## City and School Elections Set To Be Held Saturday

### Nine Seek Four City Offices —

Political interest on the local level will surge Saturday in Shallowater as voters go to the polls to vote for the candidate of their choice in both city and school elections.

Polling place for the city election will be the City Hall. Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Mrs. Julia Gentry will be the presiding judge with Mrs. Henry Krey and Mrs. Vera Meeks serving as clerks.

The Shallowater Community Building will be the polling place for the school election. Polls will open there at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. also.

Mrs. George Blackmon will serve as the election judge and clerks will be Mrs. Pat Lupton and Mrs. Roy Blair.

In the city election, the terms of Mayor Howard Preston and Aldermen Bert Deavours and A.C. Wages will expire. All three have chosen not to run for re-election. Jack DuLaney is running unopposed for the mayors seat, resigning his position as Alderman Place 2, which holds a term of one more year.

Eight candidates are running for the three Alderman seats. On Place 2, as shown on the election ballot, W.A. "Dub" Hardin opposes Bob Grice. Alderman, Place 3, Gene Usrey, E.V. Lesley and Doyle Moseby; and Place 4, Mrs. Howard Preston, W.R. Johnson and Joe Cox.

Five candidates are vying for two places on the school board with only one candidate running for reelection.

Terms of Newman Lusk and

Bob Grice will expire with Lusk announcing for re-election.





## First Hotel in Shallowater was Enterprise Operated by Mrs. H. W. Holleyfield



Little did the pioneering forefathers of Richard Glenn Boozer imagine as they sailed from Switzerland for the coast of South Carolina over 2 centuries ago in the year of 1736, that this pioneer spirit would be born anew 80 years later, when the Boozers started leaving South Carolina and migrating to other parts of the United States. About 1817, the two younger sons of Jacob Boozer, named William and Henry left Lexington County, S.C. and came to Alabama and settled on land ceded to the United States by the Creek Indians in 1815. By 1850, both of these Boozers and descendants were migrated to Marengo County Alabama and there in 1870, R.G. Boozer was born, later married to Susie Quinney and were parents of seven children. Glenn, who owned and was overseer of several cotton plantations lived there until boll weevils, floods and his great urge to come West to Texas, as he in his early manhood had ventured out this way to visit an uncle on his ranch around Sweetwater, Texas and as a cowboy, stayed 5 years.

He returned to Alabama, married, as said before, his dream of coming to Texas came true and in 1924 he brought his family to Texas, landing in Denton County and farmed for four years. His love for real West Texas had never left him, so in 1928, the pioneer spirit was still urging him on West and Lubbock County was his destination. He moved to Shallowater in 1934, at the

church, she helped them. She would take a collection from her boarders and chuck it away in her apron pocket and in 1927 when the Methodist built their first church, Mrs. Holleyfield shoveled the first spade of dirt.

In the few years before his death (Susie in 1958, Glenn in 1959), they saw many changes in the town. It was incorporated into a city. Lee Pierce was the first mayor and Boozer loved to walk across the corner to Lee's blacksmith shop and visit with him. Then on over to Jake Johnson's grocery across the street. Maybe, make his way to Higgenbotham Lumber yard to chat with Cy Brown, and later Bob Payne and Herbert Gentry.

Most of his family stayed around close. Two sons migrated on to California. Eli and then Norman moved on to Oregon. Garland Sr., better known as "Judge" farms over around Reese AFB and Joe lives at Hereford.

The daughters, all of Shallowater; Varina Putman, who passed away this month; Julie and Opan Married brothers, Luther and Open and Julia and Cleo Vaughan live in Shallowater.

The old landmark is gone, so are many others, to make way for the new. But memories will never fade.

height of the depression and farmed two and one half miles northeast of Shallowater. He retired in 1941 and bought this home in Shallowater from the H.W. Holleyfield family. It was at that time a landmark in this little town. Mrs. Holleyfield ran a hotel and boarding house here for years. She fed drifters free meals if they were broke and passing through. She had one fellow drop in to eat a meal, decided to linger around for a few days and asked Mrs. Holleyfield if she would keep his "44" gun for him til he got ready to leave and move on. When he had stayed around about a week and decided to go on, he paid her his board and lodging and reclaimed his property and said as he was leaving, "By the way, I never did introduce myself to you all, my name is Clyde Barrow."

Mrs. Holleyfield was a great worker in the Baptist Church and when the Methodist were struggling to organize and build a

Austin—Common sense is one of the least expensive things around, and government should use more of it.

That is exactly what we are trying to do with tax collecting in the Comptroller's Department. The sales tax particularly is an area where common sense should come into play.

One significant improvement we have made in sales tax handling is to clear up the very unfair bond situation which had

been giving many businesses fits for the past year.

The problem was that the previous administration required existing businesses to post bonds whenever the business underwent any technical change in legal status such as a small business incorporating or a single ownership becoming a partnership.

Common sense should dictate that something as simple as a name change doesn't affect a business' taxpaying trustworthiness topside nor bottom when

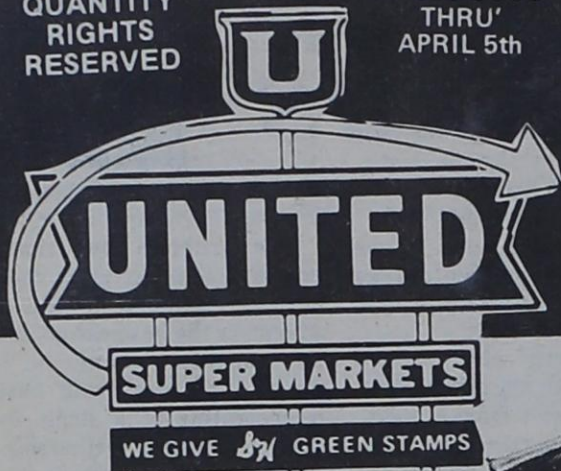

Johny Woodin retiring? That's like losing an old and dear friend. It's not that the UCLA coach and I were close. No, sir. I had no more than a speaking acquaintance with him, the result of Tech playing games against the Uclans there and here.

But Woodin, to coaching, was something like Notre Dame in football to alumni. Whether the subway "alumni" went to Notre Dame or not, they cheered for the Irish.

UCLA's basketball team captured the imagination in much the same way. There were the Bruins, piling up win after win, but it was the calm, imperturbable man sitting on the sidelines that everyone watched, talked about and tried to emulate.

He was the Old Gray Fox. Basketball Xs and Os danced around in his head. He could adapt his material to the style of play he knew it was best suited to execute.

Win, lose or draw, Woodin was magnanimous. You didn't hear him belittle the opposition and, when maybe his team didn't play as well as it should, he was the reason for the loss.

Woodin is a gentleman and a scholar. He may well be hailed as the greatest college coach of all time. He probably would be the first to deprecate that. It's enough of a tribute to mark the record his teams compiled. What greater tribute is there?

The NCAA finals Monday were really fitting, for it brought together two of the teams which, in the past, have ruled basketball, Kentucky under Adolph Rupp and UCLA under Woodin.

The Baron is gone, but it's obvious that Joe Hall may well be the successor that makes the Wildcats a perennial challenger again. As for UCLA, it was the swan song for Woodin, and will the Bruins be fortunate enough to get his equal as a successor?

The semi-finals last Saturday were tremendous. The Kentucky-Syracuse game was far from what a championship game should be, but much of that was due to the incessant whistle blowing.

It was obvious that Kentucky had the superior team, but you had to admire the Orangemen. Stripped of first one, then another and finally a third of its stars, they fought back. They didn't have the muscle or ability, but they kept trying.

As for the Louisville-UCLA game, it was one of the great college basketball games. Louisville almost cracked it wide open, only to have the Bruins roar back.

In the final moments of regulation and in the overtime, I was sitting on the edge of my chair. Both teams made mistakes. Both teams squandered chances to win. And then came UCLA, determined not to lose when it appeared the curtain had fallen.

And so, to all intents and purposes, the college season is over. Oh, there will be an exhibition or two involving some of the top stars, but the NCAA finals is the ultimate.

You can talk about the NIT all you want, but the top teams in the nation are in the NCAA playoffs. Probably the teams in the regional playoffs would be equal of the best in the NIT. After that, NIT teams wouldn't fare well. The NCAA championships are the one plus ultra of college basketball.

Many years ago Theodore Roosevelt was quoted as advising to "speak softly, but carry a big stick." The message apparently was well received by Steve Sloan.

Great football teams are not built by pampering players. Football men respond to real life situations the way they learned in practice. Let it be soft during the week and they have a hard time responding when the gauntlet is flung.

I remember talking with some pro basketball players years ago. They said that they looked forward to the games because they were fun. Practice was much tougher than the real thing.

Del Morgan, who once was maligned as Tech coach back in the days when his material didn't begin to measure up to his schedule, had that philosophy. If he thought the team needed it, Dell wouldn't blush over having his charges scrimmage on Friday.

The Raiders of those days might be worn down by force of superior number, but for 30 minutes they could play with anyone. They enjoyed the games because they were really easier.

Jim Carlen's philosophy was to be encouraging, lead the cheers and inspire great play. But, when all else failed, his teams weren't rugged enough in the face of adversity.

The final game with Arkansas was proof. After fumbles twice broke up touchdowns, the Raiders seemed to wilt. I doubt that you'll see Sloan teams in that condition. There's nothing as healthy as a few bloodied noses, and broken plates, to snap any group out of lethargy.

there hasn't been any substantial change in ownership and management. Therefore, I decided we should take into account a business' previous taxpaying record before deciding whether or not to require a bond.

That's the system we are using now. Businesses who think they may have been unfairly required to post bond during the past year should contact their nearest field office of the Comptroller's Department.

We have also recently put a stop to what had been arbitrary and mistaken enforcement of sales tax on food sold under certain conditions by such groups as volunteer firemen's associations and similar civic groups.

To be nontaxable it is necessary that the food sale—such as a pancake supper—is not professionally catered, is not held in a commercial business place such as a restaurant or hotel and is not a regular affair (again, common sense tells us that once or twice a year is not "regular").

Past enforcement of such food sales was a hit and miss proposition so in cutting it out altogether the state won't be losing any great amount of money.

As hard as we try to use common sense, sometimes we just get boxed in by things beyond our control.

The recent problems the Camp Fire Girls have had with the sales tax is a good example. The Camp Fire Girls Council of Fort Worth is now going to court with it because they think it is wrong for the candy they sell to be taxable while cookies sold by the Girl Scouts are nontaxable.

I agree that it's wrong and I would like to do something about it but my hands are tied by the law. The sales tax law passed by the Legislature specifically spells out that candy is taxable, so I have no alternative but to enforce it. On the other hand, cookies are not

mentioned so they are considered tax free food.

The Camp Fire Girls, besides going to court, are rightly asking the Legislature to change the law. I hope it is changed, and if the Camp Fire Girls are as good at selling this idea as they are at selling candy, I think it will be.

Incidentally, the Fort Worth Council is the only Council in the state which hasn't regularly collected and sent in its sales tax over the past several years.

Common sense in sales tax enforcement is critical because the sales tax is the single largest

source of state revenue and is a major source of revenue for more than 800 of our cities.

Cox and his wife Eyvonne have been married for 25 years and are the parents of four children, and the proud grandparents of twin grandsons. They are members of the Methodist Church.

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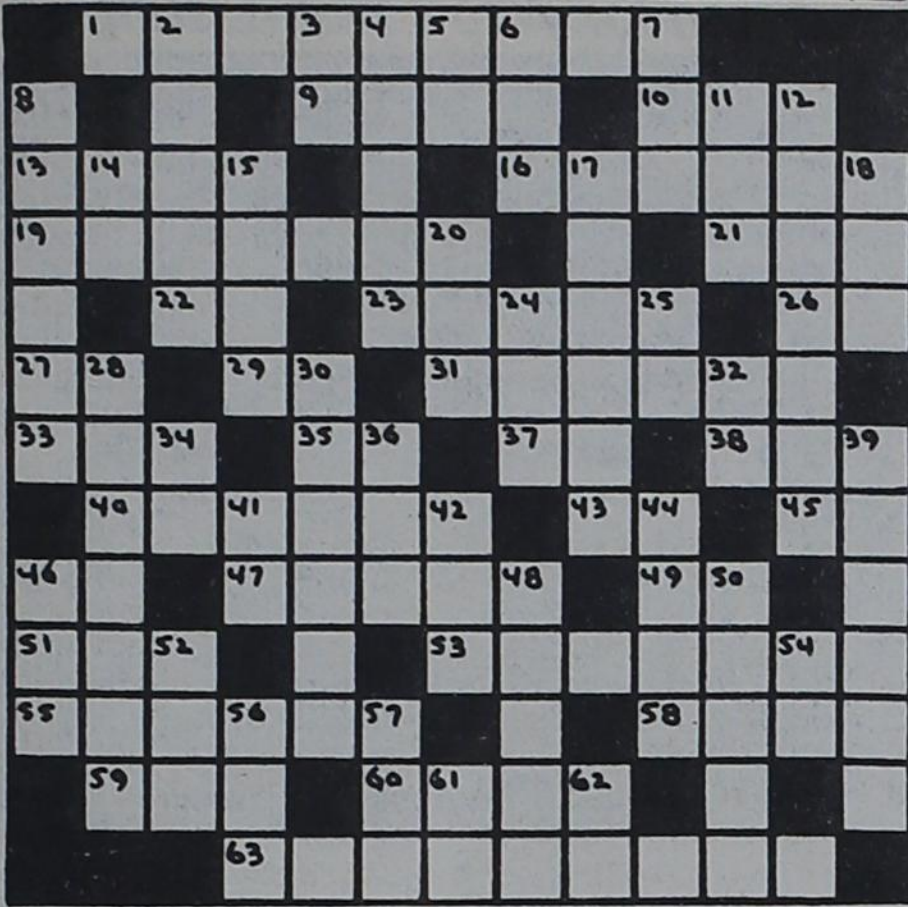

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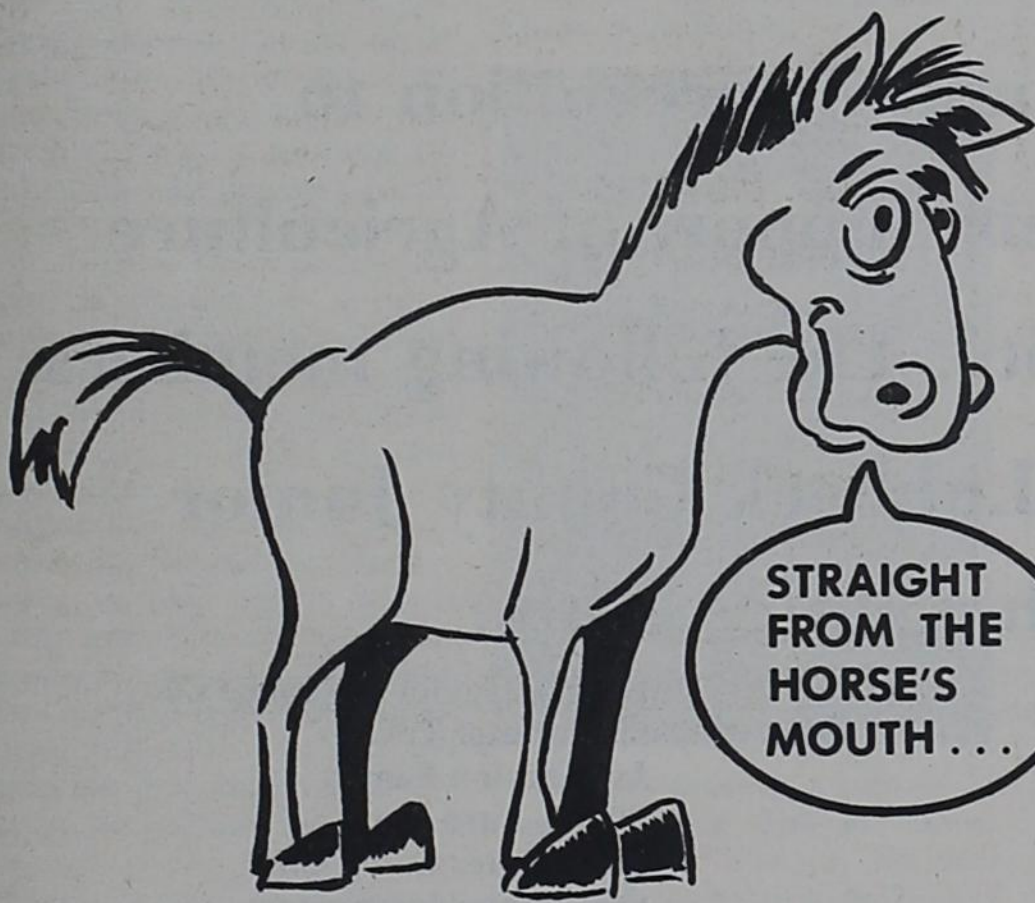

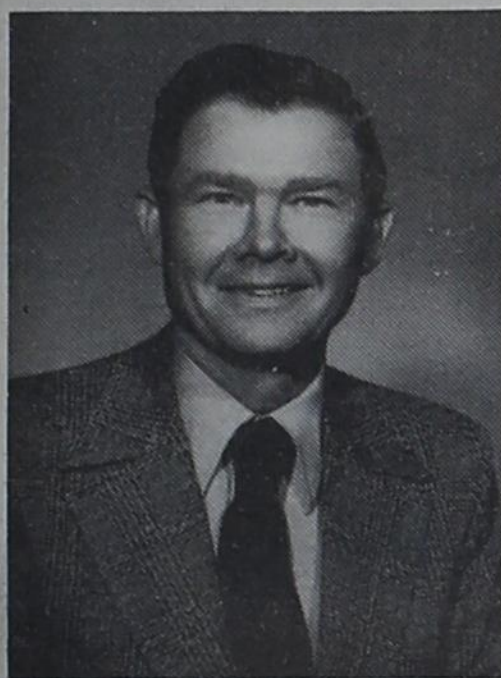
The open house will feature gifts for those attending, including favors for the children. Refreshments will be served.

## From The Scrap Book - Shallowater Bank Gets Charter On Condition (July 15, 1960)

The State Banking Board voted Thursday to grant a charter to the First State Bank of Shallowater on the condition the stockholders raise the capitalization to \$200,000 instead of \$150,000 proposed.

Proponents of the bank assured State Banking Commissioner J.M. Falkner the capitalization would be increased to \$100,000 capital, \$50,000 reserves and \$50,000 surplus. Proposed capital had been set at \$75,000.

### Issues Warning

Falkner had warned the group that the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation may not insure deposits unless additional capital were gained.

The application proposed capital of \$75,000 surplus of \$37,500, and reserves of \$37,500. The board told the applicants to increase their capital to \$100,000 surplus to \$50,000 and reserves to \$50,000.

Projected directors are Bob McLean of Dimmitt, Leroy Johnson, Howard Preston, Neff Preston and John Shipp of Shallowater and Richard Blackmore of Lubbock. Blackmore to be the president.

Also speaking for the application were G.H. Nelson and Harold Harriger, Lubbock attorneys.

Banking Commissioner J.M. Falkner questioned Blackmore's experience. Blackmore said he has

been in banking eight years.

In reviewing the petition, Falkner said "Every bank in Lubbock thinks the application is

premature." He said he would not approve any bank's charter until the bank was insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

The FDIC told the bank's proposed directors, the bank is under capitalized in view of the deposits they foresee. Nelson told the banking board there would be little difficulty in raising the extra capital.

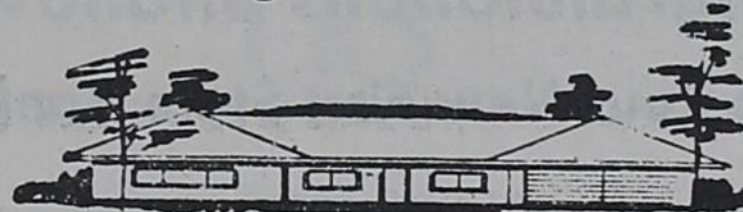

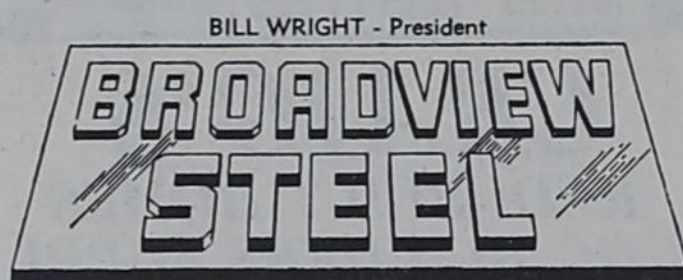

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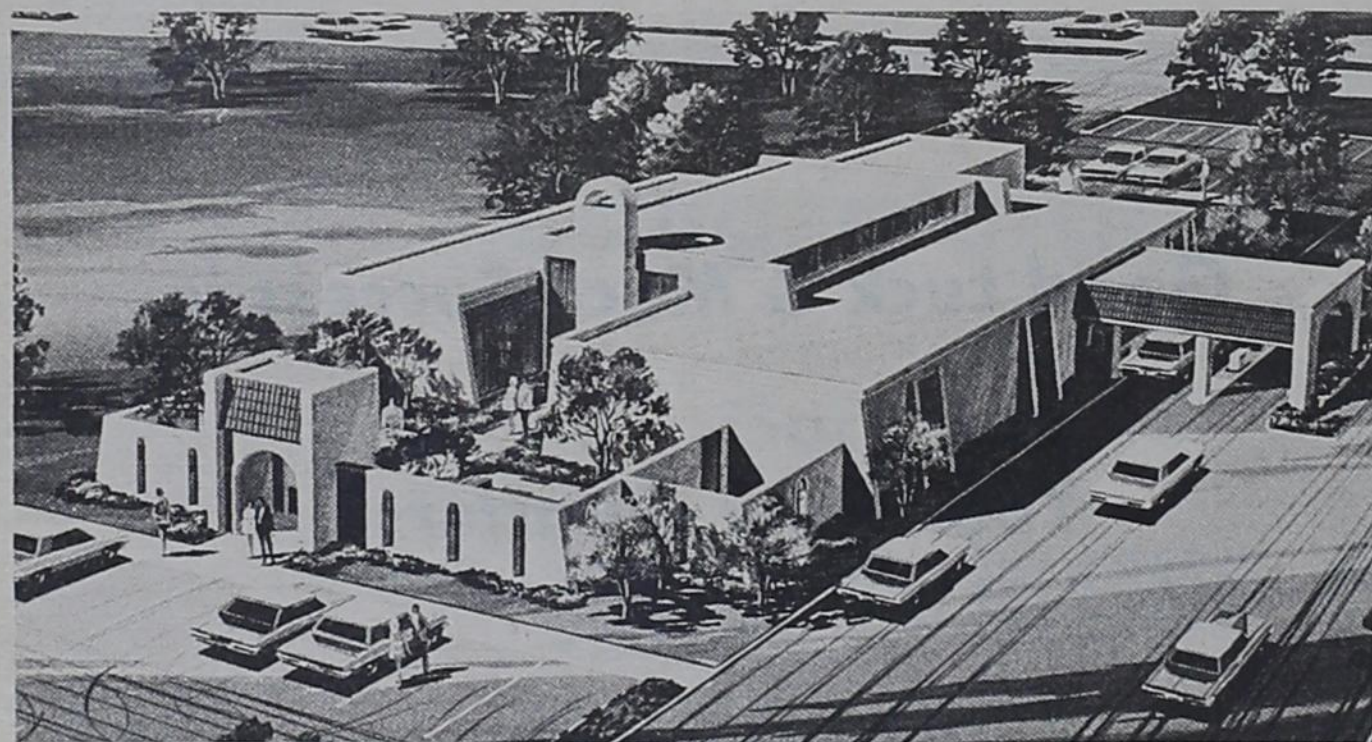

Austin — Constitutional revision, widely regarded as an almost impossible task for the legislature this year, may be moving along faster than any of the session's "big three" items.

Revision panels of the House and Senate voted out proposals almost identical to the document which failed by three votes in the 1974 Constitutional Convention. Education finance reform and utilities regulation have not moved so far so fast.

Senators brought up the plan Tuesday, April 1, for floor consideration on an article by article basis.

The House is expected to follow the same procedure.

A two-thirds vote will be necessary on each article before it can be submitted to the voters for approval or rejection in a statewide election next November.

None of the controversial "separate submission" items like right-to-work, which split and doomed the 1974 convention, are

included in the present resolutions.

Apparently, if article by article revision fails, the legislature will offer a plan for a new citizens' convention to try its hand at revision next year.

**Primary Advances**

Drive for a Texas presidential preference primary gathered momentum in spite of some stubborn opposition from political convention oriented liberals and George Wallace supporters.

The Senate State Affairs Committee gave its approval to a revised and improved version of the House passed primary bill, and quick Senate passage was anticipated.

The measure still calls for a vote in May on presidential candidates who decide to enter the Texas primary. Seventy-five per cent of the state's presidential nominating delegates will be named on a senatorial (or congressional) district basis. Another 25 per cent will be selected in state party conventions in accord with the percentage of the vote various candidates received in the primary.

An objectionable feature of the House bill which would have required candidates to file slates of delegates in all 31 senatorial districts to get on the ballot at all was removed. Liberal provisions also were made for uncommitted

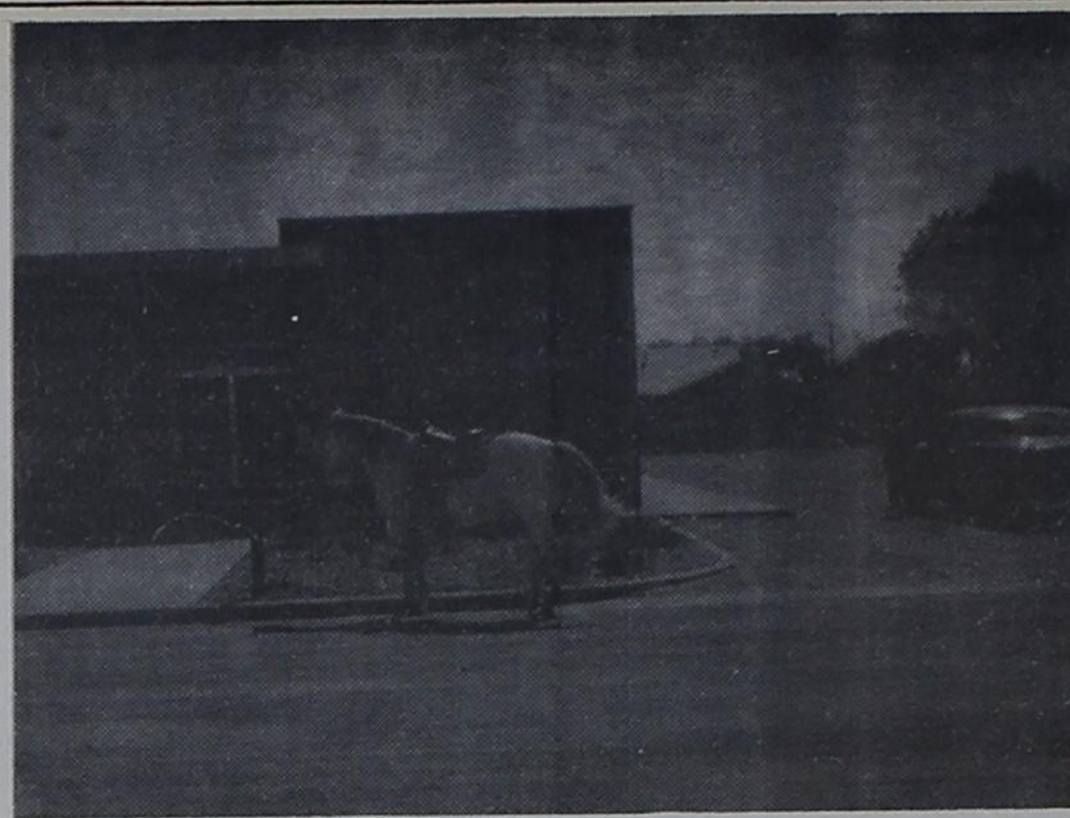

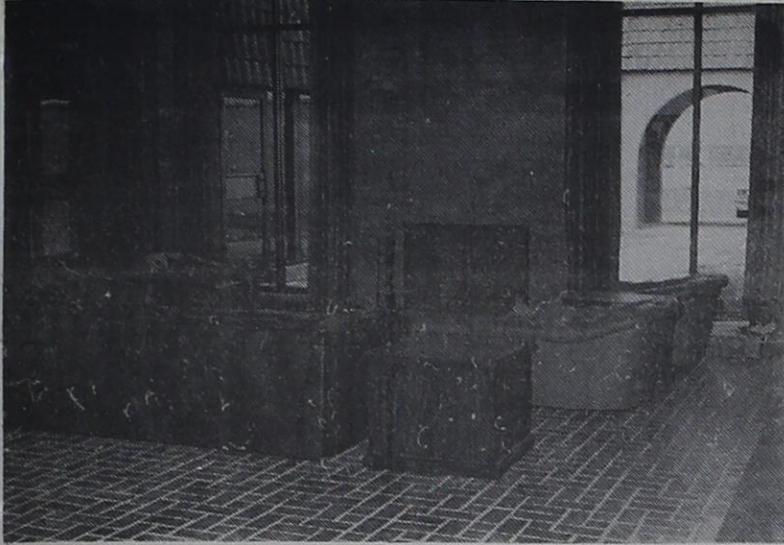

### Texas' Quarterly Pig and Hog Report Shows Inventory Lowest in Nine Years

Austin—Texas' hog and pig inventory as of March 1, 1975 was the lowest since 1966, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

There were 800,000 hogs and pigs on Texas farms, down 18 percent from a year ago. Of that number, 680,000 are intended for market and 120,000 are marked for breeding purposes.

The number intended for market is 17 percent below this time last year while the breeding stock is 10 percent under the levels of a year ago.

The pig crop from the last quarter, December, 1974-February, 1975, is estimated at 294,000 head, 13 percent less than a year earlier. There were 42,000 sows with an average litter of seven.

Hog producers intend to farrow 40,000 sows from March-May, 1975, down 20 percent from last year's farrowing total.

A combination of high production costs and a surplus of beef are the causes for the sagging production rate, according to White.

### 4-H'ers Boosting Bicentennial

4-H'ers all over Texas are doing their part to help rediscover America during the American Revolution Bicentennial celebration.

While soaking up the spirit of '76, 4-H boys and girls are also telling the 4-H story to the people in their neighborhoods and communities, says Ms. Yvonne Garcia, 4-H and youth specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

As part of the nation's gala event and 4-H community development project, 4-H youth are getting ready for 1976 by

sprucing up roadside parks, highways and vacant lots and organizing litter and recycling campaigns.

Parades, historical crafts, skits and pageants will also unfold the rich history of American life through the young people's skills and talents, adds the 4-H specialist.

A highlight of 4-H Bicentennial activities will be the 1975 Texas 4-H Congress in San Antonio. Designed around the theme of "Texas Cultural Heritage," the congress will give more than 500 4-H youth an opportunity to experience the language, customs, food and values of the ethnic groups which reflect Texas' past and present.

Through their enthusiasm and sincere interest, 4-H'ers are getting involved to learn about and share in the Bicentennial "birthday party", points out Ms. Garcia.
