A gavel brings to order a political convention. But who brings order to the million details that go into the gavel-to-gavel coverage of political conventions on television? Behind the NBC coverage of the Republican and Democrat conventions are a dozen unit managers whose job it is to see to everything from housing and headpieces to "how can we get this done in time?"

One of these men is Gene

One of these men is Gene Whitlock who has been a unit manager for various NBC shows since 1956. At the conventions he is the NBC unit manager in charge of production and related business matters for Gulf Oil Corporation, which again is sponsoring the television and radio coverage, Mr. Whitlock sees to it that the film libraries at both convention sites have the programmed commercials ready for use at the right time. He knows the running time and the intricacies of scheduling. He works with the advertising agencies in assuring the air quality of the film or tape and he must be ready for every contingency.
