The annual Briscoe County 4-H Achievement Banquet will highlight the special 4-H Week observance in Silvertown Saturday night, October 7, at 8:00 p.m. in the Silvertown School Cafeteria. This annual event is held to honor county 4-H members, parents and adult leaders who have worked during the past year to make the 4-H program a success.

4-H'ers Are A Dog's Best Friend



SPECIAL - A dog is a 4-H'ers best friend to some 117,000 4-H member participants in the national 4-H dog care and training program, sponsored by the Ralston Purina Company. "And if dogs could talk, they might reverse that statement," says T.W. Thompson, assistant director of the National 4-H Service Committee, who has been closely associated with the program for 14 years. Caring for and training a dog is something that can be done by 4-H members wherever they live in cities, small towns or on the farm. The 4-H members in the dog care and training program come from all of these areas. Club members involved in the program, not only take care of their family dogs, but they raise and train dogs that aid others, notably the blind. Marianne DuBois, of El Centro, California, raised and

trained seeing eye guide dogs for the blind. Miss DuBois, who was a national winner last year in the 4-H dog care and training program, also recruited and taught other 4-H'ers how to raise dogs for the blind. "You need a love of animals and a love of people to succeed in this project," Miss DuBois says, "I already have learned patience, the ability to use psychology on both dogs and people, and how to be a weight-watcher for a bunch of Labradors." Ronald Chavez, of Faxon, Oklahoma, another 1971 national winner, set up his own dog kennel for other dog owners. He now plans to start a dog obedience school, for dogs and their owners. Besides the satisfaction of caring and training your own dog, or dogs for other people, 4-H members who participate in the dog care and training program can receive other benefits. Ralston Purina offers four gold medals of honor for outstanding 4-H'ers in each county. State winners in the program receive a transistor radio. The Cooperative Extension Service selects 18 sectional winners from among the state winners. These members receive an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 26-30. Scholarships of \$700 are given to six national winners at the Congress. Ralston Purina Company also gives educational assistance to the program through offering visuals, record forms and attractive instructional materials on canine care and training. For more information about the 4-H dog care and training program contact the county extension office.

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Boys Join Girls in 4-H Dress Revue



SPECIAL - Another barrier to males has fallen! 4-H boys all across the country can now participate in the 1972 national dress revue program, sponsored by the Simplicity Pattern Co., Inc. Previously, boys served only as escorts, while the girls were eligible for the competition. Now, for the first time, boys, as well as girls, can make their own garments, model them in the dress revue program, and be eligible for recognition awards provided by Simplicity.

Each state and Puerto Rico will select a girl or boy, from the thousands of county medal winners to represent them in the National 4-H Dress Revue. These 51 lucky 4-H'ers will receive an expense paid trip to the National 4-H Congress, in Chicago, Nov. 26-30.

During the Congress, the 51 boys and girls will be honored by Simplicity at a special dinner and preview of spring fashions. At the conclusion of the 1972 dress revue, six outstanding members will be awarded \$700 scholarships.

Simplicity also provides added support of the 4-H dress revue program through assistance of 4-H stylists and publications on modeling.

STATE LAW REDUCES AUTO INSURANCE RATE

A state law became effective on September 1, 1972, whereby a person(s) completing an eight-hour Defensive Driving Course approved by the Texas Safety Association, may receive a ten percent reduction on the insurance rate for his family car.

Frank Phillips College now has qualified instructors and Defensive Driving Courses will be offered upon receipt of the necessary materials from the National Defensive Driving Council.

Since there are restrictions on coverage, prospective students should check with their own insurance agents before registering for the course.

Class schedules will be announced as soon as possible, possibly within the next two weeks. The complete cost of the course will be \$10.00 per student.

FRANK PHILLIPS FALL ENROLLMENT IS UP

Enrollment at Frank Phillips College, Borger, for the 1972-73 fall semester ended last Wednesday, September 20, with the college showing a 2% increase.

The fall semester enrollment for 1971-72 was 576 in comparison with 590 for this fall.

The increase is attributed to the high academic standards of FPC, addition of several new courses and an intensive public relations program.

The college officials and other personnel are very happy about this increase, since college attendance is down in many areas of the nation.

Spring semester registration is scheduled for January 11 and 12, 1973, in the James W. Dillard Library.

WAYLAND SETS ALL-TIME ENROLLMENT RECORD

Wayland Baptist College set an all-time record enrollment this fall and accomplished an almost unbelievable feat for any college, especially a private one. Wayland shows a 22 percent increase over last year.

Final registration for the fall stands at 932 compared with 761 last fall. The previous record was set in 1965 when the final total was 780.

Though final geographical breakdowns are not complete, there are at least 31 states and 6 foreign countries represented in the present student body. Of the 932 students, around 700 are from Texas.

New Mexico contributes 95 students to the total, Colorado 38 and Oklahoma 22. Eight students come from California, six from Alaska and five from Indiana. There are four students from Montana and Ohio; and three from Illinois, Kentucky, Missouri and New York.

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REP. PURCELL GARNERS PERFECT RATING OF 100

U. S. Rep. Graham Purcell (D-Tex) has garnered a rating of a perfect "100" in the American Security Council's "National Security Voting Index of 1972." Purcell was notified in his Washington office that on the basis of his votes on

ten key national security measures, his record had earned a perfect rating.

Heading the list of votes which made up the index was a vote in June, 1971, on a powerful House amendment to cut off funds for military activities in Indochina. Purcell's leadership and vote ag-

ainst the amendment earned him not only the support of the American Security Council, but also an immediate letter of appreciation from President Nixon. Purcell was told by the President that his efforts "helped materially to strengthen our ability to achieve a ceasefire, achieve the release of American prisoners, and negotiate a just peace."

Purcell, a Lt. Colonel in the active U. S. Army reserves, led combat troops in Northern Africa and Italy during World War II. "The security of this Nation against forces which would attack it from afar must never be taken for granted," Purcell said in accepting his notification of the perfect rating.

Congressman Purcell has been to South Vietnam twice at the request of Congressional leaders to survey the American presence there. Additionally, Purcell has inspected American bases and the NATO security system throughout Europe for the Congress.

The American Security Council is a Washington-based association of citizens concerned with United States defense and security policy.

KEY HOUSE APPOINTMENTS RECENTLY MADE IN AUSTIN

Key House committee appointments of particular importance to the Panhandle were made recently by House Speaker Rayford Price. The appointments were made prior to new legislation expected to flood the legislative body due to Governor Smith's opening the call of the Special Session.

Junior leadership is a popular project for the older 4-H members. They get an opportunity to help younger 4-H members with their projects and plan and conduct county-wide activities. Also this past year Briscoe County was selected to attend the 4-H Electric Camp for junior leaders, and seven older 4-H members from this county participated in the training at Scott Able 4-H Camp near Cloudcroft, New Mexico.

The 4-H contests held in the spring gave 4-H members an opportunity to "learn by doing" and improve their abilities in speaking before an audience, exercising their judgment, making decisions, planning and preparation and competing with other members. Thirty-two 4-H members from Briscoe County competed in the District

4-H contests in Lubbock in May. The members took part in horse judging, livestock judging, dairy judging, share-the-fun, vegetable preparation and use demonstration and natural resources demonstration.

It has been a busy but a fruitful year for 4-H members here in Briscoe County. Activity is what keeps a strong program like 4-H going and it takes the support of



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the entire community to do so. This is something Briscoe County has and can be proud of.

As the old project year is closed out with the annual Awards Banquet, new and increased numbers of projects have begun or are beginning for the coming year.

Twenty-two 4-H members have 45 lambs on feed, 11 4-H members have 13 steers on feed and 21 4-H

members have or will have over 50 barrows on feed for the winter stock shows. In addition to the livestock projects on feed for the shows, four 4-H members are carrying breeding sheep as a project, three members have breeding swine projects, at least one member is carrying stocker calves as a project and another member has begun a rabbit project.

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
