## GREAT TRASH-OFF: Spring cleaning time in Texas

Texas will be cleaner and greener on April 4, when more than 82,000 volunteers scour state highways, county roads and city streets and parks in the 13th annual Great Texas Trash-Off.

Statewide, 1,840 Adopt-a-Highway groups will pick up litter on state roadways. Keep Texas Beautiful volunteers in 100 communities will concentrate their cleanups on city streets and parks. Altogether, the volunteers expect to collect more than 6.8 million gallons of litter.

One of the nation's largest single-day litter pickup events, the Trash-Off is organized by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and Keep Texas Beautiful (KTB). The one-day event reminds people of the state's natural beauty by providing cleaner, safer roads, streets and parks.

"Thousands of Texans are turning their convictions into action by giving their Saturday to clean up their communities," said Doris Howdeshell, director of TxDOT's Travel Division. "These volunteers are role models. We hope the sense of pride they foster will cause their neighbors and visitors to stop and think before they litter."

The Great Texas Trash-Off is part of the TxDOT's "Don't Mess with Texas" public awareness campaign. The litter prevention program, which includes Don't Mess with Texas, Adopt-a-Highway, and a grassroots partnership with Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc., works to change the attitudes and the behavior of would-be litterers. By reducing the amount of trash on state highways, these programs are saving taxpayers \$2-\$4 million in litter pickup expenditures each year.

**BATTLEFRONTS IN THE WAR ON DRUGS**

The north Dallas community of Plano is the kind of place in which many families aspire to live: green and attractive, upscale, with good schools and lots of public-spirited citizens working to make it even better. At first glance, this is the last spot in America you'd think would have a drug problem.

But in 1997 eight Plano youngsters lost their lives to heroin. An epidemic of drug use has spilled from the inner city into suburban and rural enclaves once thought immune.

Having reached the saturation point of death and destruction in urban neighborhoods, drug traffickers are targeting kids living in suburbs all over the country. Make no mistake. They are marketing their deadly commodities on a massive scale. The Justice Department says the amount of heroin seized from South America has doubled in the past four years.

One strategy the federal government is using to fight the drug plague is the so-called HIDTA. No, we're not talking about an endangered desert critter. The acronym refers to a High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area designation. The Office of National Drug Control Policy sets up HDTAs to coordinate anti-drug law enforcement efforts in designated areas that have severe or unusual drug trafficking problems. The idea is to tailor anti-drug efforts to local conditions.

Texas has three such designated areas already, the Houston HIDTA, the West Texas HIDTA and the South Texas HIDTA (which in turn are part of the Southwest Border HIDTA). These have become the centerpiece of drug law enforcement in our state.

We are working on the designation of a third HIDTA, to take in the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex. (As you might imagine, a majority of the people in Plano favor this proposal.) And East Texas is in preparing a proposal for the designation, as well.

HDTAs work by pooling both resources and information. One early success was the dismantling of one segment of the Amado Carrillo-Fuentes iportrunner gang, which is known to have brought 4,000 loads of drugs across the border in 1994 and 1995. Their favorite method of operation is to simply run their drug-laden vehicles through the ports-of-entry in El Paso and Ysleta without stopping — for Customs agents, pedestrians, or anyone else. The near elimination of this practice was accomplished by a Southwest Border HIDTA task force led by the U.S. Customs Service.

The Houston HIDTA, which was created in 1990, focused on money-laundering. It has been successful in interrupting the smooth flow of drugs north and money south, out of the country. Because of Houston's proximity to Mexico, its large illegal population, international trade status and transportation infrastructure, by the early 1990s the city had become a distribution focal point for drugs — and drug money.

The Houston HIDTA's comprehensive approach has had a major impact on the money laundering business. In 1990, more than 100 igiroi houses (money wiring businesses) operated in the area. They processed more than \$450 million in wire transfers, a substantial portion of which were going to Columbia. After a one-two punch of a HIDTA crackdown and new, stricter regulation of the industry, the number of igiroi houses shrank to eight and the amount of money transferred annually diminished to less than \$10 million.

Illegal drugs continue to take a frightening toll on our society. And Texas, through which more than three-quarters of the drugs coming into the country pass, is horribly vulnerable. The battle lines in the drug war are being drawn across our state. The casualties are numerous: 20,000 Americans died of drugs or drug-related violence last year. We must not lose the will to fight this war to victory. 2.20.98

**Brown Named to FLBA Board of Directors**

Members of the Panhandle-Plains Federal Land Bank Association (FLBA) Board of Directors recently named Briscoe County resident Steve Brown as board-appointed director. Brown began his three-year term earlier this month.

Aside his farming duties in Briscoe County, Brown has owned and operated Brown Implement, in Floydada, for almost ten years. Previously, Brown was in the implement business in Turkey.

Since their relocation to Floydada almost ten years ago, Brown and his wife, Marie, have enjoyed being active members in their community.

Currently, Brown serves on the board of the Floydada Country Club and is a member of the Lions Club and the Floydada Chamber of Commerce.

Panhandle-Plains FLBA is under the direction of the stockholder-elected board of directors. Other members on the board include chairman Jon "Mike" Garnett, of Spearman; Vice Chairman Jerry K. Oswalt, of Abernathy; and members Dean H. Burger, of Pampa; Ervin J. Davis of Happy; John C. Duke of Follett; C. L. Edwards of Panhandle; Larry E. Fairchild, of Adrian; Ronnie N. Hopper, of Petersburg; and Dean Turner of Matador.

The association has approximately \$135 million in loans outstanding to farmers, ranchers and agribusinesses in 17 counties. Offices are located in Amarillo, Pampa, Perryton and Plainview.

**SSI Kids Get Second Chance**

It's not often that you get a second chance in life, but almost 90,000 children with disabilities will get just that because the Social Security Administration has mailed out second redetermination notices to children whose benefits were terminated since last summer from the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program due to welfare reform.

Families who receive these notices also will find a new vital feature included: statewide hotline numbers where they can get free legal representation, which the American Bar Association and children's advocates believe will greatly improve SSI families' chances of retaining funding.

As soon as SSI families get notices, they should use the hotline numbers to link up with a lawyer who will represent them without charge during their new SSA review. Time is of the essence.

The ABA urged the SSA to issue new redetermination notices and to include the statewide hotline numbers for free legal help to ensure that these children get their right to due process and not just an administrative review. On Dec. 17, the SSA finally agreed to do just that. SSA Commissioner Kenneth Apfel is to be commended for taking this step toward treating these most vulnerable of children fairly.

As before, families will have 10 days to file an appeal and retain funding during the appeal process, and 60 days to appeal.

The SSA's own internal report on the termination program found that many families did not appeal within the necessary 10-day period to continue funding because they feared the SSA warning that they might have to repay funds paid them during the appeal process.

Quite simply these impoverished families would not be able to comply with such a demand—dire financial straits were why they qualified for SSI originally. The SSA notifications fail to mention repayment waivers.

The SSA agreed that errors had been made, and many children had been unjustly cut from the program. To his credit, SSA Commissioner Apfel agreed to take steps to correct these measures including conducting further field training for SSA staff on SSI regulations, and giving those doing the reviews additional information to aid them in making their decisions fairly.

However, the ABA still believes these families should have legal representation to make certain they have a fair hearing. The administration review procedures are complicated and difficult to understand. The process has many stages.

The ABA encourages these SSI families to take the hand extended to them by the nation's lawyers.

**Taxpayer Bill of Rights**

In 1996, a second Taxpayer Bill of Rights increased the protection of taxpayer rights in complying with the tax laws and in dealing with the IRS. It also established the Office of the Taxpayer Advocate, which has broader authority to take any action permitted by law to help taxpayers who would otherwise suffer a significant hardship due to the way the IRS is administering the tax laws.

In any dealing with the IRS, people are entitled to fair treatment by IRS employees, privacy, representation and the right to appeal an IRS examiner's findings. If their problems are not solved through normal IRS channels, people can get special help through the Problem Resolution Program. Want more information? Another taxpayer right has been strengthened as a result of the Taxpayer Browsing Protection Act. People have the right to confidentiality of their tax information. It is now a misdemeanor for employees and contractors of federal and state governments to willfully inspect another person's tax records without authorization. The IRS will notify any taxpayer whose records were illegally inspected when a person is criminally charged for the browsing.

**Texans qualify for income tax refunds**

More than 1.5 million Texans applied for income tax refunds under the Earned Income Tax Credit program in 1997. Texas ranked second among the states behind California's 2.5 million participating taxpayers—more than 15 million taxpayers in the U.S. received EITC refunds. EITC refunds may be sent to:

- Families with two or more children, and a gross income of no more than \$29,290. The maximum refund could be \$3,656 in this category.
- Families with one child, and a gross income of no more than \$25,760. Maximum refund: \$2,210.
- Families consisting of adults between the age of 25 and 64 with no children, and a gross income of less than \$9,770. Maximum refund: \$332.
