Valley Lassoes Claude Mustangs

The Valley Patriots hosted the Claude Mustangs at Patriot Stadium Friday night in the season opener, winning 26-0.

Team captains for the night were seniors Jesse Chavira, Robbie Harmon, Shane House, John Harmon, Brandon Stark, Scott Garner and Lance Fulbright.

Claude won the coin toss and elected to receive. Scoring was futile however, until the second quarter. With 11:49 on the clock, Valley's Bubba Clardy carried the ball 73 yards giving the Patriots their first touchdown of the night. The extra point attempt failed.

Three minutes, twenty-one seconds later, Valley added a second touchdown when Lance Fulbright scored from three yards out. The two-point conversion pass from Fulbright to Garner

was good, giving Valley a 14-0 lead over Claude at halftime.

During the third quarter, Valley prevailed with the scoring of two additional touchdowns. Stark scored on a three yard run with 3:18 remaining on the clock. The extra point try failed. Clardy scored his second TD of the night on a ten yard run. Extra point was no good.

The Patriot offensive line of Jon Pigg, Jason Little, Chad Isbell, Benjie Hughes, Shane House, John Harmon and Jesse Chavira did a good job blocking for the backs. They led Valley to 293 yards rushing with 15 first downs. Leading rushers were Clardy with 13 carries for 171 yards and Stark with 16 carries for 108 yards.

The defense did an outstanding job holding the

Mustangs nine times inside the twenty, allowing only six first downs.

The Patriots travel to Lorenzo Friday, September 9 for an 8 p.m. kick-off. Show your support by attending and cheering the Patriots on to victory.

Coach Price encourages everyone to come out and support our Junior Patriots.

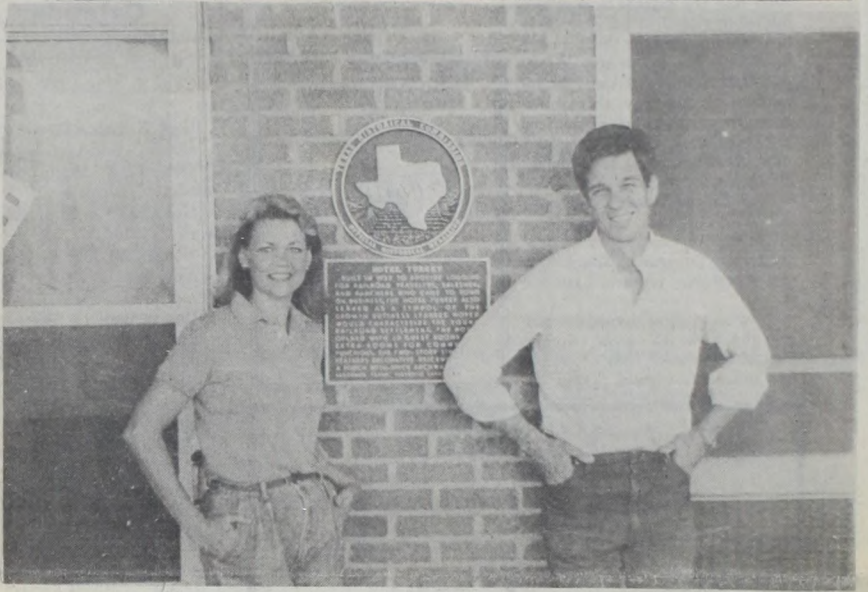
Proposed Ordinance City Council Topic

The Quitaque City Council meet in a special public hearing last Monday night at 7:30 p.m. to discuss and hear public opinion of a proposed ordinance regulating dogs in the city limits. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Conner. Councilmen present were W. L. Merrell, Danny Mayfield, O. R. Stark, Larry Price, and Randy Powell. Twenty citizens signed-in at this hearing.

The proposed ordinance reads as follows: This ordinance required vaccination of dogs, set out procedures for impounding and redeeming dogs, fees for impoundment, required restraint of dogs, described vicious dogs and procedures for their impoundment, set out procedures for destroying unclaimed dogs, and dealt with animals displaying rabies-like symptoms.

Each section of the proposed ordinance was discussed individually, with citizens being given the opportunity to comment and/or suggest additions, deletions, or amendments to each section.

The proposed ordinance was to be considered by the City Council at its regular meeting on Monday night September, 5, 1988.

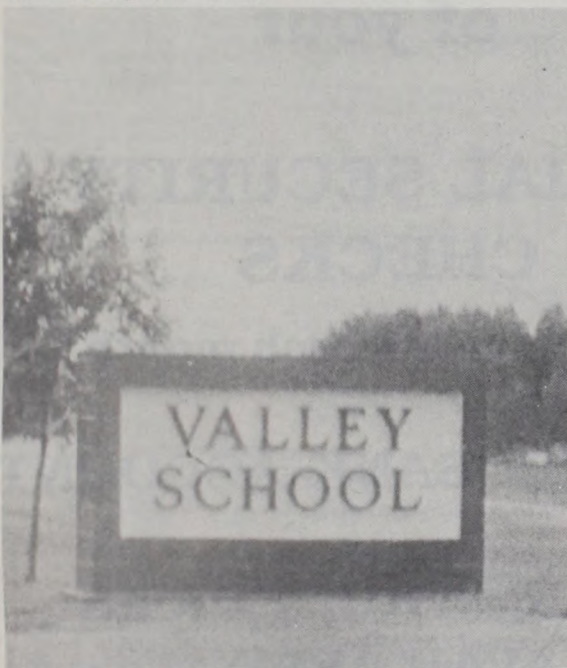
Valley Booster Club will meet every Tuesday night in the Cafeteria at school, at 7:30 p.m. Supporters of The Patriots are encouraged to attend.

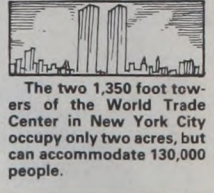

WTU Asks For Rate Increase

West Texas Utilities Co. has asked for permission to increase fuel factors effective on January 1989 bills. In the request filed today with the Public Utility Commission the company stated that the primary reason for the increase is the expiration of a 20-year gas supply contract at the Rio Pecos Power Station.

"This contract was essentially a fixed price contract which let us buy fuel at pre-1973 Oil Embargo Prices," said WTU local manager Keith Edwards. "Compared to the average cost of fuel during the last 20 years, this 22 cents per million BTU gas will have saved our customers almost \$350 million by the time the contract expires in late December 1988," she said. That includes the period in the early 1980s when average fuel prices had reached \$4 per million BTUs before declining to \$1.95 in 1987.

The company will continue to operate its system in a way that will minimize fuel cost and is presently studying gas supply proposals. However, WTU expects to pay eight to ten times more for replacement gas than the cost of the expiring contract.

The local manager emphasized that this change is tied primarily to expiration of one contract. Since 1985 WTU has lowered the factor five times, and had six refunds totaling almost \$50 million as a result of other contract changes.

WTU filed the request four months before the effective date of the factors to allow the commission time to review the request and process it through necessary channels.

Under the request a typical residential customer using 635 kilowatt-hours a month would see an increase of \$2.97 or 5.7 percent per month on the electric bill.
