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Regular BB Schedule To Be Over Friday

The regular season basketball schedule comes to an end in district 7-B Friday night, and after the firing is over Friday night a girls champion may be crowned but a playoff will be necessary to determine the boys champion.

Quitaque hosts Matador in the windup for those two teams and if the Pantherettes win, they are in as champions of District 7-B. If the Panthers win over Matador, they will be winners of the second half of the round robin and will meet Flomot, who won the first half of play.

Turkey played Flomot Thursday night.

The Quitaque teams played Estelline last Friday night here at Quitaque and won them both. The Pantherettes won over the Bearettis 39-28 in a game that was close for about ten minutes. Estelline was out front 11-8 at the end of the first quarter but the Pantherettes went ahead to stay in the first minute of play in the second period.

Jackie Cheatham led all shooters with 23 points. Glenna Ramsey scored 9 points, Wanda Ramsey 4, Neva Morrison 2 and Stephanie Chadwick 2. Jan Rapp scored 14 points for Estelline. The boys game was strictly no contest and the Panthers went over the century mark for the first time this year, scoring a 101-39 win over the inept Bears.

The Panthers hit 35 points in the first period and in the first minute of the second quarter, with the score 39-11. Coach Muir sent in the reserves, but that did not stop the scoring. Perry Brunson hit for 22 points to lead in that department.

Tuesday night the Quitaque teams took on Paducah here at Quitaque and lost both games.

The Pantherettes won over the Dragonettes at Paducah three weeks ago, and should have won Tuesday night but made too many mistakes and lost 54-57. Glenna Ramsey led the Pantherettes with 22 points.

The Panthers lost to the big Dragons 59-75. Paducah won by 15 points the other game. The Panthers battled the taller Dragons, and even scared the visitors a bit in the fourth period as they pulled to within 3 points a couple of times. The Dragons were equal to the occasion and pulled away again.

Stanley Price with 17 and Gary Chandler with 16 points, sparked the Panther attack. Turkey hosted the Matador teams last Friday night and won both games.

The Turkettes won over the Matador girls 56-46 as Sally Case tossed in 24 points for scoring honors for the night.

The Turks had to go all out to squeeze by the Matadors 63-60 as Rod Adamson led the Turks scoring attack with 19 points.

Tuesday night the Turkey teams drove to Estelline for a double header and won both of them.

The Turkettes took a 33-21 win over the Bearettis with Sally Case scoring 13 points to lead the Turkettes.

The Turks won 47-35 over the Bears, Rod Adamson hitting for 17 points for the Turks.

Flomot was in Matador last Tuesday night for a doubleheader and split with the Matadors, the

girls losing 42-52. Susie Gilbert won scoring honors, however firing in 31 points.

The Longhorns and Matadors had a real battle before the Longhorn won it 78-72.

Flomot led 20-18 at the end of the first quarter; 41-40 at half-time; and by only 61-59 at the end of three periods. Billy Green tossed in 31 points in that one to spark the Longhorns.

Flomot's Grade School teams played in the tournament at Matador last weekend.

In the first game the girls played Roaring Springs and lost 20-15. Marilee Martin scored 7 for Flomot.

The Flomot boys played Roaring Springs their first game and lost 39-11. Billy Morris scored 3 points for Flomot.

Flomot and Quitaque girls met in the second round of action with Flomot winning 33-25. Marilee Morris scored 22 points for Flomot and Vonaceil Robison 13 for Quitaque.

The Quitaque boys won over the Flomot boys 42-24. Billy Morris hit for 17 for Flomot. Carlton Oglesby scored 12 for Quitaque.

Flomot girls won over Matador in next round action 30-21 with Debbie Clay leading the way with 15 points.

The Matador boys won over Flomot 45-17 with Billy Morris scoring 8 for Flomot.

In Monday night games with Matador at Flomot, the Flomot girls won 30-22 with Cindy Morris scoring 12 for Flomot.

The Matador boys won 35-17 with Clayton Pigg scoring 7 points for Flomot.

ASC CHAIRMAN TALKS ABOUT FARM PROGRAM PROCEDURE

Local farmers have shown considerable interest in the recent announcement that 1970 farm program payments are expected to be completed in July and August this year, according to Louie Kitchens, chairman of the Briscoe County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

"Some farmers have asked if speeding up completion of program payments means changes in their participation in the voluntary farm programs," he said. "The answer is no. No basic changes have been made in the three steps required of participating farmers — sign-up, compliance, certification."

During sign-up — February 2 through March 20 — eligible farmers go to the County ASCS Office to request participation in one or more of the programs: feed grain, wheat and cotton. They sign up for the acreage they will divert in the case of feed grain and wheat, and they agree to comply with program provisions.

As program participants, they may earn price-support payments and be eligible for price-support loans. Feed grain and wheat farmers may also earn payments for voluntary diversions.

Next step is compliance. In general, this means establishing the permitted feed grain, wheat or cotton acreage, identifying the diverted acreage that was signed up, and putting conserving bases and diverted acres into approved soil and water conserving uses.

Measurement service, offered at cost by the County ASCS Office,

can provide farmers with the exact measurement they need for compliance. Measurement service results are guaranteed if farmers use the service exactly as requested and performed.

Mr. Kitchens urged farmers who have not already asked for measurement service to do so when they sign up for the farm programs.

Third step for farmers — after sign-up and compliance — is certification. They certify they have complied with program provisions.

"I want to emphasize that farmers should not certify until they know the acreages planted to the crops involved. Certification must not be an estimate of what a farmer will do. It is a statement of what he has done. A farmer also is responsible for maintaining the diverted acreage throughout the year," said Mr. Kitchens.

After certification, farms may be checked at any time. If a farm is found out of compliance, the farmer may lose part or all of the price-support and diversion payments and may forfeit eligibility for price-support loan on his crop.

The ASC Committee chairman pointed out that farmers must keep within program provisions after certification and that farms are subject to check throughout the program period.

When the County ASCS Office receives a farmer's certification, it will begin at once to process the information in order for price-support and diversion payments to be made as rapidly as possible after July 1.

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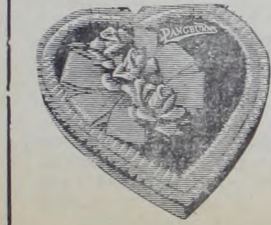

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INFORMATION SOUGHT IN HIT-AND-RUN KILLING

The Texas Department of Public Safety has issued a special public appeal for any kind of information which might lead to the apprehension of a hit-and-run driver whose car struck and killed a young highway patrolman on US 80 east of Weatherford in Parker County, at 2:43 a.m. Sunday, December 7.

Patrolman Douglas Thompson, 26, married and the father of a five-year-old son, was killed by the hit-and-run car while standing at the side of the road interviewing a traffic violator. The car sped on at a high rate of speed after the impact without any sign of hesitation.

Specifically, the DPS is seeking information that might help locate the killer car which has been identified as a white, 1960-model Ford Fairlane or Fairlane 500 four-door with damage to the front right side. The damage included the loss of the right front fender ornament, which was found at the scene, along with a 43-inch long chrome strip from the right front door. Also found at the scene were the first two letters—"Fa"—which had been knocked off the Fairlane emblem on the side of the right front fender.

Reason for the renewed appeal for assistance in locating this car, said Col. Wilson E. Speir, DPS Director, is the belief that several reported "leads" which didn't prove out may have led people to think the death car has been located.

"We again earnestly solicit the help of anyone who might recall having seen such a vehicle in the past few weeks on the road, or perhaps being repaired at a repair shop, back-yard garage, or some seemingly inconspicuous place," Speir explained.

"We are determined to continue the search for this vehicle and its driver whose wanton act of lawlessness in leaving the death scene should be dealt with accordingly."

The DPS called upon any citizen who might have information he thinks would be helpful in this case to contact the nearest office of the Highway Patrol or Texas Rangers, which is listed under "Texas Department of Public Safety" in the telephone book.

BAYLOR UNIVERSITY CELEBRATING 175th ANNIVERSARY

Baylor has done a lot of growing in 125 years, is now the largest Baptist university in the world, and one of the largest

The university will climax a year-long celebration this week by bringing to its Waco campus outstanding personalities from such fields as religion, education, music and journalism for speaking engagements. Theme for the week, which has been set aside to particularly highlight the observance, is "Toward 2095: Dimensions of the Human Quest".

On Sunday, February 1, an convocation featuring a message delivered by the internationally known evangelist Billy Graham, was held at 2 p. m. in the Heart O' Texas Coliseum. "Dimensions of Faith" was the theme of the convocation that attracted a crowd in excess of 11,000, including numerous state and national leaders. The commemorative convocation began a week that will bring to the Baylor campus several guest speakers including Dr. Sam Magill of Washington, D. C., president of the Council of Protestant Colleges and Universities; Francis Robinson of New York City, assistant manager of the Metropolitan Opera; William Crook, former ambassador to Australia, now chairman of Translinear Inc. of Austin; Bill Moyers of Newsday Publications, Garden City, N. Y.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT APPROVES TWO-YEAR PLAN

V. J. McGee, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at Childress, announced this week that the Texas Highway Commission on January 30 approved a \$406-million, two-year consolidated highway program that will mean better highway facilities throughout Texas. The program calls for construction or reconstruction of U. S. and State-numbered highways. In all, a total of 1,968.6 miles of non-interstate highways will be built or reconstructed under the program. Estimated cost of the construction work is \$365 million. Included in the consolidated highway program is a project in Briscoe County which covers the widening, reconditioning, and re-

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surfacing of State Highway 86 in Silverton, from State Highway 207 to the East City Limit.

The estimated cost of this work is \$30,000 and will be constructed in conjunction with the reconstruction of State Highway 86, from the East City Limit of Silverton East to the Caprock, which was approved on a previous program. Plan work has already begun on these projects, and it is estimated that the contract will be let in the latter part of the summer of 1970.

MEDICARE ENROLLMENT PERIOD ENDS MARCH 31

The annual period for enrolling in the supplemental medical insurance program under Medicare will end on March 31, 1970, according to Travis C. Briggs, manager of the Amarillo social security office. This will be the last opportunity for many persons over 65 to become eligible for the doctor bill part of Medicare. Those enrolling during this period will have this coverage effective July 1, 1970.

This part of Medicare helps pay for doctor bills and other related medical services and is separate from the hospital part of the law. The medical part is paid for by the participants paying \$4 a month—which will increase to \$5.30 in July—with the government matching the costs from general revenues.

Each year, January through March, there is a general enroll-

ment period giving those over age 65 who are still eligible to enroll another chance. One must enroll within three years after his first opportunity to enroll at age 65.

Persons born October 1, 1901, or earlier who have never enrolled are no longer eligible. Those born after October 1, 1901, are still eligible during this period.

The general enrollment period does not apply to persons just becoming 65, or to those already enrolled. It is just for those over 65 who have never enrolled in the doctor bill part of Medicare, or for those who were enrolled and dropped out in 1967 or later.

Additional information about the enrollment and the forms to enroll can be secured from the Amarillo or any other social security office.

A representative of the Amarillo office will be at the courthouse in Silverton on February 5 and 19 between 9:30 and 11:30 a.m.
