DISAPPEARING TIN -- Tin constitutes less than one percent of most "tin" cans, and now American Can Company has developed a process to eliminate 98 per cent of that one percent, from some 10 billion cans a year.

The new technique, known as margin plating, consists of tinning only a narrow margin of the edges of the steel plate that forms the soldered sidebeams of cans. The rest of the can will be enameled.

For some types of cans, like those for pet foods, only 85/100 of an ounce of tin will be needed to make 1,000 cans, says Dr. Roger H. Luck, Canco's vice-president in charge of research and development.

Significance of this advance would escape the average person, unless he knew that no tin is mined in the United States, and that 75 per cent of world supply comes from Communist-menaced Southeast Asia.

Coffee and pet food cans are being produced on a limited basis by the new process, and Canco plans to install equipment for margin-plating beer cans. Applied to all coffee, pet food and beer cans, margin-plating would save 5,260,000 pounds of tin a year.

WHO IS HIT HARDEST?

The federal income tax begins at 20 per cent, on the lowest taxable incomes. From there on it rises fast until it reaches 91 per cent in the high brackets.

You might logically judge from this that people of large means, because of progressive taxation, pay most of the tax bill. But they don't. Eighty-four per cent of all individual income taxes collected come from the basic 20 per cent rate - - and only 16 per cent from the surtaxes. As Graham Patterson puts it in Town Journal, "So the high rates are actually more destructive of income than productive of revenue."

Excessively costly government hits everyone - - and it hits people of moderate means hardest. There aren't enough rich people to carry the load.

TWO CLERKS NEEDED—

The Winsted, Conn., Evening Citizen, recently ran a little advertisement of its own, directed at its advertisers. It said: "A store that doesn't advertise still needs two clerks, - - one to carry out the other who faints when a customer comes in. Advertising is the life blood of business."

That goes for the sellers of goods and services - - and for concerns that want to build up confidence and public interest, which are touchstones of commercial success. Advertising isn't an expense in the ordinary sense - - by building business, it helps to lower costs to producer and consumer both. And the newspaper, large or small remains the most effective advertising medium.

"GOVERNMENT HASN'T A DIME"—

"Education has always been a matter for the localities in the states," writes James W. Doutha in the Idaho Voter. "The Federal Government hasn't got a dime that it doesn't take away from the people. So it can't give anything to a school system without first having taken it away from the very people who should be supporting the state system."

This is true of all other federal "grants" to local government. Government, like an individual, can't get anything for nothing. The taxpayers must put up the money -- plus the large additional sums absorbed by the bureaucrats and administrators.

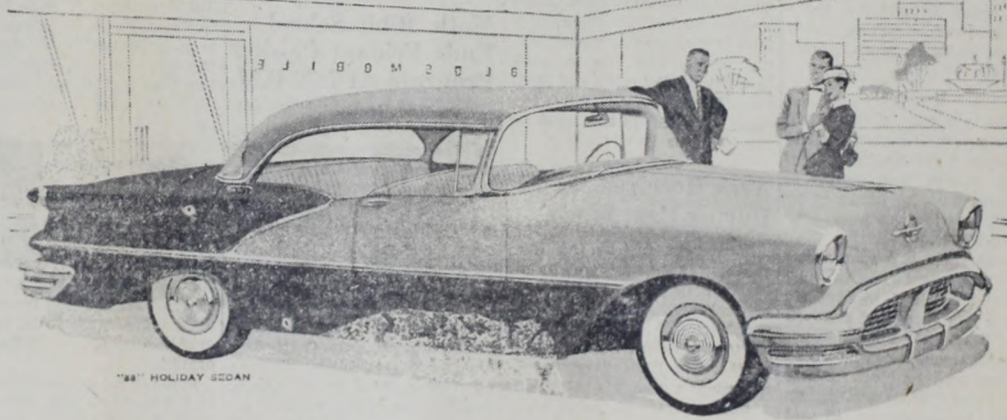

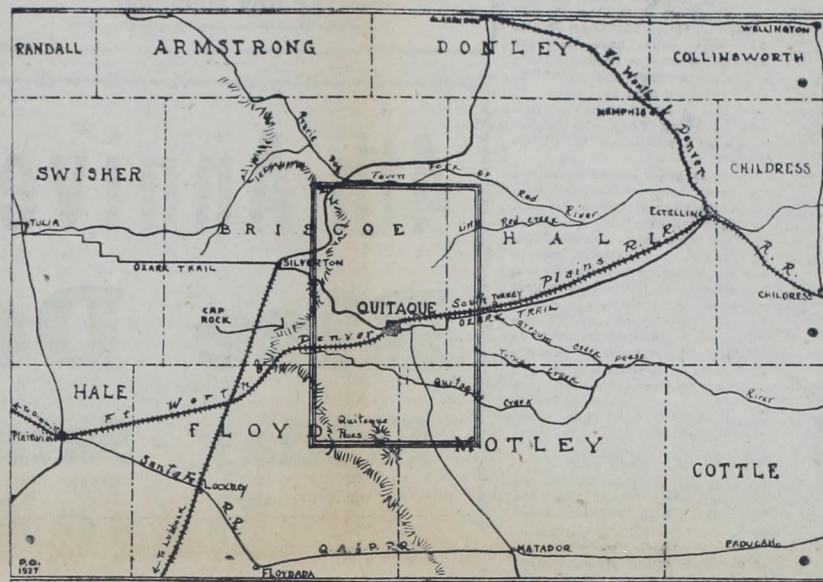

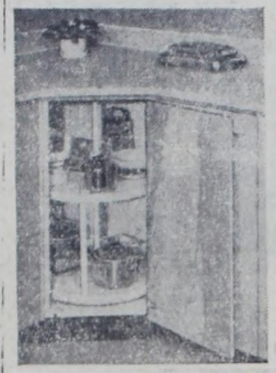

It's not the heat, it's the degree of water vapor saturation in the air—otherwise known as humidity.

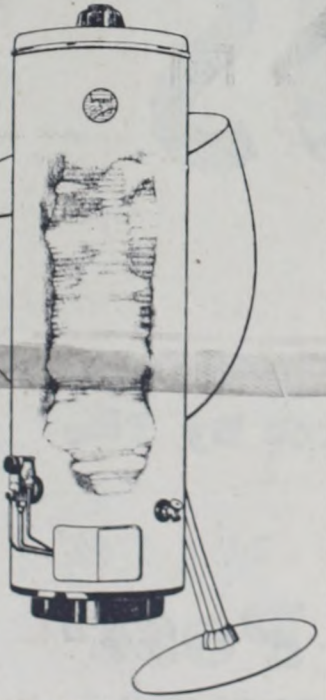

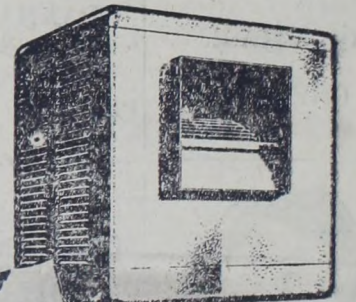

FARM HOUSING PROGRAM REACTIVATED

Walter T. McKay, State Director of Farmers Home Administration in Texas, Mr McKay said. Regulations for processing the loans have been distributed to all field offices.

Farm housing loans may be made for the construction and repair of farm houses and other farm buildings, including farmstead water supplies. Interest on the loans will be 4 percent

per year on the unpaid principal. Repayments may be scheduled over periods up to 33 years. The loans will be secured by a mortgage on the borrower's farm.

Building plans and specifications for the improvements to be financed with the farm housing loan will be obtained by the applicant. Farmers Home Administration will review the plans and inspect construction as it progresses to assist the borrower in obtaining construction that meets generally accepted standards of soundness.

The local county FHA committee determine the eligibility of applicants for farm housing loans. To be eligible, Mr McKay explained, an applicant must be the owner of a farm, be unable to obtain suitable credit for dwellings and other buildings from other lenders, and have enough farm income or income from the farm and other sources to meet family living and farm operating expenses and repay his debts.

The farm housing loans are made under the authority of Title V of the Housing Act of 1949, as amended. In Texas 1165 farm housing loans have been made for a total of \$6,726,135; \$1,996,299 of this amount has been repaid. In addition, interest collected through December 31, 1955 totaled \$864,030.

The supplemental appropriation Act which was signed by President Eisenhower May 19 made \$5,000,000 available for farm housing loans. At present no additional funds are authorized after June 30, 1956. Mr McKay stated that the farmers Home Administration also extends credit for farm housing under the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act, as amended.

News Letter

From Congressman **WALTER ROGERS**

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18th DISTRICT

THE VA HOUSING SITUATION

Some 20 Members of Congress, including the undersigned, have introduced bills to provide for a 6 year extension of the G.I. Loan Guaranty Program. Although this program has had much criticism from some sources, its basic purpose was highly commendable, and had it been pursued with rigid co-operation between the money interests of this country and the Veterans Administration, much of the criticism directed at it would have never arisen. It is my opinion that the program generally has been highly successful, and the opportunities afforded under it, have made a tremendous contribution to the economy of this country. Its results have helped to build one of the greatest bulwarks we have against communism -- "home ownership". It is true that there has been some maladministration of the program. We have had our share in the Panhandle. As a matter of fact, I am working on several cases at the present time in which I feel that a veteran is not receiving from the Veterans Administration the consideration Congress intended. I expect to get to the bottom of these cases and see that the responsibility is placed where it belongs.

The money interests of this country have also engaged in some practices which to me are not in keeping with good conscience. I have reference to the excessive discounts that have been charged for handling the G.I. loan paper. The big money institutions have gone entirely too far in exacting tribute for financing these loans. It is true that these extra charges are not placed directly against the veteran. The reason for this is the law will not permit the veteran to pay these unconscionable charges directly. The truth is that in a substantial number of the G.I. loan cases, the veteran is being indirectly called with these excessive charges. In other words he is having to pay a price for the house that is higher than it is actually worth. The difference between the actual worth of the house

and what the veteran is having to pay is the amount of the excessive charges being exacted by the moneyed interests of this country before they will finance these loans. For instance, if a veteran in financing his house with a \$10,000 mortgage, and the loan company is requiring a 5 point discount it will only put up \$9,000 for the \$10,000 mortgage. This means that somebody must pay the \$500. There are instances where this discount has gone much higher.

In other cases the lending institutions have refused to loan money on veterans loan programs because the houses were situated in smaller towns and communities. This required the Congress to set up a direct government loan program to meet the needs of these veterans in the less populated districts.

It is difficult for many of us to understand how these lending institutions can justify their continual preaching of "free enterprise", and then engage in such practices as above related that will eventually destroy free enterprise.

We hope that the G.I. Loan Program will be extended for 6 years and that the bad practices and the maladministration

matters will be corrected so that every veteran may have the opportunity to own a piece of America that he so patriotically defended. The ones I have talked to are not asking to be given anything. All they want is a fair and honest opportunity to own a house for themselves and their families and to be treated fairly and honestly in their dealings to obtain such a home.

I sincerely hope that some of these money-chargers who seem to be infesting the temple will awaken to the fact that some of their practices in regard to the VA Program and also the FHA Program are not exactly in keeping with some people's ideas of honesty.

TAXES

Our good friend, Judge Luther Gribble, over at Wellington has written me about a Constitutional Amendment to limit the taxing powers of the Congress on the incomes of the people. Judge Gribble is certainly to be commended for his part at the Democratic Precinct Convention and the County Convention concerning his support of a Resolution asking that the Constitution be amended to so limit income taxing power. This is a matter that has been before the Congress in several different forms, but Judge Gribble's approach is much more acceptable than some of the others. He recommends that the limitations on the taxing power be graduated so that the taxing power increases as the size of

the income increases.

Judge Gribble and I are in agreement that the best way to stop wasteful spending is to limit the power to produce the money through tax channels and to keep a ceiling on the debt-making power. Those who have opposed the limitation on income taxing power take the position that such limitation would tie the hands of govern-

ment officials to meet emergency defence requirements or defense requirements generally. This argument, of course, falls in its face because the Congress and the President can exercise such powers as may be necessary to meet any emergencies confronting this country. The existence of a real emergency creates the basis for the exercise of government power that could

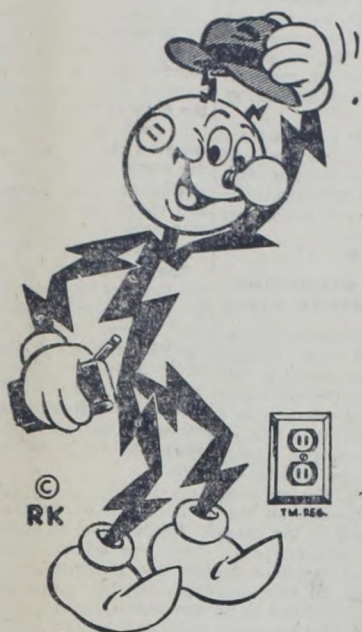

subject to control and domination on the human and material resources of this nation and its possessions. Let us hope that such an emergency never comes about, but at the same time, let us realize that a power, much greater than the power to tax, would be necessary to that the limitation on the power

to tax would not mean that such an emergency could not be met.

Slim New Unit Cools and Heats, Uses Less Space



To answer the obvious question, this is a furnace. Just as obviously, it's not the bulky contraption that took up half of the cellar twenty years ago and that still exists in many older homes. As proof that times have changed, the photo shows a modern furnace that packs all of its heating capacity into 2 1/2 square feet of floor space. In addition, it's a summer air conditioner. Made by Coleman, the furnace houses all cooling components that need to be inside the house. The cutaway section shows a cooling coil. The furnace is 14 inches wide and 28 inches deep. It's especially designed for installation in closets or alcoves, wherever space is at a premium. As pictured here, the furnace is equipped with an extra-tall sheet-metal bonnet. In use, the top of the bonnet would extend into the attic of a one-story house. Ducts to carry heated or cooled air would run from the bonnet to rooms.

"A storm door that does nothing but keep out the cold is only half-efficient," according to Beatrice West, New York color stylist. "The screen-storm door hangs the year around and has to be good looking to be really efficient," she explained. "The front entrance is one of the most conspicuous areas of the house. It offers the initial welcome. It must be warm and friendly. "Some home-owners take great deal of care to make front entrance elegant. Then they blindly destroy the impression they've worked to create by having a cold, unbecoming combination door." Miss West points out that a combination door, such as one made of ponderosa pine, is well suited to the dual role of beauty and utility. Easily painted to harmonize with the color of the front entrance, it becomes a full-fledged part of the entrance.

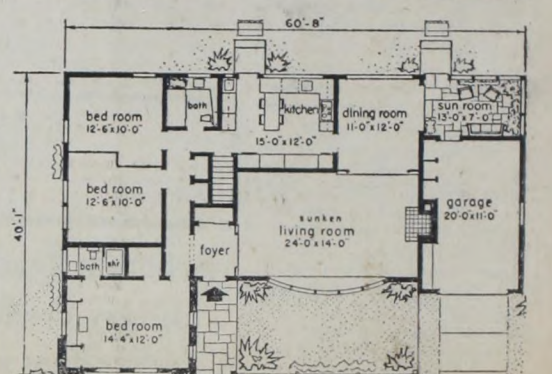
