Harvey Martin to Speak at MS Dinner of Champions

The South Plains Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society has announced that Harvey Martin, Defensive End for the Dallas Cowboys, will be the keynote speaker at the MS Dinner of Champions. The Dinner will be held on Saturday night, March 26th at the new Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

Martin, known as "Too Mean," has led the Cowboys' defense in quarterback traps. At 6-5 and 252 pounds, Harvey Martin has been called by teammate Jethro Pugh "the meanest man in football." An All-Conference performer at East Texas State University, Martin lives in Dallas and hosts the "Beautiful Harvey Martin Show" on KRLD Radio.

According to Bill McAlister, chairman of the Dinner of Champions, the event will honor Texas Tech Head Coach Steve Sloan and his coaching staff. Various Southwest Conference football and basketball coaches will be in attendance. All of the proceeds from the Dinner will go to physical therapy services for local MS patients and to the research toward finding a cure for this neurological crippler of young adults.

Recently the Texas Chambers of Commerce Managers presented him a citation recognizing that he has spoken before more than 5,000 community building meetings in his career. The citation reads in part, "Whereas through these speeches, said Reagan Brown, has enhanced and enriched the lives of thousands..."

Mr. Brown is equally at home in academic or rural community meetings. He has received standing ovations on college campuses, sales meetings, and hundreds of community get-togethers. He has published many articles and poems. He is a community builder, Methodist, father, Aggie and Ambassador for Texas.

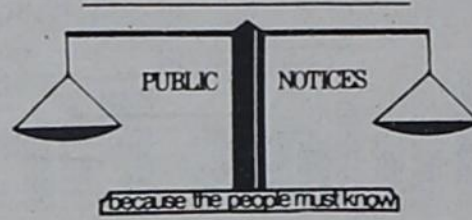

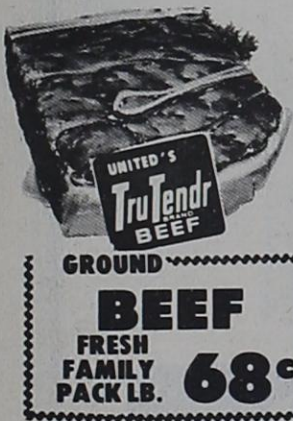

It is not a doctrine which frees him from sin, but a person. That person frees him, however, when he obeys his commandments by faith. It is not that form of doctrine wherein he places his faith to save, but in that Saviour. That Saviour saves him when his faith in him leads him to obey his particular doctrine. THE LAW OF PARDON IDENTIFIES THE TRUE CHURCH

1. The Law of Pardon Reproduced in the Book of Acts. The Book of Acts reveals exactly what men did in New Testament times to become Christians. In every case of conversion the same thing was delivered, believed, and finally obeyed. When the same doctrine is taught and obeyed by all, it becomes apparent that THAT doctrine is to be identified as God's law of pardon.

Below is a diagram of the cases of conversion in the book of Acts. The items which are checked to show which particular areas of obedience the Holy Spirit mentioned in that particular case. Remember, "THE SUM OF THY WORD IS TRUTH" said the Psalmist (Ps. 119:160). Each person in each case obeyed every point of the doctrine delivered, but the only thing specially mentioned is baptism which was mentioned in every case. Yet to baptism so many in the religious world object! Read carefully every case of conversion listed below.

More Public Works Monies for Texas

COLLEGE STATION—More federal money for public works programs should soon be available to Texas, says a resource development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Passage of new legislation is virtually assured by early March that would make an additional \$120 million available to Texas cities and other public entities that have unemployment greater than 6.5 per cent," points out Jack Jones. "This money would be part of an additional \$4 billion to be authorized nationally to cities, counties and other special purpose public bodies with high unemployment."

Texas already received some \$60 billion from the Economic Development Administration in January that funded public works

programs in 59 Texas cities, counties and special districts under the Public Works and Employment Act of 1976. However, this money funded only one of every 20 public bodies that applied for assistance. That's why additional funds should soon be forthcoming, explains Jones.

The specialist encourages public entities that failed to qualify for the initial round of funding to contact the Economic Development Administration for the new funds. Grant proposals should be prepared and submitted now in anticipation of the new appropriations, advises Jones.

Deadline Near for Governor Briscoe's Community Achievement Awards

COLLEGE STATION—Texas cities and communities interested in participating in the Governor's Community Achievement Awards Program have until March 23 to enter.

All cities, towns and communities in the state are eligible to enter, announces Mrs. Vernon Jackson of Grand Prairie, president of the Beautify Texas Council. The Council jointly sponsors the awards program along with four regional Chambers of Commerce, the Texas Department of Community Affairs, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System.

Winners will be selected from six population categories—0 to 2,500; 2,501 to 5,000; 5,001 to 10,000; 10,001 to 20,000; 20,001 to 60,000; and more than 60,000.

According to Mrs. Jackson, an entry should be in the form of a typed report based on communitywide cleanup projects conducted from March 1976 through March 1977. The report should outline the following—citizen participation, communitywide beautification, property improvement, economic development, theme or slogan, committee coordination and summary.

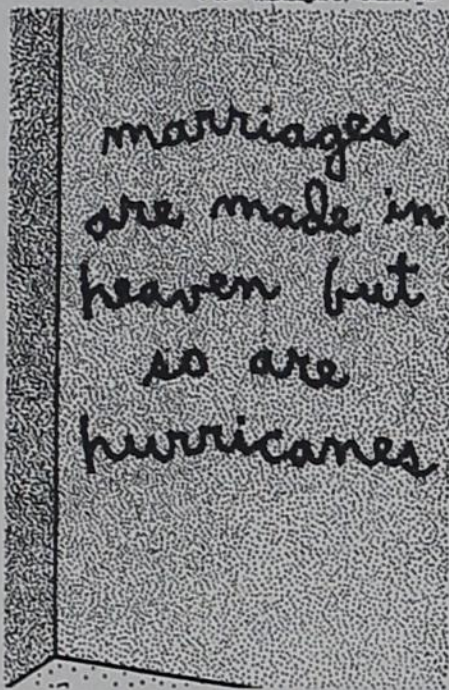
The report should be mailed to the Beautify Texas Council, Drawer CS, College Station, Tex. 77840.

Plaques will be presented to the six winning entries by Gov. Dolph Briscoe at the annual meeting of the Beautify Texas Council June 22 in El Paso. An

additional Award of Excellence will be given to one of the six winners with the best overall program of community beautification.

"The Governor's Community Achievement Awards Program is an opportunity for Texas communities and cities to develop a coordinated program for community improvement and beautification and at the same time compete for a number of awards," points out Mrs. Jackson.

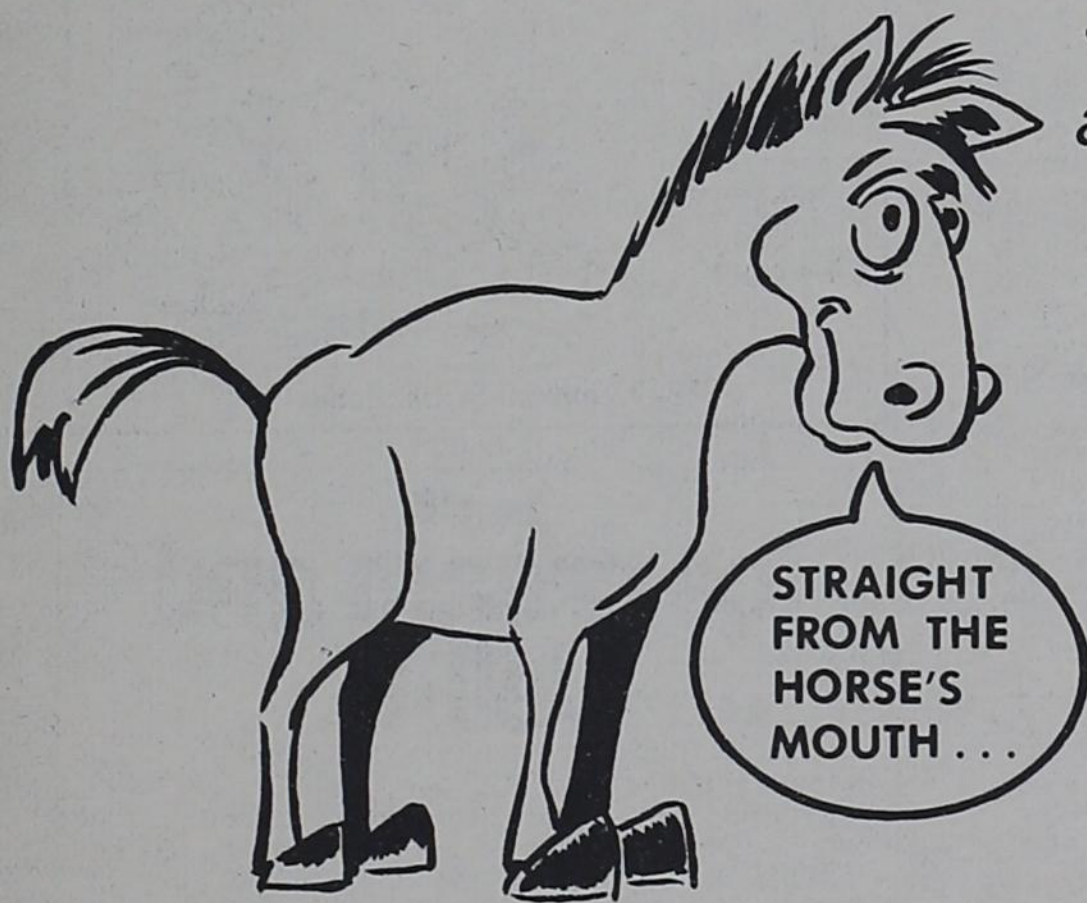

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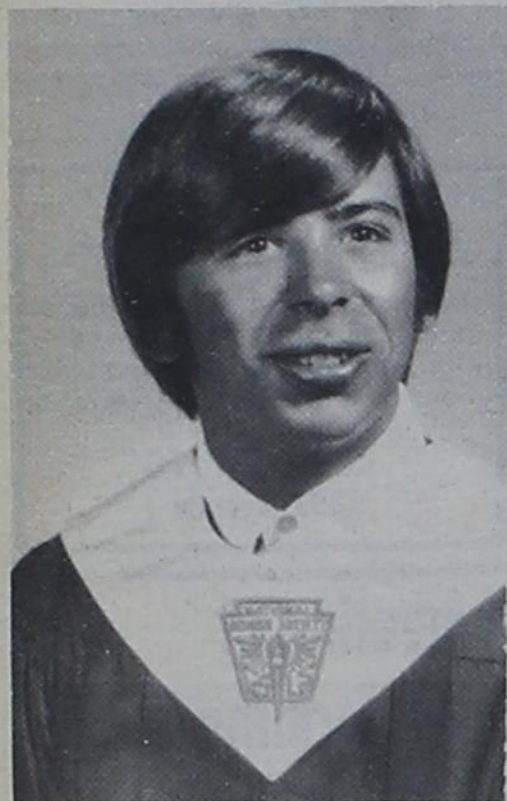

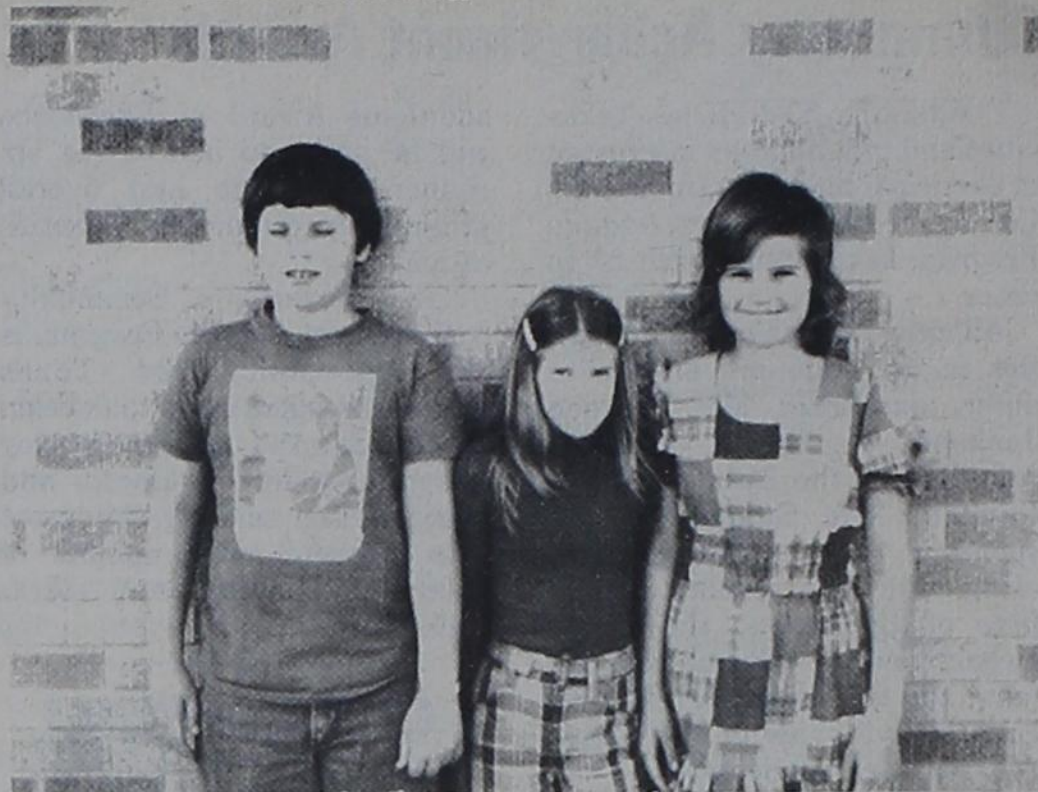
