SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES -

A youth injured in an autom bile accident in 1966 and facing a long period of recuperation wantous surprised to find that he not worked for social security long enough to qualify for disability penefits.

A change included in the 1967 amendments, however. reduces the amount of work credit needed to qualify for disability benefits. Today the worker and his family are collecting nearly \$2,800 a year, haved on his average, pay of \$2,500 based on his average pay of \$3,500 before he became disabled.

before he became disabled.

This and other examples are included in a new social security booklet announced this week by Travis C. Briggs, the social security district manager in Amarillo, Texas. The booklet, "Social Security for Young Families," tells in detail how social security operates for the young worker.

primarily a retirement plan," Briggs said in announcing the booklet. "Actually, over the years, naintenance and financial secur

Briggs noted, of the 24 million persons currently receiving social security benefits — some 2.2 mil-tion are disabled — workers — and their dependents, and about 3.4 million persons are widows and children of deceased workers rereiving survivors benefits. The booklet explains how a young worker builds up survivors and disability protection, what it can mean to a family, and how to make an application should it become necessary. Also included is information on how to check your social security account and the financing of social security.

The booklet is especially impor-tant since the 1967 amendments include a number of changes of particular importance to young workers and their dependents, Briggs said.



Saftey is the most important factor Sattey is the most important factor to remember in the upcoming hunting season, says Wallace Klussmann, Extension wildlife conservation specialist at Texas A&M University. Nearly all hunting accidents could be prevented if gun safety rules are followed.

It's the "over - anxious" hunter who endangers the lives of fellow hunters and causes needless dam-age to wildlife. Approximately age to wildlife. Approximately two - thirds of all hunting accidents are caused by humans in the line of fire, humans mistaken nimals and hunters not using the

animals and hunters not using the safety catch on their guns.

Hunting only in season and respecting the bag limits are rules of good hunting sportsmanship, says the specialist. Also never throw away a lighted eigarette or leave a huming campfire since either can burning campfire, since either can start a destructive grass or forest


