Citizens May Have Say In The Continuation of Annual Park Fee

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commissioners will vote on proposed fee increases for hunting, fishing, parks, and other activities at its March 28 Meeting.

Andrew Sansom, executive director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department stated the fee increases are needed because all sources of department revenue are declining.

Money from the fees being proposed will be used to fund all of the activities of the department since it will no longer receive General Revenue funds, Sansom said.

Committee on Library Meets

Quitaque area residents responded favorably to the survey distributed to recognize the need to develop a public library. Seventy-eight surveys were returned representing 190 people.

Mary Kay Wells, coordinator of the Texas Panhandle Library Systems, was in Quitaque Friday March 8, 1991 to review the results of the survey.

She also inspected the old City Hall building upon the recommendation from the City Council that it be used for establishing a public library. Floor plans are now being drawn up to reflect the needs recognized in the surveys.

The Library committee will meet on Thursday, March 14, at 5:00 p.m. at the Community Center to discuss the results of the survey and the next steps to be taken in establishing a public library in Quitaque, anyone who is interested in this project is encouraged to attend.

Several items are on the agenda for these proposed funds, of which development of 400,000 acres of undeveloped State Park lands is one. Keep highly qualified wildlife, fisheries, and park managers who are currently moving to other states because of low salaries are a few others.

Mayor Conner states, "One of the proposals in the Texas Parks and Wildlife proposed restructuring is to eliminate the 'Restricted Annual' permits that allow local residents who are frequent visitors unlimited visits to a specific state park at the one time annual fee which currently is \$13. I think this will tend to create barriers between the local citizens and the park—a sense of being pushed aside. 'Quitaque' has publicized Caprock Canyons State Park and worked very closely with park management. We want to try and stop any barriers being put up. Fee increases are necessary and annual permits at an increased fee are acceptable, but no annual permits would be unacceptable for our locals."

"Caprock Canyons State Park is an intimate part of this

community," according to Chamber of Commerce President, Steve Ulrey. "We feel a tremendous amount of pride in the fact that Caprock Canyons is one of the fastest growing parks in the state in visitation."

"The Chamber will continue to support the Park and its management in our promotional efforts and development plans."

"We heartily oppose any move to discontinue restricted use permits, which provide entrance to a specific park for an annual fee. This would adversely affect the community's relationship with Caprock Canyons by making many residents feel excluded," says Ulrey.

Fire Damages Grassland

Tuesday, March 5, during the high wind and sand, a grass fire was fought at Silverton, a fire at the Turner Gin at Flomot and a grass fire between Turkey and Northfield on land leased by Saul Cattle Company and the Turkey Creek Shoe Nail Ranch.

The Bridle Bit Ranch fire began first at the south west corner of the Saul Ranch and continued to burn eastward for

about five miles. Four pastures were involved. Mr. Saul stated that probably one half of four different pastures bordering the highway was lost.

The fire hopped and skipped around due to the high winds. On the south side of the highway on the Shoe Nail Ranch the worst of the burned area was from the Motley County line east. The fire traveled all the way to the river bridge on the south side of the highway. Estimates are from three to five sections for the Shoe Nail Ranch and the majority of the fences along the highway.

Saul estimated his loss of grass at around 2000 acres and several miles of fence. Wednesday, Thursday and Friday stumps were still smoldering.

The land is dry, the winds are high and fire easily started. Be very cautious when using any type of fire outdoors.

Do you know that you can greatly extend the life of your perm by caring for it correctly? Bryant Renfro, a New York City hairstylist who specializes in working with television stars, offers the following suggestions for behind-the-scenes maintenance that will make your curls last longer.

Water Ways
 • Rinse hair well before shampooing. Many hair styling aids are water soluble and will rinse right out. When hair is thoroughly wet first, your shampoo works better, you need less, and it lathers up more completely.

• Don't worry about lathering the ends of your hair. Even if your hair is long, the ends will rinse clean as the shampoo and water work through. Concentrate on cleaning your scalp.

• If you shampoo in the shower, bend over so that the water pummels the underside of your hair, not the top, to keep the fullness in your curls.

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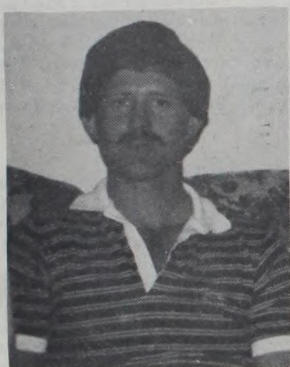

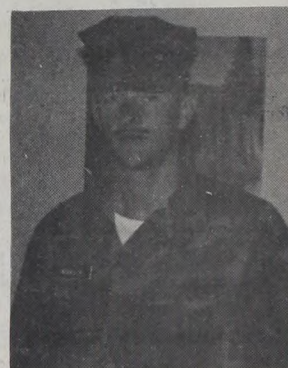

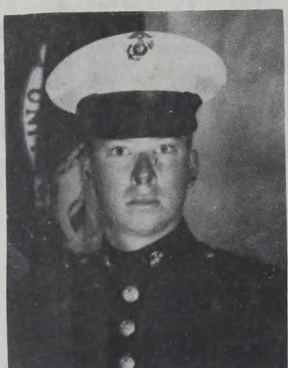

A Gigabyte of Knowledge

The computer world, some say, seems to move faster than a 486 chip. Happily, a handy reference book can help you keep up with its changing technology and jargon.

Called *The Computer Glossary*, it's by computer expert Alan Freedman, who keeps track of everything to do with computers—concepts, jargon, products, the industry—and defines it all in plain, pithy English. Now in its fifth edition, this lavishly praised bestseller, published by Amacom Books, includes 4,300 updated definitions, 400 photos and drawings and reference charts for codes and specs. Readers will find the latest on desktop publishing, LANs and WANs, windows and the new vendors on the block.

"When you hear a computer term, you may not know if it's generic or vendor-proprietary," the author notes. "This book is the only one to include both kinds of terms—all the real computer words that people hear and use. It doesn't waste time including arcane phrases that only fatten up a book and provide no meaning whatsoever."

Chosen for *Library Journal's* short list of the Year's Best Science-Technology Books and for *Computer Review's* Maevenec Award, this mega-glossary is also a mini-encyclopedia and a micro-

history. Freedman's tidbits on the industry's major players and breakthrough moments are compulsively readable. Users also appreciate the complete cross-referencing and bold, easy-to-read print. The book is so thorough and user-friendly it was selected for inclusion on Ziff-Davis' CD-ROM "Computer Library," the popular computer periodicals database.
