Turkey has been on the lucky side, but back in the summer of 1928 Turkey did have a tornado and it came down about 4:00 p.m. on Sunday afternoon about one-half mile southwest of Turkey and traveled on a northeast course. Several small buildings were torn down and the sheet iron was thrown against a dwelling house, tearing off shingles. Next the gin on the north bank of the creek was hit and the seed house was torn off and scattered along the path. One man had just put his car under a shed to keep it from being hailed on and had gone back to his house when he looked back and saw his car come backing out from the suction of the wind then pushed it back under the shed. He also watched a chicken picked up and it disappeared up in the cloud. Next the tornado hit the Methodist Church and twisted it off the foundation. You would wonder how a tornado could travel completely through town without hitting a dwelling house or without injuring any people. My answer to that would be that it is the best kind of tornado to have. When it reached open country, northeast of town it pulled back into the cloud but had left its calling card and one less chicken.

Social

Security

People who wish to apply for
Social Security retirement benefits but who find it difficult to
visit a Social Security office can apply by telephone. Social Security personnel will obtain the necessary information and then arrange to complete the application process by mail.

An application for retirement

benefits should be made at least 2 or 3 months before the person plans to stop working. This will help assure that benefits will start for the month of retirement. The first check should be received early in the month following the first full month of retirement.

Certain documents are essential for establishing eligibi-lity for retirement benefits. They include a Social Security card or a record of the number and proof date of birth, such as a birth certificate or a religious record of birth or baptism that was recorded before the person was 5 years old. These documents must be original records or copies certified by the agency that issued them.

In the event that original records or certified copies are not available, the best possible evidence of date of birth should be submitted. These include, among others, school and church records, a marriage license, a passport, and employment or military service papers.

Applicants for retirement benefits should also submit their

Wage and Tax statement form (W-2) for the preceding year, and self-employed individuals should submit a copy of their schedule SE. The reason is that the most recent report of earnings may not yet have been credited or applicant's Social Security

lar documentation. In addition, a marriage certificate may be re-quired. The birth certificates and Social Security numbers of eligible should also be submitted.

Additional information about applying for Social Security retirement benefits can be obtained at the Social Security office at 1401-B West 5th Street, or you may call us at 293-9623. Appointments can be arranged if desired.

Research by the Calorie Control Council has shown that the body's natural reaction to a reduction in food intake is to conserve energy, which leads to a reduction in the rate at which calories are burned at rest, making it harder to lose weight. Repeated dieting attempts may teach the body to be more efficient in its use of food so that with each diet the weight comes off more slowly and is regained more

A sensible weight loss program that combines exercise with a cutback in calories has been found to counteract this diet-related decrease in metabolism. In addition to burning calories directly, regular aerobic exercise

can bring the metabolic rate back to normal and in some cases, can speed up metabolism for up to several hours after activity.

Most health professionals agree that the most sensible approach to veight loss is a combination of moderate caloric reduction and increased physical activity. Walk, play tennis, swim, or get out the kids' bike and go for a



Lemon-Vanilla Tea Loaf

1/3 cup butter, softened
1 cup sugar
1/3 cup dairy sour cream
2 eggs
2 teaspoons pure
vanilla extract
1-1/2 cups all-purpose
flour (unsifted)
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
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1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons milk
1/3 cup finely chopped
walnuts
Lemon-Vanilla Topping*

1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour (unsifted)

Preheat oven to 325 F. Grease and flour an 8-inch loaf pan; set aside. In a large bowl with an electric mixer cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in sour cream, eggs and pure vanilla extract. On a square of wax paper combine flour, baking powder, baking sod and salt. On low speed add dry ingredients alternately with milk, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Stir in walnuts. Turn batter into prepared pan; spread evenly to edges. Bake until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean, 50 to 55 minutes. Place pan on a rack. Slowly spoon Lemon-Vanilla Topping over cake. Run spatula around sides of cake to allow excess to drip down. Cool in pan for 10 minutes; turn out onto 2 rest to finish cooling.

*Lemon-Vanilla Topping: In a small bowl combine 1/2 cup sugar, 3 tablespoons fresh lemon juice and 1/2 teaspoon pure vanilla extract.
