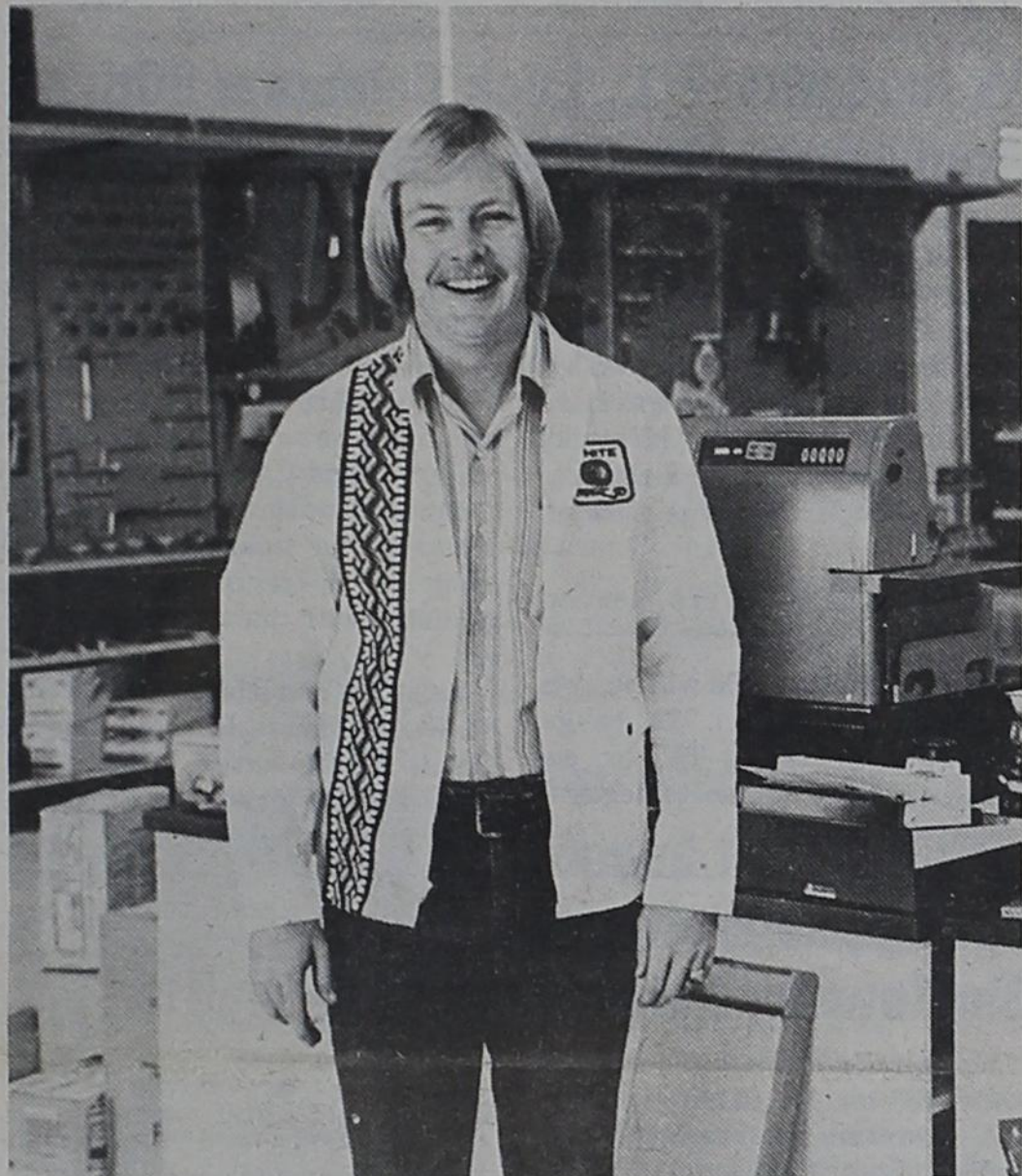


Harvest Festival Opens Saturday Morning

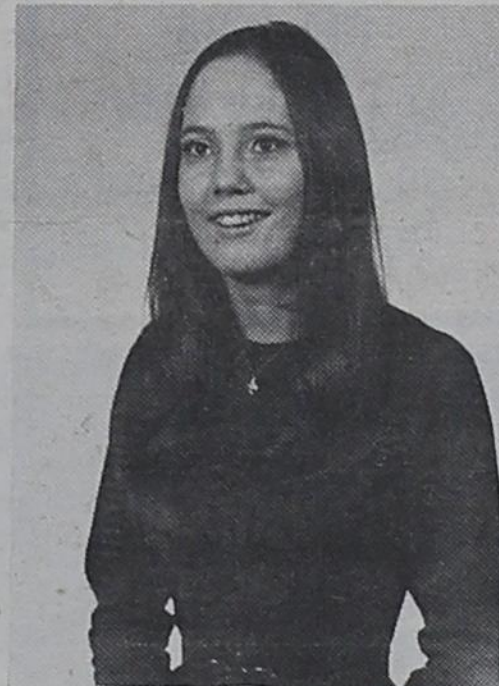

Wolfforth Officials Meet With Lubbock Group to Discuss Fire Situation



STUDYING FIRE PROBLEMS—A large crowd was on hand last Sunday afternoon in the Lubbock-Cooper High School cafeteria to hear a panel of Lubbock County officials and local residents discuss the lack of fire protection in Lubbock County at the present time.

No solutions were forthcoming, but a five-man committee was established to work toward affording the Woodrow-Cooper area of the county with some type of fire protection.

Our mayor, Mr. Edwards, along with other personnel, have been meeting with the Lubbock City Council. They are discussing the dispatching of Lubbock fire trucks to rural farms and rural communities. Apparently, as it stands at the present, the dependance on Lubbock fire equipment is going to be prohibitive from the standpoint of cost. It seems as if the only area of solution for the small or outlying communities at the present time is to buy more equipment and to train more men for this vital job.

The Wolfforth fire department is now having an Army surplus truck renovated to carry water as a back-up for the fire truck they are now using. This will be a great help when there are no fire hydrants for the truck to hook up to.

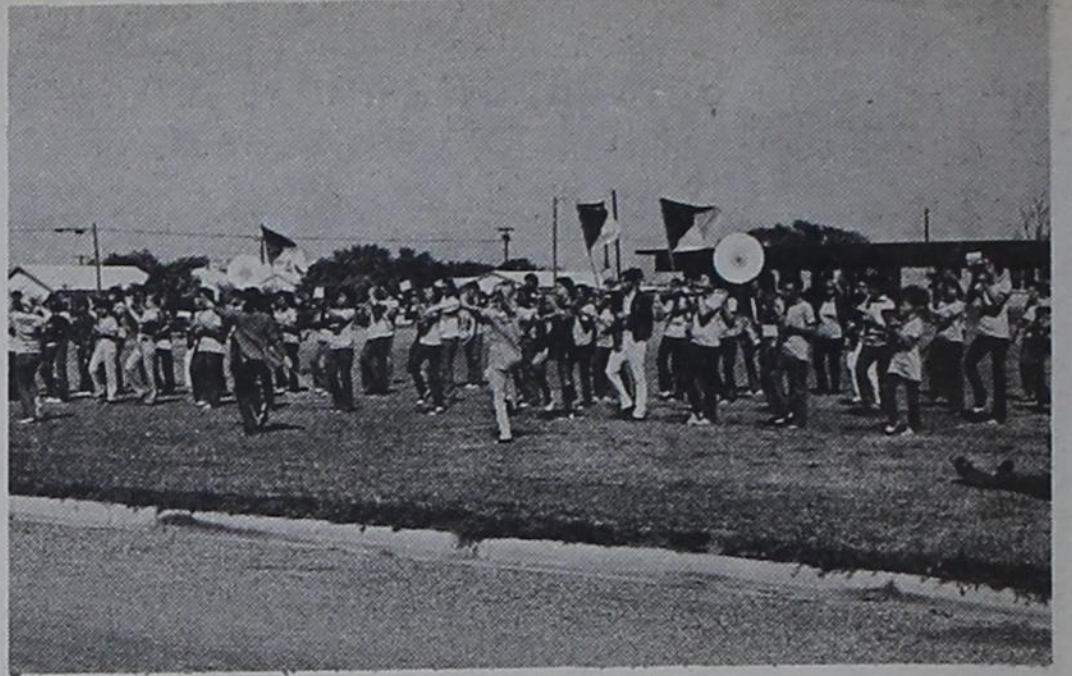

First Baptist Church Holds Annual GA - Acteen Coronation Sunday Night



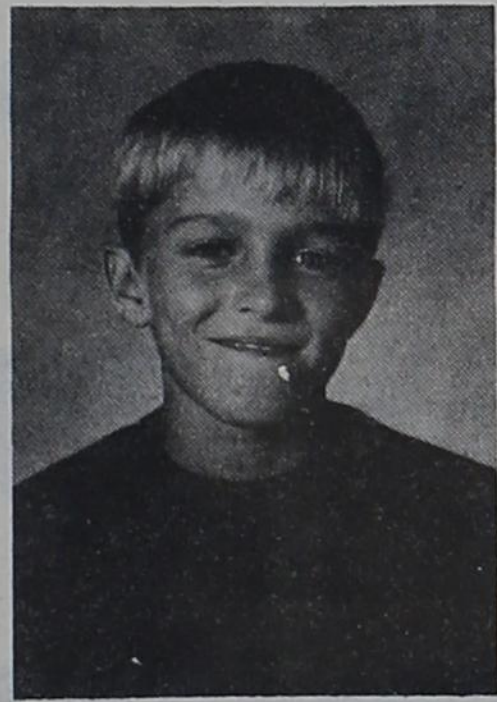
IN REMEMBRANCE

Student Council Meets Wednesday

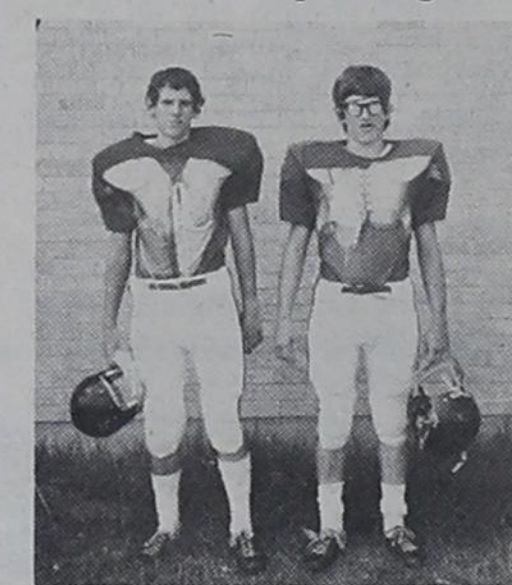

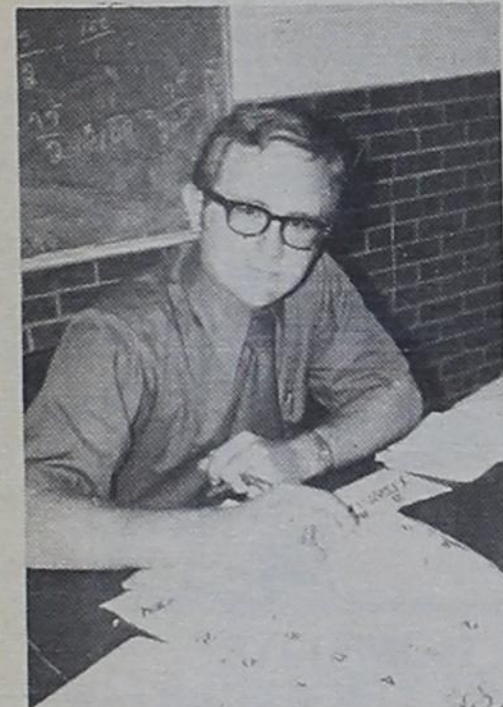
