The concerned audience gathered under the shade of the big elm trees on the east side of the cemetery, each one bringing their own chair.

Steve Ulrey, Methodist pastor for Turkey and Quitaque, extended the welcome and why we have a memorial service. Steve McLean, pastor

of the Turkey Church of Christ, did an outstanding job in leading the group in patriotic hymns. U. F. Coker, who initiated the first memorial service to honor our war casualties, offered a prayer.

Melvin Clinton, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Turkey, gave a very touching and thoughtful talk on why we celebrate Memorial Day, to honor our boys who have given their lives.

Buster Hanna gave the benediction.

Danny and John Ulrey presented the flag and led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance at the opening.

The cemetery was quite beautiful and well maintained, thanks to Sue Proctor, who has done an excellent job in maintaining our cemetery.

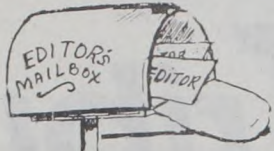

Heat Exhaustion Symptoms Listed

When temperatures begin to rise, many sports enthusiasts like to get outdoors and enjoy the sunshine. However, over-doing it in hot weather could cause a potentially dangerous condition known as heat exhaustion.

Heat exhaustion occurs when the body loses essential fluids faster than it is able to replenish them.

Rick Hartwig, director of the Cardiac Rehabilitation Center at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, offers the following tips on how to avoid heat exhaustion. First, drink plenty of fluids while exercising outdoors. If you are sweating profusely, you should drink a mixture of equal parts of tomato juice and water. This combination not only replaces water that the body needs, but also replenishes salt and other fluids the body requires to function properly.

In addition, Hartwig advises wearing clothing which allows the body to "breathe," such as cool cottons.

Symptoms of heat exhaustion include:

- * a throbbing headache
- * nausea
- * pale skin color
- * chills
- * unsteadiness
- * fatigue
- * "clammy" feeling skin
- * profuse perspiration
- * hair erection on chest and upper arms.

"If any of these symptoms develop during or after physical exercise, you should seek medical attention," Hartwig said.

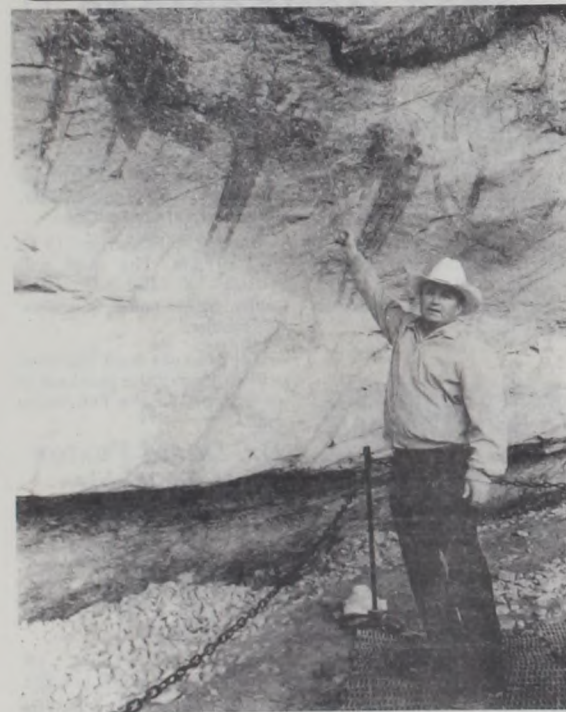

Lines From Lynda

Do you take better care of your equipment and livestock than you do of yourself? If you are a male who has never read this column, please humor me and read it just this once.

Is there a female in your life—wife, mother, girlfriend, or sister—who is always nagging you about your health habits? Does she tell you to quit smoking, drinking, eating salt, fat, sweets or anything else that tastes good? Does she try to drag you to a doctor for a checkup or get you to exercise?

Why does she do that? It's probably because she loves you and wants to keep you around for a long time. Have you noticed the number of widows in our communities? That should tell you something about the differences in the health habits of men and women. And don't say that it's because men are out working themselves to death for their families that they die earlier than women.

While planning health programs recently, it occurred to me that men take much better care of their tractors, pickups, horses, cattle, and even their dogs than they do of themselves. You don't fail to oil and grease your equipment to keep it running well or get necessary repairs. You feed the livestock the correct ration

with the right vitamins, minerals and medications. You take them to the vet when necessary and you

follow his instructions for their care. You don't ride your horse until it is ready to drop. Are you getting the idea?

Lifestyle habits play a critical role in our health. We have control over many aspects of our health by the choices we make in the food we eat, amount of exercise we get, and the things we do, such as smoking, drinking, driving too fast, and failing to wear seat belts.

We have been providing health information through a Wellness at the Worksite program for Valley School and Briscoe Implement employees. Other businesses may participate in this free program by calling my office at 823-2131. If you are self employed and would

like to have the six-lesson study course on wellness or have a computerized health risk appraisal, just call me. There is no cost.

We want men to be better informed about health matters and to take a more active role in their health care. Through the Extension Home Economics Committee we are emphasizing health and wellness throughout 1989. If I can provide you with any information on health and nutrition, please call me or come to my office and pick up free publications on these subjects.

Your health is the most valuable possession you own—even more so than your livestock and equipment—because it cannot be replaced. It has to last you a lifetime.

Q -- I live on a very modest income and find it difficult to make monthly National Service Life Insurance premiums. I don't want to lose the coverage. What can I do to reduce or waive premium payments but still retain coverage?

A -- You may choose one of the following options: 1) To reduce the cost of premiums, you may reduce the amount of coverage, in multiples of \$500. 2) You may also apply your dividend to purchase paid-up insurance which would allow you to periodically reduce the basic insurance as new paid-up additions are purchased. Since the basic insurance would be reduced, the premium would be lower. 3) If you have a permanent plan policy that has a cash value it may be surrendered for reduced paid-up insurance. For example, a \$10,000 20-payment life policy effective May 1, 1989. This cash value, used as a single premium, would purchase \$4,601 in paid-up insurance. Also, all National Service Life Insurance policies provide for waiver of payment of premiums for total disability starting before your 65th birthday.

They visited, ate and had settled down for a challenging game of Skip-bo. All was well. Then, about 9 p.m., brother Jack suggested they load up in the

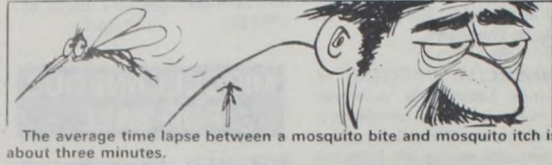
morning and go to a family reunion. They agreed.

Panhandle Transit Available To Residents

Panhandle Transit, a division of Panhandle Community Services, is designed to provide mass transportation to rural America. It offers door to door transportation for the elderly, handicapped and general public.

Services are available Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., unless prior arrangements are made, and require a one day notice to reserve a seat. Reservations can be made by calling City Hall in Turkey or call driver Betty Farley. Persons in Quitaque, and Flomot may ride the transit van also.

Funding for Panhandle Transit originates from Section 18 of the Urban Mass Transportation Act. The program is administered and funds provided by the State Department of Highways & Public Transportation.

Administrative funds: State-80 percent, Local-20 percent. Operational funds:

State-50 percent, Local-50 percent. Capital funds: State-80 percent, Local-20 percent.

Persons receiving any governmental assistance or are handicapped are eligible to ride free. Others just wishing to take advantage of the services are charged a minimal fee. If persons are unable to pay the full fare, donations are accepted. Public or private donations are also accepted, payable to Panhandle Transit.

Interested persons may call for the scheduled trips out of town, to reserve a seat for medical appointments or other business appointments, or for trips locally, such as grocery store, beauty shop, etc.

Driver, Betty Farley (423-1423 or 423-1033) states she will be happy to answer any questions anyone might have about Panhandle Transit Services.

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

If you hire someone to help you with spring cleaning, it is likely you will need to pay Social Security taxes for the work.

Any time you pay a household worker \$50 or more in a three month calendar quarter, the work is covered by social security. According to tax laws, you have the responsibilities of an employer/employee relationship.

This means, among other things, that you need to ask to see the worker's social security card. Copy the worker's name and social security number as it is shown on the card. You will need the worker's home address, too, so

you can send the W-2 form at the end of the year. If work stops before the end of the year, you can give the worker the W-2 form personally at the end of the employment period.

You need to deduct FICA taxes (7.51 percent in 1989) from the employees' wages and pay an equal amount as the employer's

share of FICA taxes. The taxes must be submitted to the Internal Revenue Service within a month after a quarter ends on IRS Form 942 (Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees).

If you have questions about any of the IRS tax forms, contact the Internal Revenue Service for assistance. Questions about social security coverage should be

directed to the social security office. Ask for Factsheet Number 11, "Household Workers." The toll-free telephone number is 1-800-234-SSA or 1-800-234-5772.

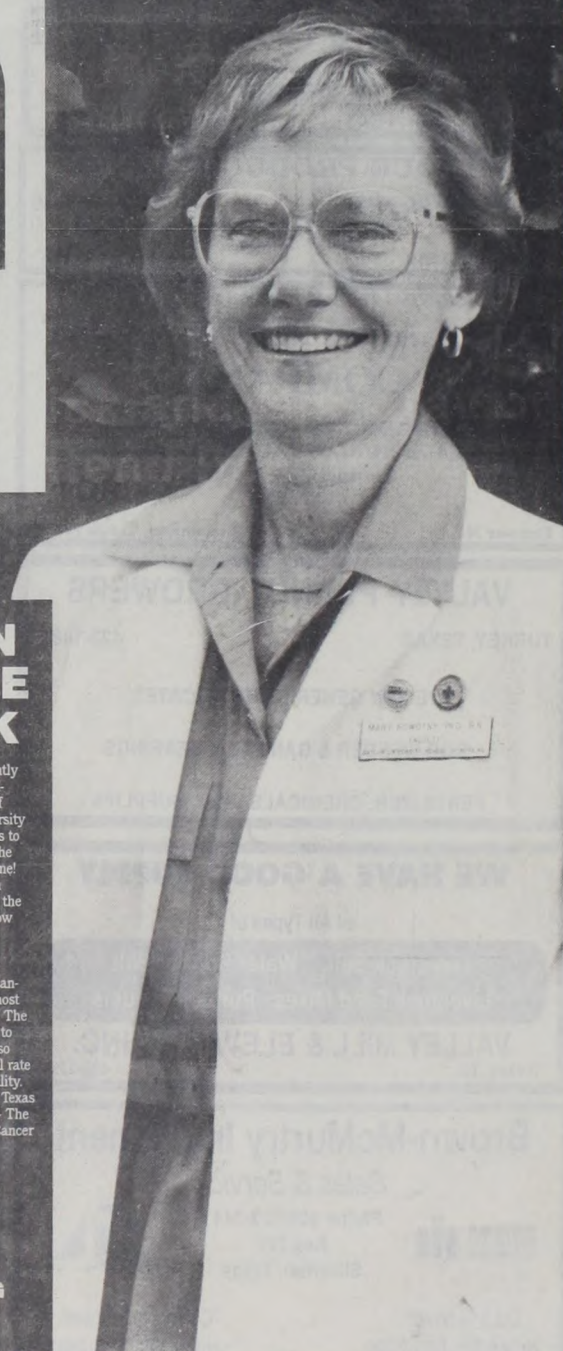

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DPS Ask For One Deathless Day

Every day for the past twelve years, somebody has died in a Texas traffic accident.

George R. Gustafson, a spokesperson for the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts and president of Texas Safety Association, wants to break that record in the summer of 1989.

"May 27, the Saturday before Memorial Day, marked the beginning of the 101 Driving Days of Summer," Gustafson said. "We want to see at least one day without a traffic death before the summer ends on Labor Day, September 4, 1989."

January 5, 1977, was the last time Texas made it through a day without a single traffic fatality, according to Department of Public Safety records.

"We tried to break that losing streak last summer with our 1988 'One-Deathless-Day' campaign," said Gustafson. "We didn't make it, so we're trying again."

Part of the challenge of "One-Deathless-Day" in Texas is the sheer size of the territory. Residents and visitors travel over 150 billion highway miles each year. "We're a high-traffic state, which puts us at high risk. But we still are not doing everything we can to minimize that risk," Gustafson said.

Last summer, we had three days with only three deaths apiece. That was as close as we got to a deathless day. We had a total of 982 fatalities for the entire 101 days—an average of 9.7 deaths per day!"

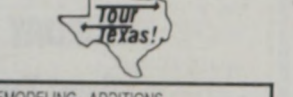
