Turkey-Quitaque school district during the 1983 year totaled \$44 million while the total market value for the district was \$109

million. The difference in the two figures are accounted for through the various exemptions such as homestead and tax relief for farm productivity. Additionally, state figures from the Tax Board claim that the school district levies taxes on approximately 82 percent of the taxable value thus claiming less value than the state market value figures. This is consistant with statewide tallies, especially rural

farming areas.

The largest category of property taxes in the school district perty taxes in the school district in 1983 was acreage used for farming. This accounted for \$14 million, followed by homeowners at \$9 million. Other categories contributing substantially to the total value were utilities, com-mercial industry, vehicles and

1. Make sure the TV antenna is pointed directly towards the Valley Translator Station.

2. Check antenna wire. Be sure both ends of wire are secure on antenna and TV set. Make sure both ends of wire are not broken, rusty or corroded. If they are, cut off about an inch of wire on each end. Fix, reattach to antenna and TV set, making sure wire does not touch each other on terminals of antenna or set.

3. Make sure antenna wire is attached to UHF, terminal, NOT THE

4. Plug TV set directly into wall socket. If you have to use an extension cord, make sure it is heavy duty wire.

5. Antenna wire should be less than 40 feet long. All over 40 feet will cause some loss in signal.

6. Antenna should be just high enough to have line of sight to station, clearing any trees, buildings or other things. However, sometimes just moving the antenna up or down or to the side just a few feet can improve the signal.

THINGS YOU CAN DO WITH A LITTLE COST INVOLVED Change antenna wire every two or three years. Make sure

2. Have tuner on TV cleaned once or twice a year or when you have a hard time tuning a certain channel in.

3. If your TV set uses strips and not a dial, make sure the strips are for the right channels. They are 54-56-58 and Ch. 60.

Buy a new antenna. The very best is a JERROLD CYD 40-70 with a BLONDER TONGUE (ABLE U2-75 pre-AMP) to be
