Due to a misunderstanding, one of the entrants, Dr. Jim Jenkins of Lubbock, was not matched with any of the other opponents in the Championship Flight, but shot a steady 79 on the following day for the overall low. Both Lindsey and Jenkins were declared champions of the Championship Flight due to the fact that they were not paired on the same day.

The Mayor's riight (a high class tournament like this would never call it the second flight) was won by Jim Clark with an 82. Jim is a former Shallowater resident who lives in Lubbock and farms in the Shallowater area.

The President's Flight (or in some areas what would be called the third flight) was won by Mike Williamson with an 89. He is former head basketball coach at Shallowater High School and defending champion of his flight in the Shallowater Occasional Open Golf Tournament.

Crappie Fishing
What do you call him?
Papermouth, white perch, or calico bass, the crappie is perhaps the most popular fish in Texas. Waters in this state have two types, white and black, and since colors vary, the only real way is count the spines in the dorsel fin. The whites have five or six, the black seven or more. Many white crappie can weigh 5 pounds, with the record being lbs. and 9 oz. Texas fishermen take crappie on several small lures, but the live minnow is still the most popular. Crappie fishing is perhaps the least expensive pastime, with a cane pole, a section of line, a 2/0 wire hook, a float, and some split shot about 8 to 10 inches above the hook makes a fine rig. Fish the channels, ledges, and brushpiles for the crappie, and mark the line where you catch the first one. They are schooling fish, and stay together at the same level. **Tip of the Week:** Start crappie fishing deep, and gradually raise the bait until that first fish is caught. If you must wager, though, bet a careful bob or two. Sometimes the season's midway point has been the kiss of death for teams that appeared incapable of losing. A sudden slump, a hot surge by another team and boom! The picture changes rapidly.

Barring a miracle, though, it would appear that both Cincinnati and Oakland are shoo-ins. The Reds have been awesome and the A's manage to win, even though they lost a lot of players.

Pittsburgh and Boston aren't cinches by any means. In fact, the American League East could be a real dogfight, especially if the Baltimore Orioles turn on the steam. The Orioles haven't been playing well, but they are in good striking range.

So what else is new? Well, Ben Brown is going to open up a big general sports complex, with emphasis on bowling, of course. When finished, it should be a good addition to Lubbock.

This was a dream that the late Quinn Connelley had for years. He got no farther than a bowling alley and swimming pool, but he had visions of tennis courts, handball courts and a myriad of other arenas. There certainly is room in the city for such a complex.

I was a little shocked when I got home and found out what the crowd for the All America game was. It looked like a much bigger crowd, even though it obviously wasn't capacity.

A year ago the prophets of doom were saying that the game was dead here, that interest had died down. I don't think in football mad West Texas that this is true. I do think that the game probably needs a few things to boost interest.

Generally, promotion of the game could be much stronger. Allocation of tickets could be better. More involvement of fans, through parties and rallies, would help build excitement. A lot of things could be tried to encourage attendance.

As it is, just under 40,000 in the heat gripping the city at the time isn't bad. In fact, it's better than any other city can manage. But the point has arrived when something is going to have to be done to push attendance back over 40,000.

Speaking of football, the "experts" have spoken and the concensus is for Texas A&M to win the SWC title. That comes as no surprise. Many have been predicting it ever since Texas whumped the Aggies right after Thanksgiving.

In fact, that defeat could well have been the making of the Aggies. They had the title in their moist little hands and let it get away. That shouldn't happen again.

The Aggies have experience. They have depth. They have ability. In fact, Emory Bellard probably could use any three men at each position and not draw a deep breath of alarm.

It's a mature team, and the addition of Tom Wilson could make A&M more potent offensively. Last year when A&M passed, it was more to see if the ends were awake than anything else. Tom Wilson could change all that.

Texas, smarting under what was not a successful season, could come back strong. Arkansas should be improved to the point of challenging. And you can't write off Baylor, the defending champion, with a host of talent returning.

That would seem to leave Texas Tech, SMU, Rice and TCU to fight for whatever scraps are available, as well as fill the role of spoilers in the title chase.

SMU and Rice could both be stronger, although the Owls were pretty dismal last year, while TCU doesn't seem to have it at all.

But I can't sell Tech that short. The Raiders may not have what it takes to be conference champions, but I feel a sense of confidence in Steve Sloan. His material may not be as impressive as A&M's, but he has a pretty good nucleus.

Another thing that is overlooked is the fact that Sloan was an All America quarterback and played pro ball. And he's going to work with the quarterbacks, and that should mean a lot.


Tommy Duniven has the ability to be outstanding. Thus, a year of experience and Sloan's tutoring could make him the top quarterback in the league. Sometimes championships have been won or lost on no more than the ability of the quarterback.

Nope, the Raiders probably will be picked for no better than fifth, with a few votes for a higher finish and some for a lower one. It's doubtful that they'll get any votes for 1-2-3.

All of which makes it an ideal position for a new head coach. He's under no pressure, neither is the team. It's much the same position Grant Teaff was in last year. No one will take Baylor lightly this year and it will be tougher to win.

I have a feeling that Steve Sloan's team will take advantage to the utmost of what it can do best and, in the course of the game, come up with some unexpected strategy.

Steve can gamble a little more this year because it isn't "his team", of course. My guess is that we can expect the unexpected. In fact, I think this could be one of the more interesting Tech teams to watch. Better buy your tickets now, if you haven't already.


