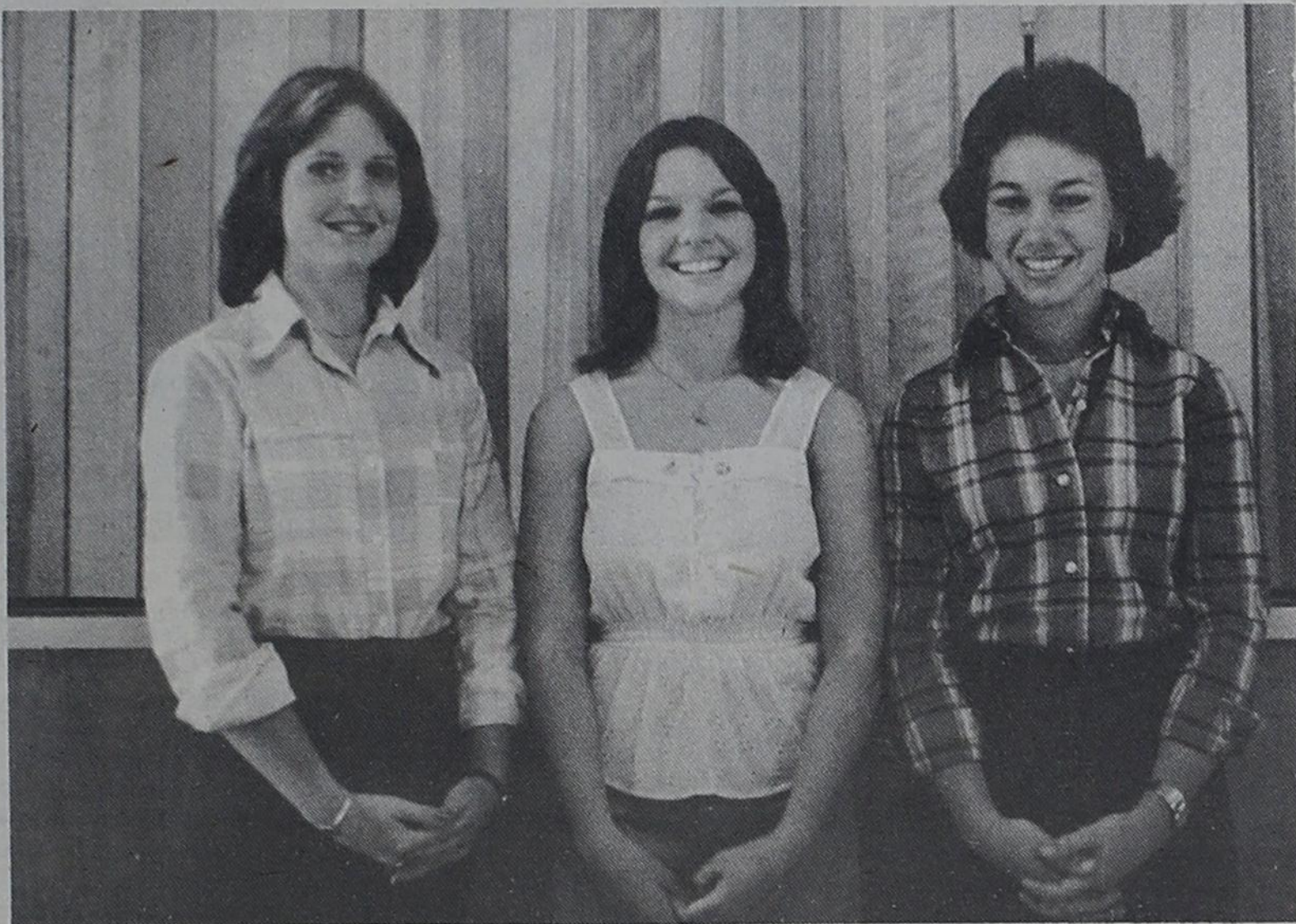




5th Annual Homecoming Set Here Friday

Certification Training Meet Scheduled Here

A series of Pesticide Certification Training meetings will be held September 15, 20, 22 and October 4, 1977 to complete the certification process for private pesticide applicators in Lubbock County.

All producers as well as interested homeowners who anticipate using pesticides that are on the restricted list

published by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) must attend one of the 3-hour training sessions.

The sessions will begin at 7:00 p.m. each evening. They are scheduled to be at the South Plains Electric Co-op in Lubbock on September 15, Shallowater Clubhouse on September 20, Bill Buckman's Airport Hanger at Acuff on September 22 and New Deal High School Cafeteria on October 4.

In conjunction with the Certification Meeting at New Deal, the Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District Board will be holding an election for director in Zone 4. Charles Wood is the present director.

Anyone who owns land within Zone 4 and lives within the Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District is eligible to vote in this election.

The Pesticide Certification law goes into effect on October 21, 1977 and, thus, it is of vital importance that all interested producers and homeowners who use the restricted pesticides complete the certification process before the deadline.

Visits Due From Comptrollers

A letter received by Suburban Today from the Comptroller's Office stated that every business in the Shallowater community will be visited soon by a representative of that office. The visits are of a friendly nature to inform each taxpayer of what is expected of him under the law, and to give him any assistance he may need and to answer all of his questions.

Comptroller Bob Bullock alerted Texas businessmen Monday to begin looking for a friendly visit from a Comptroller's enforcement officer sometime during the next nine months.

The Comptroller said that the enforcement officers from his 40 field offices will fan out across the state with the goal of offering personal assistance to each and every Texas business.

A testing of the canvassing program in July showed that 19 percent of taxpayers contacted required assistance or needed permits, he said.

"The theme of this project is taxpayer assistance," Bullock said. "We have found that in many instances only personal contact can eliminate errors that eventually prove costly both to the taxpayer and the Comptroller's Office."

He said his employees, armed with smiles and packages of taxpayer information, will be knocking on doors with the hopes of:

- Providing education to taxpayers;
- making sure every business is properly permitted;
- establishing personal lines of communication between taxpayers and the individual

enforcement officer responsible for the area;

-updating Comptroller's Office records;

-making certain each taxpayer is filing returns and paying tax properly.

July's sample of 4,702 businesses showed that 97 were operating without needed permits, 766 had changed address or business name without notifying the Comptroller's Office and 37 were not paying tax properly, Bullock said.

"We hope to take care of every little problem on the spot, before it turns into a big problem," he said.

"Above all," Bullock added, "we want people to believe us when we say 'I'm from the Comptroller's Office and I'm here to help you!'"

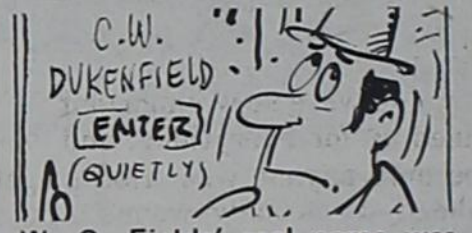

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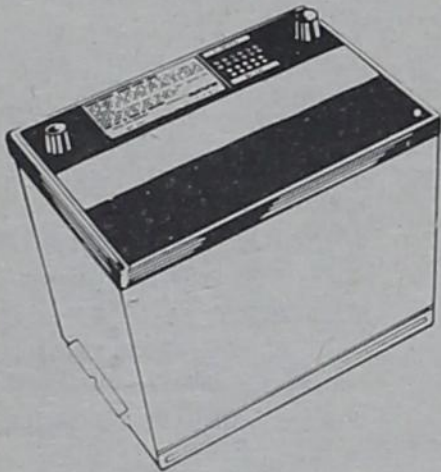

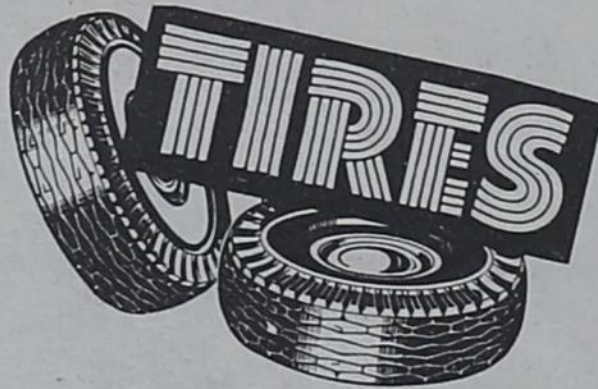

Life in my first grade classroom was at times very funny, and always exciting and rewarding. Sometimes the mothers had as hard a time adjusting to this new life as the children. I always kept the welcome mat out and the door open. I like to think that some of my best friends are the mothers of the children I taught. I couldn't have accomplished very much without their help.

I spent thirteen years teaching in the same room. There were close to 350 children that learned to read, write and "do sums" as they said in the olden days. There were bright happy faces, crying faces, scared faces and all the faces wanted to learn.

Lines were very important. We lined up for everything, and woe be unto anyone who tried to get ahead—he usually wound up at the end of the line.

The first two or three weeks were the hardest, especially for the teacher. I had to be in three places at one time. Finally

everyone learned where his seat was and that he was supposed to be in it. He also learned how to manage as many trips to the restroom as possible.

We had a motto that stayed up on the wall until Christmas. It was "Happiness is learning to read." We all worked hard toward that goal. In the spring most could read very well and it was a great thrill for us all.

There have been several honor graduates from among my students. Many have excelled in sports and other activities. It is always a great pleasure to hear that they have done well in high school and college. I just hope I helped them in some small way to achieve their ambitions, and to become good citizens.

Mr. Keith Wiseman, Methodist minister from Andrews, Texas was guest speaker and brought a

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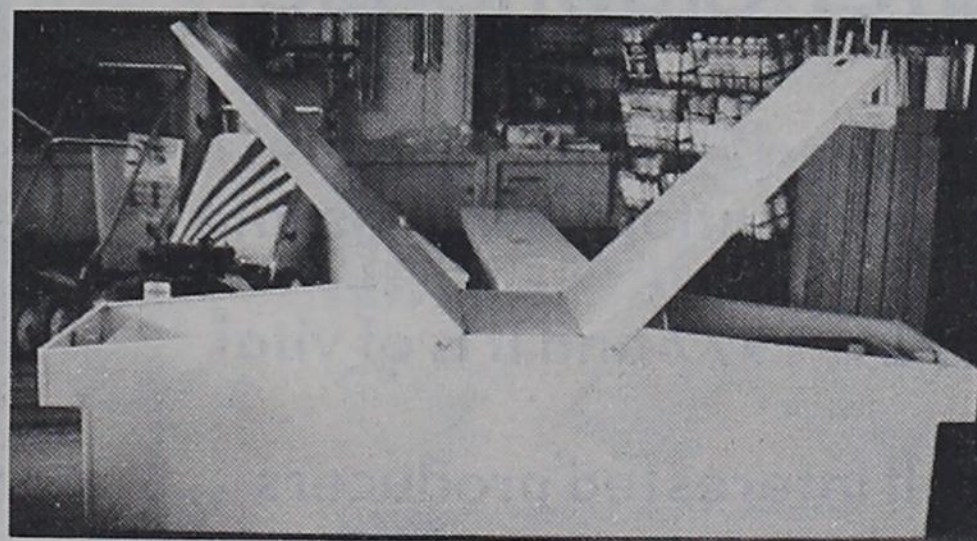
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Class History of 1939 Seniors

Backward, turn backward, O time in your flight and make me a first grader just for today! We will recall J.R. Anderson, Rudell Wynn, Cathryn Gentry, Maurice Malone and Harold Douglas starting to school with Mrs. Hooten as the teacher in September 1928. She was still our beloved teacher in the second grade.

The third year Miss Lawrence took over.

The fourth year we had two new members, Mildred Duncan from Hardy and Refa Page from Abernathy.

The fifth year saw an increase of three members, Joe Miller, Garland Stokes and Harlan Dunlop.

Mrs. Gentry taught us our first history in the sixth grade.

The seventh year saw us with the same students and teacher.

In our eighth year a group of timid freshmen entered high school. Our numbers were increased with Sam Evans and E.W. Goodgion.

The Sophomore year saw us with another new member, Margaret Teague from County Line.

The most outstanding even of the junior year was the Junior-Senior Banquet, at last we were growing up! Two new students joined our rank, Emmett Wood from Carlsbad and Glenn Andrew from New Deal.

In September of 1938 we started to school with a new outlook on life and great plans for our future—after we had graduation out of the way! Our new senior for that year was June Williams from New Deal. Our new teachers were B.T. Rucker, Supt., Mr. Craig, M.J. Williams, Otho Drape and Miss Veda Shaw our English Teacher and Class Sponsor.

On Wednesday May 17th, 1939 these sixteen happy seniors received their diplomas at 7:30 in the Clubhouse.

The following day was the next big day for us. We had worked all year selling candy, Cokes and peanuts, had cleaned house for the local ladies, washed cars and helped at the local gas stations for money to take our Senior Trip. By now we had almost \$130.00 free and clear! Early Thursday morning we loaded one of the yellow school buses with bed rolls, suitcases, cooking utensils and groceries along with thirteen excited seniors and four apprehensive chaperons. T.O. (Shorty) Douglas was our fearless bus driver. Mrs. Joe Miller Sr. and Mrs. T.O. Douglas were the brave room mothers. Miss Shaw couldn't see another week with us so M.J. Williams graciously concented to be our "sponsor," and we took off for eight wonderful days touring south Texas and Old Mexico. We

planned on having at least one room or shelter for the girls to spread their bed rolls in, while the boys slept on the ground, after all we only had \$130.00 to spend on gas, oil, groceries and lodging! For the most part we stayed in City Parks or State Parks, cooking our supper and breakfast over a campfire. I never knew bacon and eggs could be so good or that coffee had such a wonderful aroma! We took time about helping with the cooking and cleaning up. Why wasn't dish washing at home as much fun! We ate hamburgers or sandwiches with a cold drink at noon, found a roadside park or a clump of trees to sit under. Only two or three times did we ever go to a cafe to eat.

Our first night out we spent in the Georgetown City Park. The following day we toured Austin, seeing the Governors Mansion and the State Capitol. We had our pictures made with Governor "Pappy" W. Lee O'Daniel and he gave us a personal tour of some of the historic rooms. We remember the words "Lightcrust Flour" printed on the collar of his white shirt. We rode all over town enjoying the sights. That night was spent just outside of San Antonio. Early the next morning we were standing in awe as we recalled the fierce battle of the

Alamo. We drank a Coke in the famous Buckhorn Saloon, and were amazed at the big collection of horns displayed on the walls. We later went out to Breckenridge Zoo and spent most of the afternoon. The Japanese Sunken Gardens were the most beautiful gardens we had ever seen. That night was spent in Garner State Park at Uvalde. The next day we visited Vice President John Nance Garner's home. We didn't get to see him as he was in Washington, doing whatever it was that Vice Presidents did then.

Next we were in Laredo, where we crossed the border into Old Mexico and spent a lot of time wishing we had money to buy this and that to take home! Brownsville was our camping place that night. We then went up to Kingsville and spent hours riding around the great King Ranch. Later we spent four glorious hours on the beach at Corpus Christi. As we stood gazing out at that great expanse of water we were reminded of the beautiful things that God had made, and were thankful that we were part of His great handiwork. Most of us had never seen the Ocean before and couldn't comprehend the vastness of so much water until we saw it there

before us. We played on the beach, had a picnic lunch, swam in the cool waters and got terrible sunburns! We were so tired by night that we only "snacked" for supper. We spent the night on the coast and next day drove into Galveston. There we saw the huge German Freighter Hamburg being loaded with bales of cotton. We couldn't believe it would hold so much. (Later it was destroyed during a bomb raid in the war.) We took a boat trip six miles out into the Gulf. It was a beautiful trip and coming back in we drug our feet in the water and felt the salt spray in our faces. That night was spent in San Jacinto Park, after seeing all the wondrous sights in Houston.

In Huntsville the next day we visited the prison and two or three of us brave ones sat down in "Old Sparky", the electric chair. It was polished until it looked new, and the straps were wide and heavy. The chair is very large, and bolted down to the floor. Next we went to Bryan and drove around College Station, spending a lot of time just looking and enjoying the trees and

scenery. We spent our last night in Waco and started home the next day. At times we were very quiet and deep into our own thoughts as we relived the past few days and wondered what lay ahead for us in the world. Just before we reached Shallowater, Mr. Williams gave each of us a new 1938 penny, left from our expense money. (I wondered where that lone penny came from that I had found stored away among my souvenirs.) We were happy to get home but sad to leave our friends, some we would never see again. Maurice Malone gave his life for our country the next year. J.R. Anderson died in the early Sixties and Margaret Teague in 1976. Nine of us still live around Lubbock and Shallowater.

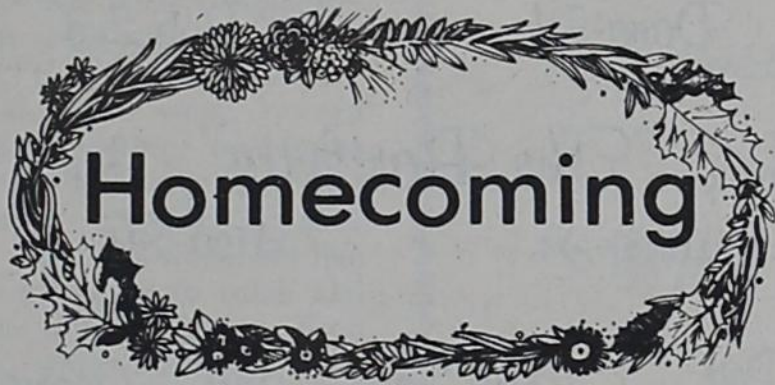

Lubbock County Third Largest Producer of Sunflower Seeds

Lubbock County was the third largest producer of sunflower seeds in Texas last year, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Lubbock County farmers harvested some 8,866,000 pounds of sunflower seeds, which accounted for 12.3 per cent of the state's total production of 71,875,000 pounds, Brown noted.

"Yields last year were disappointingly low," Brown stated, "primarily because many of the High Plains crops, which were planted late, were hit by early frosts before reaching maturity."

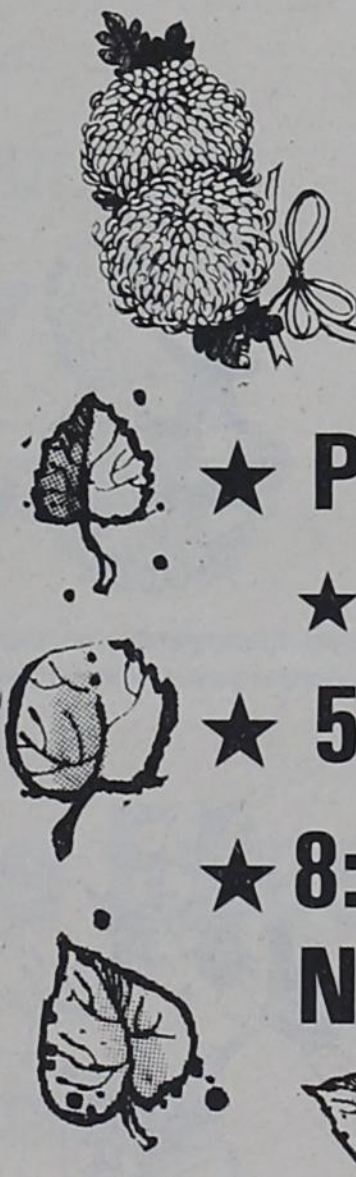

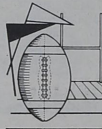

Fall Color For Landscapes

Have you noticed the fall wardrobe of many of the woody trees and shrubs? As you drive through the countryside, observe the many attractive colors and consider some of these plants for your own landscape for fall and winter effects, suggests a landscape horticulturist.

"Some plant species have colorful foliage while others are noted for their attractive fruit, interesting seed pods, or unusual bark characteristics," points out Everett Janne with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Some of the most brilliant foliage colors are provided by such species as sweet gum, Chinese tallow, black gum, dogwood, crapemyrtle, maple, Shumard oak, Texas oak, Callery pear and Chinese pistachio.

Shrubs having attractive fall color include winged euonymus, cotoneaster, mahonia, nandina, some viburnums and sumacs, which have the most brilliant foliage of all.

Plants noted for their colorful berries or fruit include yaupon, deciduous holly or possum haw,

American beauty berry, pyracantha, hollies of all types, coralberry and cotoneaster. Dual purpose trees that have interesting fruit that is also edible include Japanese persimmon and crab-apple.

"Some plants such as the goldenrain tree, screwbean mesquite and redwing have interesting seedpods," notes the Extension Service specialist.

Janne also suggests selecting a few plants with colorful or interesting bark to boost the winter landscape. These include crapemyrtle, red twig dogwood, birch, beech, winged euonymus and Chinese elm.

"Start now to add some of these colorful and interesting plants to your landscape," says Janne. "Many can be obtained at nurseries and planted immediately. Others must be collected from their native habitat."

If you are going to collect plants, tag them now so you can find them after the leaves and fruit have fallen. Then obtain permission from the landowner before digging. Prune back at least one-half to two-thirds of the top growth of collected plants to insure any degree of success in moving them, advises the horticulturist.

"The most important thing to remember about adding any type of plants to your home landscape is to make sure they are adapted to you area," emphasizes Janne. "There is little beauty or pleasure in a plant that is not suited to your climatic conditions."



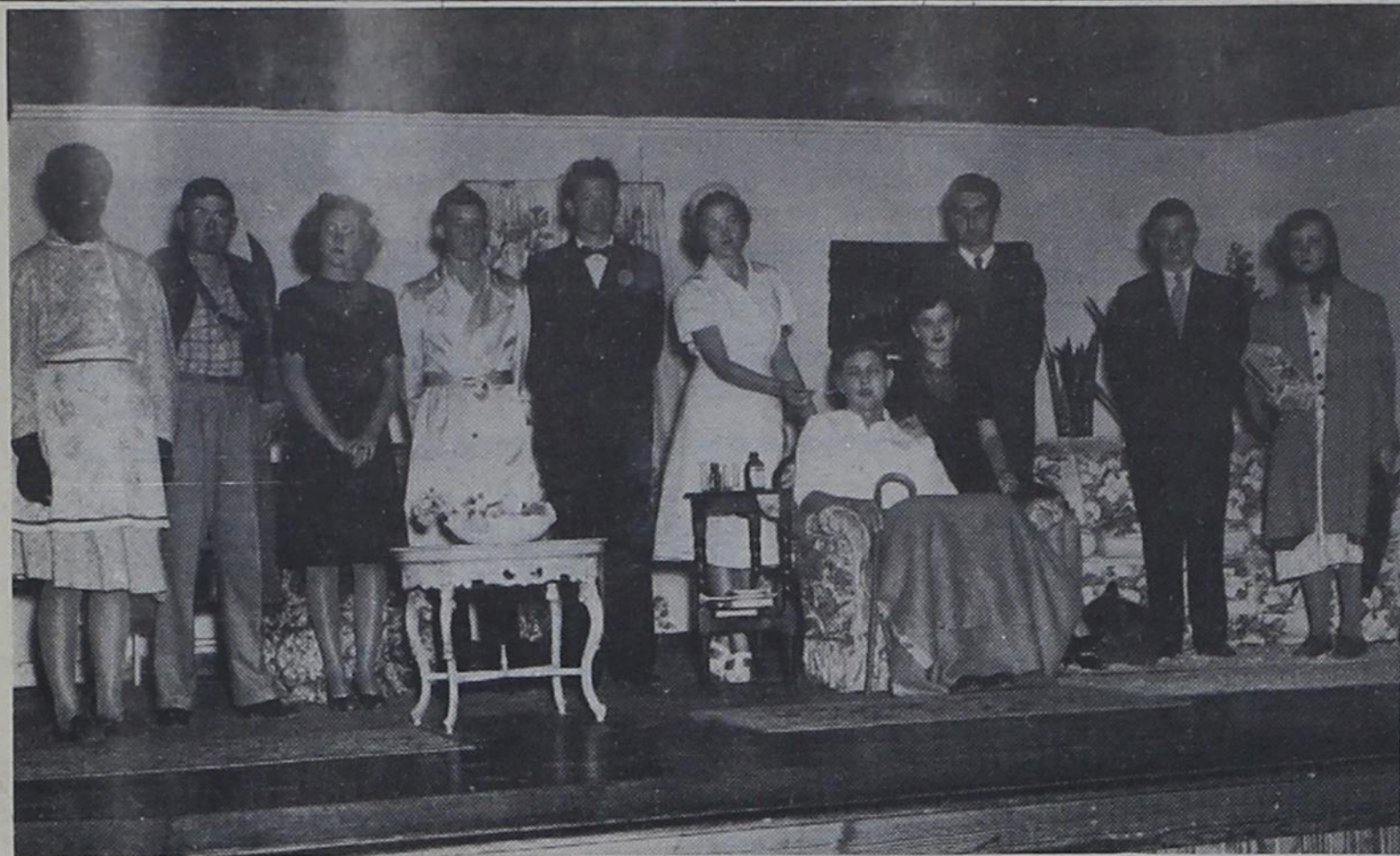

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

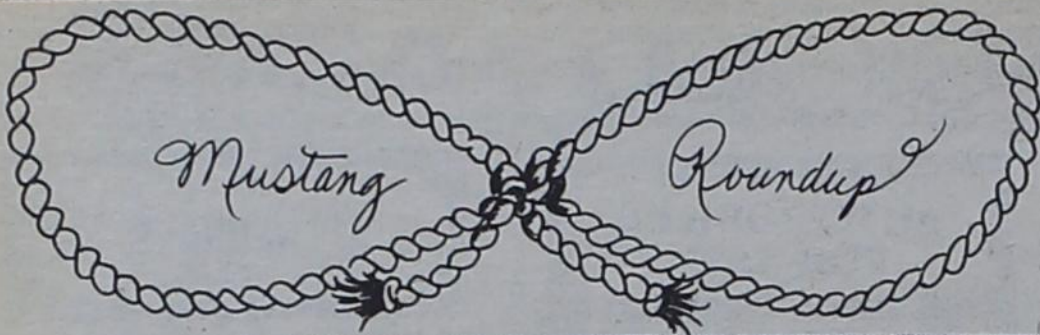
"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."
