Valley Patriots Take A Pair Of Wins Over Motley

The Valley Patriots drove to Matador Tuesday night of this week and came home with a pair of varsity wins, the girls eking out a narrow 1-point 36-35 victory while the Valley boys took a 75-65 victory over the Matadors. This one was not exactly an overwhelming victory either but the Matadors are pretty tough. For the Valley girls it was one of those nights when the ball just won't fall through the hoop. Coach Sanders stated that the girls got the shots, in fact put up more shots than usual, but the basketball just rolled 'round and 'round the rim and then came out. But Valley won and that was the thing they went after. Michie Lipscomb scored 16 points for Valley, Sherice Price scored 14 and Janna Turner tallied 6.

The Valley boys had to hustle all the way to outscore the Matadors. Ernie Lucero put in 19 points to lead the Patriots in scoring. Pepper Jones was right behind him with 18. Joey Barefield tallied 16, Ron Eudy hit for 10, Brian Wheeler scored 5 and Scotty Setliff 4 points.

Tuesday night's wins left the Valley girls with 6 wins and 5 losses for the season while the boys are now 9-4.

Valley's boys took the consolation trophy at the Tulla tournament last weekend, winning 59-52 over Dumas. The victory over Class AAA Dumas gives the Patriots wins over teams in every classification from B through AAA for this season. The Patriots lost to defending AA state champion Dimmitt 60-75 in first round play at Tulla last weekend. The Patriots then went on to take a 62-46 victory over Slaton in the first round of consolation play and then won over Dumas in the consolation finals. And talk about your balanced scoring! In the game with Dumas Scotty Setliff scored 12 points, Joey Barefield scored 11, Pepper Jones scored 11, Ron Eudy hit for 10 points, Ernie Lucero hit 10 points and Brian Wheeler scored 5 points.

The Valley girls did not fare so well at the Tulla tournament. They, too, were paired with Dimmitt in the first round of the tournament and lost to the Bobbies 46-54 but the Valley girls went down fighting against the once-beaten Dimmitt crew. The score was tied 14-14 at the end of the first quarter 30-30 at the half-way point and 38-38 at the end of three quarters. The Valley girls lost to Slaton 47-53 in first round consolation play.

Friday night of this week the local teams will host Paducah and it will be revenge time for the Valley girls for they lost a close one at Paducah a couple of weeks ago.

Tuesday night of next week Lockney will come visiting and it will be revenge time for the Valley boys for the Lockney boys are one of only three teams to defeat the Patriots this year. Next Tuesday night's games will close out the 1975 part of the basketball season. Next action for the Valley teams will be January 1, 2, 3 at the Claude tournament.

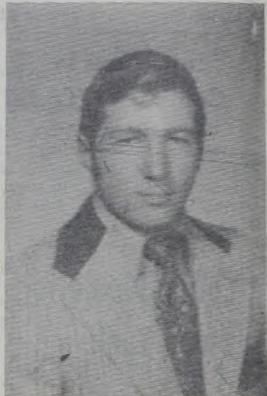

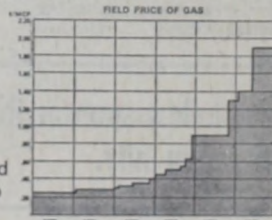

MISTLETOE
The traditional time for the French to exchange gifts as we Americans give on Christmas is New Year's Day. It is also the season when everybody calls on his friends and relatives. Also, it is at New Year's that the old Druid custom is observed of hanging a large clump of mistletoe above a doorway so that people may exchange kisses when they walk under it.



New Year's festivals, among the oldest and most universally observed, generally include rites and ceremonies expressive of mortification, purgation, invigoration over life's renewal.

The earliest-known record of a New Year's festival dates back from about 2000 B.C. in Mesopotamia, where the year began with the new moon nearest the spring equinox (mid March; Babylonia) or nearest the spring equinox (mid-September; Assyria). The year began for the Egyptians, Phoenicians and Persians with the autumnal equinox (September 21st) and for the Greeks, until the 5th century B.C., with the winter solstice (December 21st). By the Roman republican calendar the year began on March 1; after 153 B.C. the official date was January 1, and this was confirmed by the Julian calendar (46 B.C.).

In early medieval times most of Christian Europe regarded March 25th as the beginning of the year, though for Anglo-Saxon England New Year's day was December 25th.

William the Conqueror decreed that the year start January 1, but later England began its year with the rest of Christendom on March 25th. January 1st was restored as New Year day by the Gregorian calendar (1582), immediately adopted by Roman Catholic countries. Other European countries followed suit.

A wood burning fireplace should be equipped with an efficient damper. Be sure to keep the damper closed when not in use. A chimney with the damper open carries warm air out the house, wasting heat.



To decrease heat loss and reduce energy cost in rooms that are not in use at night or in extremely cold weather, draw the draperies and lower the shades over the windows, glass panels and doors. If the sun is shining on glass areas, open the draperies. The sun shining through the glass will supply additional heat at no cost.
