GRUVER LIBRARY, A GROWING INSTITUTION

Like Topsy, once it got started, the Gruver Public Library just "growed", starting as a few shelves of books, mostly contributions, started by members of the American Legion Auxillary following the completion of the Memorial Building until the present when it has become a permanent institution of the Gruver Community located in the rear of the City Building, and boasts a total of nearly 2,000 volumes running the gamut from the latest in fiction to time-worn literary masterpieces.

In 1959, the Gruver PTA established a summer reading program which was located in the Elementary Building under the direction of the late Mrs. Bill Hamm. This program was continued for another summer in the Elementary Building under the direction of Mrs. Carlie Knight and in May of 1961, the books from program were moved down to the Memorial Building with the cooperation of the Legion Auxillary the summer reading program was set up with Mrs. Knight assist ed by Carlita Knight.

During the winter of 1961 and 1962, the library was open under the direction of Mrs. Ben Nobles and in the summer of 1962, Carlita Knight served as Librarian with Sammy Cluck supervising the PTA Children's Reading pro-

gram. Mrs. Nobles continued as the Librarian for that winter and in the spring of 1963, a space was reserved for the Gruver Public Library at the present location. Mrs. Ruth Lee has served as Librarian since that time.

The growth of the Gruver Library can be attributed to many but several individuals have been outstanding in persisting in establishing it including Mrs. Don Hudson and Mrs. S.B. Hale, Jr., who have faithfully worked toward this end through the Gruver PTA encouraging the County Commissioners to establish a \$400 annual fund for payment of the Librarian's salary, securing donations, and finally establishing in February 1964 a Library Board with representatives from various organizations serving. 

We asked a man who has had 84 years experience, or will have had when he celebrates his birthday Saturday.

"I couldn't think of a better time than rightnow," says W.- L. Harris, better known around here as "Uncle Will."

"It's 10 times as easy to make a dollar now, than it was back years ago," he said. A dollar would buy more then, but not 10 times as much."

"There's not a young man in this town who can't make at least 10 dollars a day now, whether he has a good education or not," he continued. Back when I was young I would have been afraid of a man who offered me 10 dollars a day."

He said he felt that a bigger percentage of people were making a good living now. "I can remember when nearly everybody worked just for a living and food to eat." We never really went hungry, but came pretty close lots of times. "We used to work for

nothing, and couldn't get a job at that," he said. As for opportunity, he said that there was some good chances back in the old days, if a fellow could find a way to get hald of some money. "It: used to ge narder to get

"Uncle Will" was born in 1880 in Henderson County, Tennessee and came to Collin County, Texas when he was eight years old. When he was 10 his father, John Henry Harris, moved the family to a farm north of Clarendon and filed on some land.

"We tried to raise crops there," he said. We raised most of our food. The family then moved

to a two-section farm near Groom. His father got the the two sections from another man for the filing fee of \$40. He sold the place for \$7 an acre in 1905 as the country began to settle.

"Uncle Will" moved to Amarillo in 1907 and stayed there for 10 years. He worked for the railroad and on a dray line. Pay then was \$2 a day, or \$1 with board.

In 1917 he moved to Hansford County and settled south of Spearman. After one year there he moved seven miles north of Gruver and has been here ever since.

He was selling Maxwell cars when he first came to the county. They sold for around \$700. Driving was pretty rough then compared to road conditions today. "It took sir hours for a man to go from here to Amarillo," he said. "I think there were 25 gates between here and there and a man could average about 25 miles an hour on the good roads.

Prices went up during World War I and everybody made pretty good money. "But, then cattle went down and broke a lot of people. " he said.

He remembers the 20's a's being pretty tough from 1921 to 1926. "1926 was a real good year here and they built a townsite building the next year and a post office and railraod came soon.

During the early de-During the early depressiin years many houses were moved our of Gruver according to Mr. Harris. "Then along in 1936 or 37 wheat prices began to

come back up." The 40's all except one or two years, were good here he said. "We planted all our land during the war years and had good crop conditions most of the time.

"Uncle Will" had this to say about irrigation: Under the circumstances it's pretty good, but nothing to get too excited about. If a man gets a good well it will pay off and they're getting better wells and equipment no w."
