west water resources for electric power generation." That statem leads off a news articly by Gene Smith, in the New York Times

Mr Smith tells of some big aluminum production projects which are to be built in the Ohio River Valley. Aluminum is a huge electric consumer—and these new plants will be served by coal-burning electric systems. Mr Smith quotes an aluminum company executive as saying that the significance of such development is that 'the aluminum industry is no longer dependent upon locations close to large hydroeltetric installations which are comoved from landaurinal markets.'

Back of all this is the fine record of progress made in utiliza-tion of coal as a source of electricity. In 1939 it took an average of 1.38 pennes of coal to produce one Milowatt hour of power-in 1954 the figures was 0.59 pounds, a drop of close to a third, and some highly advanced plants do much better. In the single year 1955 there was a three per cent improvement in efficiency as against 1954.

Color Helps Give Family **Efficiency Lift**

After a year in attractively color-styled classrooms, the pulls boosted their average grades 9 percent and their attendance 13 percent above the previous year spent in drab classrooms. Home-owners can brighten the lives of their families in much the same way by following these four guides for interior color styling:

1. Two or three bright colors in one room can make it cheerful and pleasant. But limit bright
