Regulations Given For Packages To U.S. Troops in Middle East

Each day as the time draws closer to Christmas, thoughts rapidly go to the troops in the Middle East.

On October 29, 1990 a group will be meeting at the bank room to pack gifts to go to the troops in the Middle

Certain regulations because of the heat and strict rules in Saudi Arabia must be taken into consideration. Do not send anything that will melt in the heat, such as chocolaste chips or frosting on cookies. It is best to use butter flavored shortening rather than butter or marga rine as they may get rancid. Nuts may be used but again use very fresh ones. Nuts that have been frozen are drier than fresh ones and will get even drier in the heat.

Refrigerator cookies, Christmas cut out cookies (un-iced), and oatmeal cookies are good choices to send to the Middle East. Other

Edwards In Second Place In This Area

According to the Lubbock Avalanche Journal on October 10, 1990, concerning the six-man football teams in the Lubbock area, Clay Edwards remained in second place in individual yards rushing with 948 yards, averaging 189.6 yards

New Diabetes Drug Study Underway HOUSTON -- Researchers at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston are studying a drug that could prevent significant disability

-- and even leg amputation -- in thousands of diabetics. According to Dr. Yadollah Harati, an associate professor of neurology at Baylor, the drug, a new aldose reductase inhibitor (ARI), is thought to prevent the formation of nervedamaging sugars from the excess

glucose common to diabetics.

all diabetics suffering from foot pain, often severe, as well as numbness, tingling and a burning sensation. And they want to learn if ARI will be free of harmful or unpleasant side

But, even if ARI is found to be of value, Harati said, effective treat-ment for diabetic peripheral neuropathy is probably two to five years away.

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
