The 1975-76 school year at Valley High comes to an end Thursday of next week, May 20, with the Eighth Grade graduation program at 8 o'clock in the school gymnasium.

The high school Commencement Exercises will be held at the gymnasium Tuesday night of next week at 8:00 p.m. There will not be a separate program.

Twenty seniors will be awarded diplomas at the Commencement program next Tuesday. This year's graduates are a bit unique in that this is the first "very" graduating class. Until this year, some of the seniors had attended Quitaque High or Turkey High before the schools were consolidated. This year's class may have two or three members that attended another high school, but for the most part they are 100% pure Patriots.

Honor students for the Class of '76 have been named this week, and as is usually the case, that race was a close one with less than a point separating the ones with the highest scholastic averages.

The valedictorian of the class is Janna Turner with a four-year average of 94.936. Janna is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jan Turner of Turkey.

In addition to excelling in the classroom, Janna has also excelled in sports, winning four letters in basketball where she was selected on several all-tournament teams, and was an all-district and an all-regional tournament selection.

Seritha Helms, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Edd Helms of Quitaque, is the salutatorian of the Class of '76 with a four-year scholastic average of 94.0238. Seritha participated in almost all activities throughout her school years being involved in FHA, sports and has been a cheerleader several years.

Elgin Connor will address the seniors at the Commencement program next Tuesday night. The senior class will leave Wednesday for a trip to Colorado Springs for a short outing.

Phelps Named As Girls Basketball Coach For Valley High Next Year

Supt. Wilburn Leeper of Valley High has announced that Robert Phelps has been named head girls basketball coach at Valley High for next season.

Coach Phelps has been in the Valley system the past year where he has coached the Junior High teams and assisted in the other departments.

He is a Quitaque native and before returning to Quitaque he taught and coached at Mobeetie High and during his last year at Mobeetie turned out a very fine girls team in spite of the fact that the squad was small in numbers.

Supt. Leeper also announced that Coach Rick Dill has been named head football coach at Valley and Coach Bill Hulsey will head coach boys basketball and will assist in football. Coach Hulsey came to Valley three years ago to coach boys basketball and assist in football. The football team went through one winless season before he came to Valley, then suffered through a second winless season after he came and when the football coach resigned, Bill agreed to take on the job of athletic director, head football and boys basketball coach. Under his direction and coaching the teams have won 15, lost 4 and tied one game. He took over a basketball team that had won only two games the year before, competing in Class A at the time. In the past three years the boys have been co-champions each year and the past year's Patriots

Beard-Growing Contest To Be Held In Briscoe County

From May 17 through July 4, a beard-growing contest will be sponsored by the Lions Clubs in Silverton and Quitaque. All male adults are being asked to grow a beard (chin and cheek whiskers) for the Bicentennial Celebration. High school students are not expected to begin growing their beards until after graduation day.

Those who do not have a beard started by May 20 (May 28 for the Silverton High School boys) will be expected to purchase a permit for \$10.00. After you have purchased this permit, you may be asked to show proof of purchase by producing your permit. If your permit is not available at that time, you will be subject to a \$2.00 fine. All those entering the beard-growing contest must report to the City Hall in Silverton or Quitaque between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. May 17 to sign up. All contestants must have shaved sometime that day. Contest will be judged July 4 at the County Court House.

There will be a category for longest beard and also for character portrayal. The character portrayal is extended to include costume for the judging. The Lions are urging everyone—including the women—to dress in costumes to support character portrayal.

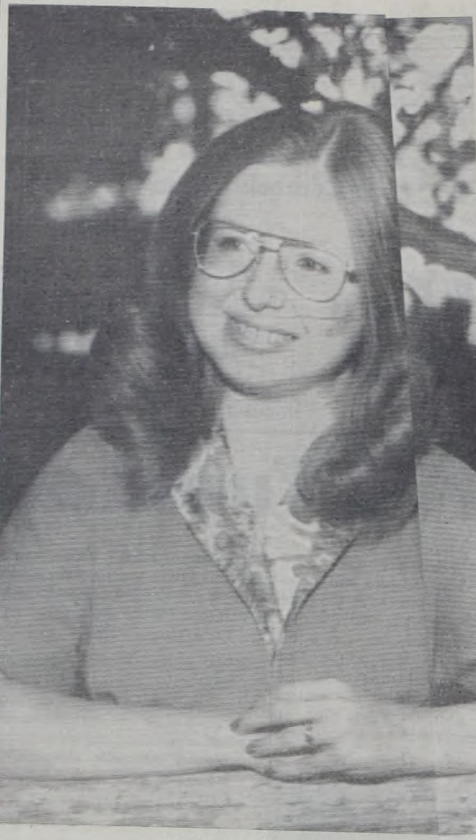

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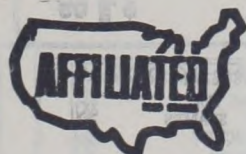
