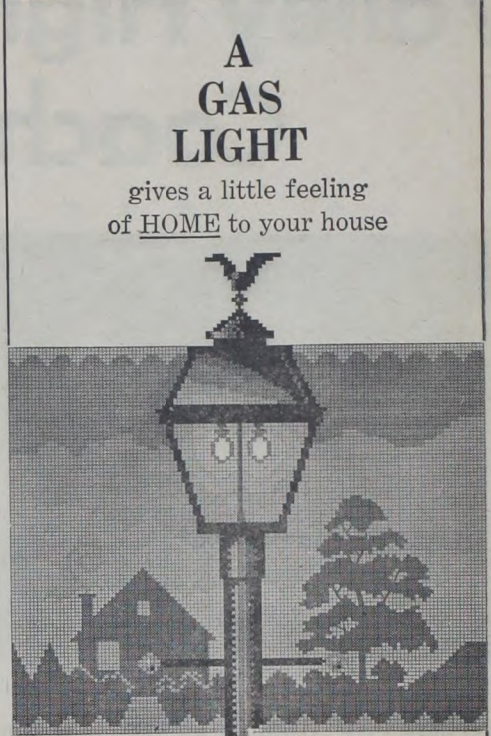

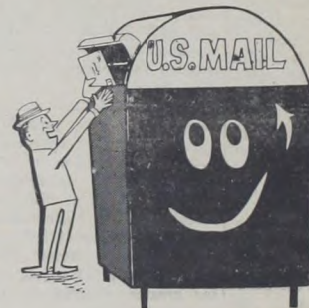

**INSIDE THE LEGISLATURE WITH REP. TOM CHRISTIAN APPROPRIATIONS BILL**

After a two-day delay brought about by the talk marathon of Senator Mike McKool's 42-hour filibuster, the House was able to get back to the State's business of reviewing the Appropriations Bill. The Bill, which totals \$4.1 billion, is projected to cover the cost of operating the State government for the fiscal year beginning September 1, 1972. This is a decrease of \$5.2 million from the current spending level. Consideration of this Bill will begin in the House on Saturday, July 1st. We hope that those who are not returning to the House next year will not pick this time to demonstrate their personal losses brought about by disgruntled constituents.

I would personally like to compliment the Appropriations Committee for many hours of hard work given to the preparation of this Bill. Their dedication in making sure this Bill was written completely in the open so that any member or interested citizen had the right to witness the hearings and debate in regard to every section should be commended. In the past, this has not been the case.

**LEGISLATIVE REFORM**  
As one who has been interested in reform since coming to the Texas House, I'm concerned about the attitude of the voter. Public sentiment and the operation of our state government go hand in hand. Therefore, it is the responsibility of the citizen to actively participate in our government and not give rise to the illusion that the rascals have been thrown out in the recent primaries, that reforms have been completed, and that good government is on the way. False security is easily brought about when the citizens feel that they can completely rely on professional organizations to keep them informed as to the happenings of the legislative process. Yet, these organizations and associations become so involved with the various personalities that they cease to function as an independent group.

In our current Speaker's race, the AFL-CIO is the only organization to endorse a candidate for the speakership. Yet, when one views the reasons for such an endorsement and takes into consideration the past efforts of organized labor—their support of a corporation tax, a personal income tax, and the authorization of public employees to organize, resulting in Union officials taking the place of Legislators at the expense of the taxpayers—it is difficult to understand the absence of endorsements from the business, community and professional organizations such as the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, to whom many citizens look for counsel and guidance in governmental matters.

Customer Service or the Consumer Relations Department for immediate results. Keep a copy of the letter for future reference. If you don't receive a response within a month, let the manufacturer know that you're taking the complaint to another level. Manufacturers don't want poor customer relations and they don't like bad publicity. The next step may be the action that gets results.

This third step is writing to a consumer protection agency. Include a copy of the letter sent to the manufacturer. This may involve local and national publicity particularly undesirable for the

manufacturer. These agencies react upon similar complaints received by numerous persons. Your consumer complaints may be addressed to any of the offices listed below.
