Election To Be Called In Quitaque, Turkey, Flomot School Districts

According to Loran Denton, Superintendent of the Turkey Independent School District, plans are underway to call an election in the Quitaque, Turkey and Flomot school districts to determine if the three schools are to consolidate.

Petitions are being circulated in the three districts to be presented to the county judges of Hall, Motley, Briscoe and Floyd counties for an election to be held on July 20, 1971.

Quitaque Methodists Get New Pastor

and it officially became a law. This bill was practically a must for the three school districts if they are to consolidate into one central school system, for without this special bill it would have been impossible to secure incentive aid from the State. With the passage of this bill, however, it will mean that the State of Texas will pay approximately half a million dollars to the new consolidated school system over a 10-year period—and this will not have to be repaid by the district, nor will local taxes have to be levied because of it. It is simply an "incentive" payment made to new consolidated school districts as an inducement for them to consolidate.

There has been a lot of confusion about this bill and consolidation plans as a whole, just as there is about any new undertaking of this magnitude. As a result many still do not fully understand what "Incentive Aid" is, or why a special bill was necessary in the first place. So a few words of explanation about this, along with some background information on consolidation, may be in order.

First off, all of this has purposefully been kept quiet, and the discussion has been limited to school board members, in order that unfounded rumors would not be circulated before the project got off the ground. And secondly, it now seems almost a certainty that strong legislation is coming up soon that will force many of our smaller districts to consolidate. This was tried two years ago in the Texas Legislature, and was finally warded off only after a hard and heated battle. Had the compulsory consolidation bill passed then

it would have overnight consolidated 865 of the 1218 small school districts across the State of Texas. Beginning with the 1971 school term the Turkey school would have been consolidated with Memphis, Flomot would now be consolidated with Matador, and Quitaque pupils would be attending school in Silvertown. It was a high pressure attempt by professional educators to ram through legislation that would have dealt a virtual death blow to hundreds of small communities across Texas.

Why then was a special bill necessary in order for the proposed school district to be eligible for incentive aid? The law states that either one of two conditions must be met before a school district is eligible. The new school must have a minimum of 750 students after consolidation, or else must consolidate so there will be only one school in the entire county. Since this proposal takes in portions of

four counties (Briscoe, Hall, Motley and Floyd) and involves less than 750 students, it would not have been eligible under the law for incentive aid. And incentive aid in this project is vital, so several months ago the joint school boards set the machinery in motion. Through the assistance of W. S. (Bill) Heatley and Tom Christian in the House of Representatives, and Jack Hightower in the Senate, a special bill was passed last month and was later signed by Governor Preston Smith. This bill authorizes the payment of incentive aid to the new district on the same basis as that provided any other new consolidated school district across the state.

The incentive aid payment to the new district could be as much as \$500,000.00 over the next 10 years. The exact amount is determined by figuring the annual budget for the new school and comparing this with the existing budgets for the three separate schools. The dollar savings per year over the old budgets (which have been estimated by the State to be approximately \$50,000.00 per year) would be the incentive aid payment made each year by the State to the new school district—and this amount would continue for a

Rhonda M. Griffin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Riley R. Griffin, 3728 Scarlet in Odessa, has received a \$1000 National Merit Scholarship from Armstrong Cork Company.
