To qualify as a candidate in the city election you must be a registered voter, have resided within the city limits for 6 months and pay a filing fee of \$3.

As a candidate in the Shallowater Independent School District, you must be a registered voter and have lived in the school district for 30 days. There is no filing fee.

The terms of Mayor, Jack DuLaney and Councilmen Joe Cox and Doyle Mosbey expire. Each place is for a two year term.

On the school board, the terms of Jay Stanton and Butch Pair expire. These places are both for a three year term.

Members remaining on the school board are Newman Lush, Ronnie Elliott, Bryan Burgett, Tommy Pointer and G.W. Gates. Deadline for filing is March 2.

Lubbock Area Legislators To Speak at Water Confab

Two Lubbock-area state legislatures will be featured speakers at the 10th Annual Membership Meeting of Water, Inc., here Feb. 19 at the Hilton Inn.

State Sen. Kent Hance of Lubbock and State Rep. James E. "Pete" Laney of Hale Center will join New Mexico State University President Gerald W. Thomas, Texas Water Development Board Executive Director James M. Rose and Congressman Jack Hightower as speakers at the day-long event.

About 300 people are expected to attend the meeting in Lubbock's Hilton Inn. Water, Inc., is a non-profit organization which encourages long-range water resource planning and development to assure adequate supplemental water for areas of West Texas, Eastern New Mexico and Western Oklahoma.

In conjunction with the Water, Inc., meeting, the Texas Water Development Board will conduct a public hearing Feb. 18 on proposed revisions of the Texas Water Plan. The hearing will begin at 2 p.m. in the Hilton Inn. At the Saturday session

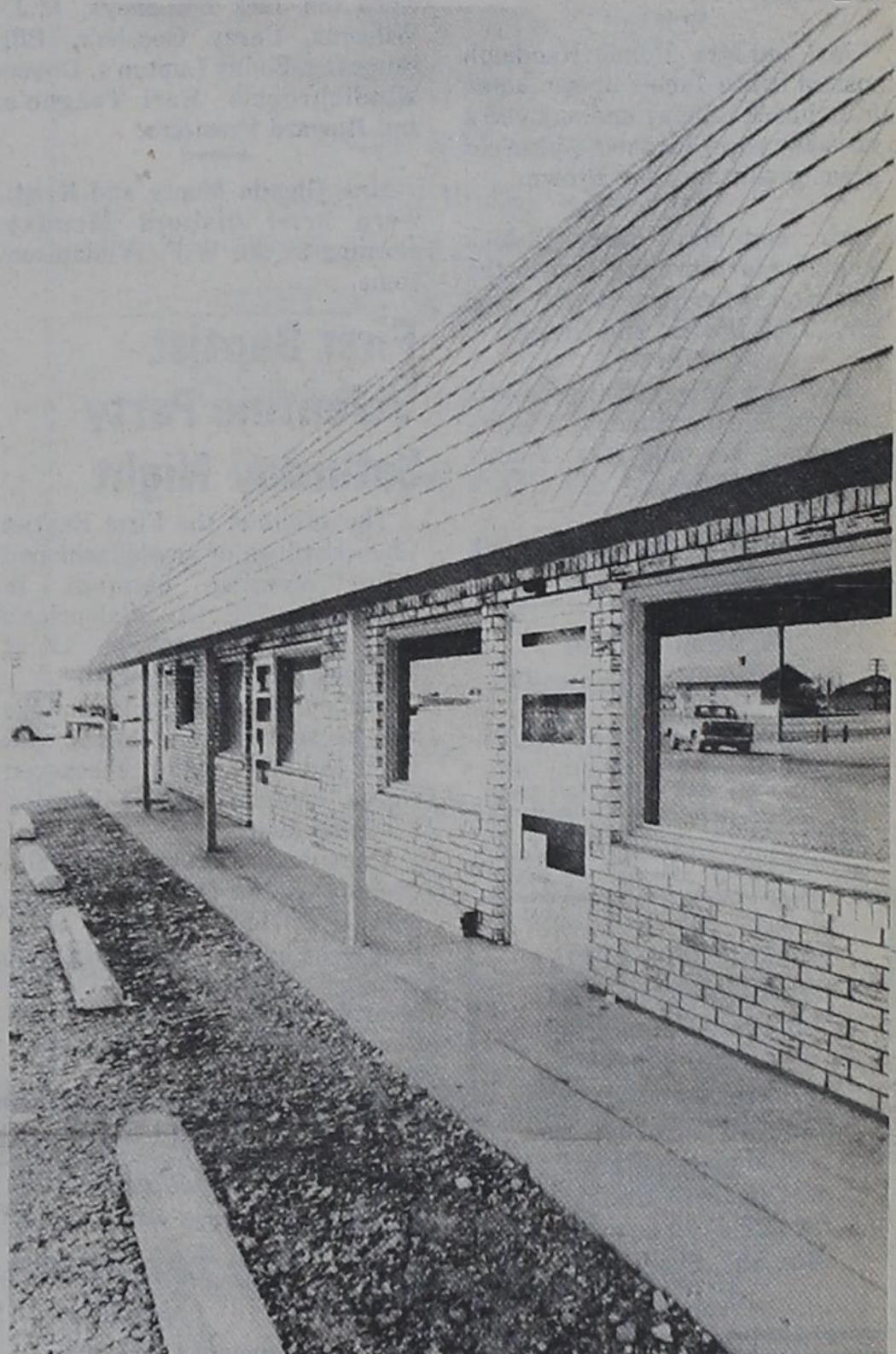
speakers will discuss the world's food and fiber crisis and the role the High Plains can play in easing that shortage, provided there is a supplemental water supply available for irrigation.

Water, Inc., President J.W. Buchanan said, "As High Plains legislators, both Sen. Hance and Rep. Laney are acutely aware of this area's potential and need. Their insights will be beneficial to all of us as we seek an alternative water source."

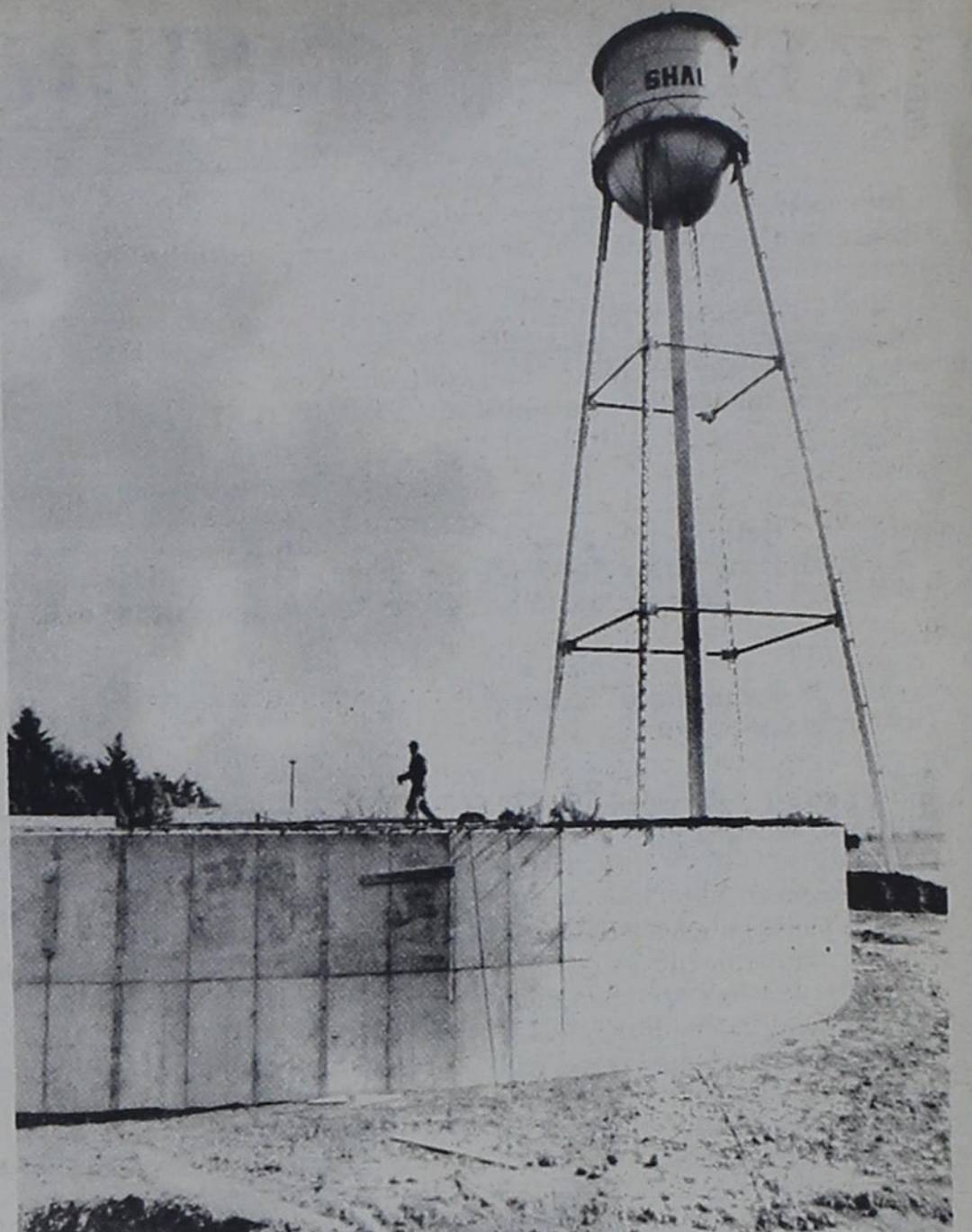

All of these winners are piano students of Mrs. Burt Sinclair.

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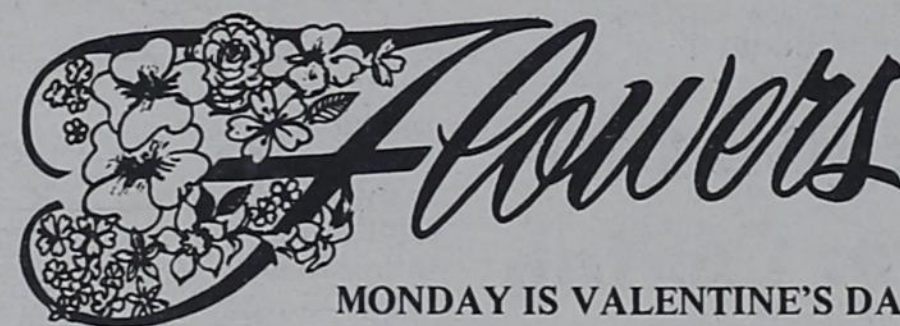

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KELLY'S HEROES

The conference basketball race is winding down and it will be a miracle if Arkansas doesn't win it. And, so far, this does not seem to be the year of miracles in basketball.

The Razorbacks did everything expected of a championship club in beating Houston last Saturday. They played well against both zone and man to man. They drove for the basket. They hit from outside. They played good, sound defense and they kept the pressure on.

Houston's Cougars did all right, too. They carried the fight to the favored Hogs and well might have won, except for two or three costly turnovers. And, in that tight a game, one or two turnovers is all it takes to make the difference.

The Porkers, as Coach Eddie Sutton said afterwards, never lost their poise. Each time they fell behind, they came back. They matched basket for basket until something had to give.

Both teams shot amazingly high percentages, especially when you consider the number of baskets scored from 20 feet or more. Both teams took outside shots that probably had coaches cringing. They weren't percentage shots, but both teams were hitting them.

Surprisingly, Arkansas won the game at the free throw line, just as Houston did against Texas Tech. The Raiders actually hit more from the field than the Cougars, while Arkansas and Houston tied.

Now the Raiders are heading down the final steps of the trail. They are third and could go higher—or lower. The schedule would seem to favor the Raiders finishing no worse than third.

Tech plays Texas and Baylor here, meets TCU, A&M and SMU on the road. A&M, though, has Baylor, Tech and Arkansas at home, must face SMU, Rice and Houston on the road. Texas has SMU, Houston and Rice at home, meets TCU, Tech and Arkansas on the road.

The Raiders breezed past Rice, but it was amusing to watch Gerald Myers in the second half. The Owls, who had been in a zone the first half, came out man to man. Tech, which didn't seem to have much intensity after building a big lead, saw the margin sliced sharply.

As the Owls cut into the margin, Gerald got up. He paced a couple of steps, watched and partially relaxed as Tech scored. But when the Owls cut the lead to 11 points for the third time, he halted the action.

After the timeout, the Raiders played with a little more finesse. In two minutes and a few seconds the lead was up to 18 points. Gerald relaxed and the Raiders never let the Owls threaten again.

Everyone was happy, apparently even the Rice people. The game had been played at 1 p.m. The Owls could watch Arkansas-Houston on TV, catch an early flight home. Tech's crowd could watch the big game and relax. There wasn't the all day wait to play.

"I wish we played all Saturday games in the afternoon," Rice SID Bill Whitmore observed. "I like these games. You get them out of the way early and have the night off."

In many ways it would be better for all concerned. Teams don't like the all day wait because the tension builds. You have time to go home and get some work done, or even get out and play some golf. In many ways, a 1 p.m. Saturday game has many advantages.

"I hope you can do some good with that column," Ed Irons told me Sunday. He referred specifically to the column dealing with more recognition for Tech greats in the Texas Sports Hall of Fame. Ed thought it was a shame that there wasn't more recognition.

"From an academic point of view, and for the good of collegiate athletics, Bill Davis probably deserves the greatest recognition," Ed declared. We agreed.

This is something that could be worked on by Ralph Carpenter, Tech's fine SID, by alumni and friends. A column like this one isn't going to get the job done, but it might stir up action.

A massive letter writing campaign would help. If anyone wants to drum up support, you could write to Dick Moore at the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. He's the Texas Sports Writers Assn. Secretary and I'm sure he'd forward letters to the proper committee members.

People still are worrying that Bear Bryant will step down at Alabama and that Steve Sloan will be offered the job, accept. It worries a lot of fans and loyal Tech supporters.

I talked with a man who should be knowledgeable and he shook his head.

"I don't think for a minute that he would take it," he declared. "Steve is an unusual young man. He's not interested in money. If he was, he wouldn't be here now."

"I think that he realizes he has a great challenge and opportunity here. And he'd be foolish to follow right after Bear."

The speaker also agreed that things at Tech looked better, over all, than at any time up until now.

"We're over the hump now," he declared.

Indeed, that's the impression. The Raiders have a good, solid program. They have proven coaches and staffs in all sports. Tech doesn't have everything it needs, of course, but it's building. The future does look good.

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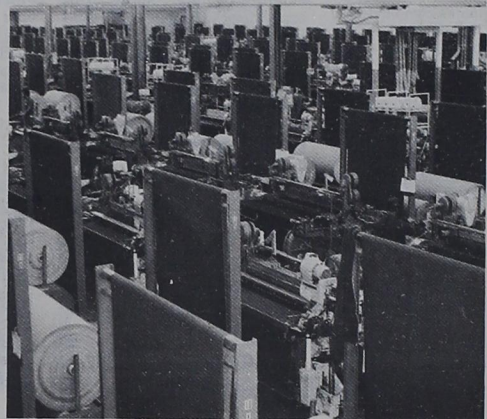
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"Extension Update"

Different Looks for Table Settings

Now that the holiday season is over, you are probably through with formal entertaining and are ready to get back to the day-to-day routine. You will still have some special occasions to look forward to and want your entertaining to be just right.

Mixing is the latest trend for attractive informal table settings.

Patterns mixed with solids or other patterns allow unique expressions of personality and denote seasonal changes.

But be careful to give tables and buffets an "altogether" appearance. The personalized, or eclectic, look should control the mix and match look—not create clutter.

Before beginning combinations, ask yourself these questions: Do dinnerware, glassware and linens complement each other? Do selected mixables fit into the overall decorating color scheme and desired mood? Is there a good balance between selected table patterns and patterns of the

floors, walls or windows?

Mixing coordinated patterns of dinnerware or a pattern with a solid will increase numbers—and show the hostess' innovative spirit. If unsure about mixing patterns, alternate favorite patterned plates with solid white ones.

next to or overlapping with a white and brown polka-dotted one can add special interest.

Playing deep colors against beige or white can be a subtle way of introducing fall to the family and guests. Use mirror placemats for an extra treat.

For a different look, cover a table with cloths that reach to the floor, or make table runners that match a hostess dress.

If a family member collects sea shells, rocks or jade, select a few prize possessions to mix in with the table setting. In this manner, children might enjoy this opportunity to show off their latest treasures to guests.

Be creative, resourceful and sensible when creating a personalized table. But do not use all possible "mixables" at one meal. An attractive table set in good taste will enhance the food's good taste.

New Crib Safety Standards Set

Do you have a new baby or grandbaby on the way? If so, you're probably interested in the new regulations concerning cribs.

New federal safety standards for all non-full size baby cribs are in effect now. This includes portable cribs, crib-pens, specialty cribs, undersize cribs and oversize cribs, according to the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

Safety requirements for non-full-size baby cribs have been in effect since February, 1974.

Safety requirements for non-full-size baby cribs include the following:

- Space between crib slats shall not exceed six centimeters (two and three-eighths inches). This prevents parts of the infant's body from becoming trapped.

- Crib mattress must fit tightly within the confines of the crib sides to prevent entrapment of body parts.

- Height between the crib mattress support in its highest adjustable position and the side rail in its lowest adjustment position cannot be less than 12.7 centimeters (five inches) to prevent against accidental falls.

- Height between the crib mattress' support in its lowest adjustable position and the side rail in its highest adjustable position cannot be less than 55.9 centimeters (22 inches) to guard against falls.

- Hardware on the crib is to be designed and constructed to eliminate pinching, bruising, lacerating, crushing and amputating during normal use or when subjected to reasonable foreseeable damage or abuse. All wooden surfaces are to be smooth and free from splinters.

- No horizontal bar, ledge, projection or other surface accessible to the child inside the crib that could be used as a toe hold for climbing is permitted.

- All non-full-size cribs that require assembly must be accompanied by detailed instructions on how to do it.

- Label stating that the non-full size crib conforms to CPSC regulations must accompany the crib itself and its retail carton. Also, the manufacturer's name and address along with a style or model number plus correct mattress size must be permanently affixed to all non-full-size cribs.

Hance Introduces Bill for Motorists

State Senator Kent Hance (D.-Lubbock) has introduced legislation aimed at preventing uninsured Texas motorists, who cannot establish financial responsibility, from operating their vehicles.

"Last year, 563,160 autos were involved in accidents where insurance reports were filed in Texas. 196,840, or 35.9 per cent of these cars were uninsured," Hance cited.

The bill would prohibit county tax assessors from registering motor vehicles and prevent the Department of Public Safety from licensing drivers unless the car owner is able to prove financial responsibility.

If a liability insurance policy is terminated, the insurer must notify the D.P.S. and the insured at least twenty days in advance.

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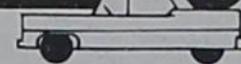

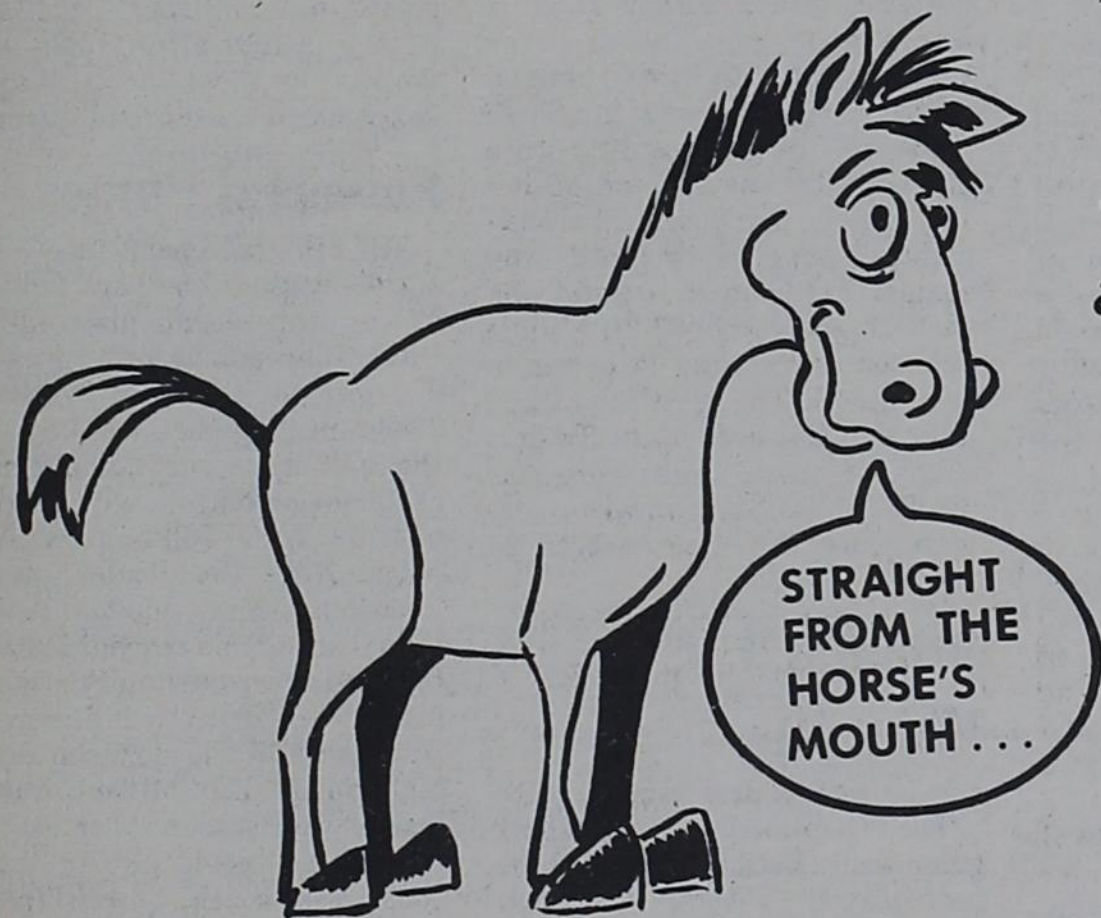
