Mail Domestic Parcels By December 3

The Postal Service today advanced its suggested Christmas mailing deadlines for domestic parcels and letter mail to December 3 and 10, respectively, in anticipation of an exceptionally high mail volume.

Citing the impact of greatly increased mail volumes generated by the 15-state United Parcel Service strike in the East and South, and its residual effect on other parts of the country, the Postal Service said it is compelled to ask the public to mail even earlier than normal.

The Service said that because of the dedication of its employees, many of whom have been working long hours, it has had little trouble handling the increased mail volume since the parcel strike began in mid-September. It expressed confidence it will continue to be able to cope with the increase, with the cooperation of the public and major mailers.

Parcel volume has already more than doubled in the strike area and is up significantly nationwide, and letter mail is also on the rise,

the Postal Service said. It said most of the increase, to date, has been from large volume business mailers, who presort their mail and deposit at scheduled, non-peak hours in plants prepared to handle it. For example, the Service said it is working closely with shippers of perishable goods to handle millions of gift packages normally moved by other shippers.

As Christmas nears, however, more and more of the mail will be from the general public, deposited at neighborhood post offices, branches and stations, on top of the already unprecedented business mail volume, the Postal Service said.

As a result, the Service said, while priority will be given to letter mail, many postal facilities normally dedicated to letter mail may have to be used to prevent an unmanageable backlog of parcels.

Therefore, the Postal Service said, it strongly urges the public to deposit their parcels by December 3 and their letters and greeting cards by December 10 to assure delivery by Christmas.

It asked that customers mail as early as possible, use proper packaging materials and techniques, and properly address and ZIP Code their mail.

Customers were strongly urged by the Postal Service to deposit

overseas packages and greetings immediately, and to send them by airmail if they want to assure delivery by Christmas.

Silverton Farmer Harvests 6346.41 Pounds Per Acre

Don Garrison of Silverton was recently named a member of the DeKalb Yieldmasters Club for producing 6346.41 pounds of sorghum per acre in 1976.

His yield, based on 14% moisture, was mechanically harvested from a solid block measuring 37,407 acres. An impartial third party verified the high yield which was recorded from a field of DeKalb E-59+.

Garrison planted the field on May 13 in 40-inch rows at 6.1 pounds per acre and harvested the crop on October 11.

His fertilizer program included 82 pounds of nitrogen. Garrison controlled weeds with Milogard at one pound per acre. No insecticide was used. An estimated five inches of rain fell on the crop from planting to harvest. Another 11 inches of water was applied through irrigation.

Concerning the hybrid's performance, Garrison says, "I was very pleased with the drought and insect resistance. I plan to plant E-59 in 1977."

Television Program To Air Cotton Research News

In an attempt to inform cotton producers and other interested people, there will be a one hour program on KCBD-TV Channel Eleven, Lubbock, December 9, 1976 at 9:00 p.m.

This program precedes the upcoming referendum where cotton producers will vote on whether or not they want to continue the Research and Promotion of cotton by supporting it with money withheld at the time of sale.

Producers are urged to tune in this program in order that they may be informed of the current facts concerning the importance of support or non-support of Cotton Research and Promotion.

Weather Hearings Postponed; People To Vote On Issue

AUSTIN—James M. Rose, executive director of Texas Water Development Board, announced Tuesday the postponement of two adjudicative hearings on applications for permits to engage in weather modification and control activities in parts of the High Plains. The hearings were scheduled for Monday, December 6, in Morton.

Rose said the hearings were postponed until after February 15 to give the Legislature, which convenes in January, an opportunity to consider legislation providing for a public vote on weather modification activities, and to give opponents to the application time to engage legal counsel.

Rose said House Speaker Billy Clayton has informed him that a bill providing for a public referendum in areas where applications to conduct weather modification and control operations have been filed will be introduced soon after the Legislature goes into session.

Plains Weather Improvement Association, Inc., and Atmospherics, Inc., have applied for permits to conduct weather modification and control operations to increase precipitation and decrease hail fall within two target areas which include portions of 13 counties in the Texas High Plains.

The permits, if granted, may extend through 1980.

New written notices as to date, time and location of the hearings will be announced after the Legislature has had time to act on proposed weather modification legislation, Rose said.

Any wage earner, including the self-employed, not currently participating in a retirement plan; self-employed individuals are not required to include employees in this plan.

How IRA Plans Works:

You may begin receiving benefits any time after you reach age 59½ years. Benefits are taxed as ordinary income to the recipient in the year in which they are received. Your spouse may establish a separate IRA based on individual earnings, provided the spouse is not participating in another retirement plan.

Contributions:

BEWARE OF MAIL ORDER CATALOGS

The Christmas season is a prime time for mail order companies to distribute their catalogs in quantity. You may be receiving several catalogs a week. Beware of mail-order forms from companies with out-of-state addresses. Nine times out of ten, the companies are not registered to do business with Texas, which means that they are not authorized to collect Texas sales tax on items they sell. Their order blanks have a line for you to fill in the price of the merchandise and then add a line underneath marked "add applicable tax." The consumer adds four or five per cent and mails away the money. The unregistered company simply pockets the money. They have not broken any laws since there is no tax on sales of this type. You have simply been taken. If the mailing address is in Texas, or the company is registered to do business here, you do owe tax. The mail order form will read "Texas residents add five per cent sales tax" or a similar phrase. The toll free number to call if you think you are being overcharged sales tax is 800 252-5555.

Building after building down-town stands empty. The community now has less than half the population it boasted in the 1930s. When everything was done by hand, a family could make a living on a 160-acre farm. Now, with equipment costing thousands of dollars, it takes equivalent numbers of acres to survive, Irby and other Turkey residents said.

In the early '70s, citizens instigated a series of projects designed to thwart the downward population slide progress brought to this agricultural land:

Annual festivals in April honor the town's most famous son—country western musician Bob Wills. The Turkey school was consolidated with the nearby community of Quitaque and a \$1 million new educational plant built between them. Plans were laid for new housing. An indoor public swimming pool was built. Grazing associations were formed.

For all the great hopes, not a lot happened. "We're holding our own," was the best Irby could say, with Lacy agreeing. "It didn't do a whole lot of good."

A Lacy customer, Western artist Otho Stubbs sounded a more doleful note. "I hate to see the town become a ghost town, but I really don't see that anything can reverse it."

"There's nothing to bring young couples in but farming, and the old ones are gradually dying off." Stubbs came to Turkey as a 2-year-old in 1910. He lives in the house his parents bought that summer and his love of the country—and its Indian, Spanish and Western history—caused him to turn part of the home into a private museum.

"I just like it here. I've been all over the country and I keep coming back," Stubbs said, his small mustache twitching a little as he remembered a hard time in his life.

"When my wife was dying, I had to take her to Houston. The neighbors came and plowed my crops for me while I was gone."

No doubt about it, there's definitely a thankful air in Turkey that's not all due to the season.

But, the town is always infused with a little extra spirit at this time of year, thanks to its name.

While cooks in town prepared stuffing Wednesday for Thursday's traditional meal, postmaster Jim Majors labored over a different kind of dressing.

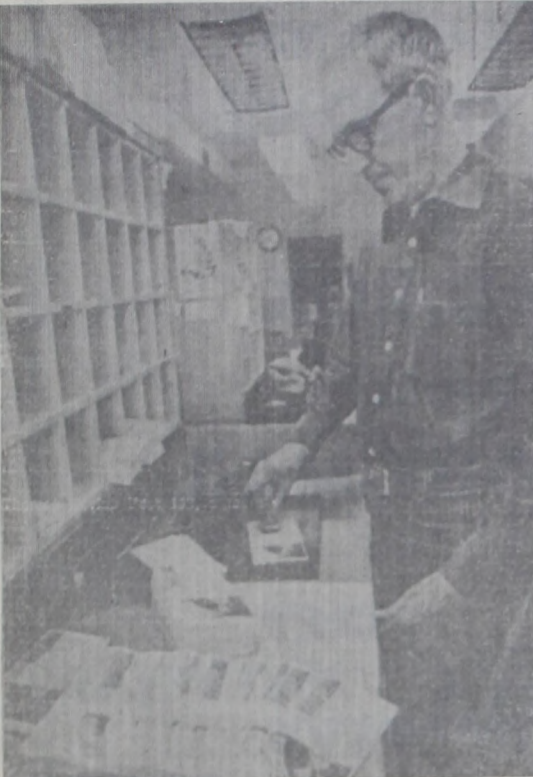
He hand-stamped hundreds of pieces of mail, sent to him for holidays window-dressing with the Turkey postmark.

It happens annually. "I've had as many as 2,500 from one company," the postmaster who moved here in 1940 from Paducah said. This year, Thanksgiving letters came from as far away as Anchorage, Alaska, for postmarking and mailing from Turkey. His desk was covered with 500 from a Woodland Hills, California, firm.

Majors came to visit a sister in Turkey and, after a short residency in Monahans, came back to stay. "I don't want to live anywhere else," said Majors who remembered a time the town of 680 was big enough to support a semi-pro baseball team.

"Oh, no. It wouldn't be the same. You can't go back," Irby said, peering over the shoulder-high shelf of vitamin pills. Despite the pride Irby and other lifelimers have in their hometown, Turkey has its problems.

Turkey Simply Stuffed With Thankfulness

TURKEY—Born here, raised here, gonna die here.

Jack Lacy feels strongly about this tiny South Panhandle community.

While there are many things a town of 680 cannot provide its residents, there are other, more important ones people here find abundant:

Roots. Helpful friends. Honesty. Peace.

Just ask Lacy. Born here 64 years ago, he's never wanted to live anywhere else.

"When I married my wife, I told her if she had any desire to live anywhere else but Turkey, she better not marry me," he said, leaning across the counter of the dry goods store he established in 1933.

Velma said that was "fine with her" and they were wed in 1933.

"This town has been real good to me—the people more than anything else. The people are the best in the world," he explained.

Though three times as big now as when Lacy bought the business from his mother 41 years ago, the store has an old-fashioned atmosphere as the "dry goods" name it carries.

No humming electronic, code-reading cash registers here—Lacy's is an ornate, silver affair that would be at home on the set
