

Oliver Clark Suffers Fatal Heart Attack

Long time Quitaque resident and long time peace officer, Oliver K. Clark, 56, died on Monday, October 31, 1988 at Lubbock's Methodist hospital, after an apparent heart attack suffered at his shop in Quitaque Monday afternoon.

Clark was born in Quitaque on May 23, 1932, and was a lifetime resident. He was the deputy sheriff of Briscoe County and owner and operator of O.K. Clark Used Cars in Quitaque.

He was a member of the National Sheriff's Association, The Texas Sheriff's association, Quitaque Lion's Club, Masonic Lodge, and a member of the First Baptist Church of Quitaque.

He is survived by his wife, the former Twila Hulsey; a daughter Denise Saul of Quitaque; two sons: Oliver K. Clark Jr. of Lockney, David O. Clark of Plainview; two brothers, Billy J. Clark of Odessa and Burl Clark of Jal, New Mexico and five grandchildren.

Services were to be held Wednesday, November 2, 1988 at 2 p.m. at the First Baptist Church in Quitaque, with the Rev. Steve Ulrey, pastor of the First United Methodist Church officiating, assisted by Rev. Jess Little, pastor of the First Baptist Church. As I See It!

This election year, you may find yourself asking: Is it really worth the effort to cast my vote? Can my one vote make a difference?

In a word, yes. One vote can make all the difference in the world. History is filled with examples of that happening.

But for one vote on September 28, 1774, we might still be British subjects.

The first Continental Congress was meeting in Philadelphia that day. The topic of debate was the Galloway Plan, which could have changed the American colonies into a British dominion, ruled by a parliament and a British governor. But Patrick Henry made an impassioned speech, arguing against the plan.

The delegates defeated the Galloway Plan. By one vote.

In 1649, King Charles I of England lost his head. By one vote.

Elizabeth II is queen of England today because, some 250 years ago, the British House of Commons voted in favor of the House of Hanover. The vote was 96-95.

When the U. S. Senate agreed to annex Texas in 1845, one vote made the difference.

In 1868, the Senate failed twice - by a single vote - to convict President Andrew Johnson in his impeachment trial.

When John F. Kennedy was elected President, he won by less than one vote per precinct across the nation. One-half of the votes cast in Illinois and New Jersey swung 43 electoral votes to Kennedy. Had that tiny percentage of votes been reversed in those two states, the election would have been thrown to the House of Representatives for a decision.

The House did decide the election in 1924, when John Quincy Adams gained the Presidency by one vote.

And in 1877, Rutherford B. Hayes was elected President over Samuel J. Tilden when a special Electoral College voted 8-7 in Hayes favor.

But national and major legislative decisions aren't the only ones that can be decided by a vote. Your vote can be just as critical in local and state elections.

In 1963, for instance, a candidate for city council in a Cincinnati suburb was hospitalized for an emergency appendectomy before he could get to the polls.

The candidate lost by a vote.

As a member of Congress from California was seeking his party's nomination, according to an often repeated story, he and his opponent each received 10,429 votes. State law required that they draw lots.

The Congressman lost. One reason, the story goes, was that his secretary was so busy working at campaign headquarters that she never made it to the polls on election day.

Make it a point to find the time to get out and vote this election day, Tuesday, November 8, 1988.

Grand Jury Hands Down Indictments

The 100th Judicial District Court was in session the week of October 11, 1988, in Hall County Courthouse. The Grand Jury also met and handed down a total of 15 indictments.

Judge John Forbis of 100th Judicial District Court heard one case in which Glen Johnson who was indicted November of 1986 pled nolo contendere to a charge of possession of a controlled substance. Johnson was fined \$300 and given a sentence of three years confinement (TDC) adjudication deferred for three years.





Texas Apples: Take A Bite

MICROWAVE APPLESAUCE

- 6 C. (6-7) peeled, cored and chopped apples
- 1/2 C. firmly-packed brown sugar
- 1/4 C. granulated sugar
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 2 T. water
- 1 tsp. lemon juice

Combine all ingredients in 1-1/2 quart covered dish. Cook in microwave oven, covered, on HIGH 6-8 minutes or until apples are tender. If a finer texture is desired, process in blender or food processor. Makes 3-4 cups.

BAKED APPLE DOUGHNUTS

- 3 C. all-purpose flour
- 1 C. sugar
- 3 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 C. shortening
- 2 beaten eggs
- 1/2 C. milk
- 1 C. peeled, cored and grated apples
- 1/2 C. chopped pecans

1/2 C. melted butter
Cinnamon and sugar mixture for coating

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and nutmeg. Cut in shortening until mixture is fine. Add eggs, milk, apples and pecans to dry ingredients, mix thoroughly. Fill well-greased tiny muffin cups almost 2/3 full. Bake at 350 degrees F. 20-25 minutes or until golden brown. Roll in melted butter, then in cinnamon-sugar mixture. Makes approximately 60 "doughnuts."

It is something that shouldn't have happened, because the financing for the County Attorney had been in the budget for many years in the amount of \$12,060.00. This amount was in the budget when the present County Attorney was appointed as stated in the minutes of the Oct. 2, 1987 meeting at the same salary as part time county attorney.

On Dec. 22, 1987 minutes it was proposed to raise the present County Attorney salary to \$15,000.00 per year. Motion failed. It was raised to \$13,060.00 per year. The present County's salary is \$13,060.00 at this time.

Anyone running for public office likes to know approximately what the salary is going to be. The controversy started when the county attorney's salary was lowered to the level of 1972, which would be \$4,800.00 per year. It was lowered at the last budget hearing, Sept. 19, 1988 minutes.

The way I see this controversy, if the budget on a public office and position to be filled is lowered, the Commissioners Court should lower all offices and positions to be filled back to the level of 1972 and 1973. Then let the candidate who wins propose approximately what it would take to finance the office and position which would be approved or disapproved by the Commissioners Court.

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


