't expected to breeze past anybody.

Panhandle was another team with possibilities. The Panthers have dropped their first two to Spearman and McLean, but have been without the full services of their fullback. Panhandle will be tough before the year is out.

Stratford fell to strong Texhoma in an opening game last week and it is still too early to tell what the Elks have. They do have some fine young players who could develop before the season is out.

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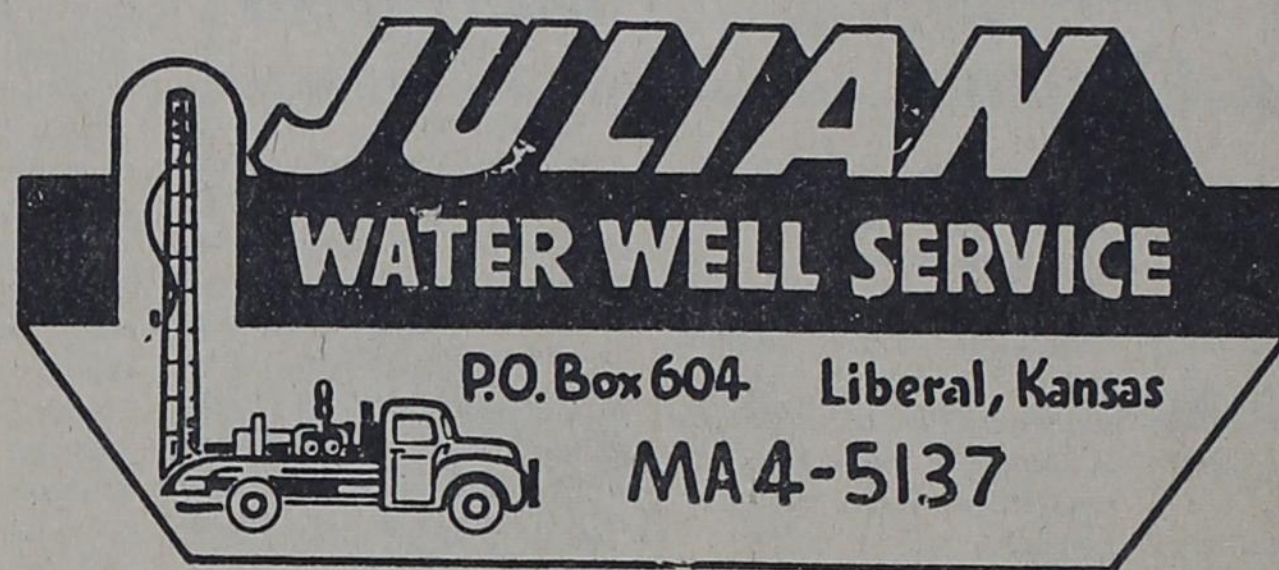
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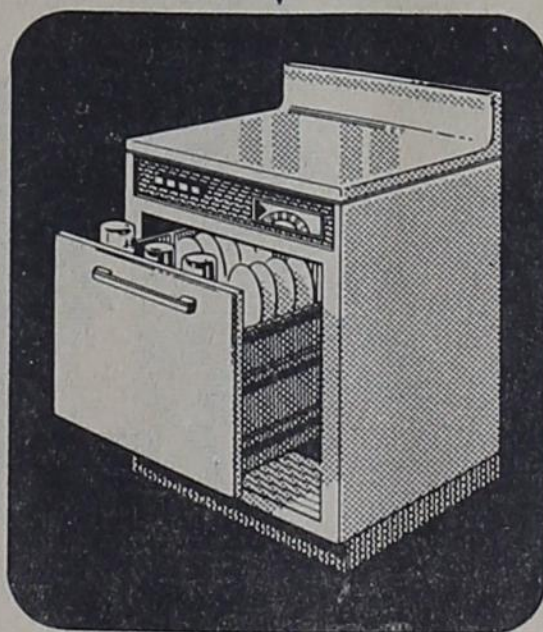
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Judy Gillispie Wins Contest
