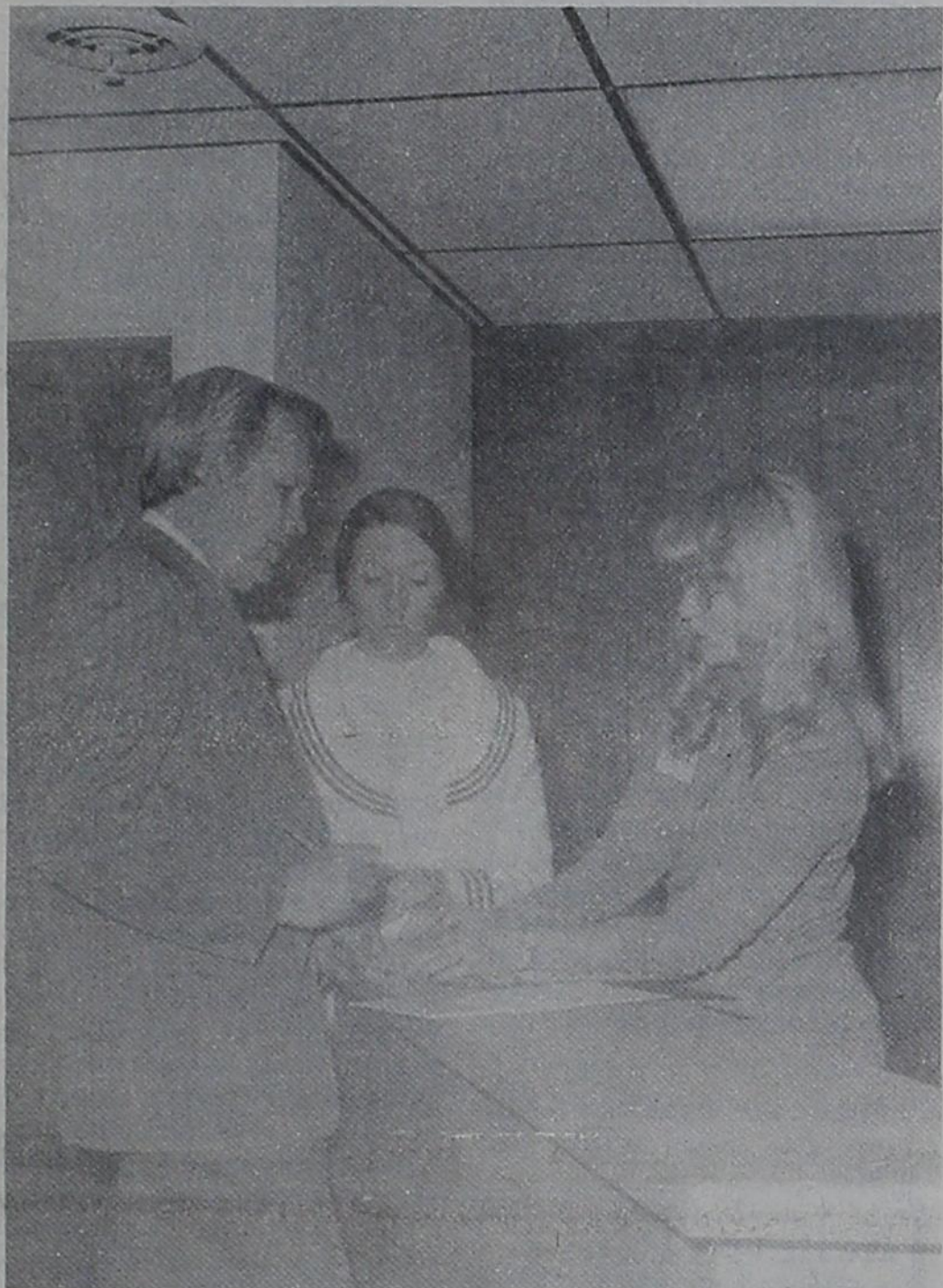




Shallowater Clinic Open House is Sunday

The Shallowater Clinic will stage open house from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. Sunday, December 12, in the completely remodeled building that was formerly the First State Bank.

The public is cordially invited to come by and tour the building which has six examining rooms, a minor operating room, two consultation rooms, four rest rooms, a coffee room, X-Ray and lab facilities and a spacious waiting room area.

Burnis Penny, local contractor, did the remodeling on the building, beginning about 2½ months ago. The clinic features 3000 feet of floor space, carpeted with commercial carpet in color tones of soft green, gold and brown, enhanced with contrasting vinyl wallpaper in gold and yellow tones with walnut wall paneling and acoustical ceiling.

An area, formerly the drive in window space of the bank was converted into a spacious consultation room. The exterior was enclosed with beautiful black lava rock. The entire clinic is well equipped with modern facilities and there is a large parking area for patients.

Floye Gosch is administrator of the clinic that will be open five days a week from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

There will be four doctors, Dr. Thomas A. Nicholas, Dr. William H. Gordon Sr., Dr. Berry N. Squyres and Dr. John Harrison Chinn Jr., all associated with the Texas Tech University School of Medicine who will be seeing patients at the clinic. Dr. Chinn will be the full time physician, with the other doctors filling in for him on his days off, to make a doctor at the clinic every day, five days a week.

There will also be licensed resident doctors in the clinic, that are in internship at TTU School of Medicine. They will be in the office the same day each week. Therefore, if a certain doctor is preferred and it isn't an emergency, the patient may see the same doctor they saw previously, by appointment.

Mrs. McKinley (Connie) Simpson of Shallowater will be the lab-technician, Mrs. Davy L. (Sue) Sanders of Shallowater is secretary, Mrs. Mike Brusenhan, former Debbie Worsham is the receptionist and two registered nurses, Mrs. J.M. (Pauline) Wiley of Shallowater and Mrs. Robert (Judy) Hogue of Lubbock will staff the clinic.

The office and waiting area was furnished by Commercial Desk and Equipment in Lubbock and Gentec of Lubbock stocked the medical supplies.

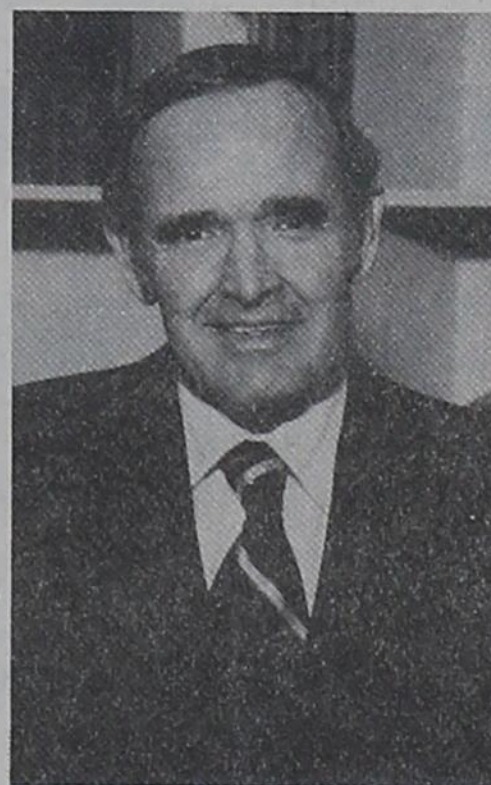
Dr. Nicholas is professor and chairman in the Department of Family Practice at Texas Tech University's School of Medicine and is a member of the TTU Dean's Advisory Committee, Chairman of MSRDP Committee, Executive Committee and Dean's Committee.

Born in Iowa City, Iowa, Dr. Nicholas received his primary and secondary education in Gillette, Wyo. and his pre-medical education at Carroll College in Helena, Montana, at University of Wyoming in Laramie from 1940-42 and the University of Colorado in Boulder from 1946 to 1947. From 1942 to 1946 he served in the U.S. Air Force as a navigator.

He graduated from the University of Colorado School of Medicine in 1950 and served his internship at Fitzsimmons Hospital in Denver. He did his general and family practice of medicine in Buffalo, Wyoming from 1951 to June 1972. He has served as administrative officer in the medical field for several years and has been presented the A.H.

Robins Award for Outstanding Service, Distinguished Service Award for the State of Wyoming, Outstanding Leadership Award from the Wyoming State Medical Society, Certificate of Appreciation, Federation of State Medical Boards of the United States and the Physicians Recognition award from the American Medical Association.

Dr. Nicholas is married and has five children.

A native Texan, Dr. Berry N. Squyres received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Zoology from Texas Tech in 1944 and his Doctor of Medicine in 1950 from the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston, rotating internship in 1950-51 in Kings Daughters Hospital in Temple.

He served in the U.S. Air Force from 1950-53 with assignments at Kings Daughters Hospital in Temple, was Dispensary Medical officer at Reese Air Force Base from 1951-52 and Flight Surgeon there in 1952-53, and had temporary assignments to Gunter Air Force Base in Alabama and Randolph Air Force Base.

He is associate professor in the Department of Family Practice at Texas Tech School of Medicine since May, 1974, was Deputy Chairman from January to September, 1975, is Program Director and Associate Chairman.

He was in private practice at Bowie from July 1953 until August, 1960 and in Denver City from August, 1960 until May, 1974 when he became associated with the Texas Tech School of Medicine.

Rural House Fire Prompts County Group's Action

Mary and Martha Mathis had a house fire Sunday, and no one came. And those that did show up got there too late to save the blazing structure.

The unattended fire at the Mathis residence—located about a quarter of mile outside the Lubbock city limits—has prompted Southern Rural Property Owners Association president Harry Hamilton to call for a joint meeting with members of the city council, commissioners court and county voters.

"We are demanding that county officials act," noted Violet Horn, secretary of the organization which consists of city and rural residents. When lives and property are threatened, there is more to consider than dollars, Mrs. Horn told reporters at a Tuesday morning press conference.

If the problem of fire protection cannot be solved, then a request for a metro type of government that considers all citizens in the area will be made, Hamilton said.

The organization—which earlier this year opposed annexation of rural land by the city—now believes the problem involves more than the area just south of Lubbock, Hamilton explained, noting that all areas of the county should be concerned.

He said the proposed meeting hopefully will settle disagreements between the city and county.

"There's no reason why we can't have fire protection," commented Barney Chapman, a rural resident. "It's childish to argue about how much it's going to cost to run a fire truck."

On hand for Tuesday's news conference were both Mathis sisters, whose reddened eyes told the story of their loss. The fire occurred Sunday while the two women were attending church. When they returned from workshop services, they found their residence, located near the Tahoka Highway just south of 82nd Street, had burned to the ground.

Members of the Lubbock Fire Department stopped at the city limits and watched the structure burn, Mrs. Horn said. Since city and county officials ended the rural fire call contract, the city fire department cannot fight fires outside Lubbock.

Slaton and Wolfforth fire trucks answered the call but arrived at the scene after the blaze was out of control.

Lubbock Mayor Roy Bass said the city council had offered county officials a rural fire contract at a cost of "a little better than \$1,200 per call." Last year, the county had paid the city \$400 per rural fire call.

According to Bass, the requested fire call figure had been arrived at by the city based on the past year's experience. To compute the figure, the city took the cost of operating the fire

department, subtracted certain expenses considered strictly for the city and then averaged the number of fire calls for the previous year.

Bass acknowledged the need for an additional fire station just to adequately protect the city. At the present time, projections show the greatest need for another station would be south of Loop 289 an east of University Avenue, he said. This station probably could meet the five-minute response time for fire calls south of the city—if city and county officials reach an agreement.

A fire truck for rural residents could have prevented such a costly loss, according to Hamilton. Chapman added, "The county doesn't expect free protection, but some protection is needed."

The cost of operating fire trucks in the county should not be thought of in terms of profit—but saving lives and property should be considered, commented New Deal Mayor Ray West. He said there is plenty of money to have a fire truck in his community.

Reporters questioned whether a 500-gallon truck could put out a fire. West explained that at least fires could be slowed down until further aid could be provided. This method has proved successful in Abernathy, he added.

One city resident who owns a business in the rural area said that the county's rural residents may not pay city taxes—but they're not getting much for their county dollar.

It was noted that only a few members of the citizen's organization had attended the last meeting concerning rural fire protection, but Hamilton explained that they were not notified. "If I'd known about it, I would have been there," he said.

No date has been set for the proposed city-county meeting. For the meeting to be successful, there must be citizen involvement, Hamilton stressed.

County Judge Rod Shaw noted that he hasn't received any communication from the property owners association. "Whatever communication I received will be presented to the full commissioners court to see what they want to do," he said.

County commissioners meet Monday, and it's likely rural fire protection will come up during that session.

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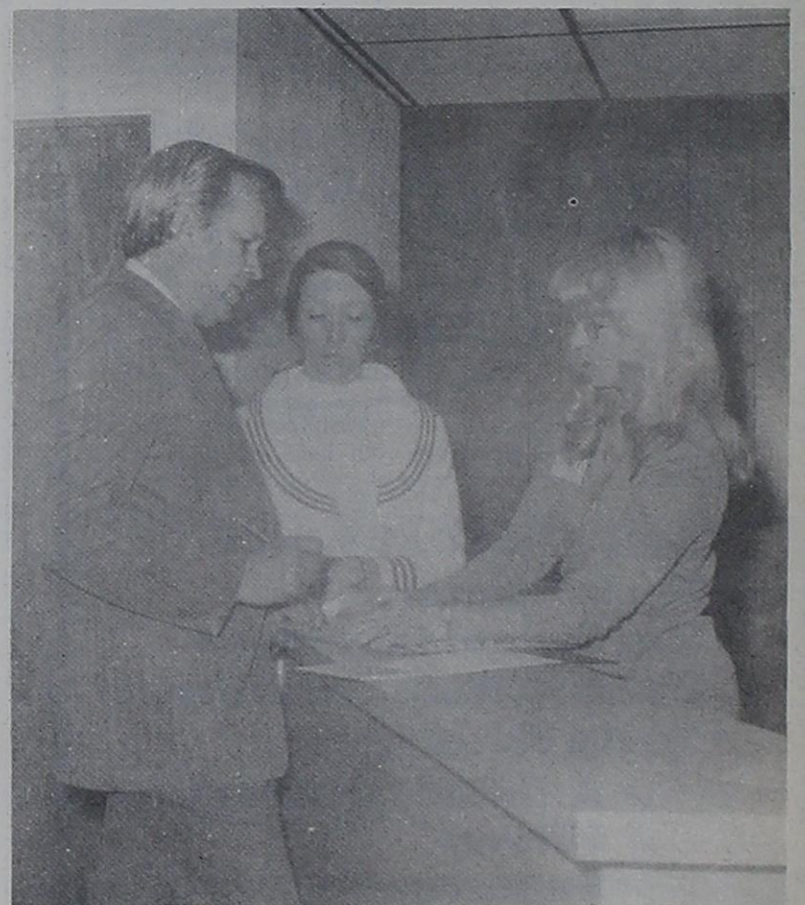
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SPORTS

Where do you start a column when you had a weekend that saw: 1. Texas Tech share in a Southwest Conference for the first time in its 17 years in the league; 2. An upset victory over South Carolina in basketball; 3. Darrell Royal and Frank Broyles both resign on the same day; 4. An all-conference team announced that honored Raiders.

You could add such things as John Michelosen, former Pitt coach, and Joe Blaylock and Jim Parmer, former Tech coaches, now all pro scouts, in the pressbox and expressing strong opinions.

The thing to do is start at the beginning, and it all began about 2 p.m. Saturday. That's when Rodney Allison ignited the Raiders with a 77-yard touchdown run.

It was followed in rapid order by a heckuva football game, strong opinions on key topics, a better-than-usual Steve Sloan press conference, that tremendous victory over the Gamecocks, the Boredom Bowl in Austin, highlighted only be resignations, and the major shocker out of Atlanta, Ga.

As the golden throats of radio love to say, if everything is in order, Sloan will not be going to pro football's ranks. An announcement out of Dallas to the effect that Steve was being offered a fantastic job with the Falcons had the sparse news crew scurrying for information.

Steve had just finished his news conference after the football game when the UPI called Mike Patterson, who dashed after the departing Sloan. AP's Mick Cochran walked in, caught on quickly and dashed after the dashing Patterson, who was dashing after Sloan.

A few minutes later, both were back and the story unfolded. Steve would not confirm or deny that he had or had not been offered: 1. coach of the Falcons; 2. General Manager of the Falcons; 3. Ownership share of the Falcons; and 4. A longterm contract in the seven figure range. Seven figure range is like a "one followed by six zeroes." Oh, yes, put a dollar sign in front of the "one."

Steve apparently had assured folks that he was not interested in leaving Tech and that he'll stay hitched. But, as I've written before, it would behoove West Texas fans of Tech to sweeten the pot here many ways.

The Raiders hung on grimly Saturday afternoon to defeat a Baylor team that was completely dedicated to winning this game. Ignored by the bowls, they looked on the Tech game as their bowl. And they came close, really too close for comfort.

But these Raiders don't give up. Once again they came from behind to win. The loss snapped a little noticed Baylor streak. The Bears hadn't lost a game this year in which they lost the coin toss.

THE big play of the game was the sack of Mark Jackson on third down when Baylor was within field goal range. A tie would have knocked Tech out of a co-championship.

Sloan pointed to that, Allison's run and the penalty that set up the 50-yard Baylor touchdown bomb.

As for the season, he singled out the Colorado game as the "best thing that happened to us this season. That gave our defense confidence and, by the time we played A&M, they had real confidence."

As I said, the press conference was better than usual. Here are some of Steve's remarks:

"Our biggest problem next year is to get a one-legged kicker! I'm assigning three coaches to find us one!"

"Allison is like a trained killer. He's always ready to play. He's funny, you know. They said he couldn't pass and he said he couldn't pass, but all he did was complete passes."

"The saddest thing is Tommy Duniven. He probably has the best attitude of anyone on the team. He's completely committed. All he does is help Allison and the team. He was well enough to play today, but what are you going to do when you've got Houdini in there?"

"Being co-champions and playing Nebraska in the Bluebonnet Bowl really made our players excited!" This was followed by a soft chuckle. "I wasn't too excited about playing Nebraska!"

"Quarterback is our main concern in recruiting. If we don't get one or two good ones, we could be in the same shape as Texas and Arkansas."

"All-conference players? I'd say that Howard, Buell, Irons, Sears, Allison, Sammy Williams, Isaac are all deserving."

I talked with Darrell Royal after the Tech-Texas game and one thing was noticeable to anyone who'd known him a long time. He was more mature, more deliberate and he didn't have the same intensity and fire that he once had.

I imagine that Frank Broyles was much the same. The both have been tested in the fire of competition and they came through like champions. They have been a credit to the college game and they'll be missed. The conference is richer for their having been coaches within its ranks.

Frank McGuire, the irascible South Carolina basketball coach, apparently was charming after Tech had beaten the Gamecocks. He told a writer: "That was the kind of game you win at home and lose on the road." He also added: "Those officials set college basketball back 25 years!"

The headline Sunday morning, as I told Cliff Speegle of the SWC office, should read: "To Carlen, With Love." Speegle grinned appreciatively.

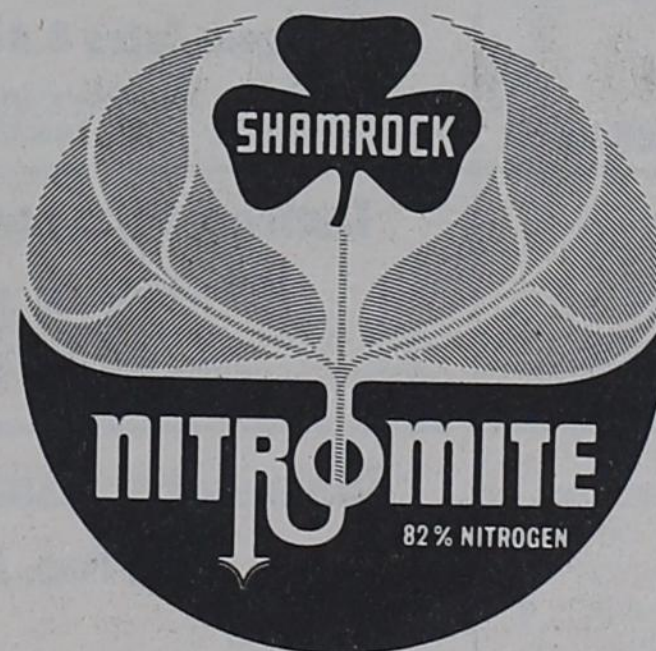

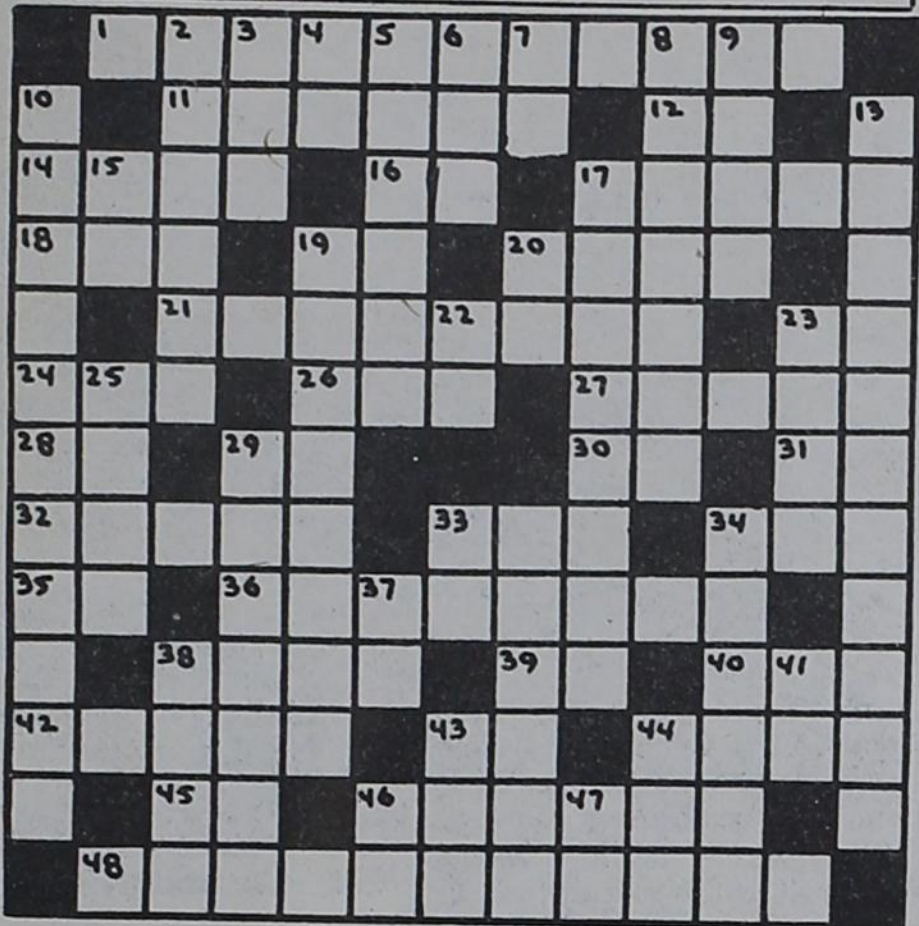

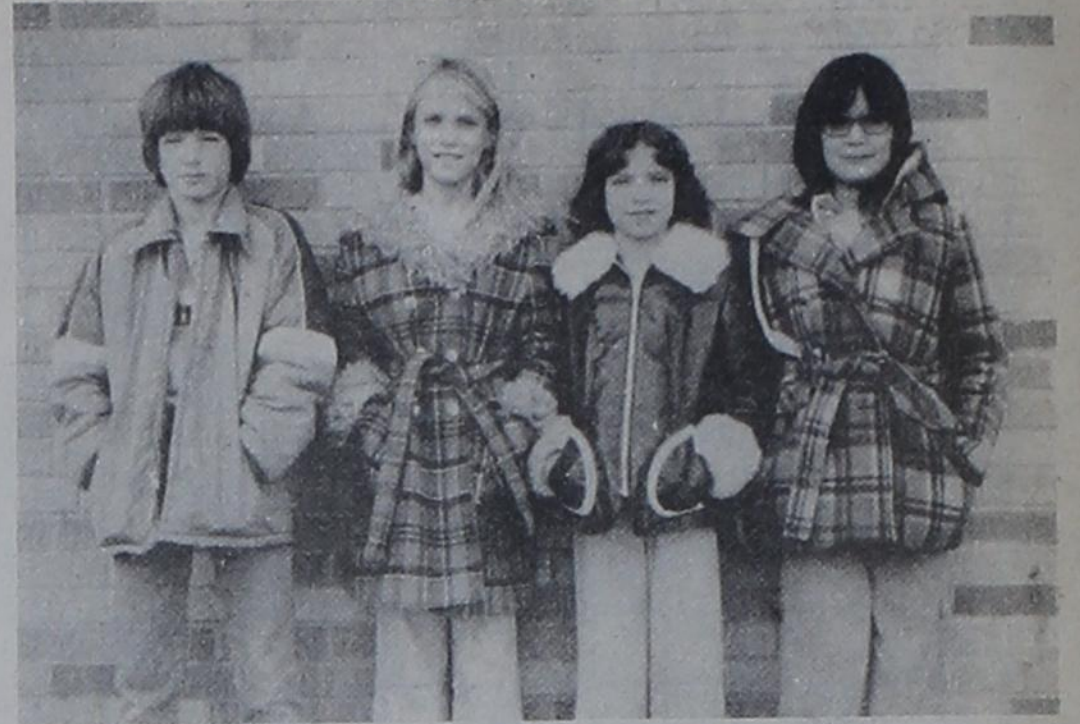
