BRISCOE COUNTY From The County Agent's Desk

A number of Briscoe County armers and ranchers, along with about 40,000 other Texas livestock producers, will receive a most im portant questionnaire during the last half of November.

It will come from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, and it should be fillossible.

Here's why: The information gained from the questionnaires will be the basis for the official estimates of livestock numbers eat-tle, hogs and poultry for the State of Texas and for each county The survey on sheep and goats wil be made in late December.

Accurate estimates are of great importance to stockmen in plan-ning production, marketings and for providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided for the program of estimates for each county because state to tals alone do not provide adequate information on our most basic industry. The program of estimates is a cooperative effort of the U S. Department of Agriculture's Statisticalr Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agricul-ture which depends upon the reporting producers for the needed information.

I urge each producer who re-ceives a questionnaire from the Reporting Service to fill out completely for his farm or ranch and return it in the enclosed postage-





SOIL TESTING

The end of the growing season an ideal time for taking and etting soil samples tested. Don' vait until the spring rush of field work to do this important job. Common tests are for pH, cal-cium and magnesium, needed as a basis for liming. Levels of nitro gen, phosphorus, and potassium are also measured. In addition, suitable methods have been developed for testing for the micronutrient

Soil sample boxes, information heets and tips on how to take soil samples are all available from the offices of county agents throughout the state. I welcome the oppor unity to discuss soil sampling and testing with interested persons. The of soil testing is well known demonstration results are available in the county office to further emphasize its importance.

CERTAIN WEAPONS AND FIREARMS MUST BE REGISTERED

an unregistered machine gun, saw-ed-off shotgun, short barreled rifle or other gangster-type weapon, or a device such as a bomb, grenade or land mine, may register it with the Internal Revenue Service with-out penalty from Nov. 2 through December 1, according to B. Frank White, Regional Commissioner, Southwest Region IRS.

The Gun Control Act of 1968, igned into law recently, establish es a 30-day period for the regis-tration of certain weapons and destructive devices. The registration ary rifles, shotguns, pistols and re-

The Gun Control Law provides that information or evidence sub-mitted in registering a weapon during this period cannot be used against the registrant in any criminal proceeding arising out of a prior or concurrent violation of the law. However, this would not false information.

Firearms and devices covered by the regigstration requirements must be registered by filing Form 4467 ,in duplicate, with Director Alcohol & Tobacco Tax Division Internal Revenue Service, Washington, D. C. 20224.

"Anyone with a weapon to register." White said, "should write or phone an office of the IRS and ob-tain a copy of Form 4467. Weapons and devices should not be brought to IRS offices for the purpose of registration '

Former servicemen should regster any automatic weapon, pisols with shoulder stocks, or other might have as a souvenir of their

Anyone with a bomb or grenade hould make sure it is de-activated. The IRS can make arrange ments to have the device inspected und de-activated.

The registration requirement for gangster-type weapons date back to the National Firearms Act of 1934. There is no federal registration requirement for ordinary rifles, shotguns, pistols and revolvers, although certain controls on the sales of these weapons become effective December 16, as part of the new gun law.



ontrol act, will be subject to im up to \$10,000 or both for each weapon not registered. Under certain conditions, the law provides civil penalties and property for ember 1 as required by the gun feiture
