Diet-heart disease seminar held

A seminar on diet in relation to heart disease called "Eat to Your Heart's Content" was held at the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium on Thursday. The purpose of the seminar was to educate the general public of the need to eat properly throughout life to help prevent some health problems in later life.

Dr. Brandon O. Hull, Cardiologist, discussed the "Prevalence of Heart Disease". "The Risk Factors" were discussed by Dr. Edward A. Downs, Internist. The topic covered by Dr. Richard L. Weddige, Psychiatrist, was "Psychological Aspects of Eating". Professor Clara M. McPherson, Department of Food and Nutrition, Texas Tech University, shared with the audience the "Factors Which Affect Food Acceptance".

The afternoon session was moderated by Mrs. Catherine Crawford, District Extension Agent, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and included a speech by Dr. Mina W. Lamb, Department of Food and Nutrition, Texas Tech University.

"The Role of the Home in the Prevention of Heart Disease." A series of mini-lessons on making low-fat foods palatable and acceptable to the family were taught by home economists.

The topic and speakers were: Meat Magic for Masculine Hearts-Mrs. Jean Martin, Extension Agent-ENP; Vibrant Vegetables for Vigorous Hearts-Mrs. Mildred Patterson-County Extension Agent; Boastful Breads for the Brave of Heart-Mrs. Catherine Crawford-District Extension Agent; Dashing Desserts for Daring Hearts-Joy Parnell-Home Service Advisor, Southwestern Public Service Company; Beverages for the Big Heart-Mrs. Diane Gillet-Graduate Student, Texas Tech University and Snappy Snacks for Strong Hearts-Mrs. Judy Sanders-Extension Agent-ENP.

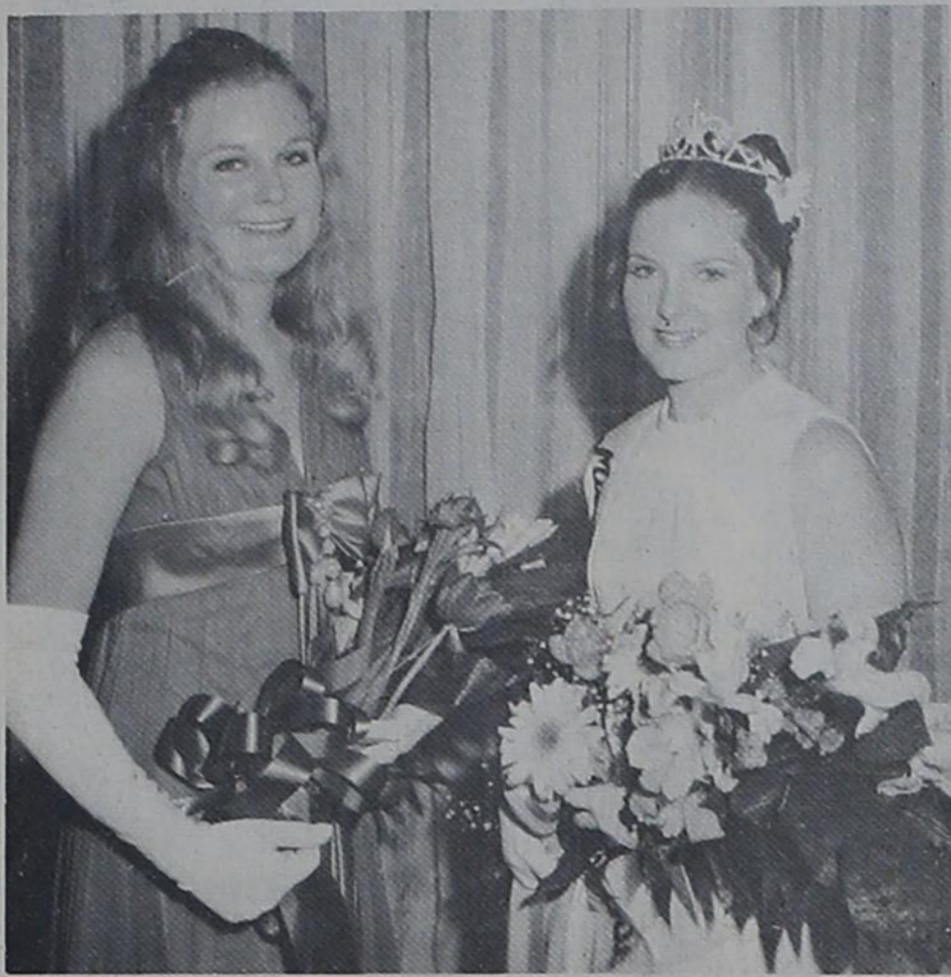
Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a formal

Farmers in Hockley County, Texas, who suffered crop or property losses because of the drought and other natural causes from January 1, 1972 thru June 19, 1972 and who have not received an Emergency loan to assist them in recovering their losses may apply for an Emergency loan at the Farmers Home Administration County Office, 809-8th Street, Levelland, on or before May 8, 1973. Applicants who apply by the deadline will be considered for Emergency loans at 1 percent interest.

In addition, those who qualify will receive a forgiveness benefit on their loan of not to exceed \$5,000 based on losses that are uncompensated by insurance or otherwise.

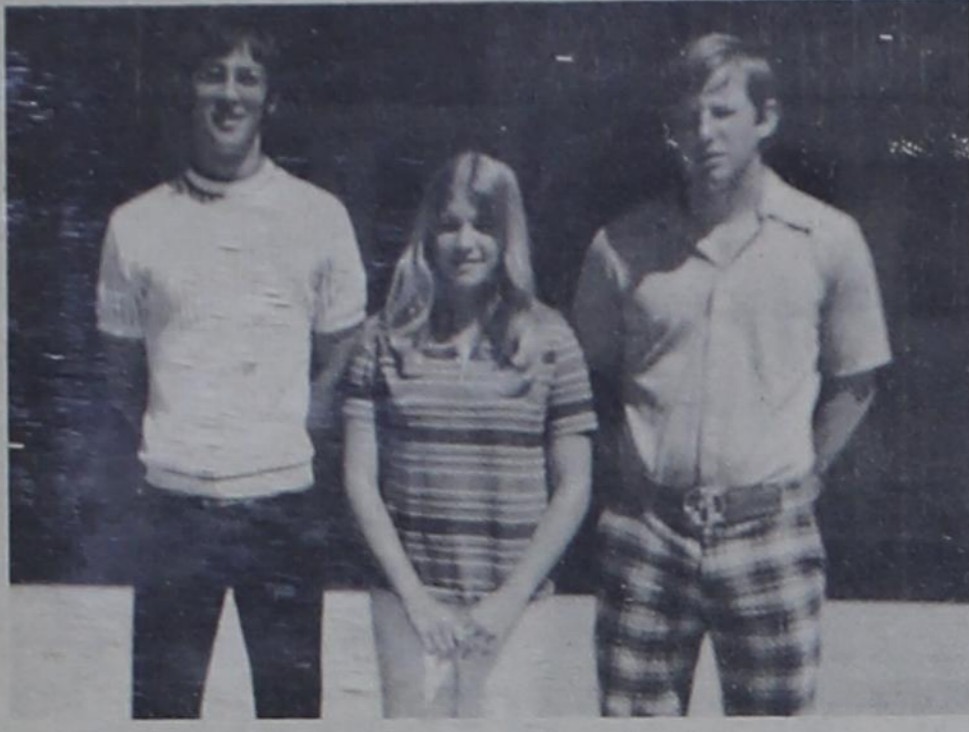

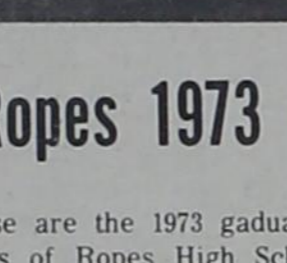

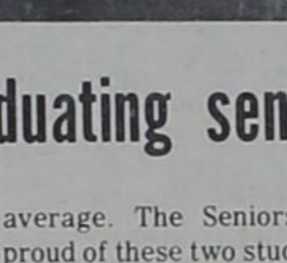

Pam's future plans are to go to Tech and major in speech therapy.

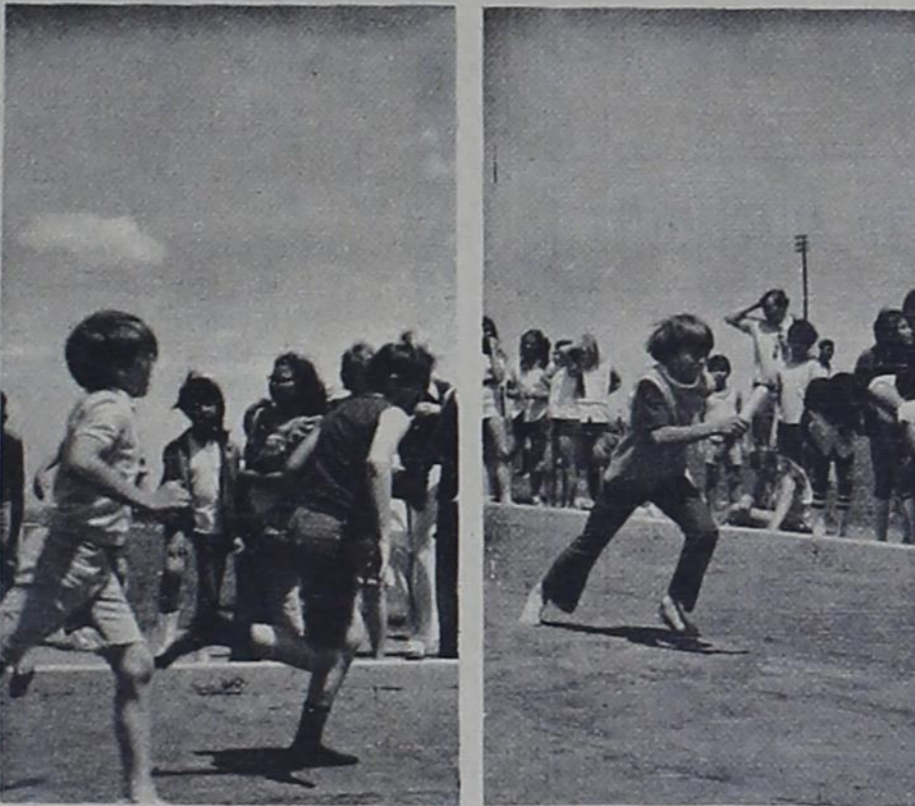
School transfer for 1973-74
