FmHA To Elect New Committee Members

The Farmers Home Administration began accepting nominations April 5 for election of county committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Becky D. Via said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency,

including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Ms. Via said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income

must come from the farm operation has been dropped."

The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," Ms. Via said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three year term at this year's election, which is scheduled for June 30.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan," Ms. Via said. "Previously, this was not allowed."

Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHA county office at 104 E. California in Floydada.

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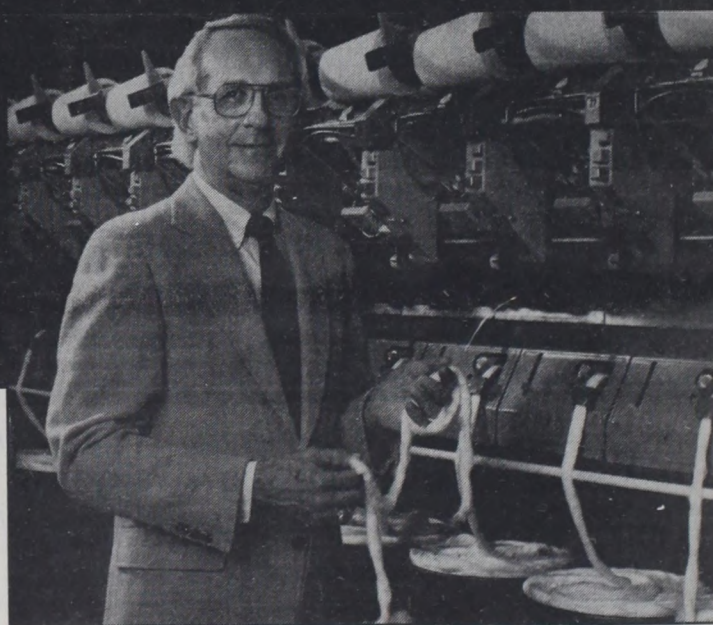

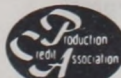

The Learning Line

Mind Games

The American Federation of Teachers suggests fun and adventurous ways for parents to help their children learn. Imagination, the AFT points out, can be the key that opens the door to learning every day of the year.



Is this a goblet—or two faces?

Do you believe everything you see? Or does perception depend upon how you view things? Look at the illustration here. You might see a goblet, while someone else sees two people talking!

Experiments with optical illusions are fun ways to exercise your brain. Draw something as you view it from the side. Then draw it as if you were looking from above. Can friends identify the object from the top view only?

Make a jigsaw puzzle from an old photo or a magazine picture by gluing it to cardboard and, after it dries, cutting it into odd-shaped pieces. Or cut the picture into even squares and see how you might rearrange the scene differently.

Orthopedists agree the sitting position can put excessive pressure on the lower back. When the chair is too deep, the small of the back can not be supported without lifting the feet off the ground. This puts added pressure on the spine and the back of the thighs which can cause back stress.

Cholesterol has received a great deal of publicity and yet many are still confused about the sources of cholesterol, its role in the body and the best way to reduce it.

Our own body produces about 80% of the total cholesterol found in blood and tissues. Only about 20% comes from our diet.

Cholesterol is ONLY found in animal sources -- meats, cheese, eggs, milk, butter (not in margarines.) There is no cholesterol in fruits and vegetables or grain products. However, once grains are made into bread with the addition of eggs and fats, the bread will have some cholesterol.

Saturated fat may also be confused with cholesterol. Saturated fats are found mostly in foods from animals, but two vegetable sources -- coconut and palm oil -- also have significant amounts of saturated fat.

Both cholesterol and saturated fats are found to increase the risk of coronary heart disease. For this reason, most physicians recommend that high risk patients reduce the amount of cholesterol in the diet.

In most people, the liver regulates the amount of cholesterol it makes depending upon the amount taken in the diet. However, for some people increases in cholesterol from the diet increases the level in the blood.

How do we reduce dietary cholesterol intake? The primary concern is moderation, NOT elimination of all cholesterol foods. Substitute margarine for butter; skim milk for whole milk; low fat cheese or that made with skim

milk, such as mozzarella, for whole milk cheeses; lean meat for meat with more fat.

Finally, become a dedicated label reader and know what information you are looking for on the label. If the product says "vegetable oil" yet the label says, "coconut or palm oil" know that you are using a saturated fat.

more aware of the latest research findings about cholesterol.

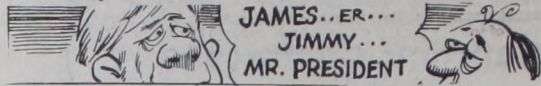

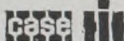
