"We want to get ideas from people in rural areas as well as the city on the relationship between energy problems and patterns of life," Commissioner White said.

Realistic adjustments in transportation practices and changes in individual living patterns evolving from energy cutbacks are problems to be explored.

Other topics to be covered are regulations that will provide for the most efficient use of energy in the state and alternative sources of energy that are practical and attainable.

"Texans must plan now to be prepared for shortages in traditional energy and the ultimate effects on homes and working patterns," Commissioner White said. "Actual energy shortages have already been experienced in agriculture; some industries have had to switch to alternate plans, but the individual in the state has yet to experience severe shortages in the fuels he needs."

Persons who wish to testify should notify the committee in writing by Nov. 15. A ten-minute time limit has been set on testimony. Lengthy statements should be sent in advance.

If witnesses cannot be present at the hearing, they should send testimony on any of these issues to John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, Committee Chairman, P.O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711.

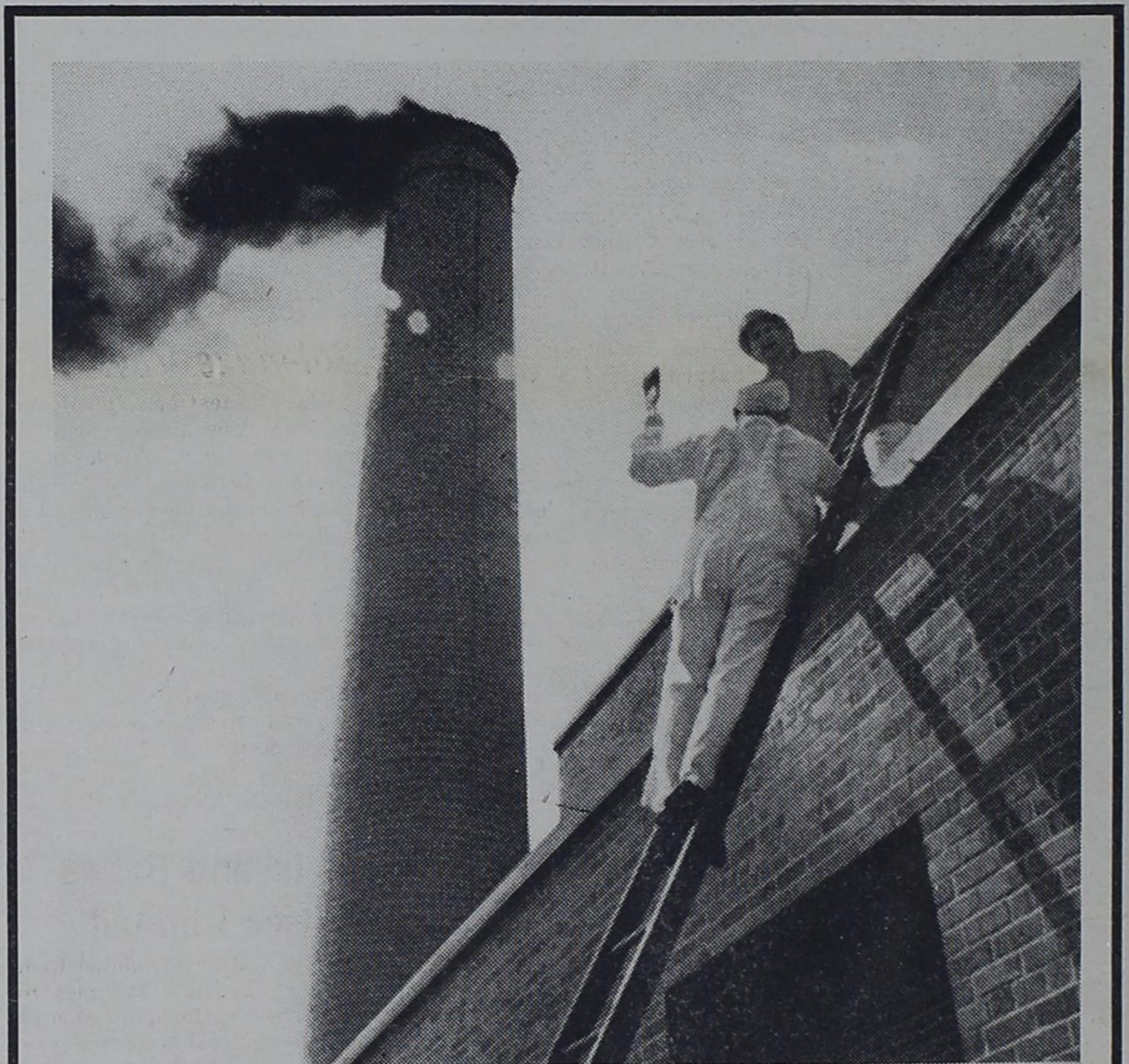

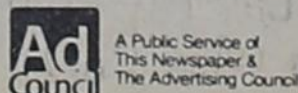

Before dismissing, the group voted to meet on the fourth Tuesday of each month, with the next meeting being November 27, at the clubhouse.

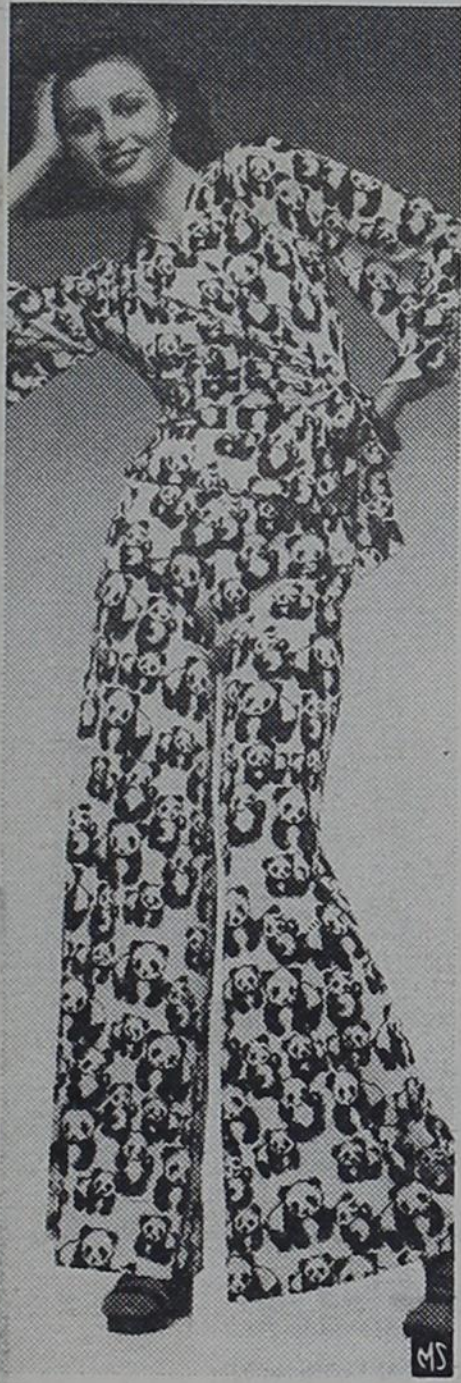

Raiders' Defense Wins By 19-6 Over Rice Owls Last Saturday

Defensive football is about as exciting as watching pigeons fly in and out of the Great Plains Life Building, but Texas Tech would have had trouble beating Rice last Saturday, 19-6, without it.

In fact, the defense turned the game around early, as it has been doing much of the season, when Kenneth Wallace intercepted Tommy Kramer's pass on the Rice 28 and returned the ball 16 yards to the 12. James Mosley scored on the first play thereafter and the Raiders were on their way to their seventh victory in eight starts.

Now Coach Jim Carlen's young charges prepare to invade Amon Carter Stadium in Fort Worth Saturday and a date against dangerous TCU. The Horned Frogs, only 3-4 for the season, have won the last two meetings with Tech and have been real spoilers.

"I'm scared to death of TCU," Carlen said as much as four weeks ago. "They play this game like it was the Super Bowl. Check it out. They've beaten us 48-13 (total score) the last two years."

But to get back to that Rice game, the Raider offense wasn't sharp. The Owls cut off Joe Barnes

on the option and did a good job of containing Larry Isaac on the option pitch.

Still, the Raiders moved when they had to. Mosley's 16-yard run gave Tech a 6-0 lead with only 3:57 gone and, with 5:19 left in the first quarter, Don Grimes kicked a 29-yard field goal for a 9-0 lead.

Rice scored its first touchdown in the past four Tech games with 6:32 left to play when Kramer kept for five yards. Linebacker Charlie Beery intercepted a pass for two points and that was it.

Social and Rehab Service Limited

States will be prohibited from providing Federal assistance to persons not legally in this country under a regulation issued today by James S. Dwight, Jr., Administrator of HEW's Social and Rehabilitation Service.

The regulation, which was published today in the Federal Register, will apply to the public assistance programs of the Social Security Act. It will become effective in 60 days.

The new regulation will require that States cover otherwise eligible residents of the United States, but only if they are either citizens or aliens lawfully in this country.

SRS issued a proposed regulation in June, 1972, to implement a Supreme Court decision which found that State statutes (in Arizona and Pennsylvania) excluding aliens violated the Constitution and encroached on the exclusive Federal power over the entrance of aliens into this country and their residence here.

The 1972 proposal would have prohibited states from denying public assistance to otherwise eligible persons solely because they are not citizens or because of their status as aliens.

That proposal was widely believed to mean that states would be required to cover all aliens, including those not lawfully in the U.S.

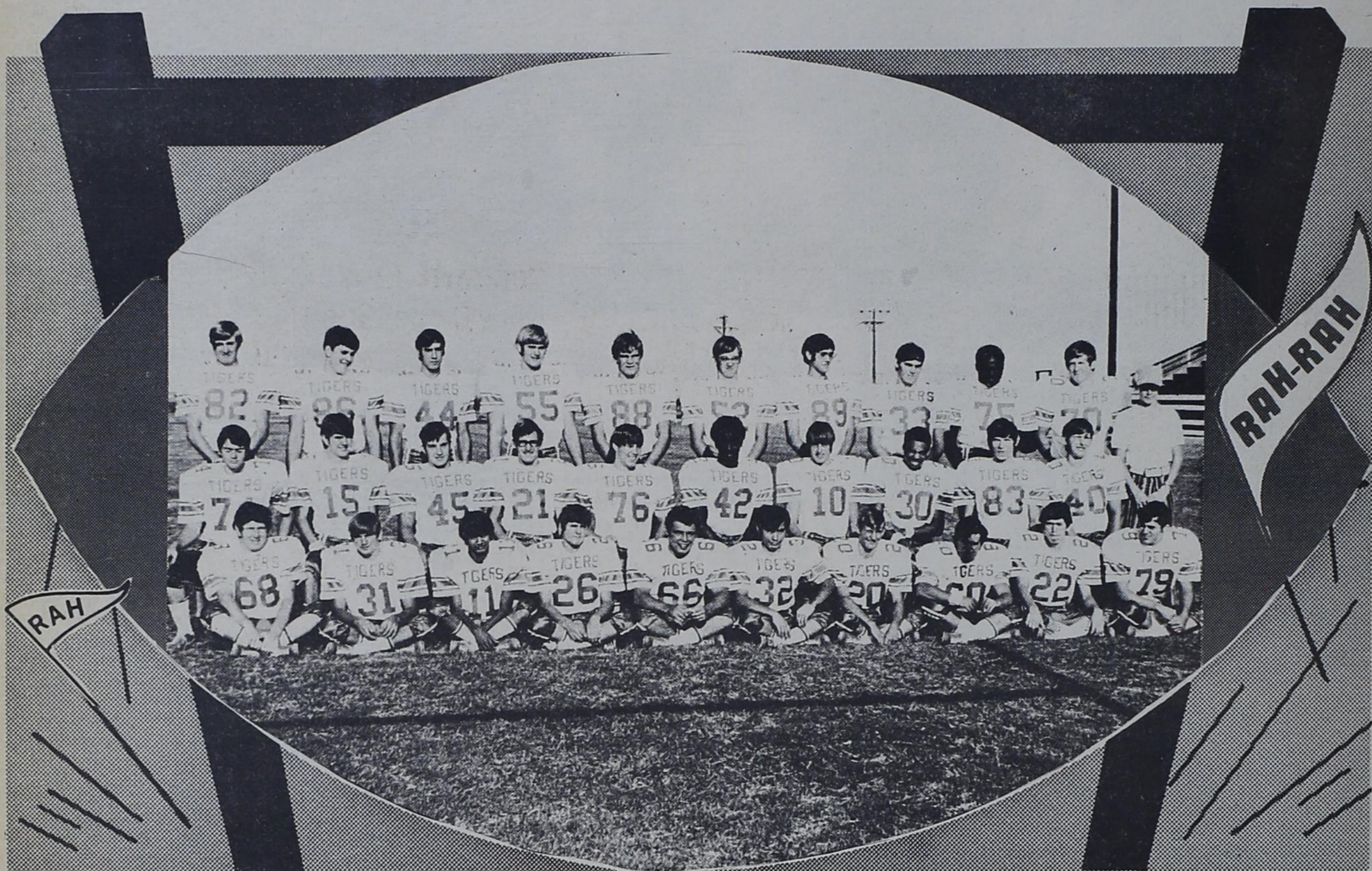

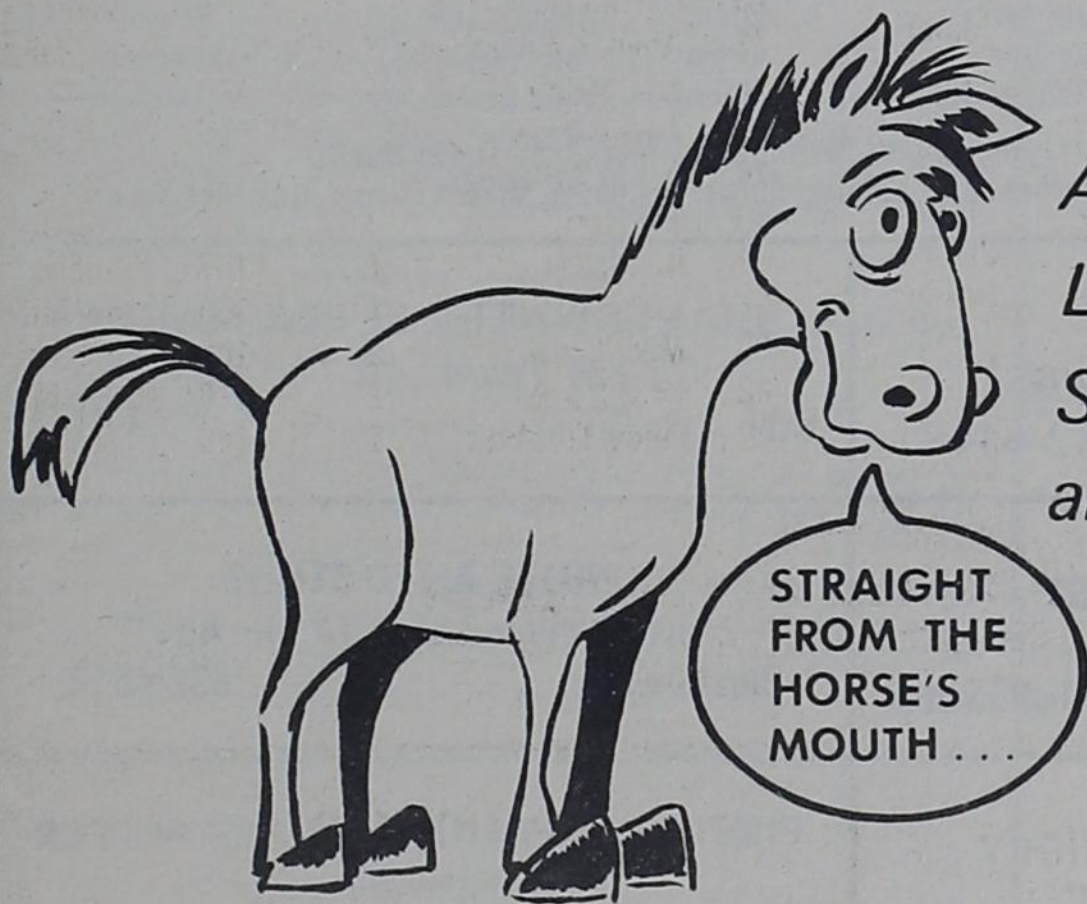

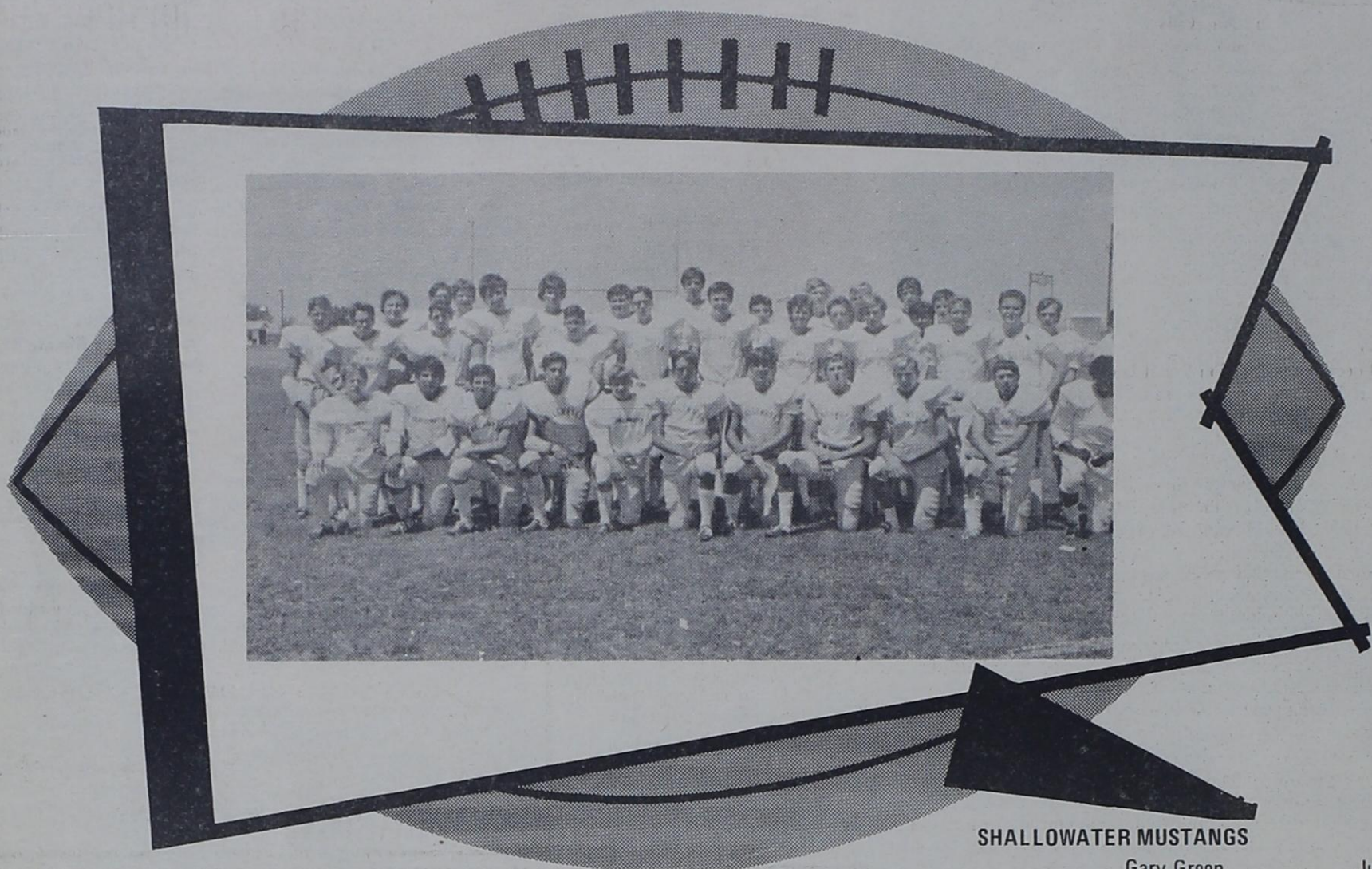

A year ago today Texas Tech had posted a 7-1 football record. The lone loss had come at the hands of eventual conference champion Texas and bowl talk was stirring on the broad West Texas campus.

Then came Homecoming and TCU. The maligned Horned Frogs, with a 4-3 record, shattered the Raiders' dream, temporarily, on a 31-7 shellacking. To say that shellshock was the order of the day, and the following week would be an understatement.

Today, Tech stands 7-1 again, with those same Frogs rising up as the roadblock Saturday. This year the Frogs are 3-4, but with the same incentive that they had a year ago.

It's small wonder that Coach Jim Carlen looks with apprehension on this game. TCU, blasted by Ohio State and crippled by injuries and talk of a coaching change, put it all together to whip a pretty fair Baylor club last Saturday.

Is it because of economic conditions? Is it because it's in the middle of the harvest? Is it because, as some say, Jim Carlen made people unhappy two years ago? What is it? Is it TV competition?

The conference office last week said that crowds are down 7.8 percent from last year, led by SMU, down 36.2 percent; Rice, 28.7 percent; and TCU, 21.1 percent. Only A&M, up 6.4 percent; and Baylor, up 2.7 percent, show an increase. Tech is down 5.2 percent. Although drawing at 87.2 percent of capacity, above, the league average.

The largest crowd for a conference game this year? Easy, Tech at Texas, 77,809.

Carlen at his post-game conference: "Against Rice we've played average, or less, for four years. I thought the defense played well. It must be something their defense does (to Tech offense).

"I'm impressed with Kramer. The worst thing that happened was that we didn't score when we were on their goal line. That's on me. We didn't read the defense right. Barnes missed the key, but we should have caught it. The momentum went to Rice when we didn't score. It could have been the other way (if Tech had scored).

"This was the first game, from an offensive standpoint, that we haven't been high. I've said all along that our offensive line is good, but it's not strong. We can't manhandle anyone. Once we get inside the 10-yard line, we're in trouble. The test of a good offense is the line, not trick plays, or good backfield. I'm not worried about Texas, I'm concerned only with Texas Tech. I'm completely dedicated to Texas Tech."

"Bowl scouts? I avoid them like the plague. We have the TCU Bowl next. That's the only one that's worrying me. We haven't played well against TCU the last two years. Check it out. The last two years they've beaten us 17-6 and 31-7. That's 48-13. They come out against us with fire in their eyes. It's one of two games on their schedule that they really get sky high for.

There is one encouraging difference. Tech had a letdown against Rice. The defense played well, saving the day, and the offense had enough to capitalize. But the offense didn't look good against the Owls and, as Coach Carlen said, the letdown was due.

Hopefully, the Raiders will shrug off the unimpressive victory over Rice and go all-out to finish the rest of the season unbeaten. They can do it if they set their minds to it.

After the Rice game, I asked Jack Agness of the Houston Post if, perhaps, Coach Al Conover hadn't tried to get a super effort out of his Owls, that he thought had a chance to win this game.

Jack nodded his head in agreement. "He figured that Tech would have to be down this week (after playing so well against SMU). He thought that this would be his best chance of winning an upset."

As it turned out, Tech's defense turned it around and the Raiders generated enough offense to win.

Incidentally, today's garlic corsage to the local electronic media that insists on saying that "Tech has a great 'incentative' to win." Dictionaries are to use.

A great deal is made of the home field, or court, advantage in basketball, but what of football? Well, sir, through the first 14 conference games, home teams had won 8, lost 6.

Losers have been Baylor (twice), Arkansas, SMU, A&M and Rice. Defeats of Arkansas, SMU and A&M probably cost those teams any chance of a conference title, although only a miracle at this point could keep Texas from an unprecedented sixth straight crown.

What's wrong with West Texas football fans? Give us a winner and we'll fill the stadium (at Tech) to capacity. Give us a winner playing a conference game and you can't have enough seats.

Okay, Tech, a winner, ranked nationally, playing SMU, ranked national, a conference game, Homecoming, perfect weather—and the vacant seats gaped up at you. A winner (7-1), perfect weather, a conference game (Rice) and even more vacancies.

PRESCHOOLER TALL TALES

Preschooler "tall tales" don't necessarily mean a child is lying. The four-year-old preschooler sees things from his own point of view, and most are tellers of tall tales.

Also with his limited experience, a preschooler, even five and six years old, may not know the whole truth. Parents can share some of their experience with him instead of criticizing his lack of insight.

At the same time they accept his tall tales, they can help him distinguish fact from fiction.

That way, he starts growing in his ability to understand the truth of a situation. For most children this ability develops slowly.

Sometimes, of course, a child will tell a lie. Though parents natural reaction is to uncover the truth, it is more important to uncover the reason for a story.

The child may be wanting to conceal guilt, or he's afraid of punishment he knows is coming. Perhaps he is lying as an act of hostility, or he could be trying to fool himself. And, unlikely as it

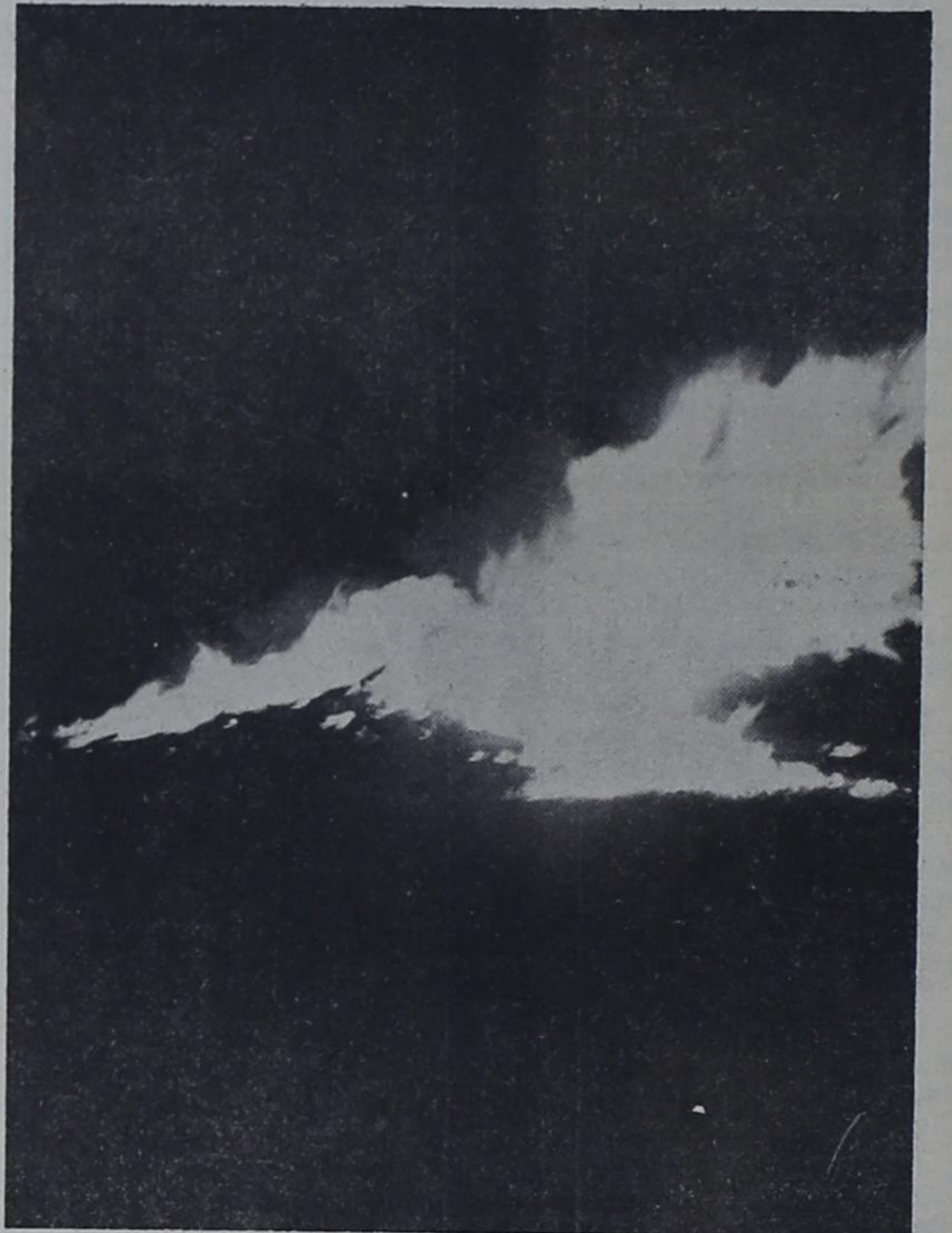
The Shallowater Mustangs made a scoring victory over the Ropes Eagles with a score of 54-6.
