

GRUVER LIBRARY, A GROWING INSTITUTION

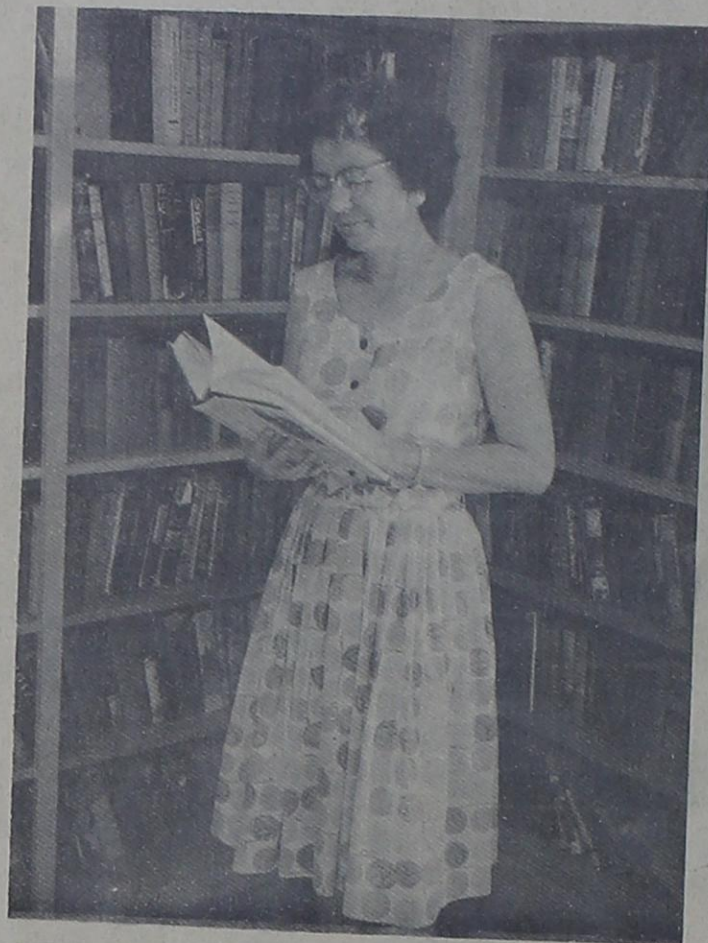

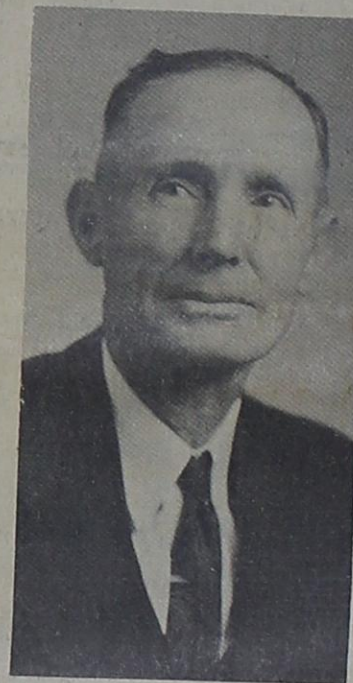
GRUVER OES INSTALLS OFFICERS

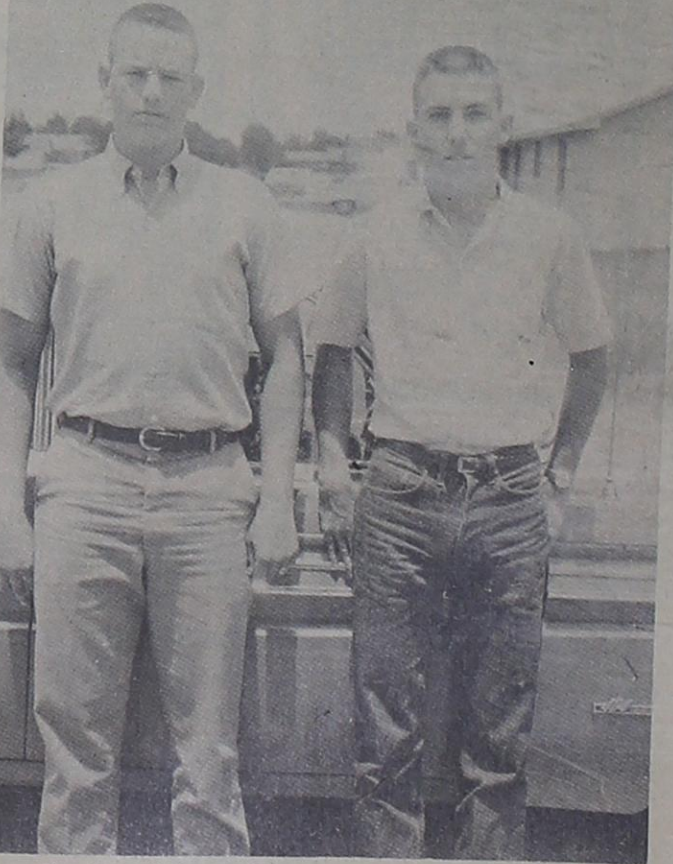

If you had the opportunity, where in your span of life would you like to go back to?

Well, most of us would pick some young age, but where would you go back to as far as making a living is concerned? We asked a man who has had 84 years experience, or will have had when he celebrates his birthday Saturday.

"I couldn't think of a better time than right now," says W. L. Harris, better known around here as "Uncle Will."

"It's 10 times as easy to make a dollar now, than it was back years ago," he said. A dollar would buy more then, but not 10 times as much."

"There's not a young man in this town who can't make at least 10 dollars a day now, whether he has a good education or not," he continued. Back when I was young I would have been afraid of a man who offered me 10 dollars a day."

He said he felt that a bigger percentage of people were making a good living now. "I can remember when nearly everybody worked just for a living and food to eat." We never really went hungry, but came pretty close lots of times.

"We used to work for nothing, and couldn't get a job at that," he said.

As for opportunity, he said that there was some good chances back in the old days, if a fellow could find a way to get hold of some money. "It used to be harder to get \$50 than it is to come up

with \$10,000 now," he said. "I can remember when a dollar would buy a lot, but nobody had a dollar."

"Uncle Will" was born in 1880 in Henderson County, Tennessee and came to Collin County, Texas when he was eight years old. When he was 10 his father, John Henry Harris, moved the family to a farm north of Clarendon and filed on some land.

"We tried to raise crops there," he said. We raised most of our food.

The family then moved to a two-section farm near Groom. His father got the two sections from another man for the filing fee of \$40. He sold the place for \$7 an acre in 1905 as the country began to settle.

"Uncle Will" moved to Amarillo in 1907 and stayed there for 10 years. He worked for the railroad and on a dray line. Pay then was \$2 a day, or \$1 with board.

In 1917 he moved to Hansford County and settled south of Spearman. After one year there he

moved seven miles north of Gruver and has been here ever since.

He was selling Maxwell cars when he first came to the county. They sold for around \$700. Driving was pretty rough then compared to road conditions today. "It took six hours for a man to go from here to Amarillo," he said. "I think there were 25 gates between here and there and a man could average about 25 miles an hour on the good roads."

Prices went up during World War I and everybody made pretty good money. "But, then cattle went down and broke a lot of people," he said.

He remembers the 20's as being pretty tough from 1921 to 1926. "1926 was a real good year here and they built a townsite building the next year and a post office and railroad came soon."

During the early depression years many houses were moved out of Gruver according to Mr. Harris. "Then along in 1936 or 37 wheat prices began to come back up."

The 40's all except one or two years, were good here he said. "We planted all our land during the war years and had good crop conditions most of the time."

"Uncle Will" had this to say about irrigation: Under the circumstances it's pretty good, but nothing to get too excited about. If a man gets a good well it will pay off and they're getting better wells and equipment now."

HOMEMAKING NOTES

June is the time of brides and bridal showers. An appropriate gift for the bride sometimes becomes a difficult decision for friends to make.

A choice the bride will appreciate is one or more basic small tools which most homemakers use every day. Usually, they are things a new bride ends up buying for herself, because no one else thought of giving such a practical gift.

The list to select from might include these categories:

Pots and pans: a large chicken fryer, or small frying pan with cover, one-quart, two-quart and three-quart saucepans; an oblong cake pan or large utility pan; a loaf pan; a covered casserole with pie-pan lid; six custard cups; and a coffee maker.

Kitchen tools: a measuring cup or cluster of cups; a set of measuring spoons, a set of mixing bowls; a perforated mixing spoon; one spatula, a rubber scraper a paring knife, a vegetable peeler, a vegetable brush, a small strainer; an egg beater, a rolling pin, a can opener pancake turner; a long-handled fork and a grater.

Some first additions: A cookie sheet, a cooling rack; a tube cake pan; 2 pie plates, 9-inch size; 2 round cake pans, 8 or 9 inch size one muffin pan, a teakettle, 1 or more salad or pudding molds; a potato masher; a wooden mixing spoon; a utility knife, and a carving knife.

Let Teeth Regrow, Says Dentist

If Johnny comes home with a front tooth in his hand instead of in his mouth, don't panic, says an official at the University of Kentucky School of Dentistry.

He suggests that parents head for the nearest dentist's office on the double.

"And don't forget to take the tooth with you—for it can be put back where it belongs," said Dr. John R. Mink of the University of Kentucky School of Dentistry.

Permanent teeth can be replaced, if they are treated quickly enough, and are likely to last six months to six years. They have been a number of instances where parents just push a loose tooth back into the bond that holds it in the jaw, he says.

The trouble when a tooth is knocked out usually is that parents forget to bring the tooth with them when they come to the dentist.

"Even if it's dirty, we can clean it up and have a good chance of replanting it," Dr. Mink says.

I hope this doesn't happen to your child, but with the summer vacation time here, this may be just the informa-

tion some hurried parents will need to be aware of in the near future.

Farm Worker Supports 27 People, Up from Seven at Start at Century

The decline in farm population highlights the efficiency of the United States agriculture. In 1900, each farm worker supported 7.0 people; in 1940, 10.7 persons; and by 1961, each worker supported 27.4 people.

A century ago, some 60 percent of the nation's 31.4 million people lived on farms. In 1963, when the population of the United States reached 190 million, less than 8 percent lived on farms.

Since the war, capital in the form of mechanical power, machinery, fertilizer and purchased feed, seed, and livestock increasingly has substituted for manpower and farm-produced inputs in agriculture.

In 1959, the average investment per farm worker reached \$22,000 as compared to \$18,000 per employee in manufacturing.

According to the "Population Bulletin," an average current investment of \$73,000 is now required for farms adequate in size to yield an annual income of \$3,500; and an investment of \$111,000 is necessary for an income of \$5,500 which is comparable to the income of the skilled or white-collar worker.

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

Nature has a way of taking care of her own problems. If you take a tract of land and never touch it, the balance of nature to available habitat will remain fairly stable all the time. Nature has many devices for such control - predators, disease, starvation. None of them are very pretty, but none-thless they are quite effective.

The real trouble starts when someone begins tinkering with this delicate balance of nature. As things now stand in Texas, there are no lands left which haven't, in one way or another, felt the presence of civilization.

This, of course, compounds the problem. When a rancher chains the brush off his land, he destroys much of the wildlife habitat. As some of the predators are killed, it also knocks the balance out of proportion.

The more this balance is altered, the bigger the need for competent wildlife biologists to try and get things back in some semblance of order again. Perhaps heavier hunting pressure is desired, to compensate for the lack of natural predators.

But, despite all the work of man, nature still makes her presence felt, quite dramatically at times. Experience has shown us that there are cycles of wildlife, diminishing populations in lean years, booming populations in years of plenty. Nothing we can do will alter this natural cycle.

A drastic die-off of deer in Llano County a couple of years back was a dramatic example of this. It was simply nature's way of balancing the deer herd to the available habitat.

Contrary to popular belief, game can not be stockpiled. Only so much wildlife can survive on any given number of acres.

A covey of quail, for example, never will get any larger in numbers no matter how much it is protected. It may diminish in lean years, but even during good years it will go only to a certain level and remain there. This, whether the birds are hunted or not.

Natural attrition annually takes care of about 80 per cent of the birds. This means that 80 of every 100 quail each year will be young birds.

This also is true of deer. Many ranchers, upon seeing a drastic increase of deer on their lands, attempt to resort to artificial feeding. According to James Teer, with the wildlife management department at Texas A&M, this only compounds their troubles.

"Such feeding programs only prolong and aggravate the problems," he said. "Such programs only treat the symptoms, not the disease. The symptoms are poor deer; the disease, poor range."

Teer points out that deer are increasing in numbers, despite the fact that more have starved, annually, than legally were taken by buck hunters.

Parasites also take a heavy toll. Yet we still have more deer today than ever before.

"Removing surplus deer is a vital part of deer herd management," said Teer. "And common sense tells us that harvesting both sexes is sound and practical on some ranges."

He asks landowners to look at the problem like this: Selling only bulls, rams or billies from herds of domestic stock is impractical management. Unless both sexes of livestock are marketed, the pastures soon become so overstocked with females that the range can not produce enough forage to feed them. The number of deer generally is determined by carrying capacity of rangelands, not by the annual harvest of deer by hunters.

This, then, points up some of the problems encountered when man starts tinkering with nature.

"Most deer never reach what is considered a ripe old age for whitetails," Teer went on. "Although some deer do live 20 years, a buck that escapes hunters and the toll of nature for five years is considered old. As far as the total deer production is concerned, deer over 7 1/2 years are not common members of the herd. About 95 per cent never see their fifth birthdays."

So it readily can be seen that the sport of hunting is vitally necessary, not only for the economical value it brings to the various communities and the fun it provides for people of all ages, but also for the role it plays in wildlife management. Man has taken much of the control of nature away from the Old Lady herself.
