Hundreds of pigs (and students) will begin arriving in Brenham Friday morning from all over the state in hopes of making it through the weekend, and on to Houston on Monday.

Last Year Mr. D left with 23 pigs, 12 of which made it on to the Houston Live Stock Show.

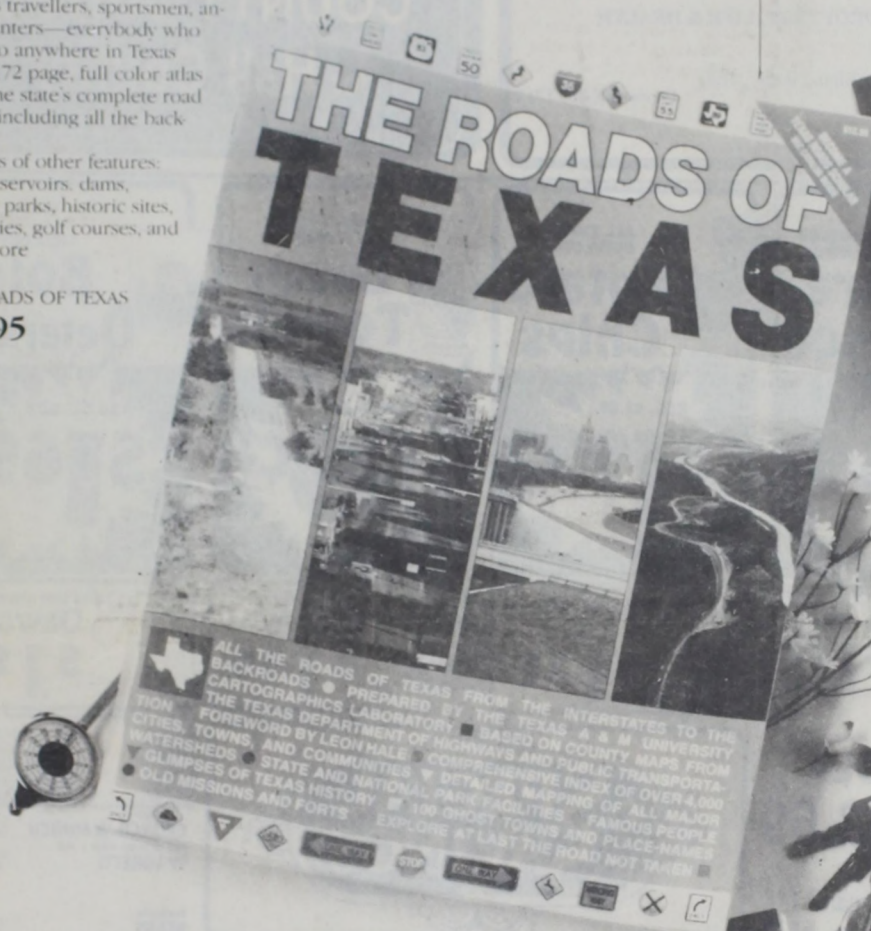
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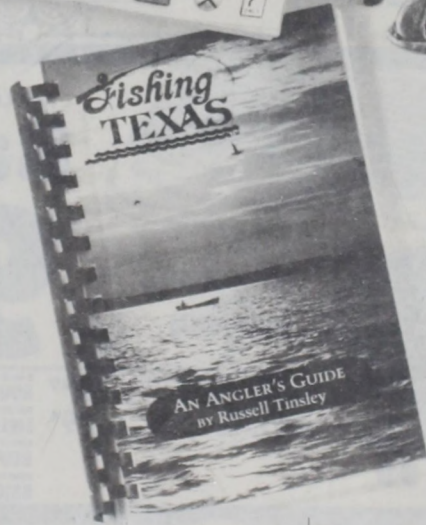
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# "Discover America" Theme Of Contest

*Editor's Note: The following article was taken from the April 1990 issue of Colonial Homes.*

A quilt contest on the theme "Discover America" will be one of the first events to celebrate the 500th anniversary, in 1992, of Columbus's arrival in the New World. The first showing of winning entries will take place in New York City in 1991. Despite the contest theme, quilters need not limit themselves to Columbus motifs.

Sponsored by the Museum of American Folk Art, the contest is open to quilters worldwide. It has four divisions, each entered separately: "Discover America", "Friends Sharing America", "Young People's America", and "America's

Flower Garden."

"Discover America" quilts must measure 45"x54" and be completed by September 5, 1990. A first prize of \$5,000 and a second prize of \$2,500 will be awarded.

"Friends Sharing America" is open to groups of at least three quilters working on one quilt.

All prizewinning quilts in the four categories will become part of the museum's permanent collection.

To enter the contest, write for information and entry forms to Quilt Festival, Museum of American Folk Art, 61 West 62nd St., New

York, N.Y. 10023. You must return entry forms by the contest dates listed above.

For the "Young People's America" contest, include a \$1 non-refundable entry fee and one 35mm slide of the design. For the other three contests, submit the entry forms with a \$10 non-refundable fee and four 35mm slides of each quilt.

Using the slides, a panel of quilting experts will narrow contestants to two semi-finalists from each state and country. The semifinalists will then send their quilts to the museum for final judging.

Quilts must measure 72"x72" and be completed by October 2, 1990. The first prize is \$5,000 and the second, \$2,500.

"Young People's America" is a fabric drawing event for children between the ages of eight and 12. Youngsters will draw a design for a quilt square upon a piece of plain muslin, using a felt marking pen, crayon, or similar utensil. Blocks must be the work of only one child and completed by November 1, 1990. Three prizewinners each will receive \$500 U.S. savings bond.

"America's Flower Garden" quilts must measure 72"x72" and be completed by January 2, 1991. Each of the 24 winners will receive a prize of \$500.

## Honor Students To Be Honored By Lions Club

Lions club members from Turkey and Quitaque will treat a number of Valley students to a hamburger supper some time after the fifth six weeks grades are averaged.

## Garden Checklist

1. Do not fertilize newly set out trees or shrubs until after they have started to grow, and then only very lightly the first year.

2. When buying plants the biggest is not always the best, especially with bare-rooted plants. The medium to small sizes (4-6 foot) usually become established faster and will become effective in the landscape much quicker than the larger sizes.

3. Complete the bare-root planting of woody landscape plants this month. Container and ball and burlapped plants are in good supply flowering before pruning spring-flowering shrubs such as quince, azalea, and forsythia.

7. When pruning shrubs, follow these steps:  
a. Prune out any dead or damaged branches first.

b. Thin out by removing about 1/3 of the canes or stems at ground level, removing the oldest canes only.

c. Shape the rest of the plant but do not cut everything back to the same height.

8. Plant dahlia tubers in late February and early March.

9. Plant gladiolus corms; space planting dates at two-week intervals to extend flowering season.

10. Fertilize pansies once again for continued flowering. Do not forget to water when needed.

## Taxes To Be Withheld

Farmers, starting on January 1 of this year, were required to start withholding federal income tax from wages of employees.

Employers must keep on file a completed W-4 form for each employee. This W-4 form determines the correct amount to withhold from each paycheck, based on how many exemptions an employee may claim, including dependents and disabilities.

Farmers also will have to provide W-2 forms to workers each January, starting this year. These forms will provide details on how much the worker earned and the amount that was paid to Social Security and federal income tax accounts.

Regarding seasonal migrant workers who don't live in the area where the farmer resides, the employers will have to be able to show they have made a good-faith effort to locate the workers so that the W-2 forms could be sent to them.

This means that the employers should obtain and put the permanent addresses of their workers on file for reference.

Workers who do not earn the minimum taxable wage base of \$4,400 will be eligible to recover all federal taxes that have been deducted. Farmers may want to offer assistance to their workers in obtaining such refunds when warranted.

Farmers should use the IRS Circular E to determine correct withholding rates. They can call IRS toll-free at 800-424-FORM to obtain this circular and other forms.

In addition, farmers are reminded that the Social Security tax rate for 1990 also increased from 7.51 percent to 7.65 percent for employers and employees and to 15.3 percent for those who are self-employed.
