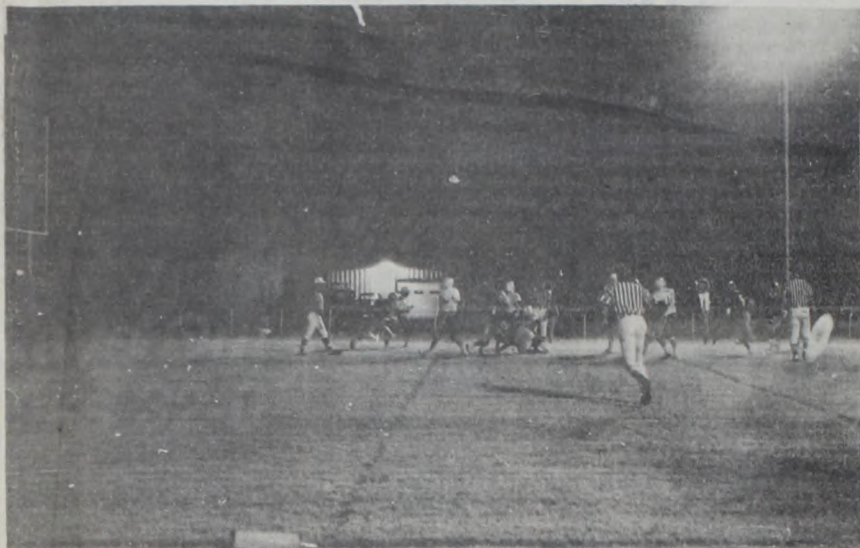
Robby To Have Brain Surgery

Robby Harmon, 18 year-old son of Robin and Pam Harmon of Quitaque, was scheduled to return to Parkland Hospital on November 8, 1989, where he will undergo brain surgery for treatment of severe epileptic seizures. He was to be in orientation with his doctors at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, prior to being registered into the hospital.

Surgery is tentatively set for sometime Thursday, November 9, 1989. Doctors will perform the surgery on the left side of his head, in the left anterior temporal lobe of the brain, which controls memory function. All seizure activity tissue in this area will be removed. However, past seizure activity has already affected memory function on the left side and the right temporal lobe has compensated for any dysfunction on the left side. Medical experts are hopeful the surgery will not alter any memory function.

According to the family, if all goes as planned, Robby will remain hospitalized for 5 or 6 days, before returning to his home in Quitaque. He will continue medication for one year, and barring any complications, he will be seizure-free.

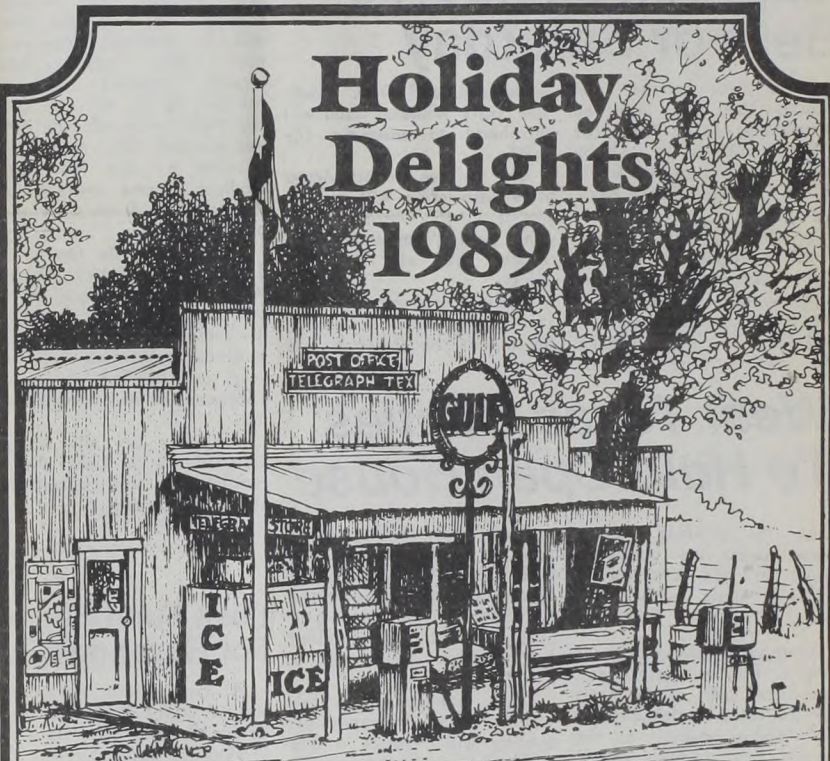

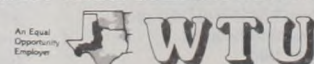
