Processing Plant May Soon Be In Briscoe

A standing room only crowd attended the Briscoe County Commissioners Court meeting on Monday, January 11, 1988. The large gathering was prompted by the presence of Archer & Archer, Inc. to explain the possibility of putting a peanut processing plant in Briscoe County.

Perna N. Strickland, Director of the Texas Panhandle Regional Development Corporation, told the audience that there are grants available for

up to \$500,000 to counties for economic development loans to companies that want to locate in depressed areas. Briscoe County has a good chance to qualify for a grant.

If the company cannot repay the loan, the county is not liable for the indebtedness stated Ms. Strickland.

Shannon Wilburn, Chief Coordinator for Archer & Archer, gave some facts about the peanut processing plant. He stated that there would be a need for many other services

as well as 33 full time jobs at the plant at the end of two years. Some of the needs for services created would be trucking, home building, concrete work and others.

There is also the possibility of processing sunflower seed and baking a peanut butter cookie here. Some of the cookies were served to those attending.

If the grant is approved by April, which is a possibility, construction could be completed in November, 1988.

Meet The Candidates

Mrs. Gloria Wood

Mrs. Gloria (Wallace) Wood is a candidate for the office of Tax Assessor-Collector in Briscoe County for the Democratic Primary on March 8, 1988.

Mrs. Wood has stated that if she is elected, "I will do my very best to serve the people of Briscoe County. With my past experience as bookkeeper, secretary and other office duties, I feel that I am well qualified to perform the duties of Tax Assessor/Collector."

Ron Slover

Amarillo oil and gas broker, Ron Slover, has entered the Republican race for State Senator. During an informal press conference, Slover said he'd be discussing three predominant issues, one of which was a proposal to develop a new natural gas supply for Panhandle and South Plains agriculture. He stated that another of the three issues, that of getting the Panhandle oil and gas field further developed, could result in a significant increase in a low cost natural gas supply, and consequently, a reduction in the cost of production for farmers.

In addition to making a new supply of irrigation gas available to farmers, Slover said the same gas supply could be purchased by other consumers for home heating, usually in cold winter months when the demand for irrigation and agribusiness was less.

As his third issue, Slover stated the last tax bill passed by the Texas Legislature must be dismantled. He said the bill was created by representatives on a spending spree and out of touch with reality.

Warren Chisum

Warren Chisum, 49, is a candidate for Representative in the 84th District of Texas.

Chisum, a Democrat, plans to work for financial responsibility in state govern-

ment, to have integrity in dealing with all concerned, and to be responsive to interests of all constituents in the 84th District.

Chisum was born in Miami and graduated from Lefors High School in 1957. Married to the former Ila Omega Crutcher, the couple has two children and two grandchildren. He is currently the owner of Omega Energy and Chisum and Wilson, Inc., an oil and gas exploration firm. A Baptist and a Mason, Chisum serves as president of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce.

Teel Bivins

Teel Bivins, is a Republican candidate for 31st Senatorial District. Teel has spent his entire life in the Panhandle building his business and raising his family. Born in Amarillo in 1947, Teel received his undergraduate degree from Tulane University. Teel also received his law degree from Southern Methodist University and passed the Texas State Bar in 1974.

Teel's commitment to the Republican Party began as a Young Republican in Amarillo. His service to the party continued as an aide to Republican gubernatorial candidate Paul Eggers in 1970. More recently Teel has worked in the campaigns of Ronald Reagan, Phil Gramm, Beau Boulter.

Teel is married to the former Nancy Terrill, his two children are Andrew and Katie. The Bivins family are members of the Saint Andrews Episcopal Church.

Larry Milner

Former Amarillo Chamber of Commerce president, Larry Milner, announced his candidacy Tuesday as representative of the 13th Congressional District.

The Republican candidate said, "My understanding of the area's economy, combined with years of involvement in

legislative and regulatory processes, offers our area an opportunity for continued solid representation in Washington."

Before working with the Amarillo Chamber, Milner was vice president of communications for Southwestern Public Service.

Milner, his wife Suzanne and their three daughters, live in Amarillo.

Jim Brandon

A long-time political leader from Amarillo, Jim Brandon is seeking the Republican nomination for Congress.

Brandon, an attorney and C.P.A., is engaged in the oil, gas, real estate and cattle feeding business.

A long time conservative, Brandon states that he is in full support of President Reagan's commitment to a strong military defense.

Beau Boulter

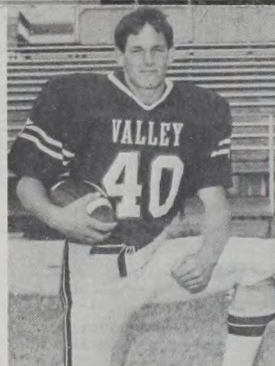

CRP Meeting Set For January 20

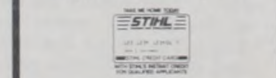
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4-H Horse Club

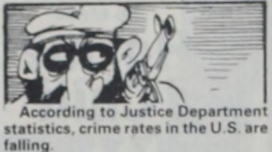
"Ride the Rising Stars" is the theme for the 1988 West Texas Vegetable Conference January 19, at 8:30 a.m. in the Hereford Community Center.
