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Redding Funeral Held Tuesday

Mrs. Ruth Redding passed away Monday morning, June 24 at 6:30 in Lockney General Hospital where she had been a patient for the past two weeks.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the First Methodist Church of Quitaque where she had been a long-time member. She was a charter member of the W.S.C.S. of that church. The pastor, Rev. James Williams, officiated at the memorial service. Burial was in Rest Haven Cemetery by Quitaque Funeral Home. Her husband Clarence Redding, died in December, 1966.

Jamie Ruth Redding was born September 24, 1913 at Jermy, Jack County, Texas. She was the daughter of W. E. and the late Mrs. Lemons. The Lemons family came to Briscoe County from Graham in 1929. She was married to Clarence Redding January 23, 1933 at Silvertown.

She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Bennie Dale Garman of Perryton; her father, W. E. Lemons of Lubbock; a brother, Ralph Lemons of Floydada; one sister, Mrs. W. C. FORMER MEMBER OF GREEN BERETS BURIED RECENTLY AT TURKEY

Robert Wayne Thomas, son of Mrs. Mary Thomas of Rockwell, formerly of Turkey, died Thursday, June 6, in the Veterans Hospital in Temple after an illness of several years.

He was born August 26, 1937, in Muenster, Texas, the son of the late Jimmie Doak Thomas and Mary Pope Thomas. His father preceded him in death in 1957.

Mr. Thomas attended and graduated from high school in Big Spring, Texas, and attended college one year at North Texas State University. He joined the military services in 1962 and served through 1965, one year of which was in Vietnam. He was a sergeant in the Special Forces of the Green Berets.

After military duty he underwent surgery at Brooke General Hospital in San Antonio and in 1967 was admitted to Temple VA Hospital in October. He returned home in December of 1967, and re-entered the hospital February 8, 1968, for the remainder of his life. His mother moved to Rockwell in February, 1963.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday, June 8, at 3 P.M. at the First Baptist Church in Turkey. The Rev. Bob Smith officiated.

Interment was in the Turkey Cemetery with Martin Funeral Home of Rockwell in charge of arrangement.

Safety Director Advises Heads-Up Driving on Holiday

AUSTIN - The acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today called for "heads up" driving on the part of Texas motorists over the upcoming four-day Fourth of July weekend to help bring about a reduction in the estimated toll of 38 lives in traffic during the holiday period.

Wilson E. (Pat) Speir announced that "Operation Motorcade," a special emphasis program designed to focus attention on the added dangers of holiday travel, will be placed in effect from 6 p.m. Wednesday, July 3, through 11:59 p.m. Sunday, July 7.

Traffic fatalities will be tabulated by the DPS throughout the period, and the totals will be announced officially three times daily as a means of keeping safety upmost in the minds of the motoring public, he said.

"It is a known fact that the usually crowded conditions of the highways on Independence Day holidays makes driving more hazardous than usual," Speir said. "Past experiences and the present trend of traffic deaths indicate that 38 persons will lose their lives in traffic accidents during the 102-hour period of the holiday this year, according to DPS Statistical Services. This means that on the average one person will be killed in traffic every two and a-half hours."

"Of course, we hope this proves to be too high an estimate, and will do everything we can to keep down the expected toll of lives and suffering from accidents. As part of this effort, we will be utilizing additional personnel from our other uniformed services to augment the regular Highway Patrol force during the holiday period."

"However, the most important effort needs to come from the drivers themselves who, of course, have the most at stake. We can talk all we please about inadequate highways, we can talk about mechanical defects, but in the end the vast majority of all accidents and fatalities can be traced directly to misbehavior, misjudgment, recklessness, negligence, and mixing drinking and driving."

SHIRT SLEEVE SERMON

"Salt of the Earth"
 by Robert Gauer

Jesus declared to his disciples,
 "Ye are the salt of the earth."
 Perhaps he had reference to the
 preserving quality of salt. His dis-
 ciples were to add to society a
 quality that would preserve it
 from moral decay. This was
 meant, yes, but there was more.

Salt permeates everything it
 touches. Put a little of it into a

 soon becomes salty. The Gospel
 of Jesus is like that. It is not

CONTROL OF IRON AND ZINC DEFICIENCY IN LAWNS AND GARDENS

Gardeners and homeowners in Briscoe County may be noting the yellowing of leaves on some of their fruit trees, ornamentals and lawn grasses during this season. This condition known as chlorosis results from iron and zinc deficiency.

Chlorosis is caused by the inability of plants to take up sufficient iron which is essential for the development of chlorophyll, the green pigment in leaves.

Primary causes of the disorder are high lime content of the soil and excessive use of phosphate fertilizer.

In addition to fruit trees, oaks and maples, ornamentals such as roses, pyracantha, abelia, hollies and photinia are susceptible.

Regardless of the type of shrub

or tree, chlorosis can be easily spotted, explains the agent. Leaves will yellow between the veins early in the growing season. Veins usually remain green but, in extreme cases, the entire leaf yellows and may be almost white in appearance.

Grass tends to turn yellow in spots and close observation may reveal a striping of the leaf with green veins and yellowing in between.

Chlorosis can be controlled by spraying the foliage until wet with a solution of iron sulfate (copperas). For trees and shrubs, use two level tablespoons of copperas per three gallons of water and include about one and one-half detergent to insure even coverage. For grasses, increase the amount of copperas to three level tablespoons in the same mixture. Three or four applications at weekly intervals may be required for effective control.

In addition to foliar spray, applications of copperas are recommended. One pound of copperas per 100 square feet of area broadcast and watered is adequate.

Chelated iron compounds are also effective for controlling chlorosis when applied as directed by the manufacturer.

Copperas will stain masonry and other material or equipment if left in contact. Remove solutions by rinsing and sweep walks clean of material immediately after application.

Additional information on chlorosis in gardens and lawns is found in Leaflet 4-35 available at the County Extension Office.

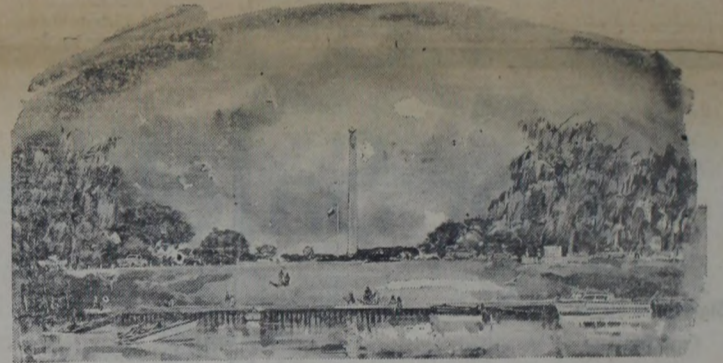

SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES

Many widows may now be able to get social security benefits as early as age 50, according to Travis C. Briggs of the Amarillo social security office. A recent change in the law allows widows, 50 or older, who are unable to work because of a severe disability, and whose husbands worked

long enough under social security, to receive reduced monthly benefits.

This new change also applies to women who were divorced from their husbands at the time of his death, but had been married to him at least 20 years and were still supported by him when he died.

Under the new law, a widow may be considered disabled, if she has an impairment so severe that it would ordinarily prevent her from working. Vocational factors such as age, education, and previous work experience are not considered.

To be eligible, Briggs said, a widow must be at least 50 years of age and a severe disability that started either before her husband's death or within seven years after his death. An exception is made if she received benefits as a widow with children. In this case, dis-

ability may begin at any time up to seven years after her payments as a widow ended.

The amount of the benefit depends on what her husband's retirement rate would have been had he been 65 at the time of his death, and how old the widow is when she starts getting checks. A full widow's benefit payable at age 62 is 82 and one-half per cent of her deceased husband's retirement benefit. If she starts receiving disability payments at an earlier age, her monthly benefit will be permanently reduced. Payments can start for the seventh full month of disability, but the first month for which payment can be made under the new provision is February 1968.

Briggs urges all widows who think they may be eligible to get in touch with the Amarillo social security office.
