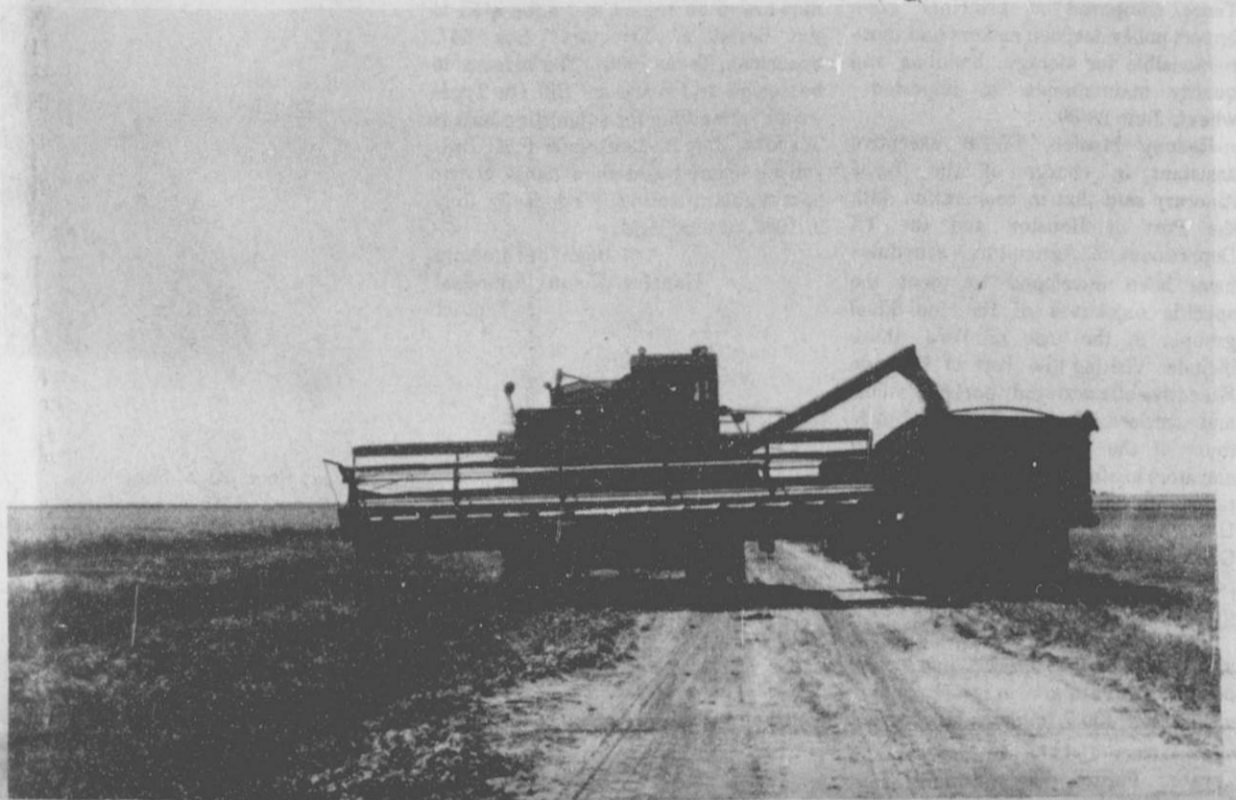

Wheat Harvest June 1986



As harvest is in the process of winding down for June 1986, many farmers are asking themselves, "What went wrong?"

Many were looking forward to beginning the cutting as early as the first week in June, but after several devastating hail storms in different portions of the county, some of the farmers were

putting aside their combines, and going on to the next phase of planting, and irrigating.

Those of us who had wheat left to harvest have been disappointed with the yields and in analyzing the situation, have come to the conclusion that trying to be more economical, we left off an earlier irrigation and therefore the

wheat heads did not fully develop. So for this year, all we can do now is plan for the next go around.

In visiting with local elevator managers, they have commented that no exceptional yields have been reported and they believe that harvest has been 50 percent completed.

Expanded Markets Sought by Wheat Board

Faced with sagging prices and large carryover stocks, the Texas Wheat Producers Board is laying plans to capture and increase foreign markets which may add to greater demand and higher prices for the farmer.

Cagle Kendrick, Stratford, Chairman of the Texas Wheat Producers Board, said that during the month of June, three foreign trade teams make up of industry and government leaders worldwide have scheduled study visits to Texas, learning more about our types and quality of wheat available for marketing as well as our storage, handling, grading & exporting facilities.

The trade teams are here under the national auspices of U.S. Wheat Associates, through which the TWPB and similar Boards and Commissions in other states, conducts their foreign market development work. The international grain leaders which will be hosted in Texas by the Producers Board, include:

Peruvian Wheat Trade Mission. The group consists of 5 grain leaders from Lima, Peru will be in Texas, June 1-4.

Indian Trade Team of leaders from New Delhi area, June 17-19.

South American Grain Inspection Team composed of principal grain import policy decision makers and those responsible for storage, handling and quality maintenance of imported wheat, June 28-30.

Rodney Mosier, TWPB executive assistant in charge of the Texas itinerary said that in cooperation with the Port of Houston and the TX Department of Agriculture, schedules have been developed to meet the specific objectives of the individual groups. In the case of Peru, these include: Visiting the Port of Houston Executive office to study port operations and services; dock and channel side tours of the port facilities and port elevators to study marketing, transportation and distribution of Texas and U.S. wheat; & meeting with the Federal Grain Inspection Service to study the point-of-export grain grading, quality evaluation and documentation.

"The reason for the Peruvian teams visit is the fact that the U.S. has lost 50 percent of Peru's average 1 million metric ton (36.7 million bu.) wheat market since 1982-83 to Argentina and Canada, Peru's poor economic and financial situation can largely account for this trend, as low Argentine wheat

prices and attractive Canadian credit have overshadowed U.S. wheat. An aggressive U.S. effort is needed to help reverse this situation by upscaling the number and quality of activities conducted with both the wheat processing industry and appropriate Peruvian government agencies. We will emphasize not only the unique qualities of Texas and U.S. wheat export industry, but also the determination of the U.S. to maintain Peru as a valuable long-term wheat customer." Mosier said.

Wheat farmers in Texas support activities such as these foreign market development missions through a 1/2 cent per bushel state-wide self-assessment on sale of their wheat in effort to increase wheat demand and to strengthen their chance of price increases.

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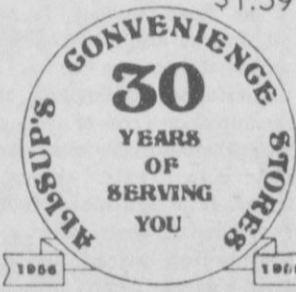

New books are arriving weekly at the Gruver Library. The authors of *A Walk Across America*, and *The Walk West* now have a newly published book titled *The Road Unseen*.

In 1973, a time of trouble and disillusionment in America, Peter Jenkins began a walk across the United States looking for his country and himself. 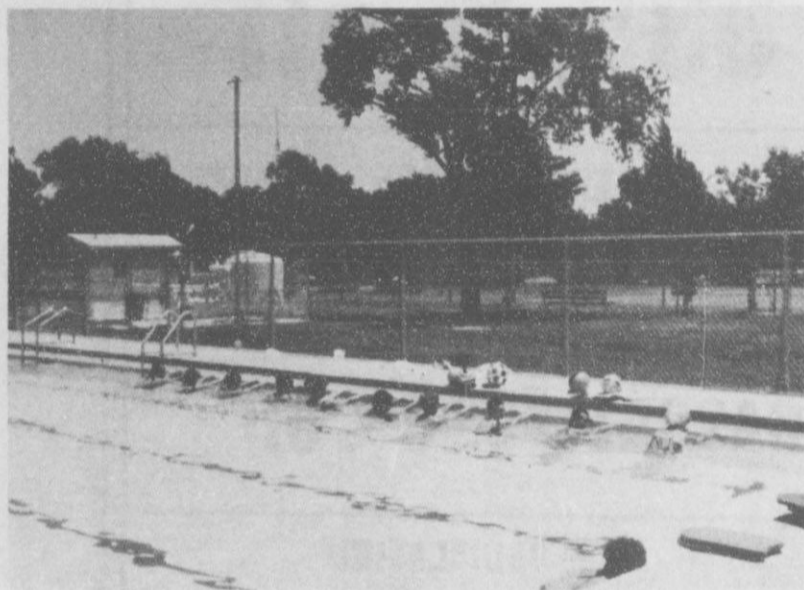

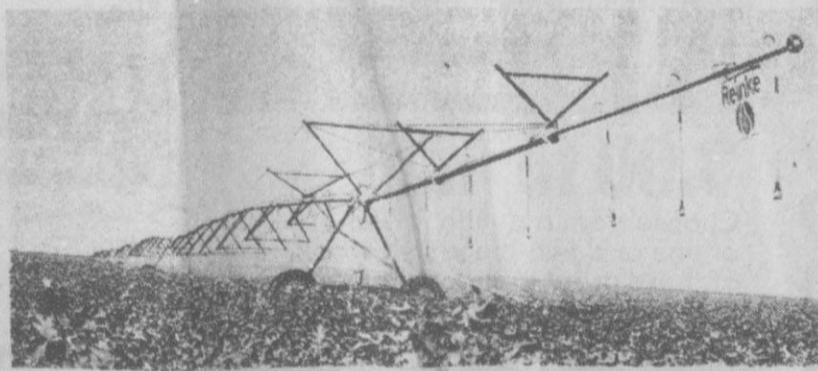

Local veterinarian warns of rabies danger inherent in skunks

A cuddly, seemingly affectionate baby skunk may be a walking time bomb, said Dr. Michael Henley, a local veterinarian.

Henley, a former president of Amarillo Veterinary Medical Association, said he recently received a telephone inquiry regarding a pet skunk. The caller said the animal was found in Oklahoma and exhibited no symptoms of the deadly rabies virus.

"It might not appear to be sick," Henley said. "A skunk can carry the rabies virus in its saliva for more than two years and have no visible symptoms."

There are two varieties of the fatal virus, Henley said. The "furious variety" is the well-known mad-dog type. A second variety is called the "dumb form," he said.

"Wild animals that normally are cautious and avoid humans may become friendly if they have contracted the dumb form of rabies," he said.

Henley said he did not want to create panic in Amarillo, but he said the public should be warned. Anyone who knows the family that has the skunk should beware. He added that the public should report such instances to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"This is not a 'Hoot the Owl' situation. It is a health hazard," Henley said.

Henley said the disease is transferred to humans from contact with the saliva of a diseased animal.

"If a person was feeding the animal and got saliva in any open portion of the skin, even a cuticle, they could get rabies," he said. "An animal cleans itself with its mouth. The saliva and virus on the fur easily could come into contact with any opening of a person's body."

There have been cases in which people have survived diagnosed cases of rabies, but Henley described those instances as oddities.

"No known cure exists. Those who survived did so due to personal immunities or experimental injections directly into the brain," Henley said.

The veterinarian said anyone exposed to a rabid animal or an animal suspected of carrying the disease should receive injections. When symptoms have appeared in a human, it is too late, he said.

Henley added that Texas law requires a fur-bearing propagation permit to keep a skunk or other fur-bearing animal in captivity.

A representative from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said the permit costs \$50.75, but the organization does not condone skunk domestication.

Bob Pence, director of Amarillo's Animal Control Shelter said city ordinances forbid pet skunks because they are "known carriers of rabies."

"When a skunk is found and a biopsy is obtained from Austin, the results almost always are positive," he said.

Texas Beef

Anne Anderson has been selected as Executive Director of the Texas Beef Industry Council.

"Our newly-formed Texas Beef Industry Council needs an experienced, knowledgeable leader as our Executive Director--and we have found such a person in Anne Ise Anderson. Anne's expertise, creativity, enthusiasm and dedication to the beef industry are just what we need," says Jimmy Owen, Chairman.

Anne, already well-known to those in the beef industry, has served the past two and a half years as Texas Beef promotion Coordinator of the Beef Industry Council in Texas--an extension into Texas of the national office. According to Roy Wheeler, President of Independent Cattlemen's Association, "The expertise she has gained in this position will be an invaluable asset as she undertakes her new responsibilities."

Prior to serving as promotion coordinator, Anne spent six years as Director of Nutritional Services for Texas Cattle Feeders Association. "We employed a qualified dietician to help combat all the misinformation prevalent today about beef. In hiring Anne, we found not only a technically-qualified individual, but one with experience in working with consumers and health professionals--and one who understands the beef business," said Charles Ball, President of Texas Cattle Feeders Association.

A native of Columbus, Texas, Anderson spent her early years in the country, then attended Baylor University for three years before finishing her Bachelor

of Science degree in nutrition and education at the university of Texas in Austin and her Masters degree at UT, San Antonio. She has been a home economics teacher, a hospital dietician and a nutritionist for the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. For five years, she was nutrition program coordinator for the Dairy Council, Inc. "Those years were really an asset in working with the beef industry as I learned more about accomplishment and accountability during that time than in all my years of college," shared Anderson.

Her responsibilities with the Texas Beef Industry Council will include establishing and monitoring the new collection system (checkoff), industry feedback, and the continuation of promotion, communication, and education activities now being handled by the BIC in Texas. These activities are currently supported by the voluntary 25 cents checkoff program. Each time an animal is sold, cattlemen voluntarily contribute 25 cents toward a national promotion effort. Although these contributions are presently sent to the Beef Industry Council office in Chicago, the Texas Beef Industry Council is presently developing a checkoff system that will go into effect about August 1. Even though Texas will begin checking off its

own quarters, these funds will continue to go to Chicago until the mandatory \$1.00 per head checkoff begins two or three months later. (This mandatory program is a result of the recent farm legislation containing the Beef Promotion and Research Act.)

"We have a wonderful message about the nutritional qualities of beef, and its place in the diet--and now we look forward to finally having the funds to take this message to the consumer," says Anderson. "However, the next two years will be busy ones as we increase efforts to provide feedback to the cattleman. We want them to know how their dollars are used and how we are able to improve the consumers' conceptions of beef."

Backwards?

What is more intriguing is the report that the professional military leadership in the Pentagon didn't agree with the civilians.

The Joint Chiefs of Staff, it's said, believe it best to continue to adhere to SALT II arms limits,

because they know Moscow can more quickly expand arms production than the U.S., where Congress must debate and pass on every arms program. At present Congress is in no mood to vote another massive increase in defense spending.

It the president is appealing hardliners in and out of his administration with this new policy (and not just seeking to force the Soviets to give more, in arms talks), he may be making the most serious political, economic and defense policy mistake of his five and half years in the White House.

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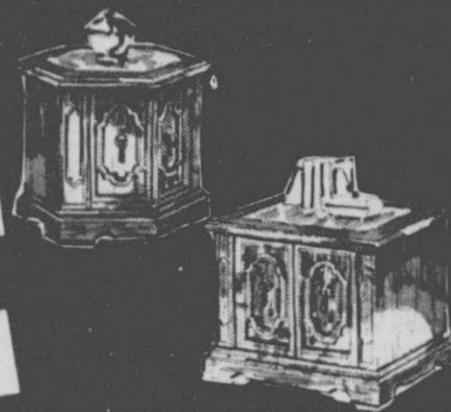

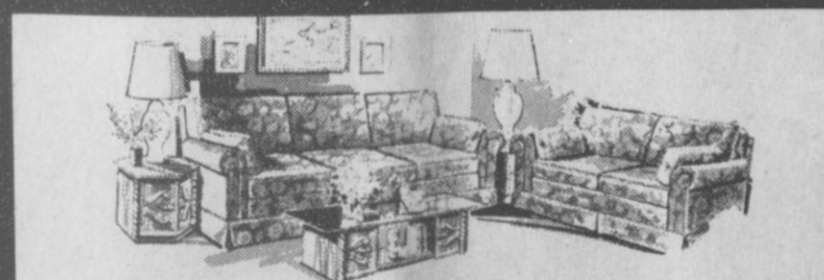
